Exploratory Play We all learn from our senses. We m from seeing, hearing, tasting, elling, and touching. We also learn m the sensation of movement. your

Newborns already prefer some sensations overothers. They respond to thing stat they see. They exploy the sound of the human voice and prefer sovect tastes to sally or bitter ones. They prefer smells that are pleasant to those that are pleasant to thos

dad, and that food is coming when they see the bottle. As physical skills improve, babies explore with fingers and hands. They love to experiment with textures, often

love to experiment with textures often smearing things such as pudding, mashed potatoes, or water. You can help your child use the senses to explore and learn. birth to age 1: hang mobilisand objects across the crib to provde new sights. Play new sounds on a tape recorder. Give chances to both smell and feel during buth time by using a scented scog and rubbing with fragmant lotion and powder.

powder, Rubbing, cuddling, and stroking are very good if your child feels stiff or floppy. Children who tend to be stiff respond better to slower, relax-ing stroking; children who feel floppy enjoy vigorous, rapid movement and massage.

massage. As soon as babies can keep their hands open they can explore differ-ent textures. Attach objects securely to a rope or towel and tie it across the crib. use things that won't come apart or break, such as: hair curlers, thick

or break, such as: hair curlers, thick coloredyam (that won'tbreak or fray), jar lids, plasic rings. Your baby also explores smells. When cooking, let the baby smell different spices, such as cinnamon, cloves, mont leaves, and lemon and orange peel. Dip a déching ring into pudding, yogurt, or other sticky sub-

stance to provide new tastes. The older baby can sit without support, so the hands are free to play. support, so the hands are free to play. Hang toys from a frame so they won't roll away. Touch and taste can be explored by finger painting with pudding or yogurt. Cooked spagheti can be squashed between the fingers,

pulled apart, and thrown. Bath time is a wonderful time to explore with the senses. Water can be

poured through fingers, and hands can slap water to make it splash. Give extra support if your child can't sit in the tub without help-ap lastic laun-dry basket with mesh sides gives support and work trap water. The one-year-old explores by toughing, in a special drawer, keep objects that are safe to touch and play with (such as a wooden sooon, a






