





County borrows \$100,000 for jail

By Ray McClure
County Judge Executive Buzz
Carloftis borrowed \$100,000 from
the Bank of Mt. Vernon Monday to
help with the cost of the county jail

renovation.

The judge took time out Monday to take a look at the problems and solutions to the jail project, His remarks in the form of questions and answers are below:

Q. Why does the county have a jail?

il?

A. Persons convicted of crime and intenced in Rockcastle County are aced in either the county jail or sent a state prison.

Q. Does it cost taxpayers to have

A. Certainly it does. Some of the A. Certainly it does. Some of the costs for taking care of prisoners include food, transportation to other facilities, medical expenses, utilities, insurance on the building, and salaries for the jailer and staff who care for the prisoners.

Q. Who is ultimately respon-

sible for county prisoners?

A. Obviously, the jailer. The Fiscal Court (county judge/executive and magistrates) however, must make

ovisions to house prisoners.

Q. If the Fiscal Court decides to house prisoners in another county, wouldn't it be cheaper than main-taining a jail here?

A. Absolutely not. First of all

wouldn't if be cheaper than maintaining a jail here?

A. Absolutely not. First of all, no jail anywhere will house another county's prisoners without charging them for providing the service. To-day that is around \$50 per person with the county averages around so that the county averages around a service of the county averages around the county around the county another county to house them, our county would have to pay \$124,000 cach year to another county, plus any medical costs, the staff salary, and transportation costs to and from another county's jail. When you consider that the state reimburses our county approximately \$75,000 per year for bed allotment, and when you realize, after adding medical costs,

transportation, insurance, social security, worker's comp, and salaries to the \$124,000 mentioned above for having our prisoners in other counties, you have to wonder where the extra \$80,000 to \$100,000 will come from. The \$75,000 given by the state would mean the county would still

have to come up with \$80,000 to \$100,000 to pay the bills every year. Q. Are you saying our county can't afford to not have a jail?
A. That's exactly correct. Rock-castle County must maintain a jail.
Q. Why?
A. As long as we maintain a jail




