

# Clean Hands?

## Wash Them Often

Microorganisms that normally live on people's hands are usually not the ones that contaminate food and make people sick. The ones that do make people sick, however, are more often transient microorganisms that result from poor personal hygiene, cross contamination of raw foods with cooked foods and letting highly perishable foods sit at room temperature too long.

What can you do to help prevent such microorganisms from becoming a problem? Wash your hands with soap vigorously and often. Washing hands under running water for 30 seconds is usually sufficient to kill most of the microorganisms found on people's hands.

What type of cleanser is best? In a study published in a food sciences journal, 99% of the transient skin bacteria were killed after one washing with regular soap. Antimicrobial lotion soap

reduced the number of surviving bacteria to less than one-half of one percent.

With each subsequent washing, sanitizing soap reduced the microbial population even more; less than 1/10th of 1% survived after several washings.

While the sanitizing soap continued to provide greater and greater killing of microbes, it did cause redness and drying of the hands.

Alcohol gel sanitizer achieved a high kill of microbes on the hands, as well, with less than one-hundredth of one percent of the microorganisms surviving the washing.

Plain lotion soap, using proper washing techniques for about 20 to 30 seconds, is quite effective in removing bacteria.

is bigger than your shirt.) All this new information will help your child improve language skills and help get ready for reading in school.

Reading books or magazines together can be an enjoyable experience for parents and children. Reading to children will encourage good language development. Listening to stories is the basis for good reading. Children learn how a book works, there the beginning is, and how the story goes from page to page until the end. They learn that the pictures can be clues about the story. When they hear new ideas and new words, children expand their world and develop their thinking skills.

You can start reading to your child when the child is very young. Eight to ten months old is not too early. Babies can enjoy looking at pictures in cloth books, in magazines, and even in toy catalogs. It is not necessary to read a story to a baby who has not yet learned how to speak. Just looking at the pictures is fine.

1. Sit in a comfortable chair with the baby on your lap.

2. Hold the book so that the pictures can be seen. Point to the pictures on the page. Raise and lower your voice, with lots of OOHs and AHHHs.

3. If the baby points to something or imitates the sounds you are making, give hugs and praise.

4. Lift the page a little, and encourage your baby to help turn it.

5. As the child learns to speak, start reading the stories. Take time to look at the pictures together. Stop reading the story if your child wants to talk about a picture. You may be surprised at the creativity and intelligence of some of your child's ideas.

6. When your child is able to take care of a book, get some books as important as owning toys. Some good books can be bought inexpensively at supermarkets, bookstores, or yard sales.

7. Take your child to the library as soon as the child can sit still for the toddler story time.

Reading to the preschool child:

1. Set aside some time each day to enjoy reading together. Choose a quiet, special time when the child is not doing something else.

2. Allow your child to choose a book for you to read.

3. Take time to look at the pictures. Help the child name things and tell what is happening. Use books with large and colorful pictures.

4. Raise and lower your voice as

you are telling the story. If you are paying attention to what is happening, so will your child.

Reading with the school-age child: When your child starts school and starts learning how to read, it becomes a good opportunity for the child to read to you! Continue reading together daily.

1. You and your child can take turns reading to each other. Praise what your child does well. Avoid criticism.

2. Remember that reading together should be fun. Don't use story time to teach reading. Remember to stop before either one of you becomes restless, tired, or bored.

3. Take advantage of your child's interests. Choose dinosaur books for dinosaur fans, etc.

4. Don't make your child choose between reading and watching television or playing outside. Let these activities all have their own place in your child's daily life.

5. If your child misses or stumbles on a word while reading out loud, just say the word. Don't make your child feel like a serious error has been made.

6. Ask your child's teacher for suggestions for reading to your child. If your child is reading a book at the proper ability level, the child will have good feelings about reading.

7. Remember that children learn by imitation. The best way to encourage reading is by reading yourself. Submitted by Rockcastle Family Resource Center.

### Reading With Your Child

Learning how to read is one of the most important areas of language development. Parents often ask teachers, "How can I help my child with reading?" The answer might surprise you. You can help at home even before your child is ready for school. Experts studied a group of school-age children who were good readers. The good readers had had several things in common when they were of preschool age. They had family members who:

- Read books, magazines, and newspapers.
- Looked at books and magazines with them, and who read to them.

• Talked to them about what was happening around them.

• Pointed out words in books and other media.

• Took the time to teach them new words.

One of the most important things you can do to help with reading is something that does not involve books. It is teaching new vocabulary words and language skills during everyday activities. Even a trip to the store can be important for teaching pre-reading skills. Take time to help your child name the different kinds of fruit and vegetables. Help your child "read" the words on the boxes and cans. (This word is "soup.") Thinking skills can be developed while sorting the laundry. (My shirt

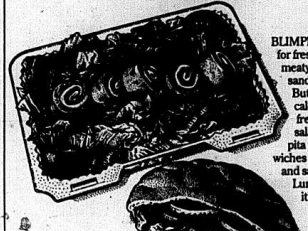





## Bullock files complaint

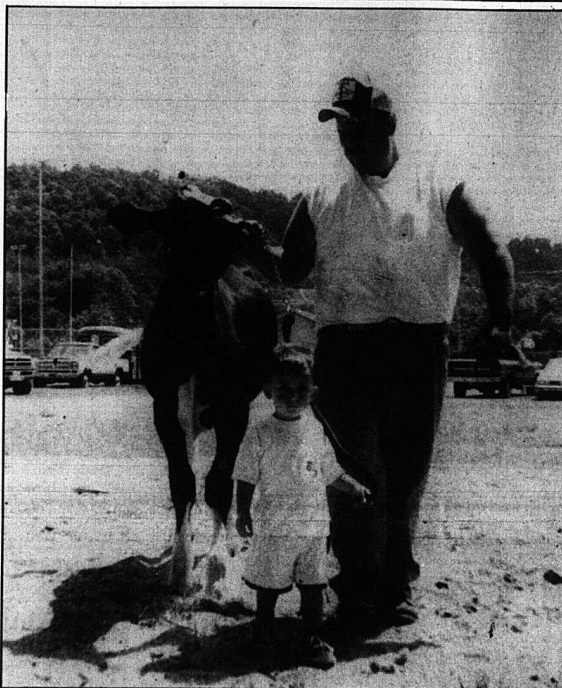

## No candidates file for seats in Mt. Vernon, Livingston

No one had filed for a seat on the Mt. Vernon City Council and for one seat on the Livingston City Council when the filing time came to an end Tuesday.

A write-in vote could claim the seats in the Nov. 7 election.

Mt. Vernon Councilman Lloyd Cain did not file, leaving the seat vacant. He was appointed by the council to replace Wayne Gregory who resigned and left the area.

Two seats need to be filled at Livingston. The seat held by Ed Lile, who resigned to become Livingston's mayor, and the seat made vacant by Hershel Niccley.

In the case of Livingston, Katha

Carpenter filed for one seat. In Brodhead, a seat is also vacant on the council. Ricky Vanzant moved out of the city and Larry Doyle filed for the seat.

Doyle will be a councilman unless someone gets a write-in vote and gets more votes than Doyle. The same goes for Livingston.

The Mt. Vernon seat is for about one year. The write-in winner would take office in January 1996 and continue until January, 1997.

At a Mt. Vernon council meeting Monday, council persons tried to talk Cain into being a candidate. At that time, he said he had not made up his mind.

In action during the regular

monthly meeting Monday, the council approved minutes of the former meeting in July, heard the July police report and paid bills, in short order.

The August police report, made by Chief Bill Mink, showed 90 citations were issued; 152 total charges; 14 DUI arrests; 240 calls for service; 15 accidents; 37 other agency assists; 15 motorist assists; 10 criminal cases opened and 11 Mt. Vernon fire runs.

## Magistrates pick roads in their district for work

During a special meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court on Friday, magistrates submitted a list of county roads in their district they would like to see paved and or resurfaced.

Each year the state blacktops a certain number of county roads and in the past they have always made the decision on what roads would be blacktopped. However, this year, the magistrates will at least get to request which roads are worked by the state and which are not.

But, Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said that in the end, the state will have the final say. The state has a certain amount of money to spend in Rockcastle and all of the roads that were requested may not get paved before the state runs out. But, the Judge-Executive said with the passage of Governor Brewer's \$50 million road package by a special legislature last week, it is very likely that all of the roads that need work will get it.

Carlotis also said that because of efforts by himself, county democrat chairman Larry Doyle and state representative Danny Ford, the Hammond Fork road in district four will be fixed.

Last year residents petitioned the court to fix the 4.2 mile stretch of road, which apparently had not been worked for several years.

At the time the county did not have the \$150,000 it was estimated to cost to fix the road, so local officials began looking for alternative funding.

Carlotis said they found help in the Governor's office. Governor Jones agreed to pay for all the materials to fix the road, if county workers would do the work," Carlotis said.

## Hammonds Fork road to benefit from state money

"All we are waiting on is a contract to be signed and we will begin work on that road," he said.

The other roads recommended for pavement resurfacing are as follows:

District One: Barnett Road and Mt. Zion/Oak Hill Road.

District Two: Calloway Hollow Road, Chestnut Hills Drive, Wald/Jones Road, McClure Road, Freedom School Road.

District Three: Clay Bowling Road, Bowling Ridge Road, Slay Branch Road, Turk Hill, Bryant Ridge and John Mason Brown Road.

District Four: Old State/May Apple Road, Stevens Road, Hammonds Fork (Special Project).

District Five: U.S. 25 Loop at Burr, Old U.S. 25 Calloway Loop, Hummel Road.

It was noted in the meeting that if the state rejects any or all of these roads, the county could possibly repair them with money from their own road fund, which has a budget of about \$160,000.

In order to try and get the best possible price for the pavement all roads fixed by the state will be done under state contract.

The court also approved the reconstruction of the Old Conway Road Bridge over Roundstone Creek.

The work on the 54 foot bridge will be paid for by the state.

The court's regularly scheduled meeting on August 8 was moved to Friday August 11 at 10 a.m.

## Her background destined woman to be natural, born story teller

"My grandma, who lived to be 97, was a little old woman who couldn't read or write, but she was a really intelligent woman, and she kept her head full of stories," Beverly Carter-Sexton remembers. "She always wore dresses, black stockings and a bonnet. She was a real active person. She'd jump around, you know, and tell stories. I think I get my storytelling like that off of her."

"Grandpa was a real laid-back guy. He'd sit down on the horse-hair couch and take a plug of 'bacco' and bite off a chew, and work him up one good spit before he started his story. He'd always put his foot out, you know,

and hold his hands like this—and he'd go real slow. He told 'jump tales' where he'd jump up at you and scare you at the end. There was a bunch of us young 'uns and we'd scream and try to get away, but of course we loved every minute of it.

"Little wonder, then, that Isaac and Cleo Bowman's Auburn-haired, green-eyed granddaughter took up storytelling herself.

"I went to a two-room school, Maple Grove, and one thing we did was, at recess, we'd do one and tell stories," Carter-Sexton said. "Usually, I'd wind up standing in the center with all the kids gathered around me. Then President Johnson sent the VISTA work-

ers into this part of the country to give us culture. We don't have any culture here, you know, so the VISTA workers came and culturized us, and brought us some toys and books, and taught us some songs. We were told to treat them nice and be good, but we were amused by them."

Carter-Sexton, now 41, was married at age 18. She now has a 22-year-old daughter and a 13-year-old son to whom she told stories when they were young. It was not until the late 1980s that she decided to go to Berea College and study English, history and education. She graduated in 1991.

"When I got to college, they offered a storytelling class during short term, so I took the class and did recall well. I told one of my stories that

came from my family, and when I finished, the professor said that that was the best story he'd ever heard...Then he told me about professional storytelling and that I should try to get into it."

Now, Carter-Sexton works as a health educator for the Cumberland Valley District Health Department, where she often mixes a few of her old favorite children's stories into health presentations she makes before school groups and others. But

she also is at home among the country's best professional storytellers, many of whom she will join in September 14 through 16 at the great harmonic convergence of storytellers—the Corn Island Storytelling Festival.

Wouldn't it be nice if Isaac and Cleo Bowman could be there to hear the stories that they passed on to their small, wide-eyed granddaughter at their little house on Brush Creek in eastern Rockcastle County years ago?

I'm sitting behind my keyboard on this hot and muggy August afternoon knowing that I should be sitting in Ed Brents' favorite chair getting a jaw tooth yanked. Dr. Brents is a neighbor and one of my favorite people. He's also a dentist. I don't have a favorite dentist. I don't think there is any such thing so when I meet Ed in passing or drive by his house and wave, I pretend he's a farmer like most of the other folks who live here on Fairview Ridge.

Every time I hear Jeff Foxworthy get into his red-neck joke routine, I wince. He has one that goes, "If your two-year-old has more teeth than you do, you might be a red neck." Another one goes, "If somebody accuses you of lying through your teeth, you might be a redneck." I'm a big fan of Foxworthy, but sometimes he hits too close to home, not that I take much umbrage at being called a red neck.

But the point is that I'm rapidly running out of teeth. I have an upper plate with six teeth on it that Dr. Jerry Mayes made for me back in the seventies. It's made of stainless steel so every time I'm outside in a lightning storm, my head literally rattles, but I also have some gaps in my upper teeth now. I need a new plate with ten on it or I'm going to have to go on a gravy diet.

The jaw tooth that has most recently erupted has caused a pome to swell up on my chin so that I look like a ground squirrel with one big walnut in his cheek. Ed probably wouldn't pull it anyway since it's all swollen up and I don't see any need to pull it when the swelling goes down because it doesn't hurt.

Still, I'm tempted to follow the advice of my buddy, Dave Maggard and just get what few teeth I have left yanked out and go artificial all the

way. Dave had eight or ten pulled last week and has about that many to go and then he's having both uppers and lowers made. He says that he hopes to be able to eat again without feeling pain and he points out that it will cut down on brushing time. Dave says he's just going to stick his new teeth in the dishwasher every night and that he intends to have the best looking pearly whites in Garrard County.

Dave does a lot of electrical wiring on automobiles however and he gets shocked about once every thirty minutes when he's on the job. I ain't saying nothing and don't you tell him any different, because I'm hoping they put his new teeth on stainless steel plates and I want to be in the garage the first time he gets shocked. The first time he gets shocked, you'll be able to hear them chatter half a mile away.

When a customer comes in complaining that his car won't start because she's not getting enough fire, Ok Dave is going to be saying, "Wait just a minute while I put my teeth in a cup and I'll check her out for you."

And the customer will want to know why Dave is putting his teeth away.

"Cauthe when I get juitheed, spunkthe fly off of em and that my mathke on fire", Dave will patiently explain when he gets his teeth out.

So tomorrow, if the swelling goes

down I aim to go over and let Dr. Ed pull this one out and then I'm going to pay attention to Dave Maggard for awhile. If he is able to eat an apple and corn on the cob when he gets his new teeth, I think I'll go the same route.

In the meantime, let me suggest to you gardeners that the time is right to get a fall crop in the ground. It's time to sow turnips, mustard, kale, lettuce and even plant a row of late Romal or Blue Lake beans. Cucumbers will still make it and if you'll look around, you can probably find a green house that has some late cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower and Brussel sprout plants for sale. If you want to try corn, plant a row of early golden sunflowers—or just a few hills. I planted some on August 13 last year and it was ready to eat by mid-October well before the first real killing frost.

You can also grow snow peas or sugar snaps if you plant them right now and they taste much sweeter in the Fall than in the Spring. Chop a few suckers off your tomatoes and put them in a jar of water for three or four days when they will start taking roots and then set them out. Fertilize them with Miracle Grow or Peter's Professional every three or four days until mid-September and they will provide you with a delicacy come October.

"You sure have a pretty garden," I said to him.

"Yep, you folks want a mess of beans go out in the garden and pick all you want," Buster said to us.

Again we run into mountain folks and their treatment which can't be beat.

A lot of small chickens ran around in the yard, Buster said they were called "banty chickens."

When we reached Wildie, we stopped at Ballard Parsons store and eat lunch with him. The usual gang of loafers, er, I mean men were there, Glenn Coffey, Vincent Fish, and Donnie Parsons who stood tall at 16 years of age. He was called L.D. Parsons, Jr. and drove a big dump truck.

They were laughing and talking, joking Ballard saying he had sold out of everything to make lunch with.

Someone said the preacher was Kenyon Parkey at the church there giving me news, he was a fine fellow and doing a good job.

The old Wildie depot was owned by June Parsons and she also had bought the old mill house that was standing by the road. Looking at the old house, one could imagine all the work it used to do for the community when folks brought in their turn of corn to be ground so they would have bread to eat.

Looking up at the old home of preacher Bill Hiatt I can understand why the family would not sell it when their parents passed on. Every so often the family came together there, seating a dinner as if they would keep the memories of their folks alive.

Back in Ballard's store, I asked what kind of business was he doing.

"Not much now selling for all goods are so high," Ballard told me. There was a good size crowd at Ballard Parsons' Day. No, I'm not selling anything under the counter. It's too hot for that. I'll have to wait until winter."

John Branaman helps Ballard in the store putting up stock.

One night for supper we had gone to Ky. Fried Chicken and we talked to Walker and Elizabeth McNew who finished their meal and stopped by our table to talk.

She was a pretty woman and agreed with me that getting her husband to bring her out to eat was the best job she did.

A man came into the restaurant seeming all tired out. He had been to Richmond and bought cattle. He said he had one steer that had jumped and broken the gate. His name was Ronnie Burdette.

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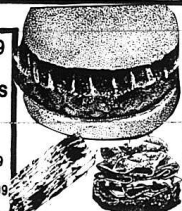

## "What Saith the Scriptures"

May we use this concept to make a few observations about some of today's religious practices that are common around about.

We see lots of men of a "clergy" class of people who wear religious titles, such as Reverend, Father, Rabbi, D.D., etc. We see these "men of the cloth" wearing special religious garments. But we ask, where did he (God) say at anytime for such to be done? Notice what he did say in Mt. 23:5-10.

We see commonly practiced church social and recreational activities, such as church ball teams, church dining rooms, church gyms and bowling alleys, etc. May we ask, Where did he say at anytime for God's church to do such things? If you would like, notice what he did say in 1 Cor. 11:22-34; Rm. 14:17, Jn. 12:32.

We see another commonly practiced matter in religion is sprinkling and pouring as acceptable modes of baptism. But might we ask, where did he ever say such at anytime? If you want to know what he did say, look at Col. 2:12, Rm. 6:3-5.

We see another common practice among the churches of men is to tell men to pray the sinner's prayer for salvation; to receive Christ as your personal saviour and that will make you a child of God; to pray through at the altar. But may we ask, where did he say at anytime say such for men to become Christians? But, you can read what he did say on the matter, Ac. 2:36-41, Ac. 8:26-39.

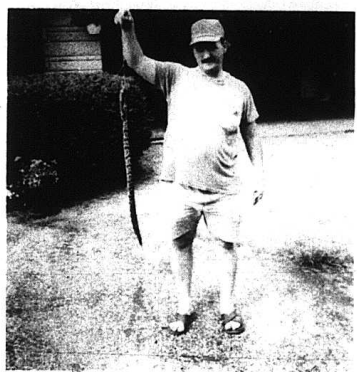

She tells her stories with refreshing honesty, holding nothing back. As she spins her tales, her words come to life with a spirit of their own. "Her authentic delivery of stories..." says Jill Payne-Reed, Managing Director of the Morehead State U. Folk Art Center, "and her enthusiastic and entertaining presentation hold the audience spellbound."

Sexton inherited Cherokee blood from both sides of her family and grew up hearing folktales, haint tales, and Jack tales learned from her grandparents...who learned from their. She says her stories, told and retold for many lifetimes, are merely "containing a family tradition"—a tradition of giving and sharing. 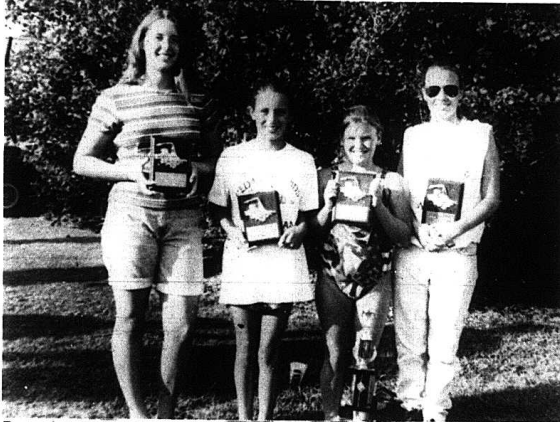

# The FDA: A Freedom Inhibiting Agency

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has been behaving in a decidedly freedom inhibiting manner under David Kessler's leadership.

In Kessler's America, government works against the people - not for the people.

In Kessler's America, citizens are crushed under the weight of burdensome, overreaching regulations that threaten their freedom of choice.

It's time the FDA was reined in. Its brand of big government is not the America we're accustomed to. Americans want a government that's less inclined to interfere in their business affairs and private lives. In fact, in the 1994 election, we pulled off the most sweeping defeat of big-government advocates in nearly 20 years, and we elected a Congress committed to deregulation.

We want an FDA that works for the people, but under Kessler's leadership the FDA is turning out more intrusive regulations faster than ever.

Many businesses have been victims of FDA excesses. A Washington health clinic was raided by armed FDA agents because the clinic sold injectable B-vitamins. A herring smokehouse owner was forced to lay off all his employees and close his doors because he could not comply with complex new fish-gutting methods. And the list goes on.

Now the FDA has turned its attention to the tobacco industry. For years, the agency insisted it had no jurisdiction over tobacco. The FDA even argued in a 1980 case that cigarettes should not be regulated by the agency.

Then, in 1994, Kessler began considering regulating nicotine as a drug. Last week, Kessler submitted to President Clinton a list of proposed regulations that could lead to a total ban on tobacco products in the future.

Kessler has made his goal clear. FDA regulation, he has written, "could mean, ultimately, removal from the market of tobacco products... Only those tobacco products from which the nicotine had been removed or, possibly, tobacco products approved by FDA for nicotine-replacement therapy would then remain on the market."

Those who support FDA action against tobacco say they're not out for Prohibition; they're simply deciding what may and may not be done in public. Isn't that the first step toward Prohibition?

The measures proposed by Kessler threaten a freedom smokers have enjoyed for years. Government regulators shouldn't try to substitute their values for the choices made by 45 million American consumers. In fact, more than 40 million people have chosen to quit smoking over the past 30 years, most of them on their own. And, the tobacco industry has spent millions to discourage children from smoking.

Several Kentucky politicians were among a bipartisan coalition who called on President Clinton to reject Kessler's latest recommendations.

They wrote, "To initiate new regulations on an already heavily regulated legal product that contributes more than \$50 billion to the nation's economy is completely at odds with the public's well-founded

belief that we need less government intrusion in our lives, not more."

The FDA is an example of big government at its worst -- huge, ineffective and out of control.

The FDA's staff increased from 4,470 in 1970 to 9,217 in 1994. Since 1970, the agency's budget has grown more than 200 percent. Despite these increases, the FDA has delayed approvals for medical devices and medicines longer than ever before. It takes the FDA an average of two and a half years to review a drug. In fact, eighty percent of drugs approved by the FDA between 1987 and 1989 were available sooner in other countries by an average of six years.

Rep. Ron Lewis, (R) - 2nd District, said recently, "We don't need the FDA to play Big Brother, and I recommend that the agency get its own house in order before adding hundreds of pages of new federal regulations."

Technically, Congress has oversight of regulatory agencies like the FDA. Urge your members of Congress to halt the FDA's tendency toward overregulation.

Ask them to trim or even abolish this agency if it cannot rid itself of wastefulness and bureaucracy. Speaker Gingrich has proposed replacing the FDA with an agency staffed with biomedical entrepreneurs, not career bureaucrats.

When Kessler took the helm, he vowed to clean up the FDA's act. Let's hold him to that.

# Come and Celebrate a Mountain Harvest!

Since the time of the pioneers in Renfro Valley, the end of summer marks a special occasion for neighborly gathering to celebrate the autumn harvest. It's been a tradition in Renfro Valley since the 1950's to gather for the annual sorghum stir-off. This came to be known as the 'Lasses Festival'. In the following year, a Harvest and a Tobacco festival, and other special events were held in the Valley at the end of the summer season.

It all began in 1953 when an impromptu "Lasses Makin" occurred at the John Lair farm. Everyone got in on the excitement—Pete Stamper (who was then known as "Waldo"), Susan Ledford (Black-Eyed Susie of the Coon Creek Girls), Roy Davidson, Harry Chasteen, Slim Miller and others in the Renfro Valley family all gathered around the simmering cane pans to taste the sweetenings. Visitors came from seven states to watch the process and to buy sorghum direct from the pan. For two weeks the whole Valley had been converted into a sorghum factory, with the synop in such demand that as soon as the shelves at the souvenir shop and Country Store were filled, they were sold out and emptied. John Lair's plans for the event grew and grew. Although there was much excitement that first autumn, Lair had even bigger plans for the next season.

"Next year it is planned to hold a 'Lasses-makin' Festival," Lair wrote in the November 1953 issue of The Renfro Valley Bugle. "The equipment will all be moved down from the farm and set up right here in the Settlement where everyone can visit the scene of activities. A much larger furnace will be built, a larger pan and evaporator purchased, along with a much larger mill to speed up production. The Festival is planned to run from Monday to Saturday, with the big event on Friday night. This will be held

in front of the grandstand at the horse show grounds. Various entertainment features are planned and the highlight of the festival will be the crown of a beauty queen—not one, but three. They will each share the title of Miss Country 'Lasses of 1954."

The fall festivities soon grew into a regular harvest festival and fair, with judging on cattle, corn, hay and tobacco. During the 1960s, the Festival was held in the second week of November to be sure to get the best entires in the tobacco judging. It became Renfro's most popular outdoor event of the year. This same spirit has endured

## Old-Time 'Lasses Making

Reprinted from the November 1954 issue of The Renfro Valley Bugle.

How many gallons of sorghum molasses can be made from sixteen acres of cane? That's an easy question, perhaps, in the other parts of the country where folks have had experience with big acreage of sorghum cane, but since this is the first time in the history of Renfro Valley that anybody had put out such a big cane patch the probable production is all guess work.

Under the board roof which once sheltered the hot dog and hamburger stand ("Hand-out House", they called it) two large twelve-foot evaporators have been installed, each under the charge of a different expert in the art of sorghum making, each of whom has his own crew of skimmers. Once man is kept busy keeping fires under the two pans and another is constantly employed in getting the sorghum put up in gallon and half-gallon pails and quart jars. Two men are kept busy feeding the power mill for grinding the juice and another workman feeds the one mule power

smaller mill. A crew of four cuts and loads the cane in the field and two men are employed in hauling it. It doesn't take much arithmetic to show that a crew of fourteen or fifteen men runs to considerable daily expense.

On Friday night of each week during the making of the crop an old-fashioned "stir-off" will be held. If you've never attended a stir-off, then you've missed out on an important rural social event. If you have attended them in the far distant past then you'll want to come down and attend another one to see if the same thrill is still there. You are welcome to come and bring your family or friends. There is no charge and you can eat all the 'Lasses Pan scrapings you can hold.

There is a certain etiquette to be observed at a stir-off. There are two schools of thought as to which should be used to scrape up the thick sweetening: a cord biscuit or a small wooden paddle. Which ever is used, the gentlemen must attend strictly to the ladies' wishes, reserving

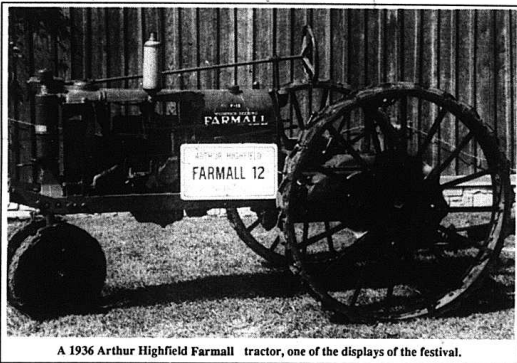
the thickest scraping for her and making the necessary trips to the pan to replenish her supply. Among couples of courting age this can be carried to the extreme of enclosing the lady in the deep shadows beyond the fire light where no eyes other than those of her escort may gaze upon her as he runs to and fro in the matter of providing for her. A great social blunder is to step into the skimming hole. If you attend a Renfro Valley stir-off, however, you will be spared this risk, as the hole will be properly covered at all times.

We'll be looking for you any Friday night during the 'Lasses making and you'll be heartily welcomed if you put in an appearance.

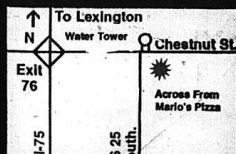

## Legislative Update

 Legislators returned to Frankfort this week to pass legislation that will boost the state's "rainy day" fund.

The Governor called us back to discuss these matters, and initially said he could expand his call to include community college projects, classroom technology improvements, and juvenile facilities. However, because of the lack of support and the general feeling by most of us not to extend an additional \$40,000 a day to extend the session, these matters were not added to the agenda. We will address these other important issues when we return in January for the regular 60-day session.

In an overwhelming vote of 99 to 0, House members adopted legislation that will put \$50 million in state road money into the Rural and Secondary Road Program to do road repairs, fix bridges and install guardrails. The money will be divided among each of the 120 counties according to the current rural secondary distribution formula. Amounts distributed among the 120 counties will range from \$176,525 to \$960,207.

It is my understanding that these extra funds can be used for county and state roads. Fiscal courts will make recommendations to the Transportation Cabinet. It is likely that bids for contracts occur in September or October, with actual

work beginning in the Spring of 1996. I am pleased to report that the net county Rockcastle County will receive from the surplus road fund will be \$370,837. McCree County will receive \$463,247; Wayne County, \$449,734; and Pulaski County, \$788,955.

After very positive move was made this week when the House voted 98 to 1 to place \$100 million of surplus money from the state's budget into the Budget Reserve Trust Fund. This move was initially recommended in July at the Capital Planning Advisory Board meeting by a Republican colleague. In addition to building up our "rainy day" fund by nearly doubling the account, this increased savings should improve the state's bond rating. An amendment to the bill stipulates that the money can be appropriated by the General Assembly to cover shortfalls in the state's budget.

This week, we met to redraw legislative district lines, and more importantly, to see that the new redistricting plan provides each Kentuckian with fair representation based on the 1990 census. The next census figures will be released in 2000.

Reaching an agreement was extremely frustrating because negotiations regarding redistricting were held behind closed doors without legislative input. An actual map of new district lines was not provided until Wednesday. The new plan does not make any significant changes within

*Beach Music* is about Jack McCall,

an American living in Rome with his young daughter trying to find peace after the recent trauma of his wife's suicide. His attitude is disturbed by the appearance of his sister-in-law, who begs him to return home, and of two school friends asking for his help in tracking down another classmate who went underground as a Vietnamese protester and never resurfaced. Their requests launch Jack on a journey that encompasses the past and the present.

*The Trickster* by Muriel Gray... In a remote ski resort town high in the Canadian Rockies something is terribly wrong. A young police officer is found murdered and strangely mutilated. A truck driver is found frozen solid in his truck, doors and windows closed, with snowdrifts inside the cab. the 80th District. The plan was adopted by the house in a final vote of 86 to 13.

In 1991, a redistricting plan split up 48 counties between various House districts, which caused some counties to be divided into as many as four districts. Last year, the Kentucky Supreme Court declared this reapportionment plan unconstitutional, and ruled that new district lines must be redrawn before the filing deadline in January for candidates in the 1996 general election.

Under our state's Constitution, the 100 House and Senate districts are to be divided as "nearly equal in population as may be without dividing any county." Ideally, this means each

House district's population should consist of 36,853 people. For each Senate district, the population should be 96,981 people.

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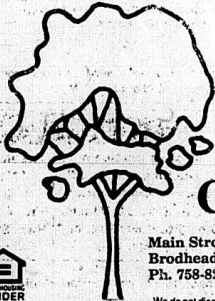

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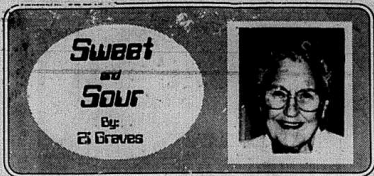

### Long ago

These hot days of August take me back to long ago when a hike down to the Rockcastle River to take a swim was the only way we had to cool off. After a day in the field or harvesting and canning, beans, tomatoes, corn and whatever else was ready for canning we were reading for a break and used any excuse we could find to take one. Then, after we made up some excuse, we would head for the river with swim suit or skimpy swimming clothes tucked under our arms. We would work like demons in the field or garden all morning so we could take that mile hike to the cool waters of the river in the afternoon.

Our good friends, Betty and Cecil Mize, lived close to the banks of the river and they with their two children, Joy and Sherman, usually joined us. Cecil, even though he had lost an arm in an accident, was an excellent swimmer and our kids loved to watch him swim and do things in the water many people with both arms couldn't do. There certainly wasn't any fear of anyone drowning if Cecil was present for he had enough strength in that one arm to lift and carry a heavy man and tow him to safety.

These outings to the river, and our friendship with Betty and Cecil began in 1937 so you see it has been a long time ago. At that time Cecil's mother and father lived close by in the old Mize homestead on the banks of the Rockcastle River and close to where Eagle Creek emptied into the river which formed the pool of water that became our swimming hole. At that time several houses were scattered along the length of Eagle Creek and the county road ran alongside it. This wagon road was the only way those living close to the river had of getting to the outside world except by a path that wound up the hollow and hillside and ended on top of the hill and close to our front yard. This was the same path we took when we went to the river and at that time seemed to me it was a five mile hike but really is only about a mile or so, many years ago that path was enlarged by Mat and Cecil and after grueling work and changes in its course it was turned into a pretty decent road that trucks and later cars could travel over.

Now this retreat we made to the river was sometimes more that a refreshing swim, once in awhile it turned into an old fashioned day long visit with Betty and Cecil. Some of us remembers the time when neighbors would simply say "Come early and spend the day, I'll bring a chicken's neck and we will have chicken and dumplings." Of course this meant the women would have a day of work, the children a day of play, while the men would discuss everything from politics to how to cure a mule of the heaves. But for some reason women enjoyed this kind of work, it was while cooking and dish washing was being done that women talked of things that isn't talked about in the parlor or mixed crowds. It was here

we got to know each other's dreams and disappointments. It was here lasting friendships began. My own house has had its share of these happy times and a feeling of sadness comes over me as I remember them and know they are gone forever.

On one of these outings to the river my mother, who was visiting, was along. She didn't swim but she loved the water and fishing was one of her greatest joys. She not only like to fish, she loved to eat them. When Cecil heard her say this he immediately asked us to bring her down and spend the day so they could fix her a special fish dinner. His dad, Wad Mize, who was also present, seconded the invitation and offered to help catch the fish. Cecil really didn't need help with the catching of fish for he was an expert at doing it, but graciously accepted his father's offer. The day was set and finally arrived.

We arrived by mid morning and found Betty in the kitchen with skillets full of mysterious things sizzling in deep fat. Cecil and his dad were sitting on the front porch waiting for us with satisfied grins lighting up their faces. In a very few minutes Betty called us to "come and get it" and I knew the reason for the grins. I had helped her finish up and get it on the table and was amazed at the spread she had prepared for us. I can't remember all that was on the table but I do remember the big platter of golden brown fish and another platter just as full of also golden brown frog legs, and big plates of corn bread. This was a feast beyond our fondest imagination. And my mother, who was never at a loss for words, was beyond speaking when she saw the frog legs, a delicacy she hadn't had for years. All of us fully enjoyed the meal which included much more than fish and frog legs, but my mom and Cecil's dad seemed to be having a contest to see who could eat the most fish and

frog legs. Then each accused the other of eating much their rice balls would slip off. (An old saying when one ate too much.)

Betty and I had quite a time cleaning up after everyone had eaten their fill and as if we hadn't had enough fish and frog legs the remainder of them were put in a brown paper bag for us to take home. Then we settled on the front porch for an afternoon of telling tall tales or simply enjoying the beautiful scene spread out before us. Their home sat high on the side of the hill and the view from there was spectacular. One could see up the valley with the distant hills closing us in or by turning a bit sideways could see across the bottoms to where the waters of the river were rippling in the afternoon shade. At the foot of the hill was a big spring where their water for cooking, drinking, and doing the family laundry came from.

While we were chatting and thanking them for the good meal Cecil admitted he had been up all night setting his trout lines and giggering for

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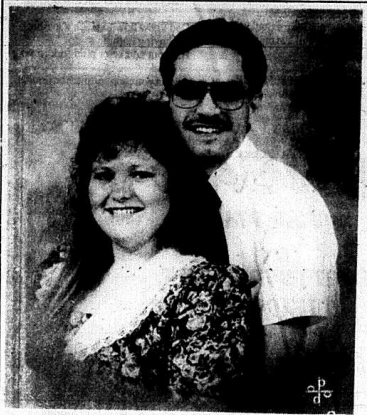

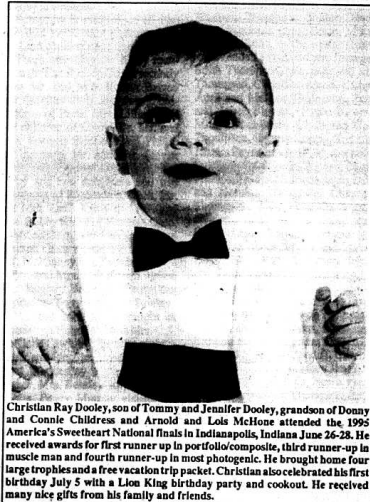
