foods sit at room temperature too long.
What can you do to help prevent such microorganisms from becoming a problem?

Reading With

Your Child

Learning how to read is one of the most important areas of language development. Parentsoften ask teachers, "How can I help my child with reading?" The answer might surprise you. You can help at home even before your child is ready for school.

Listening to stories is the basis for good reading. Children learn how a book works, there the beginning is, and how the story goos from page to page until the end. 

"What Saith the Scriptures" There's an interesting and important principle found in the book of Hebrews, chap. 1, that we want to develop a few thoughts for us to

Hebrews, chap. 1, that we want to develop a few thoughts for us to consider.

The Hebrew writer in chapter 1 is showing that Jesus Christ is superior to angels. He raises the question "for unto which of the angels aid he at anythme. Thou art my 500, this day have Depoten there?" vs. 5. The answer of course, is none! In vs. 7 he points out what God did say about angels, "and of the angels he saith, who maketh his angels apoint, and his ministers a flame of fire." May we use this concept to make a few observations about some of today's religious practices that are common around about.

We see commonly practiced church swist and memoriant contains.

minut 23:5-10.

We see commonly practiced church social and recreational activities, such as church ball teams, church dining rooms, church gyms and bowling alleys, etc. May we ask, Where did he say at anytime for Gold's church to do such things? If you would like, notice what he did say in 1 Cor. 11:22.34; Rm. 14:17, Jn. 12:32.

Then another commonly practiced matter in religion is sprinkling and pouring as acceptable modes of baptism. But might we ask, where did he ever say such at anytime? If you want to know what he did say, look at Col. 2:12, Rm. 63-5.

We see another common practice among the churches of men is to tell men to pray the sinner's prayer for salvation; to receive Christ as your personal saviour and that will make you a child of God; to pray through at the altar. But may we ask, where did he at anytime say such for men to become Christians? But, you can read what he did say on the matter, Ac. 2:36-41, Ac. 8:26-39.

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
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

The FDA: A Freedom Inhibiting Agency

President, Burley Tobac
The U.S. Food and Drug
Administration has been behaving in
a decidedly freedom inhibiting
manner under David Kessler's

leadership.
In Kessler's America, government works against the people - not for the

works against use people.

In Kessler's America, citizens are crushed under the weight of burdensome, overreaching regulations that threaten their freedom

regulations that threaten their treadom of choice.

It's time the FDA was reined in. Its brand of big government is not the America we're accustomed to. Americans want a government that's less inclined to interfere in their business affairs and private lives. In fact, in the 1994 election, we pulled off the most sweeping defeat of big-government advocates in nearly 20 years, and we elected a Congress committed to deregulation.

We want an FDA that works for the 'people,' but under Kessler's the leadership the FDA is turning out more intrusive regulations faster than ever.

more intrusive regulations faster than ever many but the properties of FDA excesses. A Washington health clinic was raided by armed FDA agents because the clinic sold nijectable B-vitamins. A herring-smokehouse owner was forced to lay off all his employees and close his doors because the could not comply with complex new fish-gutting methods. And the list goes on.

Now the FDA has turned its attention to the tobacco industry. For years, the agency insisted it had no jurisdiction over tobacco. The FDA even argued in a 1980 case that eigarettee should not be regulated by the agency.

Then, in 1994, Kessler began considering resultating national statements of the considering resultating nations as a considering resultating nations as a

considering regulating nicotine as a drug. Last week, Kessler submitted to President Clinton a list of proposed regulations that could lead to a total ban on tobacco products in the future

regulations that could lead to a total anon ontobacco products in the future.

Kessler has made his goal clear. FDA regulation, he has written, 'could mean, ultimately, removal from the market of tobacco products from which the incitone had been removed or, possibly, tobacco products approved by FDA for incitone-raplacement therapy would then remain on the market. Those who support FDA action against tobacco say they're not out for Prohibition: they're simply deciding what may and may not be done in public. Isn that the first step toward Prohibition?

The measures proposed by Kessler threaten a freedom smokers have enjoyed for years. Government regulators shouldn't try to substitute their values for the choices made by 45 million American consumers. In fact, more than 40 million people have chosen to quit smoking over the past 30 years, most of them on their own. And, the tobacco industry has spent millions to discourage children from smoking.

among a bipartisan coalition who called on President Clinton to reject

Ressler's latest recommendations.
They wrote, "To initiate new regulations on an already-heavity regulated legal product that contributes more than \$50 billion to the nation's economy is completely at odds with the public's well-founded

to Growers Cooperative belief that we need uses government intrusion in our lives, not more. The FDA is an example of big government at its worst - huge, ineffective and out of control. The FDA's staff increased from 4,470 in 1970 to 9,217 in 1994. Since

4,470in 1970 to 9.217in 1994. Since 1970, the agency's budget has grown more than 200 percent. Despite these increases, the FDA has delayed approvals for medical devices and medicines longer than ever before. It ackes the FDA an average of two and a half years to review a drug. In fact, eighty percent of drugs approved by the FDA between 1987 and 1989 were available sooner in other countries by an average of six years.

Rep.RonLewis, (R)-2nd District, said recently, "We don't need the FDA to play Big Brother, and I recommend that the agency get its own house in order before adding hundreds of pages of new federal-regulations."

Technically, Congress has oversight of regulatory agencies like the FDA. Urge your members of Congress to halt the FDA's tendency toward overregulation.
Ask them to trim or even abolish

Ask them to trim or even aboush this agency if it cannot rid itself of wastefulness and bureaucracy. Speaker Gingrich has proposed replacing the FDA with an agency staffed with biomedical ntrepreneurs, not career bureaucrats
When Kessler took the helm, he

vowed to clean up the FDA's act. Let's hold him to that.

Come and Celebrate a Mountain Harvest!

Reprinted from August 1995 Ren-fro Valley Bugle.

Since the time of the pio-neers in Renfro Valley, the end of summer marks a special occasion for neighborly gatherin to celebrate the autumn harvest. It's been a tradition in Renfro Valley since the 1950's to gather for the annual sorghum stir-off. This came to be known as the Tasses Festival In the following year, a Harvest festival, a Tobacco festival, and other special events were held in the Valley at the end of the summer season

It all began in 1953 when an impromptu "Lasses Makin" oced at the John Lair farm Everyone got in on the excitement-Pete Stamper (who was then known as "Waldo"), Susan Ledford (Black-Eyed Susie of the Coon Creek Girls), Roy ridson, Harry Cha Miller and others in the Renfro Valley family all gathered around the simmering cane pans to taste the sweetenings. Visitors came from seven states to watch the process and to buy sorghum direct from the pan. For two weeks the whole Valley had been converted into a sorghum factory, with the syrup in such demand that as soon as the shelves at the souvenir shop and Country Stope were filled,

they were sold out and emptied.

John Lair's plans for the event grew and grew. Although there was much excitement that first autumn, Lair had even bigger plans for the next season

"Next year it is planned to hold a 'Lasses-makin' Festival. Lair write in the November 1953 issue of The Renfro Valley Bugle. "The equipment will all he moved down from the farm and set up right here in the Settlement where everyone can visit the scene of activities. A much larger furnace will be built, a larger pan and evapora-tor purchased, along with a much larger mill to speed up production. The Festival is planned to run from Monday to Saturday, with the big event on Friday night. This will be held

in front of the grandstand at the horse show grounds. Various entertainment features are planned and the highlight of the festival will be the crown of a beauty queen-not one, but three. They will each share the title of Miss Country 'Lasses of

The fall festivities soon grew into a regular harvest festival and fair, with judging on cattle, com, hay and tobacco. During the 1060s the Festival we held in the second week of Novemher to be sure to get the best entires in the tobacco judging It became Renfro's most popular outdoor event of the year

Old-Time 'Lasses Making

How many gallons of sor-

ghum molasses can be made sixteen acres of cane? That's an easy question, perhaps, in the other parts of the country where folks have had experience with big acreage of corphum cone but since this is the first time in the history of Renfro Valley that anybody had put out such a big cane patch the probable production is all guess

Under the board roof which once sheltered the hot dog and hamburger stand ("Hand-out House", they called it) two large twelve-foot evaporators have been installed, each under the charge of a different expert in the art of sorohum making each of whom has his own crew of skimmers. Once man is kept busy keeping fires under the two pans and another is constantly employed in getting the sorghum put up in gallon and half-gallon pails and quart jars. Two men are kept busy feeding the power mill for grinding the juice and another workman feeds the one mule power

cuts and loads the cane in the field and two men are employed in hauling it. It doesn't take much arithmetic to show that a crew of fourteen or fifteen men sune

during the making of the crop an old-fashioned "stir-off" will be held. If you've never attended a stir-off, then you've missed out on an important rural social event. If you have attended them in the far distant past then you'll want to come down and attend another one to see if the same thrill is still there. 

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

Legislative Update

By Rep. Danny Ford Legislators returned to Frankfort this week to pass legislation that will boost the state's "rainy day" fund, allocate more money for road and bridge repairs, and redraw legislative boundaries

boundaries.

The Governor called us back to discuss these matters, and initially said he could expand his call to insaid he could expand his call to in-clude community college projects, classroom technology improvements, and juvenile facilities. However, because of the lack of support and the general feeling by most of us not to spend an additional \$40,000 a day to spend an additional \$40,000 a day to extend the session, these matters were not added to the agenda. We will address these other important issues when we return in January for the regular 60-day session.

In an overwhelming vote of 99 to 0. Howe members detected legislar.

0, House members adopted legisla-tion that will put \$50 million in surtion that will put 350 million in sur-plus road money into the Rural and Secondary Road Program to do road repairs, fix bridges and install guard-rails. The money will be divided among each of the 120 counties according to the current rural secon-dary distribution formula. Amounts distributed among the 120 counties will range from \$176,525 to \$960,207.

It is my understanding that these extra funds can be used for county and state roads. Fiscal courts will make recommendations to the Tran portation Cabinet. It is likely the bids for contracts could occur September or October, with actu

work beginning in the Spring of 1996.
I am pleased to report that the net dollars Rockcastle County will receive from the surplus road fund will be \$370,837. McCreary County will receive \$463,247. Wayne County, \$449,734; and Pulaski County, \$788,955.
Another very positive move was made this week when the House voted 98 to 1 to place \$100 million of surplus money from the state's budget into the Budget Reserve Trust Fund. This move was initially recommended

into the Budget Reserve I rust Fund. This move was initially recommended in July at the Capital Planning Advi-sory Board meeting by a Republican colleague. In addition to building up our "rainy day" fund by nearly dou-bling the account, this increased savings should improve the state's bond rating. An amendment to the bill stipulates that the money can be appropriated by the General Assem-bly to cover shortfalls in the state's

budget.

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We are much more than a long-term facility. Are you aware of the other services offered by your community hospital's Respiratory Care Department?

There are EEG (electroencephalograph) services for all ages. These tests allow a physicians to detect any abnormalities in the brain waves. These tests are transmitted to Lexington where they are read by a neurologist.

Pulmonary Function testing is also available. This type of test helps determine if lung function is impaired and to what degree. Another use of these tests is to determine eligibility for Black Lung Benefits. You can also see the amount of improvement achieved after using a bronchodilator.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.
