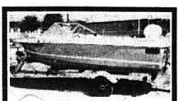

 Public notification is hereby given by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) of the intent to reimburse eligible local governments and State agencies for eligible cost incurred to repair publicly-owned facilities, as well as potential construction of new facilities due to damages resulting from floods, severe winds and hail storms, torrential rain and flooding. This notice applies to the Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs. The areas affected are the counties of Fulton, Jackson, Perry and Rockcastle in the State of Kentucky. These counties are now added to the counties which were declared a major disaster area by the President on June 13, 1995. This assistance is granted under the authority of Public Law 93-288, as amended, the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act. This notice concerns projects and facilities located in the 100-year floodplain (areas that have been determined to have a one percent probability of flooding in any given year), or critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. These projects and facilities may have adverse effects upon the floodplain or may be vulnerable to damage by flooding if they are restored to pre-disaster condition.
 These projects and facilities include, but are not limited to the following:
 1. Non-emergency debris removal.
 2. Non-emergency repair to protective flood control facilities, including dams, reservoirs and channels;
 3. Damages to roads, including streets, culverts and bridges;
 4. Damages to water control facilities, pipes and distribution systems;
 5. Damage to public buildings and related equipment;
 6. Damage to public utilities, including sewage treatment plants and sewers, and electrical power distribution systems;
 7. Damage to private, non-profit facilities (hospital, educational centers, emergency and custodial care services, etc.);
 8. Construction of a hazard mitigation project designed to reduce the impact of future flooding.

The President's Executive Order 11988 on Floodplain Management requires that all Federal actions in or affecting the same floodplain be reviewed for opportunities to relocate out of the floodplain or to minimize future damage from flooding. Executive Order 11990 requires all Federal actions give consideration to relocating outside of or within floodplains and to developing alternate project plans to protect wetlands. FEMA has determined that for certain types of facilities, there are normally no alternatives to restoration in the floodplain. These are facilities which meet all of the following criteria:
 1. The FEMA estimated replacement cost is less than 50% of the estimated replacement cost of the entire facility and is less than \$100,000.
 2. The facility is not located in a floodway.
 3. The facility has not sustained structural damage in a previous Presidentialy-declared flooding major disaster or emergency.
 4. The facility is a critical one (i.e. hospital, generating plant, contains dangerous materials, or emergency operation center, etc.).
 FEMA intends to provide assistance for the restoration of the facilities described above to their pre-disaster condition except that certain measures to mitigate the effects of future flooding may be incorporated into the restoration work. For example, culverts and bridges with insufficient roadway openings may be subject to washing out due to the backed-up water. This backed-up water may also cause damage to other facilities in the area. One mitigation measure would be to increase the size of the roadway openings.
 Other projects and facilities which do not fall into one of the four criteria listed above are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternative locations. The public is invited to participate in the process of identifying alternatives and analyzing their impacts. Details on how to obtain information on specific projects and on the submission of comments will be provided at the end of this notice. Further explanation on the final determination on the restoration of these facilities will be given in subsequent notices.
 Because of urgent need for some facilities of the type described in the previous paragraph, an applicant may request restoration of a facility when the Federal inspector visited the site. Some of these facilities would normally fall into the category requiring examination of alternative sites. These facilities will be restored in their original location based upon the following rationale. One of the following situations applies in each case:
 1. The facility is functionally dependent on its floodplain location. Flood control facilities and bridges are examples.
 2. The project facilitates an open space use. Facilities which are part of a park or other open space use are examples. This type of use represents sound floodplain management and therefore, there is no need to change it.
 3. Facilities, such as roads and utilities, are an integral part of a larger network which would be uneconomical to relocate.
 Additionally, the possible effects of not restoring the facility were examined. In each case, there was an overriding public need for the facility which clearly outweighed the Order's requirements to avoid the floodplain and which would not floodplain does not practice. FEMA also consulted with State and local officials and actions which will be carried out do not violate either State or local floodplain protection standards. The restoration of these facilities also will incorporate certain measured designs to mitigate the effects of future flooding and/or storm damage. This will be the only notice to the public concerning these facilities.
 Hazard mitigation projects may involve construction of new facility, such as a levee or a debris dam; modification of an existing, undamaged facility, such as improving roadway openings of bridges or culverts; relocation of facilities out of the floodplain; or other types of projects to limit the effects of future floods. Subsequent notices will provide more specific information as project proposals are developed.

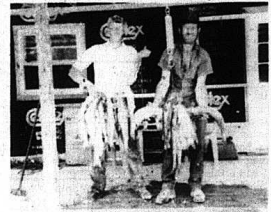

Brodhead arrest

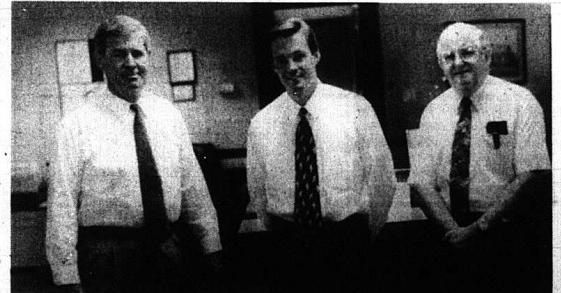

Points East

I love to cook. Take a side-long glance at my belly and you will probably make a smelly, gossipy remark having to do with the fact that I also like to eat. But you may also be interested to know that I catch women checking me out all the time. Thank Heaven I don't have to worry about them staring. They just sort of glance and look the other way so I don't have to worry too much about what they're thinking.

It's so disgusting to be taking an innocent jog along Highway 52 and have women drive by and stare right through your trousers. Undressing you in their minds, so to speak.

At least I think it would be disgusting. And I've been here fifteen years and, so far, all they've done is glance at all my belly and speed up as they drive past. So far, here in Garrard County, the local women have given Loreta nothing to be jealous

about. And that's a load off my mind. On the other hand, I've only been truly disgusted a scant few times in my life. When Martha Wilkinson announced her candidacy for Governor, for instance, I vomited on the kitchen table and I'd like to know what it feels like to be more disgusted than that. I can't imagine that being "checked out", however thoroughly, would even come close. But what the heck, I'm game.

All of which has nothing to do with cooking.

And, as I recall, that's how this whole thing started. I really intended to talk about a different way of cooking beans.

And friends—are you tired of your garden fresh green beans being cooked for half a day with a big slab of salty, seasoned fat-back? Do you yearn for French loaves lathered with garlic butter instead of corn bread with every evening meal? Do you

prefer your green beans filled instead of broken at the joints? If you answered yes to any of the questions in the preceding paragraph, you ought to be tarred and feathered and run out of the county.

If you answered no consistently, but had some lingering doubt in the back of your mind about trying something new just one time, try this:

The kids call their recipe "Dad's Best Beans Yet" (probably because it smells like pizza)

- About half a gallon (broken) of young green beans
- Four or five good sized, dead-ripe tomatoes
- One fresh hot banana or jalapeno pepper
- One good strong onion
- One average bell pepper
- One teaspoon grated garlic or three crushed garlic cloves
- A fistful of shredded fresh basil
- Two tablespoons dried oregano or a fistful of fresh shredded if you can find it (I grow mine)
- Three tablespoons white vinegar
- Three tablespoons white sugar
- One teaspoon each of black pepper and salt

Water

The ideal variety is a Roma pole bean, but almost any other variety from Kentucky Wonders to half runners will work if you pick them before they get full. You want "flabs" as my mother used to scold me for picking, tender, immature, green pods with very little seed formation. This

will not work nearly as well with full "meats" beans because everything else will overcook before the beans get done.

Break them up like you would your regular snap beans and fill a six quart cooker almost half full. Soak the tomatoes so that you can remove the skin, then slice and dice and put them on top of the beans. Chop the peppers and onions up recipe fine and dump them in on top of the tomatoes to add all the other ingredients. Stir the mixture until it is mixed thoroughly and then add enough water to barely cover the whole thing. The water will vary from a cup to as much as three cups depending on how juicy your tomatoes were. Bring to a rapid boil for about five minutes and stir a time or two. Then simmer, uncovered, for thirty minutes.

I guarantee you that nine people out of ten will go back for second helpings.

We grow everything in this recipe except the salt, sugar and pepper in our garden and herb bed and that makes it a bit special. If you have a favorite "all garden recipe" you'd like to share with fellow readers of this column, please send one or two along and I'll put them in the news over the next several weeks. My address is 6945 West, West, Paint Lick (you can't miss it) 40461.

Cooking and gardening are the best ways I know to stay out of politics and I'm trying real hard to do just that.

counties including Jackson, Perry and Rockcastle Counties have been added to President Clinton's disaster declaration for the state of Kentucky, releasing federal emergency disaster funds to those counties. Fulton County in western Kentucky was also added to the declaration.

The additional counties were added to the Presidential declaration after Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) officials assessed the damaged public areas in all four counties.

The disaster assistance will help county and local governments repair and replace damaged public facilities that occurred during sudden storms that tore through southern and eastern Kentucky in May.

"Southern and eastern Kentucky have been particularly hard hit by the high winds and heavy rains," Rogers said. "The bad weather has placed tremendous burdens on every family, business and community. This disaster declaration will be a tremendous help to everyone."

Rogers penned a June 3rd letter to President Clinton asking him to declare Kentucky a disaster after the sudden storm, allowing federal assistance to help cover the costs of the storm-related damages.

Even though final estimates are not yet available, the State Disaster and Emergency Services said preliminary damage estimates could reach over \$50 million.

Only Jesus can liberate us from the shackles of sin, Jn. 8:36, Jn. 14:6. 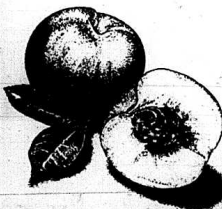

Sensory

Exploratory Play

We all learn from our senses. We learn from seeing, hearing, tasting, smelling, and touching. We also learn from the sensation of movement, our play—and your child's—should include all of these sensations.

Newborns already prefer some sensations over others. They respond to things that they see. They enjoy the sound of the human voice and prefer sweet tastes to salty or bitter ones. They prefer smells that are pleasant to those that are strong and pungent. Babies also have preferences in the things they feel; they prefer soft silky fabric or human touch to the feel of a rough towel. As babies get older they tell different sights, sounds, smells and textures apart and learn what various sensations mean. They know that the higher-pitched voice is mom and the lower-pitched voice is dad, and that food is coming when they see the bottle.

As physical skills improve, babies explore with fingers and hands. They love to experiment with textures, often smelling things such as pudding, mashed potatoes, or water. You can help your child explore the senses to explore and learn. Birth to age 1 hang mobiles and objects across the crib to provide new sights. Play new sounds on a tape recorder. Give chances to both smell and feel during bath time by using a scented soap and rubbing with fragrant lotion and powder.

Rubbing, cuddling, and stroking are very good if your child feels stiff or floppy. Children who tend to be stiff respond better to slower, relating stroking; children who feel floppy enjoy vigorous, rapid movement and massage.

As soon as babies can keep their hands open they can explore different textures. Attach objects securely to a rope or towel and tie it across the crib. Use things that won't come apart or break, such as: hair curlers, thick colored yarn (that won't break or fray), jar lids, plastic rings.

Your baby also explores smells. When cooking, let the baby smell different spices, such as cinnamon, cloves, mint leaves, and lemon and orange peel. Dip a teething ring into bath time, or other sticky substances to provide new tastes.

The older baby can sit without support, so the hands are free to play. Hang toys from a frame so they won't roll away. Touch and taste can be explored by finger painting with pudding or yogurt. Cooked spaghetti can be squashed between the fingers, pulled apart, and thrown.

Bath time is a wonderful time to explore with the senses. Water can be

poored through fingers, and hands can slip water to make it splash. Give extra support if your child can't sit in the tub without help—a plastic laundry basket with mesh sides gives support and won't trap water.

The one-year-old explores by touching in a special drawer, keep objects that are safe to touch and play with (such as a wooden spoon, a strainer, a funnel, an old pan, or an old magazine).

A flashlight is another toy for this age. Children love to examine the switch and shine the light in a darkened room.

Noisemakers give practice in telling different sounds apart. Fill salt or oatmeal boxes or film canisters with noisy objects (such as oatmeal, raisins, or old measuring spoons). Make these in pairs so your child can match the sounds.

You can do the same kind of matching with smells. Put herbs, onions, garlic, lemon, etc., in small pinions or baby-food jars. Cover the jars with contact paper. Let the child match the smells.

Different textures can be explored with a "feely" bag. The bag might contain feathers, scrapes or burlap or other textured fabric, and objects which might be rough or soft.

Sand and water play is fun, too. Your child can feel the dry sand as it runs through the fingers and can make imprints in the wet sand. Macaroni or beans also pour nicely.

Cooked clay dough is another good material for play and sensory stimulation. Here is a recipe:

- 1 cup cornstarch
- 2 cups baking soda
- 1 1/4 cups water

Mix the dry ingredients in a saucepan. Add water. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil about a minute, until the mixture is the consistency of moist mashed potatoes. Spoon onto a plate, cover with damp cloth. Refrigerate in a plastic bag.

The two-year-old touches and tastes everything, so keep electrical outlets protected and electrical cords out of reach. Store breakables on high shelves. Two-year-olds explore anything which provides a new feeling or a new sound (such as sand, mud, bugs, and leaves).

The two-year-old is able to match textures—cover pairs of blocks with different textures. It's easier now for the child to identify different household smells; play name-the-small games (such as soap, coffee, and bacon).

The two-year-old also enjoys games that require telling the difference between wet and dry—a big help if you're working on toilet train-

ing. Ask if the child is dry, and give praise when the child says correctly that the pants are dry. If the pants are wet, comment that they are wet. Another way to teach wet and dry is to show how clothes go into the dryer wet and come out dry.

The three-year-old is learning more about the world. Imitation is how three-year-olds act out this understanding; they "bake" mud pies, "drive" a car, and "sweep" the floor. The three-year-old also enjoys water play—blowing bubbles, splashing, finding toys hidden in soapy water—and sand play—pouring, filling, and emptying. Hide toys in sand to encourage exploring. Make textured finger paint by mixing the paint with oatmeal, dry beans, etc. Many materials are good for finger painting—try frosting, yogurt, jelly, or mashed potatoes.

Sometimes, the things we see, hear, or feel must be interpreted for us in order to make sense, you can help by providing a variety of experiences and by helping your child understand what the experiences mean.

to get fixed when we have the money to fix them right now.

This summer, we'll have a golden opportunity to help every county in the state improve its roads, if our

lawmakers and citizens agree. As you may know, we have been working for three and a half years to put Kentucky on sound financial footing. When we took office in 1991, Kentucky's finances were in sorry shape. As you probably remember, for the first half of our term, we couldn't even pay income tax refunds on time because the checks would have bounced.

We downsized government by eliminating more than 1700 permanent full-time jobs through attrition for a total payroll savings of approximately \$45 million a year, every year. We reduced the welfare rolls by 18% for a \$30+ million savings. We cut out waste throughout state Government by limiting out-of-state travel, selling cars and curbing spending. At the same time, our economic development policies allowed us to create a record number of new jobs in the private sector. Now, unemployment is at a 20-year low, and since more Kentuckians are working, more are paying taxes.

Today, we have a vastly improved financial picture. We have \$100 million in our budget reserve trust fund (our state savings account) which is the largest in history. Also, when we get the final financial reports from the past fiscal year which ended June 30, we expect to have between \$114 and \$134 million of undesignated surplus in the general fund and \$50 million in the road fund. That amounts to between \$164 and \$184 million, on top of the \$100 million already put into our savings account. We have come a long way in a short time.

When state legislators come to Frankfort in late July for a special session needed to re-draw legislative boundaries, I am suggesting that they also agree to use the \$50 million

surplus that is in the state's road fund to give counties urgently-needed money to fix dangerous roads and bridges and to install guardrail where needed. Under our proposal, Rockcastle County would receive \$70,837. This money could be used to eliminate a good many dangerous situations in Rockcastle County and across the state this summer—and perhaps save lives. We have a responsibility to the taxpayers of this Commonwealth to make these repairs as quickly as possible.

"I also will ask lawmakers to con-

sider a proposal to invest some of the \$114-\$134 million general fund surplus in educational and job-creating possibilities; to save some by adding to the \$100 million budget reserve trust fund; and to return some to the taxpayer, possibly by raising the standard deduction—currently the lowest in the country. Increasing the standard deduction would most help those Kentuckians with incomes between ten and fifty thousand dollars a year."

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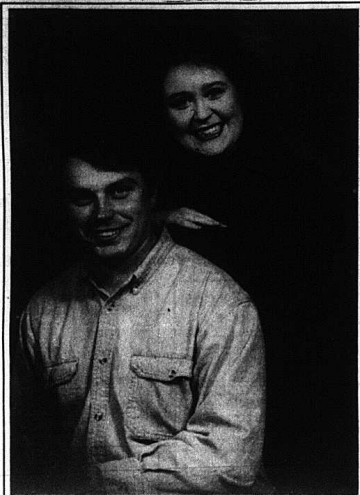

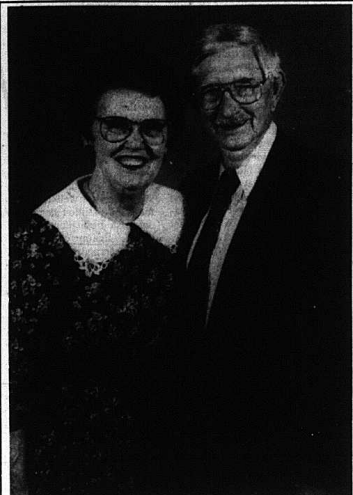

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A Common Problem With Canning Lids

The 1995 Canning Season is well underway. Occasionally problems with canning are due to lids, jars, or canning equipment. If you have any problems with canning or you need recipes and safe recommendations, don't hesitate to call the Extension Office at 256-2403.

Some problems this season have been reported with the Kerr brand lids. Kerr was required to switch to a new sealant this year. It requires only light tightening of the ring. Strong-handed tightening will result in the lid buckling. If you would like to talk to the Kerr company about the change, call the Extension Office for their toll free number.

HAVE HEALTHFUL & SAFE SUMMER PICNICS

Picnics with family and friends are a summer tradition. To make sure your next outing is a healthful, safe event, choose nutritious foods

and transport and serve them according to food safety rules.

Your imagination is the only limitation to the healthful, tasty foods that will make your picnic a memorable event. It's easy to update favorite picnic recipes to meet nutritional guidelines for less fat, sodium and sugar, and more fiber.

To lower the fat in salads, replace mayonnaise with a mixture of half low-fat mayonnaise and half plain, non-fat yogurt. Toss potato or pasta salads with lots of chopped peppers to replace salt.

Since sugary drinks and sodas tend to increase thirst, avoid them on hot summer days. Ice-cold water is the best choice. Add some zest with lemon or lime slices. You can also puree fruit like peaches, nectarines or pears with a

little lemon juice; freeze in ice cube trays and serve in iced tea or chilled soda water.

Snacks or frozen grapes, bananas, strawberries or peach

salads are a nutritious way to beat summer heat.

To add fiber to your diet, tuck sandwich fillings into whole grain bread, tortillas, or sourdough rolls. Fold chunks of fresh or dried fruits such as peaches and apricots, or chopped nuts into chicken or turkey salads to add fiber as well as flavor and color.

Play it safe by following these basic food safety guidelines: • Keep hot foods hot (140 degrees F or above) and cold foods cold (40 degrees F or below)

• When in doubt, throw it out. • Meat, dairy or other perishable foods might spoil if left out more than 2 hours. At temperatures of

Multiflora Roses

Multiflora roses were once promoted to be the living fence as well as an ideal water conserver. Many farmers are finding that plants finished with this plant rapidly becomes a wildlife habitat as weeds grow close to the living fence. Excretion, maybe, but when left uncontrolled, multiflora roses will creep out from fence rows, taking acres of farm land out of production.

Controlling multiflora roses seems to be the big problem. When cut off by grubbing, bush-hogging or a mowing machine, they come back. The key is in killing the root system. Chemicals are now available to control this problem with little danger of affecting other crops.

During late summer is an ideal time to control this noxious weed. The key to success is to apply chemicals to actively growing leaves. In our area, this means applying treatments before Japanese beetles have stripped the plant.

Chemicals like Roundup and Crossbow, when applied to the leaves, will translocate to the root system, killing the whole plant. Approximately 10-14 days after application the results will be seen.

For large areas, farm sprayers may be needed. However, on small groups or single plants out in the field, small hand sprayers are fine. Mixing 2 1/2 ounces of Roundup per gallon of water then applying complete coverage of the foliage along with 4-6 hours without rain is all that's needed. Crossbow has the advantage of killing only broad leaf plants without killing the grass in treated areas. Mixture for Crossbow is about 1 1/2 to 2 ounces per gallon of water; however, continuous

85 degrees F or above, spoilage can take place in 1 hour.

Chill cooked foods thoroughly before packing them in a cooler or picnic basket. Put perishable foods in coolers with frozen ice packs (blue gel packs), crushed or cubed ice. If you put other foods in the cooler, place the most perishable items closest to the ice. To keep foods cool, remove from the cooler only as much as you plan to eat right away. Discard all leftovers.
