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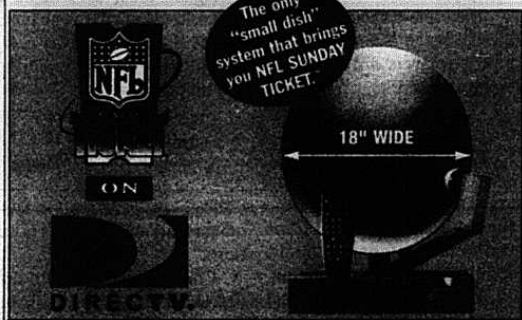

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Rock opens '95 campaign Saturday

Anticipation may be the word used to describe August in Rockcastle County. It's a time when everyone counts down the days to that first kick-off of a new season for the Rockcastle County Rockets football team.

This year, excitement fills the air - possibly more so than in the past - due to the scheduling of five new opponents. And if you've done your math, five makes up half the schedule.

The new opponents are: Estill County, Prestonsburg, Whitesburg, Pike County Central and Garrard County.

Rockets' head coach Tom Larkey simply categorizes it as a lot tougher.

"We are trading weaker teams for stronger ones," Larkey said.

Of the five, Estill County will prove to be the most important since it is a district game. Estill was placed in the district after Middlesboro dropped down to 1A at the end of last season. The report is that Estill is more of a power type team, more so than Middlesboro. Larkey also stated that in this

particular year, Estill is probably the stronger team in comparison to Middlesboro.

Prestonsburg will prove to be a worthy opponent just by looking at their past accomplishments. For one, they were the state runners-up two years ago. Secondly, they have been the only state team to defeat powerhouse Danville within the past four years. Danville's other loss came to Pennsylvania's state champions.

Whitesburg brings 25 seniors into this season and are expected to be a tough task in their own right. They faced the same dilemma as the Rockets, going against Danville and losing in last year's semi-finals.

Pike County Central and Garrard County round out the new opposition by fielding two solid teams with noteworthy programs. Noteworthy enough to be reviewed by a national high school football magazine this year.

Of course, the remaining district rivals are no pushover either. Of the opposition, Corbin and Somerset are expected to

be the most competitive according to Larkey.

"I think it could be a toss-up between Corbin and Somerset, but I would have to lean toward Corbin," said Larkey.

"On any given night I think we could beat any team or they could beat us. They are all going to be good enough to beat us," he added.

Larkey emphasized that in order to contend with this schedule, they are going to have to keep everyone healthy throughout the season.

That will entail keeping up a 58 member squad made up of 13 seniors.

As of now the Rockets have only nagging injuries and should be in good shape at season's start.

Their strong points will be depth in the backfield and more speed that they've had in a while. And that's not to mention one of the best offensive and defensive lines the Rockets have had in a long time. In fact, Larkey compares this year's line to the squad of 1991. Of course that was the year the Rockets played so close to Danville.

"I think our line can play with anybody," says Larkey.

Offensively the Rockets will set up with Jason Brock at center and Adam Browning sharing that duty. Steve Owens, Eddie Todd and Browning will fill in the guard slots while Slade Calhoun, Jason Weaver and Todd again taking duties in the

tackle positions.

The same names will be on the defensive line as most all position players will be playing both-ways this year. The starting line should be Weaver, Owens, Todd and Calhoun.

The supporting cast on the defensive side will be linebackers David Coffey, Dallas Rigsby, Neil Sparks and Chris Bullock. Defensive backs should be Jarrod Singleton, Jason Brown, Jason Childress and Ronnie Vanzant.

Tasked with advancing the ball for Larkey's offense will be Jamie Linville at quarterback. Bullock, Childress and John Hammond will be the ends. Backs look like Rigsby, Brown, Sparks, Singleton, and Jon Cromer.

Again, most all will have duel roles, but at the same time, Larkey also feels that a few players will have to step in during key plays.

This will have to happen in order for the Rockets to work on overall weak point, team depth.

"We are still working on others working into some positions," Larkey said.

Chris Bishop, Malcolm Shepherd, Dusty McClure, Jimmy Kidwell, Brian Scalf and Ronnie Vanzant are a few names mentioned in the transition.

In a nutshell, what to expect this year is excitement with the new schedule. And of course, the Rockets putting the ball in the air. As Larkey put it, "We are going to see if we can pass."

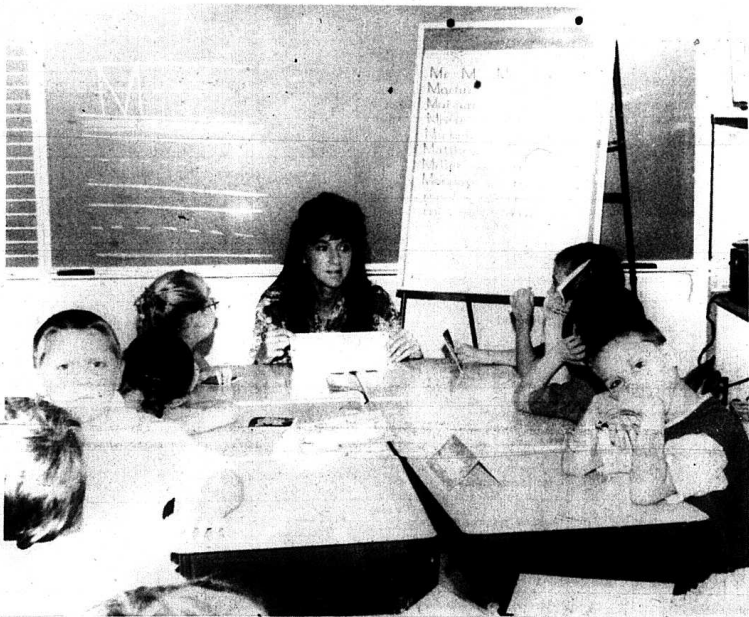

Local woman in critical condition after train hits car

A Mt. Vernon woman is listed in critical condition at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington after a car she was driving was hit by a train near Hummel Friday morning.

According to police, Amanda Bradley Isaacs, 21, of Shirley Street, Mt. Vernon and Wendell F. Lovell also of Mt. Vernon were riding in a 1978 Pontiac that collided with a CSX train near the Langford Tunnel around 10:45 a.m. Friday.

Police said that Mrs. Isaacs was driving the car that skidded six feet before hitting the train which was traveling north on the track.

Isaacs and Lovell were traveling on Cove Branch road, which crosses the track very close to the tunnel. The Pontiac traveled 85 feet over an embankment flipping several times before coming to rest on its top in Roundstone Creek, according to police, who said that both Isaacs and Lovell were ejected from the vehicle

after the impact. According to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Randall Reynolds, Lovell said that he nor Isaacs saw the train exit the tunnel until a second or two before the impact. Lovell was treated at Rockcastle County Hospital and released. According to officials Mrs. Isaacs is suffering from a brain stem bleed.

Three injured after single vehicle wreck

Three young Mt. Vernon residents were injured in a single car wreck on Monday when their car left the Hummel Road and went over an embankment.

Driver of the auto, Carrie Martin, 16, was flown to U.K. Hospital in Lexington. Teresa Robinson, also 16, was treated and released from Rockcastle Hospital. Curtis King, 20, was taken to the U.K. Medical Center by ambulance.

The accident happened when Miss Martin lost control of the 1995 GEO Tracker she was driving, according to Randall Reynolds, deputy sheriff who investigated the accident. The accident occurred about two miles down Hummel Road near Maret Cemetery Road.

Martin and Robinson are juniors at Rockcastle County High School where they attended classes earlier in the day.

Hitchhiker found shot to death at Livingston

A Washington state man was apparently shot to death after he accepted a ride last Thursday from a Manchester man.

David Longknife of Vancouver, Washington, died of gunshot wounds to the chest and abdomen, according to Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane. Lane said that Longknife apparently accepted a ride from Billy Don Begley, 33, near London Thursday and that the two proceeded up U.S. 25 into Rockcastle County.

Lane said that a witness saw Longknife's body being thrown from Begley's car near the former Trolley Inn south of Livingston. The detective said the witness reported the incident to Livingston police officer Danny Keeney who discovered the body along the side of the road.

Begley, who was picked up by state police in Hazard, was charged with murder. He is being held in the Rockcastle County Jail under a \$250,000 cash bond.

Mayor asks for water conservation

The mayor also said if voluntary cut-backs do not work, he will be forced to enact restrictions.

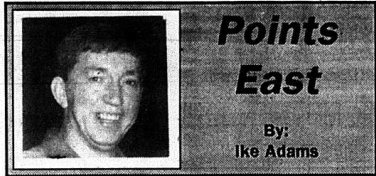
Sexual abuse, exploitation trial to begin

Junior and Mike took one look at

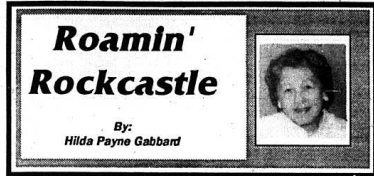
me as I slunk back into cover, soaking wet with sweat, and one of the other of them allowed that "going fishing might not be the smartest thing in the world to do right now."

- Donnie Stephens has one on the 21st of August, Genevieve's birthday was last Sunday and Kim's birthday came on the 22nd.

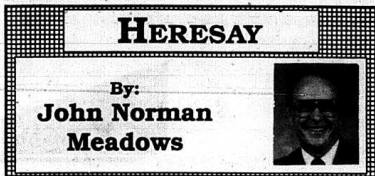
Paige Anderkin Benge is preparing to take up a new career. Maybe that's rather than the newspaper work she has been doing. Lots of good wishes, Paige.

Nutrition assistants Brenda Saylor and Judy Hudson of the Rockcastle County Extension Office collaborated with Migrant Even Start Program on the Migrant Even Start Van, and presented a nutrition unit to Migrant families including knowledge of the food guide pyramid and how food affects our bodies and lives. The emphasis was on low fat health diet and disease that can be caused by improper diet.

Computer diagnostic reports were run for each family member to help identify preventive measures of disease caused by improper diet. The

unit presented supermarket skills—shopping, and how to compare food prices—comparing brands and quantity of products, meal planning, correct servings, and how to plan a week's menu wisely according to newspaper sales and coupons.

Educational materials were handed out, cookbooks, refrigerator magnets, and menu guides. A low fat nutrition snack was demonstrated and enjoyed by all.

Health and nutrition education is just one of the many free services provided to Rockcastle County migrant families by the Migrant Even

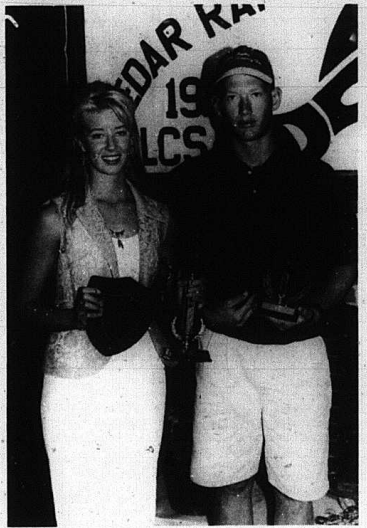

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



Every minute of our instructional day is important. If you pick up your child, please endeavor to wait until 3:15 p.m.

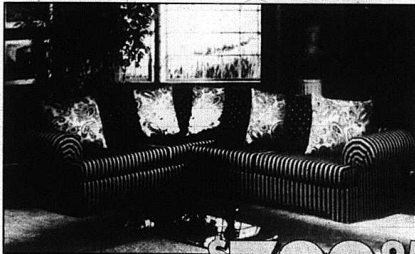

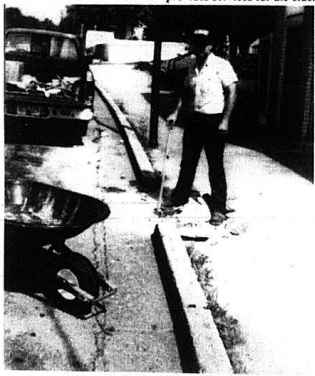
City of Livingston working with seniors

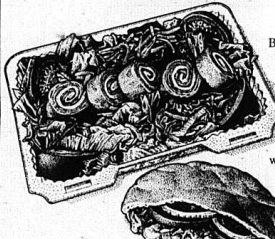

PROTECTING THE WORK OF GENERATIONS

Winston Churchill once said that "To build may be the slow and laborious task of years. To destroy can be the act of a single day."

Kentucky's farmers certainly understand what Churchill meant. Most of the farms they work have been in their families for years, the product of generations of hard work and sacrifice. Yet, the act of a single day can place all that tradition and hard work in jeopardy.

The President's announcement on FDA regulation of tobacco is very disappointing. After weeks of attempting to arrive at a solution with the White House, offering proposal after proposal, my farmers lost out to the zealots. I tried to negotiate for weeks, agreeing to most of their efforts on youth smoking, and with ways to put teeth into those efforts.

No one was attempting to block the President's position of reducing underage smoking. We were offering a fair and enforceable way to get there. But, the FDA's Mr. Kessler wanted a scalp on his belt, and the White House was determined to give it to him. Even Representative Ron Wyden of Oregon, a strong anti-tobacco advocate, asked the President to basically agree with our offer.

The Administration has chosen litigation over compromise, delay over action. The President has chosen a press conference instead of a negotiating conference. He has chosen a process that reaches his goal later rather than sooner.

I am not only disappointed, I am hurt. My first thought was to be vindictive -- to use every means I have available to me, and there are several, to get back at the White House. But I have decided not to take that course. I will, however, try to seek out people of reason to help work through this problem.

I have never been one who thought it wise to appoint a person to your Administration from another, especially if he or she was of a different party. Mr. Kessler is a carryover from the Bush Administration and he is certainly not doing this Administration any favors.

The FDA is so far behind now in making important decisions, and with the attempt to acquire additional work, I believe the people of this country will be ill-served to a much greater degree by this decision.

The President has said he wants to work to pass legislation that would accomplish his goals. I will introduce such a bill when we return in September -- one that comprehensively addresses the issue of youth smoking, but does not jeopardize the future of Kentucky farmers.

Because I don't want to see the work of generations, brought down in a day.



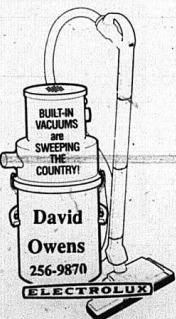

Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon set for Brodhead on Sept. 9th

The 12th annual Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon will be held Saturday, September 9 at 12:30 to 4:00 at the Brodhead Elementary School. Rain date will be September 16.

Once again we are asking everyone to join in and help with the fight against Cystic Fibrosis. By contributing to CF you are investing in the lives of those with the disease.

The symptoms of CF are diverse, vary in severity and are often confused with pneumonia, asthma or other respiratory problems. CF causes a thick, sticky mucus leads to chronic lung infections and lung damage, and also interfere with digestion.

Scientists, supported by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, have done so much to help CF patients, however we can't quit now, we need much more.

The following is a speech made last year by a child, with Cystic Fibrosis, in the first grade, age 11.

Cystic Fibrosis

For eleven years now I have had CF, that stands for Cystic Fibrosis. I was born with Cystic Fibrosis. I have to do breathing and percussion treatments every day at home, so I would like to tell you about it.

Cystic Fibrosis is a disease that is a little hard to deal with. For 39 years now scientists have been working very hard to find the cure for Cystic Fibrosis and they have, but now they have to find out to use it in CF patients.

As I said before Cystic Fibrosis is a disease that is a little hard to deal with and also Cystic Fibrosis causes a thick, sticky mucus to clog the lungs. The abnormal mucus leads to infection and lung damage and also interferes with digestion and breathing.

The Sweet test diagnoses Cystic Fibrosis by measuring the amount of salt in the sweat. An abnormal high level of salt indicates that he or she has Cystic Fibrosis.

Cystic Fibrosis is not like a cold. I cough a lot, but you cannot catch it from anyone anyway. I go to the Doctor on Thursday every one or two months. Every October I have to get a flu shot, it is supposed to help me

not catch a cold. Not only CF patients take this shot but anyone can.

I have to take four pills after each meal I eat and two with a snack to help my food digest. They are enzymes called Ulase M+20. They have come up with a drink called Scanda Shake. It is supposed to help me gain weight, so far it is working a little.

I'm lucky I don't have CF as bad as other CF patients do. I can catch cold easily. Every time I get a cold I usually get in the hospital, but sometimes I get better and don't have to. I have been in the hospital 11 times for two weeks each time. I have fun in the hospital. I play Super Nintendo and sometimes the nurses take me out to eat or to see a movie. The nurses always try to make it fun for you in the hospital, especially on the holidays. They put up a big Christmas tree and let you put the ornament up, and they give presents out. I've never been in the hospital during the holidays, but that is what I have heard. The bad part is needless! One time two weeks after I left the hospital, Billy Ray Cyrus came to see every CF patient at UK Hospital.

Hard work of many people has brought hope for ending this disease, scientists say they can't stop now.

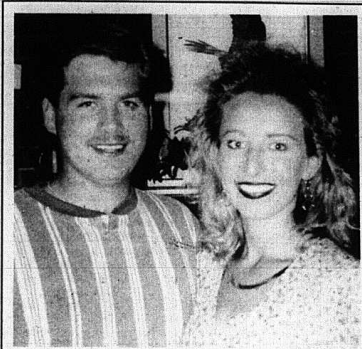
I hope soon scientists find out how to use the cure in CF patients so I and everyone else can get rid of this disease called Cystic Fibrosis.

Every year in September we have a Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon to help raise money to find a cure for all CF patients.

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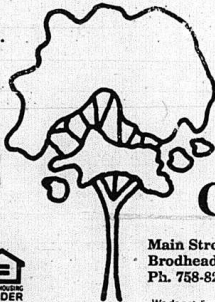
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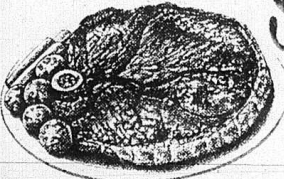
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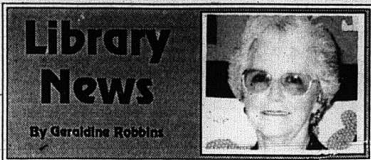
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Library News

Chocolate Milk - A Nourishing Beverage

Chocolate milk has more protein than cows as a potential source of children's daily calcium intake.

Children ages 2-10 years need the equivalent of three 8-ounce servings of milk per day. From ages 11-24 years, 4 servings daily are recommended. An 8-ounce glass of 2% milk contains about 300 milligrams of calcium.

Calcium is especially critical for children and others up to age 24 years old because they are developing strong, mineral-dense bones.

Many children refuse to drink milk unless it's chocolate, which is just as nutritious as unflavored milk.

Since many chocolate milks are made with 2% milk, they contain less fat than whole milk, but are higher in fat than skim milk. Chocolate milk does contain sugar, caffeine and a caffeine-like substance not found in unflavored milk.

It generally contains two to four teaspoons of sugar which equate to 30-65 extra calories. However, this isn't a concern for most children because their activity rates

are high enough to burn the few extra calories. And research studies have proven that sugar does not increase hyperactivity in children.

Chocolate milk contains caffeine at about the same level as found in decaffeinated coffee. It also contains theobromine, a compound similar to caffeine. However, theobromine is in levels that have no physiological effects. Oxalic acid, which can bind with calcium to keep the body from utilizing this mineral, is the final substance found in chocolate milk. However, the absorption of calcium from chocolate milk is similar to absorption from unflavored milk.

Children need calcium.

Chocolate milk is a good source of calcium.

Children who won't drink unflavored milk often will drink chocolate milk.

The bottom line is that it's better for children to drink chocolate milk than no milk at all.

Reopened Wounds

Sometimes we may think the wounds of heartache are over and look backward to the time they were inflicted with somewhat of a soothing feeling of comfort as we gently rub our fingers of memory over the scars left by them. Then suddenly, something happens that opens these wounds and the memories flood over us in waves of emotion that almost devastate us.

Last Saturday this happened to me. My daughter, Judy and husband, Geoff Kennedy, had spent the week with me and it had been a wonderful time for this doesn't happen too often, us having a whole week together. For visited places I hadn't been to for years and some of the places we went I had never visited. One of these days was to Richmond where we had breakfast at Shoney's then hit the back roads to places like Danville, Lancaster, Harrodsburg and Bard-

stown. These are historic places where many of our ancestors settled when Kentucky was an infant. We visited old cemeteries and several places claiming the birthplace or the homeplace of Abraham Lincoln. We drove past "My Old Kentucky Home" that Stephen Foster made famous. In the heart of Bardstown, we found an old-fashioned drug store that had an ice cream counter where one could order his choice of anything from a cone of delicious ice cream to an elaborate banana split, then sit beside the window and watch the moderately busy townspeople go about their daily chores. This was a beautiful experience for I had all but forgotten how nice it was to sit at a counter slowly eating a banana split or drawing big draughts of a creamy chocolate malted milk through a straw, while watching people darting in and out of stores.

Another day was spent prowling around the malls in Lexington then

holding onto everything that seemed solid enough to hold my weight, as I passed by a chair or table. These catchy bad problems do that to us old folks.

The days and evenings at home were just as pleasant, for it was then we got to visit with Polly and Chuck, Ish and Pauline and Vera and play a few games. One day was spent going over some paperwork that sorely needed attention. You folks who have your children around you all the time have missed the joy of having one come home for a whole week.

But, all good things have to have an ending so Saturday came and, once again, I watched the car being packed and had to say my goodbyes with a lump in my throat big enough to choke me. It was this parting that brought back the hurting memories of another time I said goodbye to Judy and her family.

This was the day after Mat was buried and they had to get back home

to get the kids in school. For some strange reason, I felt Mat's presence more strongly last Saturday than I have felt it since that sad day when I was left alone for the first time in my life. And, once again, I could almost feel his arm around me and hear him say, "Sure will be quiet around here for a while. I hope they have a safe trip home. What say we go out to Reece and Lula's for a while?" He didn't like the emptiness and quietness of a house that had so recently been filled with chattering kids and women any better than I did. Several times Saturday, I found myself looking over my shoulder as if I was expecting him to be there. Even though Ish and Pauline had stopped by and spent the evening with me, playing dominoes, I still felt his presence. These memories are the scars of old wounds that one expects to be healed in twelve years but I sometimes wonder if they are ever completely healed.

I never received a purple heart for my wounds in the battle of life and marriage but my reward has been

even greater. I received the honor of being called mother by three wonderful children and grandmother by four

The Caring Connection An Early Childhood Information Team

As a parent, you are the most important person in shaping your child's life and personality. You develop and manage the home, which is a complete world where your child grows and learns. You provide a quiet place for sleeping, food and social contact. You give love and learning experiences. You are a role model.

The home can be part of the therapy for your child. It's vital that you plan the best environment possible; you child needs sameness, newness, comfort and structure. Everything is important -- places, things and the language and emotions which surround children and activities.

Feeding, dressing, bathing and sleeping are all part of the physical environment. It means physical comfort. It includes warmth, fresh air and sunshine. Space to play is important -- when children are contented and secure, they are ready to learn and grow.

The social environment includes contact with parents and friends. Children imitate those around them. They learn language as they hear it spoken around them. Being with others teaches them how to ask for what they want (Cookie?) and how to take turns. They create order in their world by giving names to the things around them ("See doggie."). They tell themselves what to do ("Play mama." "Make car go.")

The emotional environment provides safety and comfort. It sets the stage for trust and growth. Secure children are loved and happy. They can move out into the world and learn. They know they can come back to a familiar place when the world becomes too much to handle.

A safe environment is also important; it's easy to miss the many dangers in the home until children start to explore.

Who would think that a crawling child could pull up, fall in, and drown in a toilet?

Wall sockets are charged with deadly electric shock. Are outlets covered with protective plugs?
Unguarded stairs invite a tumble. Do yours?

Many cleaning supplies are dangerous. Do you store yours under the sink or up, high, out of reach?
Children need to be free to explore and learn to function in their expanding world. You can protect your child from obvious dangers and oversee your child's play. It's better to "baby proof" the house than to confine your child to a playpen.

A good environment provides a place where primary needs are met. Food, comfort, sleep, love -- children need all of these to grow strong and healthy.

Social contact is provided. When you talk to your child, you teach the child how to get along with others. Your child's responses -- laughing, talking back and even noiseless sounds -- encourage your own efforts to communicate.

Environmental interaction -- seeing, feeling, touching and exploring fun things that are suited to age levels -- promote learning. Planning is an important part of a good home environment. Keeping to a regular schedule is very helpful. Your child will expect bedtime and will fuss less if it always comes after supper. Feeding makes children sleepy, anyway, so
