### Pre-Reading Skills

Most people think that children must learn to talk before learning to read. But, lots of kids who have speech problems can learn to read. On the other hand, some children with good speech skills do not progress naturally into reading. Many children have problems in making the connection between oral and written language. There are thinking and language skills that must be mastered before learning to read. If your child is having difficulty with speech and language, the child may need extra help developing these pre-reading skills. Fortunately, there is a lot you can do at home to prepare your child to learn to read.

Reading is a very efficient means of gaining information. From birth, we take in information through our senses—hearing, seeing, touching, tasting, and smelling. We learn to use our senses to gain meaningful information about the world. We learn that gestures, pictures, sounds, and words are used to convey information. We organize and store useful information in memory. We learn to filter out information about the world that we don't need. As we grow, we improve and refine our information-getting skills. These skills are the basis for learning to read. Readers have simply learned how to focus their information-getting skills on letters and words.

Children discover that printed letters and words are important when they see us paying attention to newspapers, magazine, mail, words flashed on the TV screen, recipes, and signs. When you read stories and share picture books with your child, letters, words, and reading become a part of the child's world, too.

You show that reading is important whenever you write letters, grocery lists, or notes to the baby sitter and tell your child what they say. You teach your child the power of making marks with pencils, pens, crayons. Your child's scribbling is an important pre-reading activity.

Talk to your child as much as possible. Talk to others in your child's presence. Give your child every opportunity to learn about the sounds of words and the rhythms of speech.

The child with hearing problems can still learn about speech from looking at moving mouths and noticing how difference words are shaped by the tongue and lips. The child can also learn to read gestures, posture, and body language.

To help your child develop pre-reading skills:

1. Help your child focus attention on pictures, sights, and sounds.
2. Enjoy books together in a warm, comfortable environment. Sit close together and share your thoughts and feelings about the book you are reading.
3. Use books which ask your child to search for hidden objects, such as the animals in the forest or the birds in the leaves.
4. Encourage pointing to the unique features of objects. "What a big truck! Like big, red trucks." Even a non-hearing child can follow your lead.
5. Do problem-solving of all kinds together. Does this part of the train track fit to that? If I turn the puzzle piece does it go in? Can I make the paper go into the envelope if I fold it smaller.
6. Play memory games, either with words or objects. Say, "I took a trip and on my trip I took \_\_\_\_\_?" Each person in turn adds one more item for the others to try to remember. Or, you can ask, "Please bring me all the things we need to set the table." You prepare your child for memory games every time your child watches you cook or do yard work or other household activities. So be sure to do these

activities with your child. Talk about each activity as you are doing it.

7. Ask your child to find information print/graphic material. For example, ask your child to find a doll or a truck in a toy catalog that the child especially likes.

During these activities, your child learns to attach meaning to sounds,

gestures, or sign language. Then the child discovers that symbols, including pictures, can mean things. Finally, the child must connect specific verbal symbols (words) to speech sounds and word meanings. This is a big job and your child may need extra help or practice along the way.

themselves, and share their life ex-  
periences. Many short stories published  
in the Journal have to do with grow-  
ing up in poverty, the responsibility  
of raising a large family, and the pain  
of suffering from illness and death.  
But for every heart-wrenching story  
is a poem about the joy and security  
of a close-knit community, the beauty

of the mountains and celebrations of  
the human spirit. What makes the  
*Appalachian Women's Journal* dif-  
ferent from other literary publica-  
tions is that many authors who sub-  
mit their work for publications are  
doing so for the first time in their  
lives—and, unlike most magazines  
and journals, everyone who submits  
a poem or story will see their work  
in print. Some stories are written by  
teenage girls. Some poems and fam-  
ily histories are written by grand-  
mothers who have only recently  
learned how to read and write.  
For Vickie Anglin, the decision  
to submit a poem about her sister-in-  
law's death was a difficult one. She  
knew about the Journal, and friends  
had been encouraging her to send  
some of her works in to be published.  
Last summer, the LEAP organiza-  
tion hosted a meeting with the Alli-  
ance to discuss violence against  
women, and Vickie was prompted to  
read her poem aloud. The encourage-  
ment she received from that meeting  
caused her to submit the poem for  
publication the next week.

When the Journal issue contain-  
ing Vickie's poem was finally pub-  
lished, friends and family were quick  
to snatch up copies and pass the word  
to others. Shortly afterwards, people  
started coming up to her at work  
saying they had a drawer full of old  
poems they'd written but never  
showed to anyone. "It was obvious to  
me that people were interested in  
getting together and sharing poetry  
and stories. Especially in a place

where there's other women who want  
to do the same," said Vickie. "I've  
been writing songs and poems like  
crazy since the Journal came out."  
LEAP will be hosting a Poetry  
Night for Women on Monday, Au-  
gust 28 at 7 p.m. at the LEAP build-  
ing. The LEAP offices are located on  
Highway 25 just north of Livingston  
at Calloway. All women and girls

## RECC rate decrease approved by commission

Jackson County RECC members will soon see the second decrease of the year in their electric bills. A recent decision by the state Public Service Commission (PSC) will mean a savings of almost \$550,000 to the co-op's members.

The reduction, which took effect the last of July, follows a 6.5 percent rate decrease in January. This means

the average monthly electric bill of Jackson County RECC consumers has decreased by about \$5 since January, representing a total savings of around 7.8 percent.

As the result of both rate decreases, the annual savings for Jackson County RECC will be in excess of \$3.2 million, and the RECC Board of Directors voted to pass the entire amount

on to its members, according to Doug Leary, general manager.

"We are pleased to announce this second rate decrease for 1995," Leary said. "At a time when the utility industry grows, more competitive by the day, we hope this shows our commitment to lower rates along with providing quality service to our members."

Jackson County RECC serves approximately 40,000 members in Clay, Estill, Jackson, Laurel, Lee, Owsley, and Rockcastle Counties.

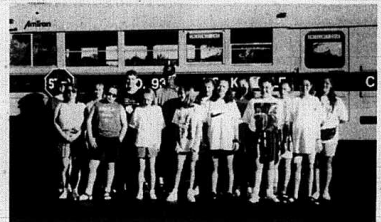

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## FINAL REMINDER OF REQUIREMENTS FOR SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

### Dear Parent(s):

According to State Law (KRS 158.035) "NO CHILD SHALL BE ELIGIBLE TO ENROLL AS A STUDENT IN ANY PUBLIC OR PRIVATE ELEMENTARY OR SECONDARY SCHOOL WITHOUT FIRST PRESENTING A CERTIFICATE THAT THE CHILD HAS BEEN IMMUNIZED AGAINST DIPHTHERIA, TETANUS, POLIOMYELITIS, RUBELLA AND RUBELLA."

**Kindergarten Students** must have had a physical in the last 6 months unless they attended the 4-year-old preschool program. Their physical should be no older than 18 months. A TB skin test is also required. The TB skin test must have been received within the 12 months prior to entering kindergarten. These must be presented upon enrollment.

**Sixth Grade Students** must have a second physical and a second MMR in order to enroll into the sixth grade. The immunization certificate must reflect all the immunizations that the student has received as well as the second MMR. These records are required upon enrollment into the sixth grade. The students should bring these records to school on Monday unless they have already been turned in to the Central Office or Middle School.

**Transfer Students** from out-of-state must present a physical, a TB skin test certificate, and an immunization certificate on Kentucky forms upon enrollment. These should be brought to school with the student on Monday in order to enroll in school regardless of grade level.

**Transfer Students** from within-the-state should bring a copy of their immunization certificate if they have one. If you are able to get copies of your TB skin test and physical, please send all of these records to school with your child.

### Attention Parents of Fifth Graders:

Now is the time to think about getting your child ready for the sixth grade. The school will accept physicals and immunization certificates reflecting a 2nd MMR anytime during the school year. Please don't wait until the summer of 1996 to get your child's health forms for the sixth grade. Plan on getting this work done before Christmas so that you will be sure that your child will have his/her health records up to date.

## Water line expansion project in jeopardy

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofitz told the Rockcastle Fiscal court members Friday that the million dollar water expansion project for the Rockcastle Water Association is in jeopardy of falling through the cracks.

The Judge said that Farmers Home Administration had still not approved the project although Kentucky Governor Breton Jones had committed \$600,000 from the Appalachian Regional Commission for the project.

Carlofitz asked the magistrates to contact Senators Wendell Ford and Mitch McConnell to ask for their support for the project. Carlofitz said that if FHA did not sign onto the project by October 1, it would likely be dead for an extended period of time.

The water line extension would provide water to an additional 300 customers.

In other court business, the court voted to advertise for bids for the hay at the Rockcastle Industrial Park and told county road foreman Jack Cromer to finish mowing the park, once the hay is baled.

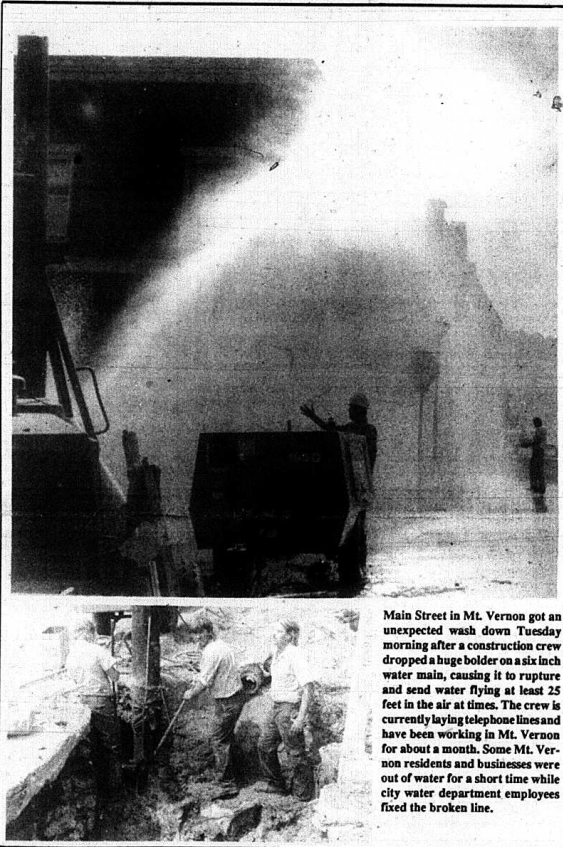

# FEMA to spend \$195,000

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofitz said that sixty-seven county roads would benefit

from the FEMA money, but that the Copper Creek slide would get the lion's share.

The Judge said for a road to qualify for the federal money, at least \$1,000 in damage had to be done by the rain and that in some cases, roads did not meet the criteria and were not eligible although they had some slight

damage. Carlofitz cautioned that money had not been received from the federal government, although it had been promised. The Judge said the \$195,000 can be used only on roads designated by FEMA.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted Friday to amend their budget to include \$194,762 that will come from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to help reconstruct county roads.

Roads that were heavily damaged during spring rains will be the beneficiary of the federal assistance which could come as early as October.

## Beware of blacktop scam

There's a blacktop scam in operation in the county.

The "customer" is approached by men in a black or red pick up who want to sell them blacktop, paid in advance.

Last year, they sold a Fleming County man blacktop for a driveway for \$7,500 but failed to return or deliver.

They're operating, to date, on Copper Creek and at Livingston.

Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith said that the only recourse local residents have is to file suit, but that he wanted to make everyone aware of the problem.



## Powell hired

Mt. Vernon Elementary School principal Lovetta Powell was hired Tuesday as the new Director of Student Services for Rockcastle County, according to Supt. Larry Hammond. Hammond said that Mrs. Powell will remain in her position at Mt. Vernon until the Site Based Council there can find a replacement.

## County gives workers 5% pay increase

Members of the Rockcastle County fiscal court believe that county workers deserve a good health insurance plan, at least, that is what they indicated to employees at Friday's regular monthly meeting of the court.

Presently workers are covered under an AFLAC policy which pays \$200 the first day and \$100 a day to each worker while they are hospitalized. It pays nothing if the employee is not hospitalized and most county workers told court members the insurance is basically useless.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofitz agreed with the workers and suggested that the court stop paying the \$1,000 a month premium they now pay for AFLAC and seek better insurance.

Court members agreed to seek better health insurance but the county will continue to pay the AFLAC premium until better insurance can be found.

County treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that they should also be trying to come up with a way to pay the estimated \$50,000 a year premium it would cost to provide a good single policy. Of course if workers

wanted to add family members they could do so, but it would cost the employee.

Dennis Cromer told the court that he had been hurt on the job and his medical bills totaled \$30,000, out the insurance the county now has only paid \$1,400 of the bill. However county attorney Jeff Burdette told Cromer that workmen's compensation should cover all medical costs in his case and that he should seek an attorney to file suit against them, since they had already denied the claim.

Court members agreed to get other proposals on the health insurance and discuss it at a later meeting.

The court did have some good news for county employees when they voted to give workers a 5% cost-of-living increase.

Carlofitz told the court that \$160,000 had been budgeted for salaries but only \$138,000 was spent. He said the county could afford the 5% increase.

Jail employees were not included in the action, because the jailer has final say over his own budget and while the county is actually in charge of the jail, the jailer would have to decide if his budget would enable his workers to get a raise.

# Ambulance board needing to do repairs on building

The Rockcastle County Ambulance Service Board wants to remodel the building that currently houses the Rockcastle County ambulance service.

The building is owned by the county, but ambulance board chairman David Pensol said that his board is willing to spend the necessary money to fix the property so that two other ambulances can be housed, but the board wants some kind of assurance that the county will not sell the property.

Carlofitz told the court that he had been contacted by Pensol about the needed remodeling at the facility, which is located next to the Rockcastle Hospital.

The county owns the property, but the ambulance board runs the ambulance service for the county.

Carlofitz was quick to point out what an asset the ambulance service is to the county and what a good job the current board does in their operation of the service.

However county attorney Jeff Burdette told the court, it was his understanding that the court could not make any binding long term commitment to the board. "When a new fiscal court comes in, they can pretty much do anything they want to, including cancelling any kind of agreement this fiscal court may make with the ambulance board," Burdette said.

One option discussed by the court was to give the property to the ambulance board, but magistrate Bill McKinney said that he was not in favor of that action.

"I would want to hold on to the property because if the hospital crowds them out, we would need to sell that property and use that money to build another building," McKinney said.

"We need to retain ownership of the property because we never know when the ambulance service is going to go broke and we are stuck with completely funding it," McKinney said.

However, Pensol said Tuesday, that the ambulance service is in excellent shape financially, "probably a lot better than the county," and the board simply wants a guarantee they won't spend thousands of dollars to improve the property and then have to find another place to go.

The court also discussed the possibility of reimbursing the ambulance board for any improvements they make, if the property is sold for some reason, but Burdette said he did not think that was an option either.

"We need to do what we can to protect an asset the ambulance service, they do an excellent job," Carlofitz said.

However the court took no action except to ask Burdette to look into their legal options.

Currently the fiscal court only spends \$23,000 a year to subsidize the ambulance service, which has a budget of almost \$450,000 annually.

## Break-in

A garage belonging to Donald Rice, South Main Street, Livingston, was broken in the night of Aug. 10 and merchandise valued at \$1,723 was taken.

Deputy Sheriff Karen Alcorn, who investigated, said stolen were two radar detectors, a CB radio, a two-way radio, eight rods and reels, a toolbox full of tools, an air conditioner and a welder.

The break-in is still under investigation.

School begins next Monday and for Jim and me, it will be the 28th year we have enrolled children in grade school.

It's a bitersweet time. You are always glad for children to grow and learn but you also realize how old you are getting and how quickly.

Several individuals have had questions this summer regarding canning lids that have buckled during or after processing.

There are several reasons why a lid might buckle: Any one of the following conditions can cause buckling of the lids:

- 1) Tightening the screwbands too tight;
- 2) Filling the jars too full;
- 3) Steam leak from the pressure canner lid;
- 4) Cooling the pressure canner with water or cool air;
- 5) Using a jar with a mouth that is too large for the lid, such as a mayonnaise jar.

Kerr has a new plastic lid gasket with the improved properties of effective sealing with minimal tightening of the screwband, better sealing with oil-based foods, and easier detection of non-sealed lids. Kerr is recommending that lids be tightened with your fingers resting

on the lid instead of the palm of your hand resting on the lid.

To test to see if Kerr's lids are sealed, after the jar is cool, press the center of the lid. IF THE LID DOES NOT MOVE, THEN THE LID IS SEALED. Kerr's tests have shown that IF THE FOOD WAS PROCESSED CORRECTLY AND THE LIDS ARE SEALED, then even if the lids buckle, the lids will remain sealed and the home canned food will not be affected. The grant will be used to landscape a nature trail.

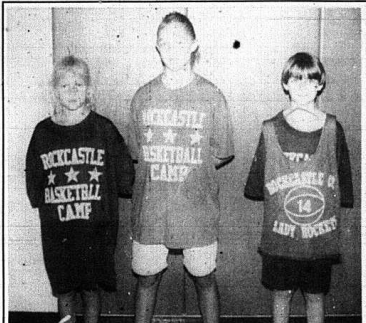
The purpose of MeLife's Community Improvement Youth Grant program is to encourage young people

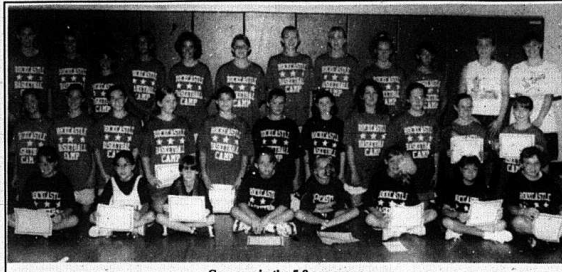

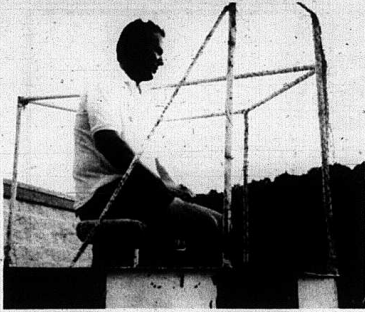
### SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations as adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs, and head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block the aisle in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp objects are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus driver.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times.
  - a. Use of profane/vulgar language
  - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
  - c. Fighting on the bus
  - d. Destruction of bus property
  - e. Defiance of driver's authority
  - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished the parent and the superintendent.

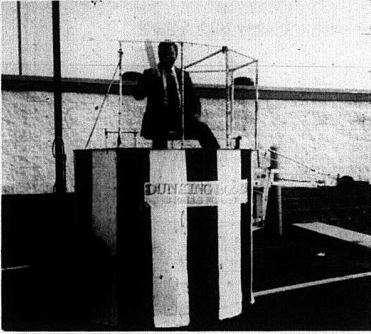

## County Attorney collecting delinquent taxes

During July, 1995, the Rockcastle County Attorney's office received approval from the Revenue Cabinet for its property tax collection for fiscal year 1994-95. Based on the Department of Property Taxation's review, County Attorney Burdette is meeting the requirements of collections established by the Common-

wealth of Kentucky.

Under new policies set by the state, the Revenue Cabinet can collect property taxes if the county attorney does not make satisfactory efforts at collection. Burdette has been approved to collect again for the fiscal

year of 1995-96.

Since taking office in 1994, Burdette has filed forty-four (44) court suits in an effort to collect delinquent property taxes owed Rockcastle County. "Hopefully, we can stabilize collections in the very near future because most of our citizens here are taking responsibility for paying these taxes timely," Burdette said.

In 1995, Burdette's administration has already seen an increase in delinquent tax collections of over 50% compared with the previous year. During the first seven months of 1995, \$34,747.54 in delinquent taxes has been collected.

## Strawberries diagnosed with black root rot disease

Several strawberry specimens with black root disease have been diagnosed in University of Kentucky's Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory in recent weeks.

Black root rot is a general name for several root problems that produce similar symptoms, said John Hartman, Extension plant pathologist with UK's College of Agriculture.

"One problem may act alone or in a combination with other factors," Hartman said. "Hot, dry, stressful growing conditions during much of this summer resulted in above ground symptoms appearing in plants with root rot."

"Affected plants are less vigorous than normal plants and produce fewer runners, he said. Leaves may wilt, discolor or die."

"Entire plants may die when black root rot is severe," Hartman said. "Affected plants should be carefully dug up (not pulled) and root systems examined."

Those roots will show one or more of the following symptoms: smaller root systems; a main root with lesions darker than the rest of the root; no feeder roots; feeder roots with dark lesions; and part or all of the main roots killed.

What causes the disease? Several factors, Hartman said. One factor is a variety of soil fungi, but the problem is exacerbated by nematodes, winter injury, fertilizer burn, drought, wet soil and other factors.

What can growers do about it? Not much, he said. There are no sure fire controls for black root rot. Proper planting and care of the plants

is the best prevention measure.

- \*Use only healthy white-rooted plants when planting.
- \*Plant in well-drained soils.

- \*Fertilize and cultivate adequately.
- \*Irrigate strawberries when needed.
- \*Fumigation may be advised for commercial plantings. It is not recommended for home plantings.

A fact sheet, "Strawberry Production in Kentucky," provides useful information on proper strawberry cultivation and is available at the county extension office.

## Watch for anthracnose in alfalfa fields

Anthracnose, a once important disease in Kentucky alfalfa fields, has been uncommon in this state's alfalfa during the 1990s.

Don't get complacent though. Granted, the levels are low, but weather conditions in many areas during the past six to eight weeks—sustained warm to hot weather with humid air masses—are favorable for anthracnose activity, said Paul Vincelli, Extension plant pathologist for the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

How does a farmer know if he has a problem?

"In alfalfa fields with little or no resistance to anthracnose, shoots will wilt and turn a pearly white," he said. "Stems will have straw-colored lesions with a brown border. Stems sometimes droop near the tip before dying leaving a characteristic shepherd's crook appearance."

The disease can be very destructive in susceptible varieties, he said.

"However, varieties developed within the last five to 10 years nearly always have acceptable levels of resistance," he said. "That's why the fungus isn't present in as low levels in most Kentucky fields."

Still, farmers planning to renovate or plant new alfalfa fields should plan on planting one of those resistant varieties.

"We recommend planting varieties with at least an HR rating (moderate resistance) to anthracnose," he said. "I would prefer a higher level of either R (resistant) or HR (highly resistant)."

## New map shows oil and gas wells in Kentucky

A new map showing more than 108,000 oil and gas wells in Kentucky is now available from the Kentucky Geological Survey at the University of Kentucky.

The multicolor map shows generalized oil and gas production trends and represents information currently available at the Kentucky Geological Survey about hydrocarbon resources.

Well-location data on the map includes: well completed since Jan. 1, 1981; well locations for which permits have been obtained since Jan. 1, 1984; deep wells and other wells and locations.

Periodic updates of the map will reflect new well completions and the growth of the computer data base.

Dear Editor,  
On August 26th women's equality groups across the nation will celebrate the 75th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution granting women the right to vote after a 72-year crusade for the ballot beginning in 1848. While this is an important historic occasion, it must be remembered that the suffragists recognized that winning the vote in 1920 was only the first step to first-class citizenship for women.

Led by the young suffragist Alice Paul, the National Woman's Party, therefore, in 1923 went on to introduce the proposed federal Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). This Amendment states: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." After forty-nine years of Congressional

inaction and blockage by the same type of politicians who had opposed the ballot for women, the ERA finally passed Congress by an overwhelming vote on March 22, 1972. However, due to a politically-imposed seven-year ratification deadline attached to the Preamble, but not in the text of the Amendment, the ERA fell short three states of the 38 required for constitutional amendments despite the extension of the deadline to June 30, 1982.

Attempts to ratify the ERA are currently underway in the States of Illinois, Virginia, and Mississippi. Since the United States is the only modern industrial country that does not have the principle of legal equality for men and women in its primary national document, the 75th anniversary of Women's Suffrage is an appropriate time to call on Congress to void that unconstitutional ratification deadline that has for too long interfered with the will of the people, who according to a recent Lou Harris poll, support the ERA by 86%.
