Whereas, an annual budget proposal and message has been prepared and delivered to the legislative body; and
Whereas, the legislative body has reviewed such budget proposal and modifications have been made accordingly.

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained by the City of Livingston

Section One: That the annual budget for the fiscal year beginning 7/1/95 and ending 6/30/96 is adopted as follows:

- Provide for budget amendments if required by the legislative body or if anticipated through implementation.
- Prepare any financial statements required for publication purposes, pursuant to KRS 424 and 91A.
- Cause each fund of this budget to be audited as prescribed by law.

Section Three: The detailed operating budget is adopted by reference for administration and accounting purposes.

Section Four: This ordinance shall be published in the Mt. Vernon Signal newspaper by title and summary within thirty (30) days after adoption.

Section Five: This ordinance effective immediately upon passage and publication as required by law. Adopted this 30th day of June, 1995.

Public notification is hereby given by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) of the intent to reimburse eligible State and local agencies for eligible costs incurred to repair publicly-owned facilities, as well as potential construction of new facilities due to damages resulting from tornadoes, severe winds and hail storms, torrential rain and flooding. This notice applies to the Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs. This has affected areas of Fulton, Perry, Rockcastle and the State of Kentucky. These counties are now added to the counties which were declared a major disaster area by the President on June 13, 1995. This assistance is granted under the authority of Public Law 95-288, as amended, the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act. This notice concerns projects and facilities located in the 100-year floodplain (areas that have been determined to have a one percent probability of flooding in any given year), or critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. These projects and facilities may have adverse effects upon the floodplain or may be vulnerable to damage by flooding if they are restored to pre-flood condition.

These projects and facilities include, but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Non-emergency debris removal.
- 2. Non-emergency repair to protective flood control facilities, including dams, reservoirs and levees.
- 3. Damage to roads, including streets, culverts and bridges.
- 4. Damage to water control facilities, pipes and distribution systems.
- 5. Damage to public buildings and related equipment.
- 6. Damage to public utilities, including sewage treatment plants and sewers, and electrical power distribution systems.
- 7. Damage to private, non-profit facilities (hospital, educational centers, emergency and custodial care services, etc.).
- 8. Construction of a hazard mitigation project designed to reduce the impact of future flooding.

The President's Executive Order 11880 on Floodplain Management requires that all Federal actions in or affecting the base floodplain be reviewed for opportunities to relocate out of the floodplain or to minimize future damage from flooding. Executive Order 11990 requires all Federal actions give consideration to relocation. FEMA has determined that for certain types of facilities, there are normally no alternatives to restoration in the floodplain. These are facilities which meet all of the following criteria:

- 1. The FEMA estimated cost of repair is less than 50% of the estimated replacement cost of the entire facility and is less than \$100,000.
- 2. The facility is located in a floodway.
- 3. The facility has not sustained structural damage in a previous Presidentialy-declared disaster.
- 4. The facility is not a critical one (i.e. hospital, generating plant, contains dangerous materials, or emergency operation center, etc.).

FEMA intends to provide assistance for the restoration of the facilities described above to their pre-disaster condition except that certain measures to minimize the effects of future flooding may be incorporated into the restoration work. For example, culverts and bridges with insufficient waterway openings may be subject to washing out due to the back-up water. This back-up may also cause damage to other facilities in the area. One mitigation measure would be to increase the size of the waterway opening.

Other projects and facilities which do not fall into one of the four criteria listed above, are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternative locations. The public is invited to participate in the process of identifying alternatives and analyzing their impacts. Details on how to obtain information on specific projects and the submission of comments will be found at the end of this notice. Further explanation on the final determination on the restoration of these facilities will be given in subsequent notices.

Because of urgent need for some facilities of the type described in the previous paragraph, an alternative project may have state restoration of a facility and the subsequent inspection of the site. Some of these facilities would normally fall into the category requiring examination of alternative sites. These facilities will be restored in their original location based upon the following rationale. One of the following situations applies in each case:

- 1. The facility is located outside of its floodplain location. Flood control facilities and bridges are examples.
- 2. The project facilities an open space use. Facilities which are part of a park or other open space use are examples. This type of use represents sound floodplain management and therefore, there is no need to change it.
- 3. The facilities, such as roads and utilities, are an integral part of a larger network which would be uneconomical to relocate.

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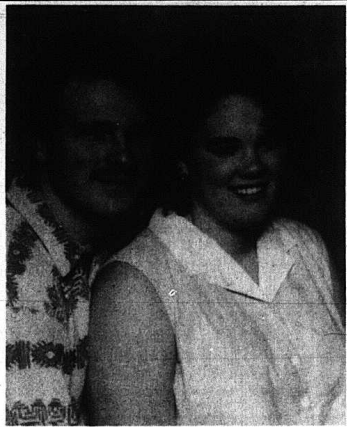

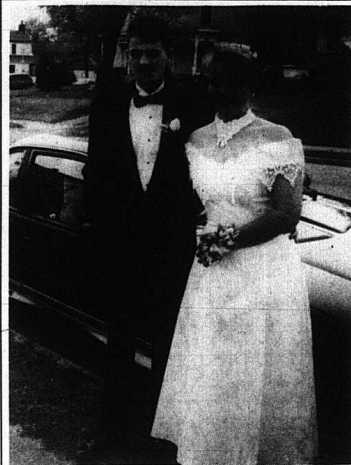

First Baptist summer mission team in Maryland

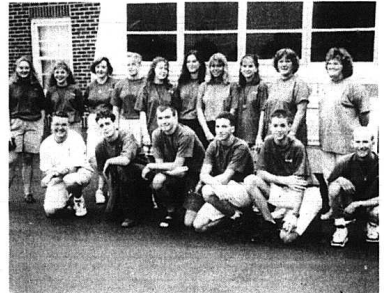
The First Baptist Church, Mt. Vernon, 1995 Summer Mission Team left Friday, July 21 for a mission assignment in Ocean City, Maryland.

Larry Hammond is new school superintendent

During a special meeting of the Rockcastle County School Board Monday night, Rockcastle County Director of Student Services Larry Hammond was hired as the new superintendent.

Hammond, 40, will officially take over August 1 for retiring superintendent Bige Towery, Jr.

Hammond, who has worked in the Rockcastle County School System since 1978, said Tuesday that he is looking forward to the task at hand.

"I intend to work very hard to see that the progress we have made in our school system over the past years continues," Hammond said.

"We are on the right track and I intend to be instrumental in seeing that we stay on the right track, going in the right direction," he said. "I will certainly be open to new ideas that will make that happen," Hammond

stated.

"One thing is for certain, just as human beings, no one ever stays in the same place, you change with time, and a school system is no different, we will either improve or decline," Hammond said. "I intend to see that we continue to progress."

Hammond taught at Livingston school from 1978 to 1982 and was a teacher at the Rockcastle County High School from 1982 to 1988.

In 1988, Hammond was hired as Rockcastle County Transportation Director and Facilities Manager, a post that he held until 1991, when he was hired as Director of Students Services for Rockcastle County.

Hammond also served as a bus

driver from 1981 to 1989.

Hammond, who was the only local applicant, was picked from twenty-two candidates.

The board met in executive session last Thursday until after midnight to discuss the final four candidates who were interviewed last week.

The board made their final unanimous decision on Monday.

Judge asks for support for \$50 million for roads

One of the longest meetings of a current Rockcastle Fiscal Court was held Tuesday, accompanied by a lot of business.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolitis called on those present, and all other residents of the county, to contact their state officials to plug legislation to pass the \$50 million surplus funds that would earmark \$367,000 for roads in Rockcastle County.

He asked those present to contact state representatives Walter Blevins and Danny Ford asking for their help.

Several residents came to the court meeting to ask for help on roads in their areas. Among them were Dr. Rudolph Burdette and Dr. Joe Henderson concerning the Hummel Road; Felix Reams on Reams Road and Antonio McCotlum on moving along

the old state road in the Roundstone/Conway area.

In other road business, the court took the low and only bid for purchase of hot mix asphalt. Elmo Greer and sons bid \$20 a ton from the plant at Mt. Vernon.

A request by Sheriff Shirley Smith for help in paying part of the gasoline expense of his office was turned down by the court because of a new cost to the court for temporary employees for dispatching.

The court agreed to take a look at a bridge on Possum Kingdom Road to the Christian Church Camp.

Judge Carlolitis presented an ordinance to the court for review. A cable television franchise to the cable companies in the area, designating service and rates in the county.

The ordinance, which will be discussed by the court, calls for free

service to county offices, including the jail, courthouse and senior citizens center, and a 5 percent fee of the gross revenue the companies for the franchise, to be paid quarterly.

The All America Club reported to the court the total bags of litter picked up in June was 217. The club used \$101. worth of gasoline.

Trash was picked up on 31 county and state roads, according to the report, but the bags were left alongside the roads because of the lack of a hauler.

The court agreed to pay half the bill for the Livingston Fire Dept.'s roof repair, including shingles and nails. The bill totaled \$462.72. The county, which houses a fire truck at Livingston, will pay \$231.36.

An update was revealed on the jail renovation project which is expected

County to hire three for radio dispatching

So the fiscal court was told at its meeting Tuesday.

Jailer Joe Howard told the court that he nor any of his deputies would dispatch calls from the jail as of August 1. Howard told the court that he had warned them about this situation long ago.

The court then discussed the best way to handle the county's dispatching, deciding they were responsible

for the dispatching and not the sheriff.

The court decided to hire three temporary employees to do the dispatching from noon Saturday until 8 a.m. Monday and from 4 p.m. weekdays until 8 a.m. weekdays. The rest of the time the dispatching will be handled at the sheriff's office, by sheriff deputies.

The court also agreed to move the dispatching out of the jail at a future date.

Friday wreck claims lives of two teenagers

A tragic single car accident on I-75, Friday afternoon claimed the lives of two teenagers.

Juan Jose Melendez, 18, and his sister, Grizel Melendez, 15, of Puerto Rico, were killed when their father lost control of an Astro mini-van at the seventy mile marker of I-75 near Conway.

State police said that William Melendez was headed south on I-75 at around 3:30 p.m. when he began to change lanes to pass a semi-tractor. The truck also began to move into the left lane and Melendez apparently swerved and lost control of the van, according to KSP officer Stacy Trees.

Trees said that after Melendez lost control of the van, it crossed the

median and veered into the north-bound lane of I-75, hitting the guardrail. The van flipped over three times before coming to rest off the roadway.

William Melendez, 45, his wife Grizel Rivera Melendez and a family friend, Ramon Ortiz-Garcia, were all injured in the accident. William Melendez and his two children were thrown from the vehicle, although he and his son both had seat belts on. His daughter who had been asleep in the back, was not wearing a seat belt, according to Trees.

Four ambulances, two from Rockcastle and two from Madison responded to the wreck. Everyone was taken to the Berea Hospital.

I've made a couple of trips to the auto races lately mostly to see what it's like in the pits.

My six-year-old pal, Travis Maggard who lives here in Paint Lick, is a big time race fan and arguably the youngest active member of a real pit crew in the country and he gets me admitted as a crew member too. His dad, ace mechanic Dave Maggard along with Danny and Rick Gibson and Pony whose last name escapes me right now, have crafted a "Road-Hog" which they regularly enter on Saturday nights at the dirt track in Richmond, Kentucky. It may not be NASCAR but it's still serious business and the kid has a number of responsibilities.

First of all, Travis has the responsibility for waving a flag with skull and cross-bones out the passenger window during warm-ups laps to intimidate the other drivers and for making sure that the car's number 20 is wiped off enough to be visible

between heats. If you think that's not much of a job, you obviously have never seen how messed up a race car can get when it's screaming around the track and ying for position with a dozen or so other muddlers.

Travis is also responsible for public relations, a job at which he excels. A couple of weekends ago for example, he made professional contact with Robby Baker who represents Tincher-Williams, the Chevy-Olds-Goo dealership in London. Tincher-Williams sponsors maybe the fastest "Late Model" car currently racing in Richmond and Travis is both a fan of #27 and Brian Asbury the Tincher-Williams team's star driver.

On top of all that he has a bit of a crush on Robby's daughter, Micki who is about 15 years older than he is, but Travis says he likes older women and he's quick to point out that Micki is the only thing at the races prettier than #27. Nobody in our crew dis-

agrees with him. In fact we have to keep reminding ourselves that we have wives at home and that Micki doesn't look like the type who would be much interested in older men. But we're off the subject here. Suffice it to say that when Micki is around that's easy to do.

To put things in perspective here for you folks who don't keep up with racing, let me explain that two classes of cars run at the dirt tracks. AGRICULTURAL FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS

- The Brodhead Fair is planned and conducted according to Kentucky Department of Agriculture regulations for use of State Funds.
- All entries must be on grounds and remain on display to conform with regulations.
- All exhibits (except livestock) must remain on display until 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 5, 1995. Premiums will not be paid for exhibits removed prior to that time.
- All exhibits (except livestock) are limited to residents of Rockcastle County.
- 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show in all open division classes with the same animals as shown in 4-H and FFA departments. All entries must be made prior to the show.
- The Fair Board reserves the right to combine classes when a class has fewer than three entries and/or two exhibitors.
- All livestock must be accompanied by an official health certificate in keeping with the State Department of Agriculture health regulations.
- No individual may take more than one entry in any one class, except that two may be entered in livestock classes.
- The Fair Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret and resolve all matters connected with or incident to the fair.
- The Fair Board will not be responsible for losses, accidents, injury to persons, animals or other exhibits, but will take precautions to prevent any losses.
- Blue ribbons are not to exceed \$30.00 in livestock shows. Money not used in one division may be transferred to another division on the Danish system.
- Foods, fruits and vegetable entries are to be made on paper plates. Canned foods are to be exhibited in standard canning jars.

- When there is only one entry in a class, it is the discretion of the judges to determine the ribbon received.

LIVESTOCK

General Provisions for Kentucky and Out-Of-State Livestock

All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a health certificate. A health certificate means a legible record covering the requirements of the state of destination accomplished on an equivalent from the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, United States Department of Agriculture, that is prepared and issued by a licensed accredited veterinarian.

- A) Health Certificates for Kentucky livestock shall be void 150 days after issuance.
- B) Health Certificates for Out-of-State livestock shall be void 30 days after issuance.

If animals are from tuberculosis accredited or brucellosis certified herds, the accompanying health certified shall show the accreditation and certification number with the date of the last herd test for tuberculosis and brucellosis.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR KENTUCKY CATTLE

All cattle for exhibition shall be identified individually on a health certificate in the owner's name.

Brucellosis - Animals six months of age or over shall have been negative to an official card test for brucellosis conducted in a state federal laboratory within 150 days of the date of exhibition, unless exempt by one of the following:

- A) Originate directly from a certified herd
- B) Have been officially vaccinated under 18 months of age for the dairy breeds.

Tuberculosis - Native Kentucky cattle are not required to have been negative to a tuberculin test to enter shows in Kentucky.

Other Disease Requirements - Cattle infected with warts or ringworm are not eligible for entry.

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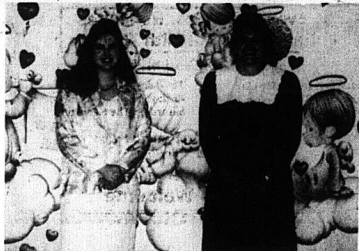

Fiscal court's lack of action will cost

 With an August 1 deadline staring in the face, the Rockcastle County fiscal court finally did something about the radio dispatching for county emergency services.
 Rockcastle County jailer Joe Howard informed the county over a year ago that he would no longer be able to dispatch calls from the county jail because of the new regulations passed by the state. Howard said he simply did not have time to be a dispatcher and take care of prisoners.
 After the court told Howard they would do something about the problem as soon as possible he agreed to keep the radios.
 But, as in most cases for this fiscal court nothing was done. Howard finally sent the court a letter telling them in no uncertain terms that he would no longer dispatch calls as of Aug. 1.
 At Tuesday's court meeting the judge and magistrates voted to hire some, probably at least three temporary employees, to do the dispatching for the county.
 They will work temporarily out of the jail, but the dispatching will be moved to a new location in the courthouse at some other time.
 At best, the emergency dispatching for county residents will be only mediocre after Tuesday's actions.
 If the court had moved on 911 for the county, they could have solved all of their dispatching problems without costing the county an estimated \$28,000 a year for salaries for the three new people that will have to be hired.
 The 911 service is paid for by county telephone companies each month, when a small surcharge is added to their bill. It has been estimated that it would cost residents anywhere from a \$1.50 per month to \$3.00 a month for the service.
 The phone company collects the

money each month and turns it over to the county for operating expense. 911 isn't going to happen over night, but at the rate this fiscal court is moving it may never happen.
 One magistrate told concerned citizens at Tuesday's meeting that the county should form a committee to study 911. That is something that should have been done a year ago, when the question was first brought up.
 No doubt Rockcastle County has a small tax base and a relatively small budget compared to other Kentucky counties, and the court should always be frugal when it comes to spending, but if they had moved when they should have, instead of sitting on

their hands, 911 may have already been in operation and the county's budget \$26,000 a year better off.
 In the end someone is going to have to pay for emergency dispatching services, that is quite obvious.
 However, there is certainly more phone customers than taxpayers and spreading out the cost seems to be the majority fairer than letting taxpayers always foot the entire bill.
 If County Judge Buzz Carlouff's warning about county finances are accurate, the county can ill afford an additional \$28,000 a year. Had they done what they should have they may have been able to avoid that expense all together. As phone customers, we would have to pay. But then again when we need police, an ambulance

or the fire department, the fee would seem small in comparison.
 I know Jailer Joe Howard pretty well, and if he had thought the county was actually making an effort to get 911 and a central dispatch in place, he would have kept the radios. However, like most observers of this fiscal court, he did not see anything that would make him believe that this fiscal court ever intends to try and implement 911.

Rockcastle Agri-Business Tour '95

Rockcastle Countians, under the direction of Roy G. Brown, took their Mid-West Farm Tour July 10-15.

The tour included the farm states of Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, and Indiana, (known as the "bread basket" of the U.S.A.). Corn and soybeans were small for this time of year due to an extra wet planting season. Corn and beans were as far as you could see in any direction you looked.

The weather was the hottest in years, especially in Iowa. Over 4,000 cattle had died in the feeding lots because of the extreme heat. Chickens, turkeys, and hogs also suffered great loss in dollars to the farmers. Fire departments sprayed the live stock in many areas to cool them. That's another risk farmers are subjected to in providing food for the world.

Other places along the route we visited were: The town of Mark Twain (Hannibal, MO), a corn, hay and hog farm at Oskaloosa, Iowa. We were hosted by the Ernest DeBruin family. They were fattening over 1800 hogs, plus some cattle. They tended around 2,400 acres of crops such as hay, corn, and soybeans. We were treated to a meal of pork burgers, chips, cookies, and ice-cream and strawberries. They were so hospitable, we felt like we were visiting family.

We also visited the VeMeer round baler factory. The VeMeer baler was the first round baler ever made. It came about because farmers had trouble getting enough help putting up square bales. Mr. VeMeer saw farmers having to quit their farms because of lack of help. This factory was at Pella, Iowa, near DeMoines.

We visited a German colony at Amana, Iowa. The colony was started by two men on a religious movement. The movement lasted until 1842. It stayed a religious settlement until the 1930s. It is now an economic, business community, but the Amana Church still remains the religious force of the community.

We arrived back in Mt. Vernon around 4:30, Sat., July 15. Everyone had a wonderful time.

Rogers turns back effort to cut services to tobacco growers

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers today led the charge to defeat an attempted elimination of the tobacco program in the House of Representatives. Rogers' efforts deflected a proposal by anti-tobacco advocate Rep. Richard Durbin, 223-200, which would have eliminated the parts of the tobacco program that provide agricultural extension services and crop insurance to tobacco farmers.

Earlier this year, Rogers helped back an effort by Durbin to eliminate the entire tobacco program. The program which costs only \$16 million, operates at no net cost to taxpayers. Tobacco farmers pay a marketing assessment which contributes more than \$32 million toward deficit

reduction. As well, the tobacco program contributes over \$12 billion in revenue to the federal and state government in excise taxes.

"Tobacco means jobs for Kentucky," Rogers said. "This proposal would hurt the tobacco farmers more than anyone else. While anti-tobacco zealots always aim at the large companies, they end up putting farmers out of business."

"Tobacco is Kentucky's heritage," Rogers added. "Ever since the time of Daniel Boone, tobacco has generated jobs and dollars for our communities. It is a way of life."

Now, the spending bill will be considered by the U.S. Senate.

Kentucky gets emergency cooling help for heat wave

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers said today President Clinton has made almost \$5.4 million in emergency home energy assistance available to Kentucky in response to last week's extremely hot weather.

More than \$100 million will be distributed by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to 19 states under a formula designed to direct aid to states that suffered the most severe weather conditions.

The funds will be distributed through the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and will target the states with the

most low-income families faced with the additional burden of higher energy costs.

"This will be a welcome relief for our families in southern and eastern Kentucky who will face higher electric bills because of the hot weather," Rogers said. "Now many residents can beat the heat without worrying that they won't be able to pay the bill."

The formula combined the number of days with extreme heat conditions and the number of low income families in the state to determine a state's need for additional assistance.

Flood insurance will be available in county

Several persons interested in the 911 telephone number for emergency calls came to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court on Tuesday along with proponents of flood insurance.
But they went off with promises ringing in their ears.

William Ackerman, CEO at the Bank of Mt. Vernon and Cameron Abney a loan officer at Citizens Bank of Brodhead and Mt. Vernon told the court they couldn't make fixed rate mortgages as long as the county didn't have flood insurance, with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The court approved participating in the program.
Like many before them, the two bankers also told the court they supported the 911 service and asked the court to get started on the program.
As in the past, the court said they needed a workup on costs to telephone customers and would try to get

it done by a special meeting on Aug. 29, since the next meeting, Aug. 8, will be too soon.
The group pointed out the "good points" of the 911 number and told the court that a proposed committee to study it would "take too long."

Carlifotis said that he did not know if the current phone number (606 256-2178), for emergency county calls would remain the same after the radios were moved, but jailer Joe Howard said that it was his understanding that the number would remain the same and the jail would receive another number.

Farthing new dog warden

It took a long time but the court finally agreed on a new dog warden. He is Harlan "Buck" Farthing of Mt. Vernon.
Farthing replaces David Sowder, who resigned. Sowder took a full-time job in another county.
The dog warden makes a \$425 salary and gets \$100 for expenses a month.
The court went into closed session to make the decision. Three persons applied for the job, but their names were not disclosed.

Prevent manganese toxicity

As if the blue-mold were not enough.
Recently, a relatively large number of tobacco samples have been diagnosed with manganese toxicity. Manganese toxicity is caused by using high rates of ammonia-based fertilizers which make the soil more acidic, said Bob Pearce, Extension tobacco specialist from the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.
Symptoms of manganese toxicity are leaf yellowing, with leaf veins usually retaining green, and plant growth stunting. Plant growth may be stunted without the leaves showing any sign of yellowing.
Farmers suspecting manganese toxicity in their field need to have the field's soil pH levels checked.
"County Extension agents can measure soil pH by mixing one part soil and two parts distilled water in a clean container and using a pH meter. If the reading is below 5.5, then manganese toxicity should be suspected," Pearce said.
Just because the pH reading is below 5.5 does not mean that the field has manganese toxicity problems, however. The combination of low pH and other factors influence the availability of manganese.
Soil acidification may be due to the high rates of sidedressed nitrogen used this season to make up for perceived nitrogen losses in the spring.
Even moderate rates of nitrogen applied in a narrow band close to the row can result in large pH reductions near the roots.
Take soil samples near the fertilizer band as well as from the row, if the crop has been sidedressed.
Manganese toxicity is a problem that can be prevented before the grow-

ing season by performing a soil test and following liming recommendations. Due to uneven distribution of lime and fertilizers in parts of the field, manganese toxicity may show up, even after liming.
As a rescue treatment for manganese toxicity, apply 1000 pounds per acre of fine bagged lime over the crop and cultivate, Pearce said.
Fine lime is recommended to promote a quicker reaction. This treatment is expected to provide some relief from manganese toxicity.

Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,
I was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to be in Mt. Vernon during the recent Memorial Day weekend. It was my third trip since 1989 and I was intent on finding out more about my ancestors who were very early immigrants to the area. The both of them being Gen. Wm. Smith and Thomas Fish both well known figures in early Rockcastle County history.
Gen Wm. Smith was an Indian Scout and served in the state legislature from 1817 to 1834. He and his father owned much of the land around Mt. Vernon during the early part of the 1800's and were instrumental in making Rockcastle County what it is today.

During my visit in 1991 I took several pictures of the tombstones of Gen. Wm. Smith and his wife Ann (Fish) Smith. They were in poor condition at that time but I was able to piece them back together in order to take some pictures. The tombstones of William and his wife were originally crypt monuments that were destroyed sometime between 1911 and 1915. They were replaced by flat stones placed on the foundations of the earlier ones by their grandson James Mares a well known figure of the early 1900's in Mt. Vernon and the state.
Unfortunately, the gravestones of Thomas and Winford Fish mysteriously disappeared in the 1970's and I have been unable to determine exactly where in the Hiatt Cemetery in Renfro Valley that they are buried.

When I returned earlier this month I was dismayed to find that since my last visit to the area the graves of Gen. Wm. Smith and his wife Ann had become almost indistinguishable in desperate need of repair or replacement.
It really brought home the fact that in these changing times we tend to forget about those early settlers that helped to build the county we live in. For the most part the only tangible proof that remains of their existence are fragile tombstones that were placed over them after their deaths and in many cases even these have disappeared or disintegrated into rubble. Only the very oldest members of the county remember these early settlers and the lives they lived, and in a very short time they will be gone. That will be a sad day because when the memories of our ancestors die, so do they.

With today's fast paced life we have lost the things that meant the most to our parents and grandparents: that of spending time together with their families and sharing the stories of their childhood. These were all things we remember as children but that have somehow been deemed less important and in some cases lost.

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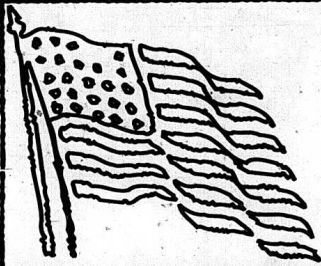

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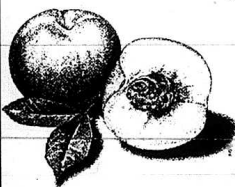
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Blue mold slows; another fungicide labelled for control

Drier weather late last week and through the weekend slowed the development of blue mold. That's good news for Kentucky's tobacco producers who have been plagued so far this growing season with an epidemic of the disease that can cut yields drastically.

"The blue mold fungus requires wet conditions at night for infection to occur and again seven to 10 days after infection for sporulation to develop from those lesions. When dry conditions prevail, reproduction and infection are reduced," said William Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Nesmith also is the North American Blue Mold Network Coordinator.

Producers need to remember, however, that if favorable weather again develops, blue mold will continue to proliferate, he said.

"If such favorable weather returns, expect to see blue mold again in about three weeks, which could threaten late set crops and those crops with serious ground sucker problems," he said.

"Some of the most active blue mold we are seeing right now is on those crops with serious ground sucker problems, which provides young, succulent tissue and a cool, shaded environment for the fungus to thrive," he said.

Because of the fungus' continuing threat to the state's crop, state officials last week approved the use of another fungicide, Aliette, on tobacco to help control blue mold, Nesmith said.

Earlier this year, the fungicide Dithane had been given clearance to help combat the strain of the blue mold fungus that is resistant to the commonly used fungicide, Ridomil, he said.

"Producers need to keep in mind that Aliette's main place in blue mold control is at and after topping. It can be used up to three days prior to harvest. That's its main advantage over Dithane, which can not be legally used in the field past topping because of serious concerns about residues," Nesmith said.

The plant pathologist noted that other fungicides, Ridomil and Dithane, need to be used as part of blue mold prevention and control. Producers need to remain concerned with residue issues associated with the use of Dithane.

"Producers need to be conscientious with their blue mold control program. If they slack off at any time, blue mold may gain a toehold in their fields. If they become careless with the use of Dithane, they may end up with residue problems in their cured leaf," he said.

Nesmith urged producers to work closely with their county Extension agents for agriculture during the continued threat posed by blue mold.

"County Extension agents can make recommendations based on the stage of the crop and the changing local situation. This year, we have early, mid- and late-set crops, as well as great local variations in disease incidence, severity and activity. Each

situation needs to be treated differently when it comes to blue mold control," he said.

lucky this year and farmers should be prepared to do battle with the pest.

"Fall armyworm troops are massing now," said Ric Bessin, Extension entomologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "Some fields are on the verge of being overrun."

The military analogy is appropriate, he said. Late planted fields have a greatly increased risk of fall armyworms this summer. Economically important infestations have already been reported on knee high corn in Caldwell, Union, Daviess and Henderson counties.

How can farmers "do battle" with this enemy?

Spraying for the pest is required, Bessin said, but timing is critical for

control. "Do not wait until it is too late," he said. "Monitor fields regularly and control fall armyworm when 25 percent of the plants are infested with small larvae."

He added, "Pay very close attention to late planted fields (those planted after June 1) and make treatments while the larvae are small."

What spray to use is not as important as the timing, he said. But how the farmer sprays is just as important as when.

"While it feeds in the whorl, the farmer can direct the insecticide to the pest. He should aim the spray directly over the whorl with either a hollow cone or solid cone nozzle."

"The spray must be forced down into the whorl to be effective, he said. "A high volume spray is required," he said. "Read that as absolutely necessary. If a farmer goes to the added expense of spraying for this pest, he should do it right and maximize the return on investment dollar."

Producers are reminded that the deadline to complete crop acreage report is July 31st. This deadline has been extended once (from July 15th), and will not be extended again for the 1995 crop year.

Crop reports are required this year on farms that will market tobacco in 1995. If you have not completed your report, please contact CFSa at 256-2325 to schedule a convenient time to file your report. If it is impossible for you to come in during office hours (7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.) contact us and we will work out a time after hours for reporting.

All persons with insurance through the CFSa Office must sign an FCI-

10, which is in regard to their policy, by July 31st. This includes tenants who may not own a farm, but will be sharing in the tobacco check from the warehouse. If you have any questions concerning the crop acreage reports or think you may need to file an FCI-19 but are not sure, feel free to contact this office.

July 31st is also the deadline to submit actual production history (APH) for grain farms. If no production evidence is available (weigh tickets, bin measurements) then the county office will assign the yield. Free appraisals may be requested for any grain farm that purchased CAT insurance through CFSa. Contact us for more information.

rection as to what the toddler can or should do. Say: "please walk" rather than "don't run", "speak quietly"

rather than "don't yell", "touch gently" rather than "don't hit".

"You never listen to me" is a complaint heard as often from children as parents. Good communication helps children and parents to develop confidence, feelings of self-worth, and good relationships with

others. Try these tips:

Teach children to listen...gently touch a child before you talk...say your child's name.

Speak in a quiet voice...whisper sometimes so children have to listen closely...they like this.

Look a child in the eyes so you can tell when he/she understands...bend or sit down.

Practice listening and talking...talk with your family about what you see on TV, hear on the radio or see at the store. Talk to your children about their friends.

Catch children being good. Praise them for cooperating with you or their siblings, for doing those little things that are so easy to take for granted.

Use door openers that invite children to say more about an incident or

their feelings: "I see..." "Oh?"... "Tell me more..." "No kidding..."

"Really..." Say that again, I want to be sure I understood you."

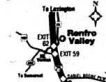
Praise build a child's confidence and reinforces communication. Unkind words tear children down and teach them that they aren't good enough.

We are much more than a long-term facility. Are you aware of the other services offered by your community hospital's Respiratory Care Department?

There are EEG (electroencephalograph) services for all ages. These tests allow a physician to detect any abnormalities in the brain waves. These tests are transmitted to Lexington where they are read by a neurologist.

Pulmonary Function testing is also available. This type of test helps determine if lung function is impaired and to what degree. Another use of these tests is to determine eligibility for Black Lung Benefits. You can also see the amount of improvement achieved after using a bronchodilator.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.
