

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the statement of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the Sheriff of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 1993. This financial statement is the responsibility of the Sheriff. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards; Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the Audit Guide for State and Local Government Auditors of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The Sheriff is required to prepare his financial statement on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the Sheriff for the year ended December 31, 1993, in conformity with the basis of accounting described above.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the results of our audit, we make the following comments and recommendations.

1) **Corrected Tax Commissions Should be Transferred To the Sheriff's Fee Account Monthly.**

During the audit, it came to our attention correct amounts for tax commissions were not being transferred to the Sheriff's fee account each month. As a result of this practice, \$3,203 was due to the 1993 fee account for commissions earned on 1992 taxes. Also an additional \$98 was due to the 1993 fee account for commissions earned on 1993 taxes. Reconciling to these amounts required a substantial amount of audit time and the Sheriff's receipts ledger had to be adjusted to include these amounts. We recommend that in the future correct amounts be transferred monthly to the Sheriff's fee account and proper amounts be posted to the Sheriff's receipts ledger. These amounts should be based on monthly tax report totals.

2) **Sheriff Should Expend Funds For Necessary Office Expenses**

The Sheriff should expend public funds only for necessary expenses of his office. In Funk vs. Hill, 317 S.W. 2d 489 (Ky. 1958), Kentucky's highest court reaffirmed the rule that county fee officials' expenditures of public funds will be allowed only if they are necessary, adequately documented, reasonable in amount, beneficial to the public, and not personal expenses. Therefore, the following expenditures of public funds by the Sheriff are disallowed:

- *Intense advising/mentoring.

Students selected for the program have exhibited a high level of motivation toward a career in one of the allied health professions, as evidenced by an interview, high school references, and/or a written autobiography. Their academic record must also be predictive of success in an allied health major.

EKU received a \$335,550 federal grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration, Division of Disadvantaged Assistance to administer the three-year project.

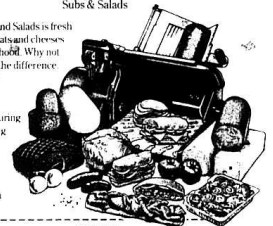

Court votes to fix courthouse air conditioner

Sheriff's office will dispatch own emergency calls

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court solved emergency dispatching at a special meeting Wednesday, leaving the service with Sheriff Shirley Smith.

On a motion by magistrate John Holtbrook, seconded by Jack Bradley, the court voted to allow the sheriff's office to operate the dispatching service instead of hiring three county employees and do the dispatching from the jail.

Four reinstated at Gibson Greeting plant

The last four of ten striking employees at Gibson Greetings Card plant in Berea returned to work on Monday. The workers were discharged for alleged strike related conduct dating back to the 100 day strike by employees at the greeting card company's Berea distribution center in 1989.

Diane King, Edna Durham and Mary Helton, all of Mt. Vernon and Carolyn Moberly of Berea, were reinstated, with back pay, to their former positions by the National Labor Relations Board in a decision that was upheld by the Washington D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals when the company appealed the labor board's decision.

King is the secretary and treasurer and Moberly the Chief Steward of Local 77, Firemen and Oilers Union, SEIU which represents approximately 250 hourly workers at the facility. A fifth employee of the original ten, Carl Long of Berea, a 40 year employee of Gibson, passed away last year. Long's wife will receive his back pay and other benefits.

The court's motion stated the sheriff's office would maintain the dispatching, seven days a week, 24 hours a day, or 120 hours, when the sheriff's office is closed. The court will pay for persons who are hired (deputies, if overtime is required for them, and others) at minimum wage.

The sheriff will choose the dispatchers and they must be certified within 30 days, if space is available at Eastern Kentucky University where

the training is offered.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carlolus told the court and Smith that he had received several applications for the dispatching jobs and asked Smith to consider them. The sheriff said he would.

The state will not allow the dispatching (radio) to come from the jail. The court said the county would continue to pay for dispatching, if and until, the 911 emergency number is available.

The court noted as long as it is paying the bill for dispatching, the court could "revisit" the issue at any time.

The sheriff attended Wednesday's meeting, accompanied by his attorney Jerry Cox.

Cox and Smith left the meeting as soon as the dispatching decision was made and Carlolus then called a closed session of the court and asked the Signal reporter to leave. County Attorney Jeff Burdette objected to Carlolus' request but the court went into closed session.

After the meeting the judge-executive said the court was allowed to meet in a closed working session and violated no laws when they met Wednesday. Carlolus said the court took no official action in the closed session.

However in Kentucky the law is very clear on closed sessions. The court can meet behind closed doors for the purpose of discussing personnel, land acquisition or litigation.

The judge-executive did not say what the purpose of the closed session was, but that other counties such as Clay and Pike held closed working sessions regularly.

The Signal is in the process of

requesting an attorney general's opinion on closed meetings, in particular Wednesday's session.

In other action, the court reinstated Benton Bullock and Rolla Cornelius to the Board of Assessments.

The court also approved a Board of Ethics for the county. On the board are: Maude Randolph, Bill Cash, John Parsons, Don Thompson, Dan Coffey, Lloyd Cain and Martha Leach Eversole. Alternate is Lewis Coffey.

Board approves daylight visiting only at Elmwood

Recent vandalism problems at Elmwood Cemetery in Mt. Vernon have prompted the perpetual care board to allow daylight visitors only to the cemetery.

During the July meeting of the board and after receiving legal advice, the members voted to post signs about the daylight hours only, which will help police in making arrests and aid prosecutors in getting convictions.

In April, 28 tombstones in the cemetery were vandalized. Mt. Vernon police arrested two people in connection with the destruction. One of those arrested was a juvenile.

The perpetual care board also voted to pay the final debt of \$1,070.22 resulting from the vandalism.

Harlan, to repair the chiller' barrel that controls the air conditioning for the old courthouse which has served for 31 years, was approved. The cost will be \$9,850. A new chiller barrel would have cost \$40,000.

The old courthouse has not had air conditioning this year.

Hammond said the recommendation from the committee was unanimous.

Perkins, 41, of Broadhead, replaces Glen Varwinkle who was transferred to food service earlier this year.

The hiring of Perkins will leave a teaching position in history open at RCHS. The superintendent said that it was his understanding that Tom Larky had been transferred from history to Perkins' old position, thereby creating the history vacancy.

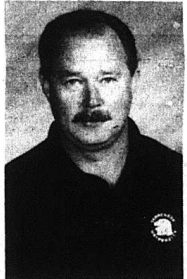
Perkins also served as girl's assistant basketball coach and athletic director. Hammond said both of those positions would now have to be filled.

The superintendent said that he was in the process of accepting applications for director of student services, his old job, and that there was still time to apply.

The company told the court the cost quoted includes materials and labor. Any other unseen repairs, if needed, will be completed on a time and materials basis. The repairs should be completed in a couple of weeks.

Hammond said that it was his understanding that no one in the system, besides him, held the proper certification for the job, but that a local person could be hired if they agreed to obtain proper certification for the job.

Fain arrested after chase

A Berea man, formerly of Mt. Vernon, was being held in the Madison County Detention Center Sunday after leading state police on a chase Saturday night.

Fain was charged with improper start, his second DUI in five years, attempt to elude, fourth-degree assault, three counts of wanton endangerment, first-degree criminal mischief, resisting arrest, speeding, reckless driving and failure to wear a seat belt.

His 1977 Chevrolet pickup was totaled.

Senior meal days to be cut

Senior citizen officials have decided to reduce the number of days meals are served instead of the people served.

So reported Shirley Cummins, who oversees senior citizen activities in the county.

The committee on Cumberland Valley area, agency on aging, announced this week it will cut eight additional days from its meals program instead of taking people off meals.

The hardest thing about aging to me has nothing to do with the ever-increasing length of belts I have to find to hold my pants up or the fact that I can no longer read without glasses. I don't even mind much that stopping and bending aren't nearly as easy as they used to be and that my joints crack and pop when I get out of bed.

The hardest thing for me is dealing with the passing of older friends and relatives who helped shape who and what I am. Grief is the most painful thing I've ever suffered and I spent most of last weekend trying to cope with it.

My first cousin, friend and mentor, Arlie Adams died unexpectedly in his sleep at home in the head of Blair Branch last Friday night. He was 69 years old and not many retired miners live past that age but Arlie was so much a part of my life and so full of life himself that I suppose I thought he'd live forever.

Over the last 20 years we didn't see a lot of each other—quick visits when I went to Blair Branch and longer ones at family reunions. Two or three good telephone conversations a year. But hardly a day if any has gone by that a bit of Arlie has not

been expressed through me.

By the time I was ten years old I was fascinated about being in the woods or in the shade beside a fishing hole. I still have that fascination and Arlie taught me most of it. I have sat in his yard, around the fireplace or campfires and listened raptly for hours when he would tell hunting and fishing tales and stories about his own growing up. Arlie's stories were the kind that you never got tired of hearing even if he'd told them a hundred times before.

He taught me how to recognize ginseng and yellow root and the names of a hundred song birds. The first time I shot a rifle Arlie was helping me hold it up and he showed me how to bend a straight pin into a fish hook, tie it to a length of cotton string and wind it round the end of an old cane pole. He showed me how to find red worms and thread them on the hook so I could fish for horny head chubs in the little pools on Blair Branch.

Arlie taught me how to skin a squirrel and clean a fish. How to pitch horseshoes and make a slingshot. He was at least as much a part of my growing up as were my parents. He was also the kindest living

person I knew before last Friday night. My Uncle Jim and my eighth grade teacher, Monroe Ciadulli are the only people I've ever known even close to uttering an oath. "Well shucks!" is about as angry as he ever got. And he was also one of the most patient. If he'd gone to college he would have made a perfect teacher.

Instead he toiled long hours on his knees deep inside the mountain seams of low coal in the days when most of the work was done with pick and shovel. Like my Dad, he came home so black with dust that he wouldn't have been recognizable had we not known him well.

When anyone in the head of our holler butchered a hog, Arlie was always called in to supervise and then perform the cutting that required some skill. When carpentry work needed doing or a door needed hung, everybody called on Arlie. I used to think there was nothing he couldn't do.

One year last fall he came down to the flatlands with his oldest son (my age) Laramie and my little brother Steve so we could spend long weeks discussing the art of his favorite spots and smallmouth bass at my father's

on Silver Creek, Paint Lick and the Dix river. And on both those trips I learned several new tricks. Several times he demonstrated the absolute value of patience by catching big fish in holes that the rest of us gave up on or passed on by. But mostly I just enjoyed his company and feeling like a school boy again.

I stopped in to see him back in May and I only had time to say hello and shake hands, and then a few weeks back we got on the phone to plan another rendezvous with the bass when the weather cooled or maybe when the forecast called for rain.

In September when the leaves begin to turn and I find myself keen deep in the creek I know I'll think of Arlie and it will be hard. There will be a lump in my throat and tears in my eyes and I will feel terribly alone. But surely there are clean, clear, rock creeks in Heaven and just as surely Arlie is there and he will be telling Saint Peter that if he'd "try just a little harder, he could get that old biggum over yonder under that big beech log to come out and bite."

I can say with certainty that our loss on earth is Heaven's gain and neither will ever again be the same.

a bill (yes, I pay my bills) about making dried apple pies, they drooled and I said I'd bring them one each when I made more. It pays to get credit so you can get it again was what I had in mind.

"If you don't stay out of that road," Cleve said, "it may be you."

In my column on November 10, 1994, I put a picture of Earl Hen

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body knew him and the many floral decorations on his grave showed Earl had friends. Now he will only be a

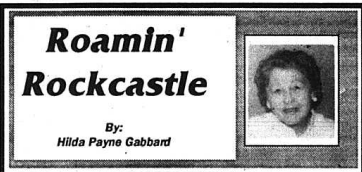

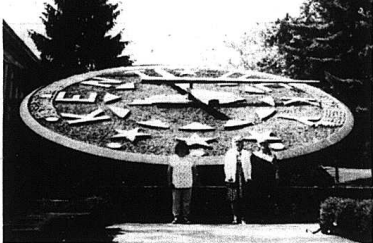

Food Labels For Infants Under Two Years

New infant food labels will look different from adult food labels. While infant food labels also use the Nutrition Facts format, the information provided is different.

The label for infant foods contains important information. There are several differences between the adult food label and the label found on infant foods. **Serving Sizes.** Serving sizes for infant foods are based on average amounts that infants under 2 years usually eat at one time. Serving sizes on adult food labels are based on average amounts that adults typically eat at one time.

Daily Values. Food labels for infants and children under four years of age list Daily Value percentages for protein, vitamins and minerals. Unlike adult food labels, daily values for fat, cholesterol, sodium, potassium, carbohydrate, and fiber are not listed because they have not been set for children under four.

Infants and Food. The first 24 months of life is a time of rapid growth and high nutritional demand. The infant's small stomach limits the volume of food that they can reasonably consume. Because of these unique conditions, the main goal of infant feeding is to provide enough calories and nutrients to support optimal growth and development.

Infants Need Fat. Infants have different nutrient and dietary requirements than adults. Adult food labels list calories from fat, amount of saturated fat, and the amount of cholesterol to help adults make healthy food choices. Infant food labels omit the detailed listing of fat information because infants need fat as a concentrated calorie source to fuel their rapid growth. Efforts to limit fat in the infant diet are unwise. Health professionals do not endorse feeding reduced-fat dairy products such as skim milk to infants under two years. Whole milk is an important source of calories for infants who no longer receive breast milk or formula. Since babies under 2 years need fat, parents should not attempt to limit their infants' fat intake.

Each child's baby is an individual, with individual food likes. Food choices that lead to dietary variety in the first two years can play an important role in developing lifelong healthy eating patterns. Serving a variety of foods, from all major food groups, provides the balance needed to begin a natural moderation of fat intake after two years of age.

By reading the new infant food label, parents can select a nutritious variety of foods for their baby's healthful diet.

Merle Haggard, Pam Tillis will headline outdoor mega concert in Renfro Valley, September 24

One is a legend in his own time -- the other is the daughter of a legend, who is making a name for herself on the country charts. Both will be making an unforgettable appearance in Renfro Valley, September 24, 1995.

Merle Haggard and Pam Tillis will be joining forces on the Renfro Valley Festival Grounds for the annual Headliner Concert Series.

Haggard is perhaps the most well-known country music singer of this era. His songs helped many other country singers get their start -- one of his most popular compositions, "Today I Started Loving You Again," has been recorded by

over four hundred other artists.

Haggard's song writing skills were honed by his years in state penitentiaries. Through the pain of an unruly childhood, a fatherless adolescence and four broken marriages, Haggard produced some of the most celebrated songs in the country music field. From his pain came great creativity, as much can often be the solace and the refuge from personal trial.

Singers of today's country music idolize Haggard in much the same way Haggard idolized Jimmie Rodgers as a child. His love for the wandering songs of such as Jimmie Rodgers lead to an errant passion for the gleaming, endless railroad tracks and

the siren song of slow freights and hobo jungles. This led to him recording an album later in his career called "Same Train, Different Time," a tribute to Jimmie Rodgers.

Starting with his first national hit, "Sing a Sad Song," in 1963, his list of hits strung on for many more years. "(All My Friends Are Gonna Be) Strangers," "Swinging Doors," "The Bottle Let Me Down," "I'm a Lonesome Fugitive," "Silver Wings," "Okie From Muskogee," "Think I'll Just Stay Here and Drink," "Rainbow Stew," and "Yesterday's Wine."

"There is no one in contemporary country music who has created a more impressive legacy, or one that spans a wider variety of styles...taken as a whole, the body of work that he has created is absolutely staggering," said Peter Gurainick, in his book, *Lost Highway*. Haggard's songs have received 56 awards from BMI. He has released over sixty-five albums, four of which have been certified gold. He has been nominated 42 times for CMA awards, more than any other male country entertainer. He won six of these awards, along with eighteen awards from the ACM, including male vocalist and entertainer of the year, eight from Cash Box, four from Record World, and five from Music City News. His music video "Are the Good Times

Really Over" won the Best Country Video award in 1983 from the American Video Awards. In 1984, Haggard was awarded a Grammy for the Best Male Country Vocal Performance of his song "That's the Way Love Goes."

Tillis, daughter of Grand Ole Opry star Mel Tillis, is enjoying recent success with albums on the charts, frequent airplay, and sell-out live concerts. Following in the footsteps of her father, Tillis is endeavoring to make a path of her own, and she's succeeding with country music stardom. Her exciting, glamorous approach to "live performances" have made her a favorite with the younger crowd.

Tillis, a native of Plant City, Florida, began singing when she was knee-high next to her father. Although this has helped get her career started, it has also been a hindrance in some ways.

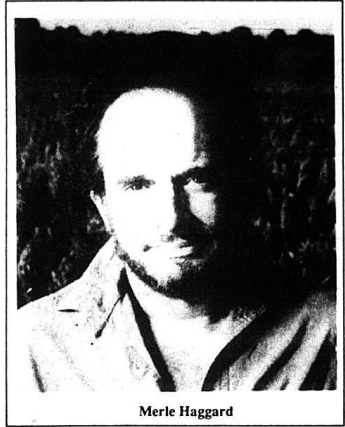
"Growing up in Nashville as the daughter of a famous person is like growing up in a fishbowl. Along with all the encouragement, there also came pressure." But Tillis has overcome that to become popular for a style of her own.

Landowners offer 570,000 for wetlands reserve program

More than 3,700 landowners nationwide offered 572,500 acres for enrollment in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP). Paul W. Johnson, chief of the Natural Resources Conservation Service, announced today.

"This is a tremendous response by landowners," Johnson said. "It shows the importance of this voluntary, incentive-based program to American farmers, who are excited about the opportunities for restoring wetlands and ensuring the health of their land."

The ten states where landowners offered the most acres during the sign-up period that ended June 30 are: Louisiana, 66,270 acres; Texas, 64,560 acres; Arkansas, 42,950 acres; Oregon, 42,170 acres; Oklahoma, 40,690 acres; California, 34,490 acres; Missouri, 31,750 acres; Mississippi, 30,510 acres; Iowa, 28,450 acres; and South Dakota, 25,320 acres.

Fifty states each had more than 200 landowners offer acres into the program; Iowa, Louisiana, Missouri, Ohio, and South Dakota.

Kentucky landowners offered approximately 15,300 acres on 170 tracts of land for participation in the program. These requests came from landowners in 41 Kentucky counties.

The Wetlands Reserve Program protects and restores wetlands to provide habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife, help purify water supplies, and help absorb flood waters. It is administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

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New and Old Friends

This is the time of year when big white fluffy clouds, forming and reforming into what looks like familiar creatures to us, drift high across the deep blue skies of summer and make us long for a dip in the old swimming hole or a big shade tree to lounge under while we watch them do their magic tricks. Yesterday was this kind of day.

I-75 south from Cincinnati to Mt. Vernon was a corridor of beauty as Lora Loh and her dad Ed Allen and I drove down it after they had picked me up at my sister Kate's where I had been visiting over the weekend. Traffic was moderate and since Lora was doing the driving it gave me a chance to look at, and admire the scenery, including the beautiful skyline. All the beauty wasn't in the sky, much of it was in the roadside flowers and distant fields of corn or hay baled into big round bundles. I miss the big hay stacks that used to be the trademark of a prosperous cattle or grain farmer. But these huge "tootsie roles" of hay are now the mark of prosperity. Nonetheless, the beauty of the clouds gave us conversation material that took us into other aspects of beauty, and nature, and the Bible. Mr. Allen is quite knowledgeable in the bible so before we knew it we had gone from Genesis to Revelations in our discussions of it and were at our turn off at Roundstone where they wanted to make a quick stop to visit with their friends Elmer and Edith Hale. It was a little more than a quick visit to see how they were doing, it was an afternoon of old fashioned hospitality where old friends greet one another heartily and welcome all comers into their circle of friendship.

This was the first time I had met Elmer and Edith but I hope it isn't my last. They are genuine down home folks, the kind I like. When we got close to their front porch, I heard a hearty voice saying, "Here are Ed and Lora, come on in" then I think Elmer recognized me from the pictures he had seen in the paper for he also welcomed me by name. He and Edith are faithful readers of my column and both admitted my face was familiar to them and at once made me feel I was an honored guest. Edith, like all women do, began apologizing for her untidy house and the way she was dressed. But to me the room was not untidy but had a comfortable "lived in look" and she looked so comfortable in her cool cotton dress it made me want to pull up a chair and sit awhile and let the menfolk do the talking. Which they did. It was then I had to whisper to Edith, "and they talk about women doing the talking, why one of us couldn't get a word in if we tried too." But the conversation was not of politics and murders, it was of times past, these men were kin folk and their relationship, and friendship went a long way back so their talk was about the "good old days" if there is such a thing. Edith did find an

opening long enough to tell of her recent baptism in the creek that runs close to their house. This is always a beautiful story to hear.

Soon the talk led to music, and singing and Elmer slipped into the other room and appeared with his old five string banjo which Mr. Allen was asking about. Now, talk about music, when two old timers get started picking a five string banjo and occasionally break into an old time song, *The Fate of Floyd Collins*, *Cripple Creek*, or *The Wild Wood Flower*, you are listening to real music, the kind this younger generation knows nothing about. This was the kind of music I grew up with and as I sat there with eyes half closed I drifted back to that childhood. Once again I heard a banjo being picked like my own

brother, Jim, picked it. And the same laughter and good humor accompanied it. Mr. Allen made the comment he never saw a musical instrument he couldn't get some kind of music out of and Jim could do the same thing. He always carried a harmonica organ in his shirt pocket so he could make music wherever he went. Even though he has been dead some fifty years I felt his presence in that room joining in the merrymaking. I think, in my drowsy state of mind, I was listening for him to begin picking and singing. *Pretty Polly*, which was one of his favorites. Another guest, Dennis Allen, the quiet one of the clan, was at the Hale home when we arrived but he only stayed a short while. After listening to these two old timers tell tales and make music like the rest of us did he soon took his leave. He had come by to see if Elmer or Edith needed anything. This is something else we seldom see anymore, a neighbor looking out for the elderly in their community.

Lora had come down to copy some old pictures so before she got too involved in doing so she offered to bring me home and I was ready. My weekend had been a full and enjoyable one, that is until my brother Herb had an attack of bronchitis and had to be taken to the emergency room at Bethesda North Hospital in Cincinnati and I had sat up all night waiting for him to be admitted or dismissed. At 4:30 a.m. he was dismissed so really I was ready for a bit more sleep.

After a week of catnapping and dozing while trying to crochet I am finally getting caught up on it.

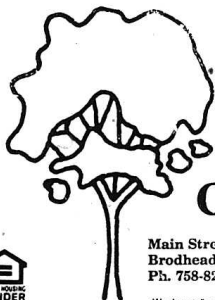

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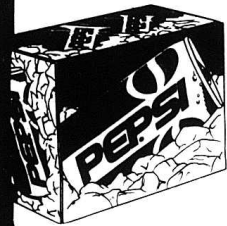
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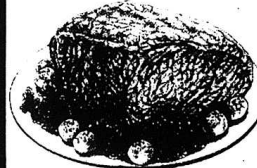

The Caring Connection

An Early Childhood Information Team

Encouraging Cooperation in Young Children

Your child's early behaviors are part of the physical and social adjustment to being in a new world. Most babies are "easy," some are "slow to warm up." A few are "difficult"—they are slow to adapt, can have irregular body functions, and sometimes withdraw when facing new situations.

When babies respond to their parents, parents tend to respond back—they reinforce each other. Don't be discouraged if your infant is not very responsive at first. Just make greater efforts to talk to, soothe, hold, and rock the baby.

Building rapport with your baby is the first step in getting the baby to respond. Give lots of attention during daily routines like feeding, diapering, and bathing. The good feelings you baby gets help build love and trust and will encourage your baby to want to please you and do the things you ask.

Your child won't want to please you right away. In fact, some toddlers become less and less cooperative as they start to explore. It becomes a game to touch something forbidden by an adult. Hitting or biting another child is a common way to gain an attractive toy.

To encourage cooperation, build your child's self-confidence. Let the child make simple choices and do things without your help.

Many toddlers don't understand how to share and cooperate when they play. Provide substitute toys if your child doesn't want to share or wants toys that belong to another child. Physically separate children who are fighting.

Self-confidence blossoms when your child solves problems alone. Suppose your child's favorite toy bunny is hidden under a blanket. It would be easy for you to get the toy, but it is much better if the child makes some discoveries. Uncover the bunny's ears, point to them, and ask your baby to find the bunny. Proudly, the baby creeps over to the ears and uncovers the whole bunny.

Encourage your child to try things independently. Give reassurance that things will turn out well. Self-esteem and confidence come from having

successful experiences and receiving lots of encouragement.

Babies as young as a year old can be offered simple choices every day. Making choices lets the child have

more self-control; the child will be more willing to cooperate with you and with other children. And life is a lot easier when you're not in a constant power struggle with your child.

At first, you may have to guess when you hold up two toys and ask your baby to choose, but the baby will soon learn to choose by pointing.

Tell your child that the child has made a choice even if it's not an intentional one. If your 18-month-old runs off after you say it's time to get into the car, pick the child up and say: "I see you've chosen to be carried."

Choices should be made without disrupting the household routine or interfering with your own better judgement. You can let your toddler decide:

*What to wear. Keep a low drawer full of choices you select.

*What to eat. Offer just two choices: corn flakes or puffed wheat; cheese or what the family is eating.

*If your child is sleepy, the child can nap or play quietly.

*If your child is warm or cold, take along a sweater. Let the child decide whether to wear it.

Understanding feelings is important for developing good relationships with others and learning how to play cooperatively.

Your child may feel happy, sad, or angry but might not have names for the feelings. Talking about what is going on helps your child become more sensitive to the child's own feelings and those of others.

"When grandma goes away, I feel so sad."

"Billy gets angry when you grab his toy."

"It hurts Lucy when you hit her."

Your toddler can learn ways to cooperate with other children by watching ideas in action. Point these out and comment about the good ideas and the poor ones.

"Jenny wants the swing, but Gabriel is playing on it. I wonder what Jenny will do? Jenny pushed Gabriel and he is crying. He is hurt. His feelings are hurt. Jenny's mother is taking

her. She didn't get to swing because she hurt her friend."

As children get older, they become more able to share and cooperate when they play. Watch carefully and step in when your child needs

help. Then back off, your child needs to practice and make discoveries

Agricultural News

Because of excessive rainfall in the Midwest region, the Secretary has announced changes in the prevented planting provisions for the '95 crop year concerning the planting and use of subsequent crops. Subsequent crops planted on acreage that were prevented from being planted must be insured at the catastrophic level of insurance by the acreage reporting date if the crops are of economic significance and insurable in the county, unless the producer chooses to forego most USDA program benefits. For more information, contact the county office.

As a condition of eligibility for receiving price support, all pesticide

products used in connection with the production of Burley tobacco, must be approved by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for use on tobacco and such pesticide products must be applied in accordance with label directions. Action to withhold price support on tobacco treated with nonapproved EPA pesticides or when pesticides are not used in accordance with label directions was made necessary because their use threatens the domestic and export markets for tobacco. The County Extension Office can furnish information about acceptable pesticides for use on tobacco, and answer questions concerning the pesticide certification program.
