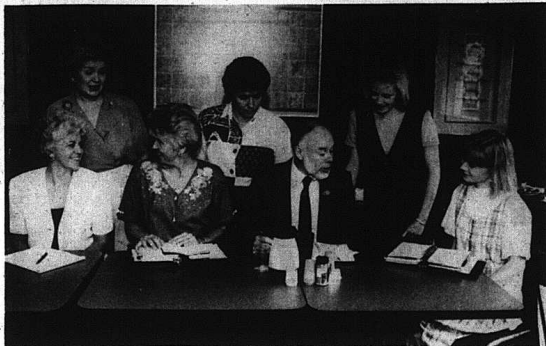
There is no charge for tuition and each student works at least 10 hours a week to pay living expenses.

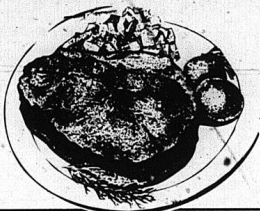

Bluegrass State Games include several local participants

Archery, softball and track/field are the sports Rockcastle Countians have registered for thus far in the annual Bluegrass State Games slated for July 28, 29 and 30 in Lexington.

Kevin E. Bullock will participate in the archery competition; Bruce Blanton of Rt. 1, Brodhead and Jeff Bullock, of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon, will field softball teams and Britany Offutt will compete in track/field in the 11th Annual Games will feature 25 different sports.

Entries as of last week, were at about 10,734 with a whopping 341 softball teams or 5,456 participants. Soccer, the second largest team sport, already had 274 teams or 4,110 individuals. Early registrations for volleyball has 16 teams entered and 13 for three-on-three basketball.

Tennis with 386 participants has the largest number of entries so far in the individual sports. Equestrian ranked second with 120 entries, followed by gymnastics, 109 and track and field, 103.

Early registrations from the other individual sports are: archery, 18; bowling, 40; canoeing/kayaking, 1; chess, 16; croquet, 10; cycling, 3; diving, 3; fencing, 3; golf, 27; horse-shoes, 7; karate, 37; power tumbling, 6; racquetball, 5; shooting, 36; swimming, 30; table tennis, 25 and wrestling, 16.

"We are extremely pleased with registration to date," said Sam Dunn, Executive Director of the Games. "If we continue at the present pace, we think we will reach or exceed last year's participation. Regardless of the numbers, we want everyone to come to Lexington and enjoy competing in their sport and carry home some fond memories and maybe a medal or two."

County borrows \$100,000 for jail

County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotis borrowed \$100,000 from the Bank of Mt. Vernon Monday to help with the cost of the jail renovation.

The judge took time out Monday to take a look at the problems and solutions to the jail project. His remarks in the form of questions and answers are below:

Q. Why does the county have a jail?

A. Persons convicted of crime and sentenced in Rockcastle County are placed in either the county jail or sent to a state prison.

Q. Does it cost taxpayers to have prisoners?

A. Certainly it does. Some of the costs for taking care of prisoners include food, transportation to other facilities, medical expenses, utilities, insurance on the building, and salaries for the jailer and staff who care for the prisoners.

Q. Who is ultimately respon-

sible for county prisoners? A. Obviously, the jailer. The Fiscal Court (county judge and executive and magistrates) however, must make provisions to house prisoners.

Q. If the Fiscal Court decides to house prisoners in another county, wouldn't it be cheaper than maintaining a jail here?

A. Absolutely not. First of all, no jail anywhere will house another county's prisoners without charging them for providing the service. Today that is around \$20 per person each day. Our county averages around 17 Rockcastle Countians in jail each day of the year. If we had to pay another county to house them, our county would have to pay \$124,000 each year to another county, plus any medical costs, the staff salary, and transportation costs to and from another county's jail. When you consider that the state reimburses our county approximately \$75,000 per year for bed allotment, and when you realize, after adding medical costs,

transportation, insurance, social security, worker's comp, and salaries to the \$124,000 mentioned above for having our prisoners in other counties, you have to wonder where the extra \$80,000 to \$100,000 will come from. The \$75,000 given by the state would mean the county would still

have to come up with \$80,000 to \$100,000 to pay the bills every year.

Q. Are you saying our county can't afford to not have a jail?

A. That's exactly correct. Rockcastle County must maintain a jail.

Q. Why?

A. As long as we maintain a jail

here in our county, we have the potential to house other counties' prisoners (and charge them \$20/day/prisoner) and house some of the state's prisoners (at \$22 per day per prisoner). By doing this our county has the potential to make money, through our jail, from other counties. If we

did not have a jail, we would not have that opportunity. And, keep in mind, that our county government has, in the past, relied heavily upon the jail fund to help pay bills.

Q. Why is the county renovating the jail?

A. To bring the jail up to standards set by the state. I'm not saying I agree with those rules set by the state—they are very costly—but our magistrates realized we had only two options: renovate or close. I applaud the magistrates for doing what will be the best, in the long run, for our county's financial health. They deserve everyone's respect for not being short-sighted. This renovation is a must if we keep a jail operating.

Q. If you did not renovate, do you really think the state would close our jail?

A. Yes! Within the first few weeks in office, I was given warning by the Department of Corrections we must begin renovating or face closure. Remember, Jackson County Jail has been closed since I've been in office, and that closure has, I understand, broken the Jackson County Jail Fund, forcing Jackson County's magistrates into a very tough position. The same thing has happened in other counties, as well. Our present jail and past jailer have been very good administrators and helped keep us out of such problems.

Q. Do you believe the new standards are too stringent?

A. Again, our Fiscal Court has no say in whether or not they are too stringent. We can do only what the state requires, which, in this case, was renovate to other standards or close it up. We are doing the right thing for the county's future.

"The good thing in all this is the fact that the Kentucky Department of Corrections has pledged \$122,000 over a ten year period that will be used to repay the \$100,000 loan," Carlotis said.

Excessive rainfall to blame

Blue mold found in Rockcastle tobacco

Blue Mold has been identified on farmer's tobacco crops. Not only is this a concern, because the crop is so small, but the possibility that this year's blue mold may be resistant to Ridomil.

Blue Mold has been found in fields treated with Ridomil well above recommended rates. This would indicate the resistant blue mold strain.

What is recommended for farmers

to do? Be sure to apply Ridomil as a lay-by treatment to control susceptible blue mold plus weekly sprays of Dithane M-45 fungicide.

The key to a fungicide working is to get spray up under leaves. This requires high pressure to point of fogging tobacco. Weekly sprayers are required to protect tobacco. For more information, contact Tom Mills at 256-2403.

As a teenager, I couldn't wait to become a licensed driver. Unfortunately, when I reached sixteen, Dad didn't have a vehicle that would even come close to meeting the standards that the Kentucky State Police said a vehicle ought to possess before they'd let you take a driver's test in it.

Dad's idea of an emergency brake, for instance, was a big squarish rock that weighed about twenty pounds that he kept in the bed of our old '55 Ford pick-up. Anytime he parked on a hill he, or one of the passengers, dragged the rock out and stuck it under the closest rear wheel to "skotch her up." And that probably worked as well as a real emergency brake but wasn't mechanical enough to suit the State Police.

Dad also figured that if you had one brake light that also burned when the head lights were on, that's all you needed on the rear end. I can remember asking what the little lever on the left hand side of the steering column

was for and he said, "that used to be the signal lights but they don't work any more."

Signal lights, in fact, were not required by law to keep a vehicle on the road. Unfortunately, they were required if you wanted to take a license test. The cops also required that the headlights have a dimmer switch but Dad was happy as long as both burned on low beam. They probably had some rules too having to do with springs sticking up through the seat but I never got around to asking.

So, in January of 1965, on the morning of my sixteenth birthday, I was at the Leitch County Court-house waiting for the Clerk's office to open so I could get a learner's permit and for the next two and a half years, that's as close as I could get to being a legal driver. When I finally got my license in the summer of '67, I was probably the most experienced driver to ever take the test. I figure I had at

least 150,000 miles of learning under my belt.

Dad was perfectly happy to let me drive, in fact he insisted as did a number of cousins and aunts and uncles most of whom enjoyed the luxury of having a chauffeur behind the wheel. Three or four of my high school classmates were comfortable with my driving their parents' cars, especially when they were with a "friend" of the opposite sex coming home from the drive-in movies.

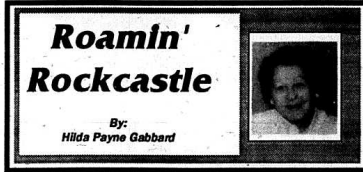
Finally in August of '67, Dad bought a '62 Chevy four door BelAir and our particular Adams family had its first luxury ride. Everything

worked. Every light burned. The radio even played. We had to spend one whole day doing road work in the head of Blain Branch to keep her from dragging, but what a car. A brand new Cadillac would not have made me any happier.

I was in college at Pikeville at the time, but Dad bought The Car on Saturday and on Monday, Jimmy Hampton accompanied me to the courthouse. Shortly after 9 p.m., I had my license. But for all that driving experience, I made 75 on my test. 74 was failing.

I lost ten points in one fell swoop for tuning the radio and five more for

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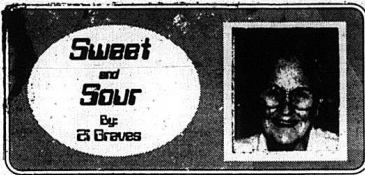
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Drifting & Dreaming

Use Fruits in Convenient Pie Fillings

As fruits begin to ripen, they are often available at reasonable prices when they are in season. Now is the time to begin to can fruits to use through the fall and winter. Pie fillings are a good way to can peaches, blueberries, cherries or raspberries. The results are pie fillings that can be poured into a shell for a pie in a matter of minutes.

Recipes for pie fillings are available free of charge from the Extension Office. Each pie filling calls for "Clear Jel", a chemically modified food starch that is excellent for fillings that are canned and baked. Other starches break down when used in pie fillings, causing a runny consistency. Do not substitute cornstarch or flour for Clear Jel. Call the Extension Office at 256-2443 for information on Clear Jel.

BLUEBERRY PIE FILLING

Quantities of Ingredients Needed For 1 Quart:

- 3 1/2 cups fresh or thawed blueberries
- 3/4 cup + 2 tbsps. granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup + 1 tbsps. Clear Jel
- 1 cup cold water
- 3 1/2 tsp. bottled lemon juice
- 3 drops blue food coloring

(optional)
1 drop red food coloring (optional)
Quantities of Ingredients Needed For 7 Quarts:

- 6 quarts fresh or thawed blueberries
- 6 cups granulated sugar
- 2 1/4 cups Clear Jel
- 7 cups cold water
- 1/2 cup bottled lemon juice
- 20 drops blue food coloring

(optional)
7 drops red food coloring (optional)

QUALITY. Select fresh, ripe, firm blueberries. Thawed frozen blueberries may be used. If sugar has been added, rinse off white fruit is still frozen.

PROCEDURE. Wash and drain blueberries. For fresh fruit, place 6 cups at a time in 1 gallon of boiling water. Boil each batch 1 minute after the water returns to a boil. Drain and keep heated fruit in a covered bowl or pot. Combine sugar and Clear Jel in a large kettle. Stir. Add water and, if desired, food coloring. Cook on medium high heat until mixture thickens and begins to bubble. Add lemon juice and boil one minute, stirring constantly. Fold in drained berries immediately and fill jars with mixture without delay, leaving

1-inch headspace. Adjust lids and process immediately.

Producers are reminded that July 1st is the deadline to sign buyout tobacco leases and sales of quota. Farms leasing away their quota must ensure that ALL owners have signed the lease or it cannot be approved. Farms leasing quota should check the County Office to be sure that all signatories have been obtained.

Crop reports are REQUIRED this year on farms that will market tobacco in 1995. As soon as crops are planted, please contact CFSA at 256-2525 to schedule a convenient time to file your report. Deadline is JULY 15TH, but if you come in as soon as planting is completed, you are sure to miss long lines of waiting. If it is impossible for you to come in during office hours (7:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m.) contact us and we will work out a time after hours for reporting. All persons with insurance through the CFSA Office must sign an FCI-19, which is in regards to their policy, by JULY 15TH. This includes tenants who may not own a farm, but will be sharing in the tobacco check from the tobacco company. If you have any questions concerning the crop acreage reports or think you may not file an FCI-19 but are not sure, feel free to contact this office.

Boiling-water Canner—Hot Pack: process pints or quarts for 35 minutes.

July 15th is also the deadline to submit actual production history (APH) for grain farms. If no production evidence is available (weigh tickets, bin measurements) then the county office will assign the yield. Free appraisals may be requested for any grain farm that purchased CAT insurance through CFSA.

Soybean Referendum
Any person who during the period September 1, 1971, through June 1, 1995, has been engaged in the growing of soybeans in the United States and who owns or shares the ownership and risk of loss of such soybeans, is entitled to request a refund referendum.

The producer poll shall be held in the Rockcastle County CFSA Office on July 26, 1995 during the regular business hours of 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Registration and polling will take place the same day, except for absentee registration and polling.

Absentee registration and polling forms shall be available by mail upon written request either by mail or in person through July 14th from the County Office of the count in which the soybean producer resides. If absentee registrations are not returned (postmarked or received by Close of Business July 14, 1995) to the County Office timely, producers may participate in person at the County Office on July 26, 1995. most of it as dung and urine. Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water, and gate areas.

Nutrient removal is much less when pasture is grazed than when it is used to make hay. Thus, starting a good rotational system reduces fertilizer topdressing needed compared to making hay.

Forage quality improves when pasture areas rest between grazings. Animals allowed continuous access to a pasture trample and defecate on significant amounts of forage. These areas often grow up, becoming more mature and lower in quality. Rotating puts livestock on pasture when the forage is at or

near its peak nutritive value: Rotated pastures have higher digestibility because forage is kept in a vegetative and growing stage with less dead and over-mature material compared to continuously grazed pastures. Animals tend to select only the best and leave the worst.

Rotational grazing systems also allow use of species that are more productive and responsive to management including alfalfa, native warm season grasses, and red clover. Different species enable farmers to improve the seasonal supply of forage, grow more forage and grow better quality forage. Using these species also can reduce hay harvest costs.

Rotational grazing means more money

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of running over the entire farm. All grass needs a recovery time, and rotating between fields allows grass to re-grow between grazing cycles. The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals harvest for themselves. Nutrients harvested by grazing cost less than half as much as nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grain.

Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase pasture utilization by at least 10%. Depending on the forage, rotating results in pasture use of 60% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed. Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures. Less than 10% of the forages' phosphorus and potassium are removed by livestock; they return

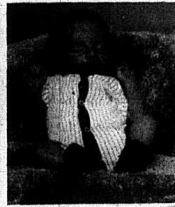

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Settlement - 1993 Taxes as of August 9, 1994. This tax settlement is the responsibility of the Rockcastle County Sheriff. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and the Audit Guide for Sheriff's Tax Settlements issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The Sheriff prepares his financial statement on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the Rockcastle County Sheriff's taxes charged, credited, and paid as of August 9, 1994, in conformity with the basis of accounting described in the preceding paragraph.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the statement of the Sheriff's Settlement - 1993 Taxes taken as a whole. The accompanying schedule of excess of liabilities over assets is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statement. Such information has been subjected to auditing procedures and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statement taken as a whole.

COMMENT AND RECOMMENDATION

Based on the results of our audit, we make the following comment and recommendation.

The Sheriff Should Eliminate Deficit in Tax Account

Based on available records, there was a deficit of \$1,489 in the Sheriff's 1993 tax account. This resulted from undeposited receipts of \$1,409; one uncollected cold check of \$122; a state penalty of \$12; less a surplus of \$63 from 1992 tax collections; plus an unexplained variance of \$9. On April 26, 1995, the Sheriff eliminated this deficit by depositing personal funds into the tax account.

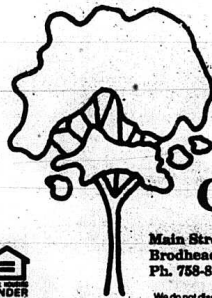
