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

Rock opens '95 campaign Saturday

Anticipation may be the word used to describe August in Rockcastle County. It's a time when everyone counts down the days to that first kick-off of a new season for the Rockcastle County Rockets football team.

This year, excitment fills the air - possiblly more so than in the past - due to the scheduling of five new oppenents. And if you've done your math, five makes up half the schedule.

The new oppenents are: Estill County, Prestonsburg, Whitesburg, Pike County Central and Garrard County.

Rockets' head coach Tom Larkey simply catagorizes it as a lot tougher.

We are trading weaker teams for stronger ones." Larkey

Of the five, Estill County will prove to be the most important since it is a disrict game. Estill was placed in the district after Middlesboro dropped down to 1A at the end of last season. The report is that Estill is more of a power type team, more so than Middlesboro. Larkey also stated that in this

particular year, Estill is probably the stronger team in comparison to Middlesboro.

Prestonsburg will prove to be a worthy opponent just by looking at their past accomplishments. For one, they were the state runners-up two years ago. Secondly, they have been the only state team to defeat powerhouse Danville within the past four years. Danville's other loss came to Pennsylvania's state champions.

Whitesburg brings 25 seniors into this season and are expected to be a tough task in their own right. They faced the same dilemna as the Rockets. going against Danville and losing in last year's semi-finals.

Pike County Central and Garrard County round out the new opposition by fielding two solid teams with noteworthy programs. Noteworthy enough to be reviewed by a national high school football magazine this year.

Of course, the remaining district rivals are no pushover either. Of the opposition, Corbin and Somerset are expected to

be the most competitive according to Larkey.

"I think it could be a toss-up. between Corbin and Somerset. but I would have to lean toward Corbin." said Larkey.

"On any given night I lthink we could beat any team or they could beat us. They are all going to be good enough to beat us." he added.

Larkey emphasized that inorder to contend with this schedule, they are going to have to keep everyone healthy throughout the season.

That will entail keeping up a 58 member squad made up of 13 seniors

As of now the Rockets have only nagging injuries and should be in good shape at season's

Their strong points will be depth in the backfield and more speed that they've had in a while And that's not to mention one of the best offensive and defensive lines the Rockets have had in a long time. In fact, Larkey compares this year's line to the squad of 1991. Of course that was the year the Rockets played so close to Danville.

ter and Adam Browning shar-ing that duty. Steve Owens, Eddie Todd and Browning will fill in the guard slots while Slade Calhoun, Jason Weaver and Todd again taking duties in the tackle positions.

The same names will be on the defensive line as most all position players will be playing both-ways this year. The starting line should be Weaver. Owens, Todd and Calhoun.

The supporting cast on the defensive side will be linebackers David Coffey, Dallas Rigsby, Neil Sparks and Chris Bullock. Defensive backs should be Jarrod Singleton, Jason Brown, Jason Childress and Ronnie Vanzant.

Tasked with advancing the ball for Larkey's offense will be Jamie Linville at quarterback. Bullock, Childress and John Hammond will be the ends. Backs look like Rigsby, Brown, Sparks, Singleton, and Jon

Again, most all will have duel roles, but at the same time, Larkey also feels that a few players will have to step in during key plays.

This will have to happen in order for the Rockets to work on overall weak point, team

"We are still working on others working into some positions." Larkey said.

Chris Bishop, Malcolm Shepherd, Dusty McClure, Jimmy Kidwell, Brian Scalf and Ronnie Vanzant are a few names mentioned in the transition.

In a nutshell, what to expect this year is excitement with the new schedule. And of course, the Rockets putting the ball in the air. As Larkey put it, "We are going to see if we can pass."





Winston Churchill once said that "To build may have to be the slow and laborious task of years. To destroy can be the act of a single

slow and laborious task of years. To destroy can be the act of a single day."

Kentucky's farmers certainly understand what Churchill meant. Most of the farms they work have been in their families for years, the product of generations of hadd work and sacrifice, Yet, the act of a single day can place all that tradition and hard work in jeopardy.

The President's announcement on FDA regulation of tobacco is very disappointing. After weeks of attempting to arrive at a solution with the White House, offering proposal after proposal, my farmers lost out to the zealots. I tried to negotiate for weeks, agreeing to most of their efforts on youth smoking, and with ways to put teeth into those efforts.

No one was attempting to block the President's position of reducing underage smoking. We were offering a fair and enforceable way to get there. But, the FDA's Mr. Kessler wanted a scalp on his beliand the White House was determined to give it to him. Even Representative Ron Wyden of Oregon, a strong anti-tobacco advocate, asked the President to basically agree with our offer.

The Administration has chosen litigation over compromise, delay over action. The President has chosen a press conference instead of a negotiating conference. He has chosen a press conference instead of a negotiating conference.

negotiating conference. He has chosen a process that reaches his goal later rather than sooner.

I am not only disappointed, I am hurt. My first thought was to be vindictive — sue every means I have available to me, and there are several, to get back at the White House. But I have decided not to take that course. I will, however, it to to seek out people of reason to help work through this problem.

I have never been one who thought it wise to appoint a person to your Administration from another, especially if he or she was of a different party. Mr. Kessler is a carryover from the Bush Administration and he is certainly not doing this Administration and ylavers.

The FDA is so far behind now in making important decisions, and with the attempt to acquire additional work. I believe the people of this country will be ill-served to a much greater degree by this decision.

The President has said he wants to work to pass legislation that would accomplish his goals. I will introduce such a bill when we return in September -- one that comprehensively addresses the issue of youth smoking, but does not jeopardize the future of Kentucky

farmers.

Since many chocolate milks are made with 2% milk, they contain less fat than whole milk, but are higher in fat than skim milk. Chocolate milk does contain sugar, caffeine and a caffeine-like substance not found in unflavored milk

milk.

It generally contains two to four teaspoons of sugar which equate to 30-65 extra calories. However, this isn't a concern for most children because their activity rates

are high enough to burn the few extra calories. And research studies have proven that sugar does not increase hyperactivity in children.

Chocolate milk contains saffeine at about the same level as found in contains theobromine, a compound similar to caffeine. However, theobromine is in levels that have no physiological effects. Oxalic acid, which can bind with calcium to keep the body from utilizing this mineral, is the final substance found in chocolate milk. However, the absorption of calcium fron chocolate milk is similar to absorption from unlaword milk. Children need calcium.
