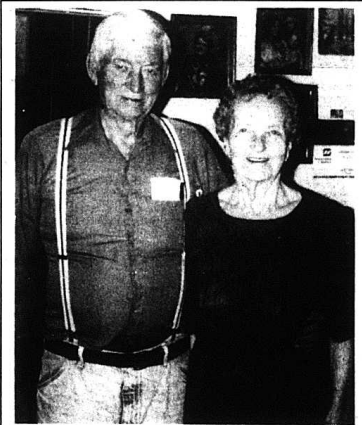

The flowergirl was Jordan Shouse, niece of the bridegroom, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Todd Shouse, Hopkinsville.

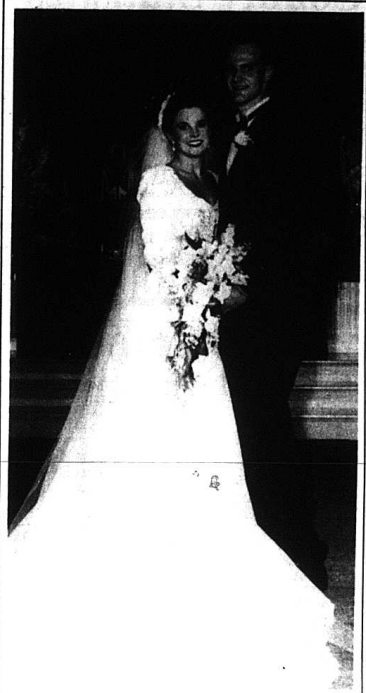

Charles pleads guilty to twenty counts of sex abuse

A Brodhead man has pled guilty to charges that he used minor girls in sexual performances.

Allen Charles, 36, of Brodhead pled guilty on Friday to twenty counts of Use of Minor in a sexual performance, one count of sexual abuse, first degree and twenty-one counts of being a persistent felony offender in the second degree.

Charles was arrested in April of last year after police discovered numerous videotapes depicting minor girls between the ages of seven and eleven engaging in sexual performances. "One performance depicted Charles fondling the genitalia of a

nine-year-old girl," said assistant Commonwealth Attorney David Tapp, who prosecuted the case.

Tapp said that his office would recommend that Charles be sentenced to 22 years in prison on each of the sexual performance charges and the maximum of ten years on the sexual abuse charge.

Charles' co-defendant and girlfriend at the time, Charlotte McClure, 31, also of Brodhead pled guilty to similar charges in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week.

The Commonwealth is recommending a fifteen year sentence for McClure.

McClure and Charles were accused last year of sexually exploiting at least seven minor girls, including McClure's own daughter over a three year period, from 1991 to 1994.

McClure and Charles were arrested after one of the girls' parents found out what was taking place and notified County Attorney Jeff Burdette's office.

Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael said that parents of each child had been involved in decisions made by his office and that the Department of Social Services was also very cooperative.

The persistent felony offender

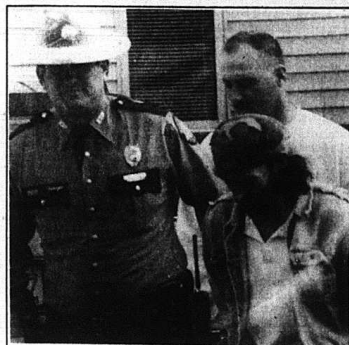
charges against Charles stem from a 1988 homicide in which Charles shot another local man to death in Livingston.

Charles and McClure will both be sentenced on September 22, following a pre-sentencing investigation.

Charles remains in the Rockcastle County jail. McClure is free on bond.

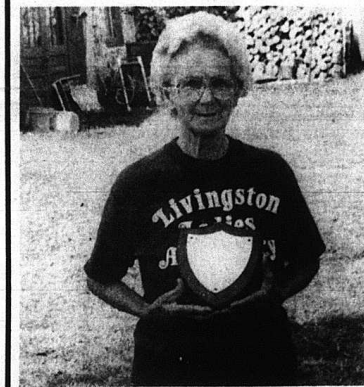

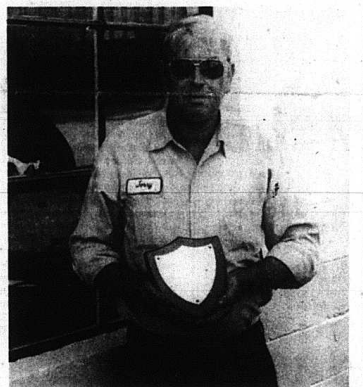

Water line expansion dead for '95, may be funded in '96

Prompted by telephone calls and questions on the status of additional water lines in Rockcastle County, County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolis discussed it with the Signal Tuesday.

Carlolis reported that Sen. Wendell Ford said recently, to the question of additional Appalachian Regional Commission funding, that it is "unlikely in the current fiscal year."

"I have been assured though," the

senator continued, "the project stands a very good chance of being given the go-ahead early in '96."

"In addition," the senator said, "ARC officials have assured me that, barring unforeseen problems, the agency remains committed to the extension and will hold the project's funds in reserve until final word comes from Farmers Home."

The statement by the county judge concerning water is as follows:

Q. What do you know about the expansion of water lines in Rockcastle County and can you give us an update of the Rockcastle Water Project?

A. First, let me say that I am very interested in waterline expansion. Without expansion of lines, the county cannot prosper and grow. As you

know, the Rockcastle County Water Association applied for a grant from the governor's office this past year in the amount of \$300,000. After making numerous trips to Frankfort, and after visiting with Governor Jones, along with several of our citizens, I received word that Gov. Jones was going to double the amount of grant money to help ensure that Rockcastle County's project could be funded. I would like to add, also, that our project received the largest amount of grant money ever pledged by a governor for a water project in Kentucky (\$600,000).

Q. Has any of the governor's \$600,000 been used by Rockcastle?

A. No. Federal regulations require that Farmer's Home Administration

funds be attached to the governor's pledge of ARC (Appalachian Regional Commission) funding before the project can begin.

Q. What has been the hold-up of the project?

A. When the governor made the large pledge of money for our county's project, he fully anticipated federal money from Farmer's Home being available by early August. The federal money simply wasn't available because every state had used their allocations, leaving nothing in a reserve 'pool' amounting for this project.

Q. Is anything complicating the project as of this point?

A. Yes. In addition to Farmer's Home not having funds available right now, Gov. Jones' commitment of the \$600,000 pledge runs out on Sept. 30. Complicating matters further, Farmer's Home has told me they expect to have funding available for the project before December 1. They can only make such funds available, however, if the governor's pledge is intact on October 1. I am desperately trying to get Gov. Jones to renew his pledge on October 1.

Q. Are there any reasons why Gov. Jones would be hesitant to renew his pledge of ARC funding for the project?

A. Yes. Several, in fact. Perhaps

The deputy said a fight started and Miss Lovell got out of the vehicle with a .22 pistol and fired a shot, hitting Allen in the arm. The shot went through Allen's arm and struck Rader in the groin area.

They were taken to Rockcastle Hospital for treatment.

There were no charges filed, pending further investigation.

If a thunderstorm blows in at 4 a.m. or anytime between midnight and dawn or booms loud enough for me to hear it, I'll get out of bed. I'll slip on my sneakers and head for the backyard. Sometimes, all I have on is my skivvies and my sneakers because I don't figure anybody is watching my backyard at that hour of the morning so why get dressed for nothing? The Caring Connection

An Early Childhood Information Team

Play is how children learn about themselves and the world. It's how they learn to move and what they can do with their bodies. They learn the world of colors and numbers and the names of objects. Many school skills are learned through play.

The only limits to a child's play are the child's imagination and the "tools" in the child's environment. You can give your child the tools by providing the right experiences at the right time. To help you know when your child is ready to learn a new skill, here's an outline of the sequence in which skills develop.

At first, your baby looks and listens. Brightly colored mobiles hanging across the crib are good now. Your baby pays attention to voices and later will turn the head to find the source of a sound.

In a few months, your baby becomes more active and begins to roll from stomach to back. At about 4 months, fingers close around objects -- now your baby can hold toys.

Your baby will learn to sit independently as motor skills develop. By 6 or 7 months of age, hands will no longer be needed for support and your baby will reach for and hold objects more easily. As control increases in the small muscles of the hands and arms, your baby will begin to hold and explore toys, turning them over and poking at them. As this fine motor control increases in the hands and fingers, your toddler will want to take toys apart or try to put them in containers.

The 1-year-old is more active. Your child pulls up to a standing position, walks around furniture and finally takes steps with your help. Independence increases as control of the big muscles -- gross motor skills -- continues to develop.

The 2-year-old enjoys being able to eat and dress independently -- more or less. Fine motor coordination improves. The child likes to take off and replace container lids, makes

identifiable strokes with crayons, puts together simple puzzles, and stacks blocks. As gross motor coordination improves, the child is more willing to try new activities such as steps and slides.

The 2 1/2 to 3-year-old can stay with an activity for longer periods of time. The child colors more accurately and uses blocks and other building toys with more skill. The child can place shapes accurately in a shapes board. Toilet training is usually complete now. Independence in self-care increases.

The 3-year-old enjoys playground equipment and any kind of outdoor activity. Play becomes more imaginative -- dolls have tea parties and an old wagon becomes a fire truck. Drawings begin to represent objects and are easier to recognize.

As attention span increases, the child is more interested in books: Your child will like to read about everyday activities or experiences such as transportation, animals and the alphabet. Children at this age also enjoy music and moving and dancing to music.

There are many ways you can encourage your child to listen and look carefully. Cover a flashlight with different colors of tissue paper and move it from side to side or up and down. Your baby can focus on the light and watch as it moves. Place toys which make noise (such as wind chimes or a ball with a bell in it) in the crib or hang them over it. Also, try playing a tape recording of a familiar voice near the crib.

Encourage early movements by placing your baby on a quilt on the floor. Slowly and carefully, lift the edge of the quilt so the baby rolls from stomach to back. To encourage grasping, give the child easy-to-hold toys. Make sure that toys which are likely to go into the mouth are safe, with no small parts to come loose or be bitten off.

The child who does not sit up independently still needs help -- support the child in a sitting position in a corner of a sofa or in the corner of the room. That will keep the child's hands free for play. Use a low stool or box as a table.

Give your child household objects to use as learning toys. The 1 to 2-year-old enjoys bowls and pans and boxes for emptying, filling and stacking. Measuring cups help teach how things fit together and give a beginning concept of size.

Let 2 1/2 to 3-year-olds help you match socks or clothing when you fold laundry -- that's good practice for matching colors and counting everyday items. Imagination games (such as dress-up with mommy's and daddy's old clothing and shoes) are fun now.

Books and magazines are popular with most 1 to 3-year-olds. Make sure your child has a variety of toys, objects and environments in which to play. Your child will play the games you provide and create new ones.

You can have a big impact on what your child learns through playing. By understanding the sequence of play development, you can modify activities for your child's special needs. Choosing the right activity at the right time makes play more meaningful and fun for your child -- and you.

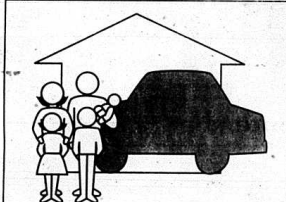

CRP sign-up Sept. 11-22

Warden Alexander, Acting CED for the Rockcastle County Consolidated Farm Services Agency (CFSA), formerly ASCS, announces that between Sept. 11 and 22, eligible persons will be able to submit bids for the 13th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign-up. This sign-up is

being held to replace acreage that was released under the early release provisions announced in May 1995. The maximum amount of acreage to be accepted is approximately 651,000 acres.

Under the new bidding procedure, producers have the option to request

a CRP contract effective beginning with either the 1996 or 1997 crop year. Annual rental payments for approved CRP contracts will be made to eligible farm owners or operators who convert eligible cropland to permanent cover. The County CFSA Office will calculate and inform the applicant of the bid cap for the acreage the applicant wishes to enter into

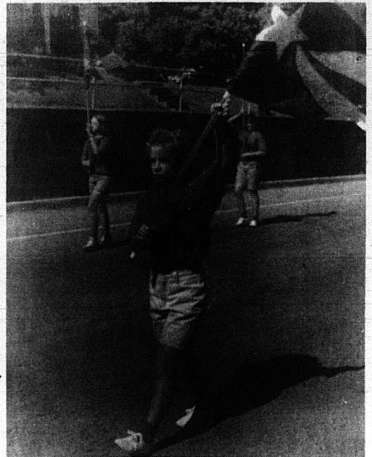

PUBLIC HEARING

In accordance with the provisions of HB 44 enacted by the 1979 Kentucky General Assembly, a public hearing has been set by the Rockcastle County Public Library District Board of Trustee for Sept. 21, 1995 at 5 p.m. at the Rockcastle County Public Library. The purpose of the hearing is to inform the public that the Rockcastle County Public Library District is proposing the .0166 cent tax rate with anticipated revenue of \$30,220.14. This tax rate reflects a 4% increase in anticipated revenue. The tax rate for the preceding year was .015 cents with revenues of \$26,669.49. The compensating tax rate is .016 cents with anticipated revenue of \$29,127.84. The expected revenue from new property is \$783.40. Increase for the 1995/96 budget year is needed due to the rising costs of books and library materials, equipment and building maintenance.

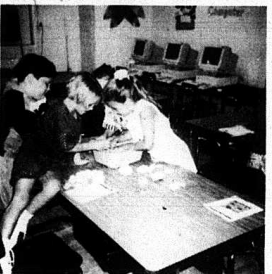

CRP before the applicant submits a bid. In addition to the rental payment, cost-share up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing a permanent cover on the new CRP acres may be available.

New with this CRP sign up are Environmental Priority bids. The Environmental Priority bids will include practices such as Grass Waterways and Filter Strips/Riparian Buffer. Acreage established to Filter Strips/Riparian Buffer will receive a 10 percent incentive bonus because of the environmental benefits. The implementation of these practices may be of particular interest to Kentucky farmers as they will assist in complying with the State Water Quality Plan for their farm which goes into effect in July 1996 as required by Senate Bill 241.

Serving Size. The serving size information gives the amount of food to which all the other numbers on the Nutrition Facts panel apply. Now serving sizes are more uniform among similar products and are designed to reflect the amounts people actually eat. Also, serving sizes must be about the same for the same types of products.

Having more uniform serving sizes makes it easier to compare the nutritional values of related foods.

Read Any Great Labels Lately?

Label Benefits. Under the Nutrition Labeling and Education Act of 1990 and regulations from the Food and Drug Administration and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, virtually all food labels must now give information about a food's nutritional content.

That wasn't always the case. Until 1994, nutrition information was voluntary. Manufacturers had to provide it only when nutrition claims appeared on the label. Nearly 40% of products didn't carry nutrition information.

Health Claims. Health claims described a relationship between a nutrient or food and a disease or health-related condition. FDA has authorized eight such claims; they are the only ones that can be used in a label. The claims may show a link between: ** calcium and a lower risk of osteoporosis; ** fat and a greater risk of cancer; ** saturated fat and cholesterol and a greater risk of coronary heart disease; ** fiber-containing grain products, fruits and vegetables and a reduced risk of cancer; ** fruits, vegetables and grain products that contain fiber and a reduced risk of coronary heart disease; ** sodium and a greater risk of high blood pressure; ** fruits and vegetables and a reduced risk of cancer; and ** folic acid and a decreased risk of neural tube defect-affected pregnancy.

Nutrient and health claims can be used only under certain

circumstances, such as when the food contains appropriate levels of the stated nutrients.

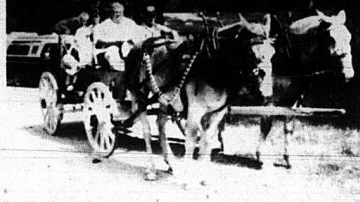

a major reason is that, if the governor does renew the pledge after October 1st, he will be committing the incoming governor's money (\$600,000 of ARC funding) to Rockcastle County (remembering that Gov. Jones leaves office in December).

Q. Do you see any reason why the governor would want to reinstate his pledge to Rockcastle?

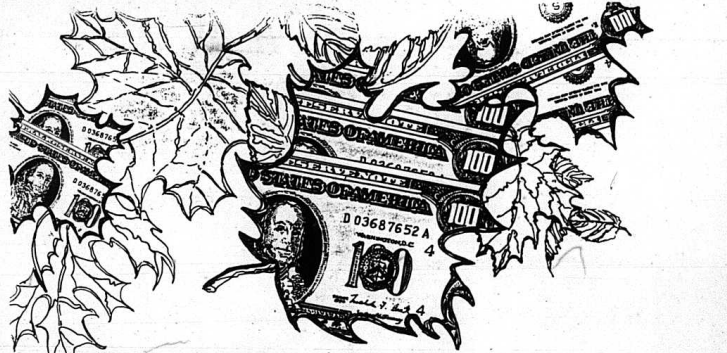
A. Yes. A most compelling argument for the governor to reinstate his pledge is that our state will lose that portion of the ARC funding (\$600,000) if the project falters. I think what is most important is making sure that Farmer's Home assures the governor that they will, in fact, provide additional money for the project.

Q. Are you optimistic that something can be done?

A. Yes, but it won't be easy. We have to remember that we are here to provide services and we will do everything possible to accomplish these tasks. I have also contacted the Southern Madison and Woods Creek Water Districts (in Laurel County) to see if they can begin providing water to our county's associations and districts. We need to diversify our supply of water to make certain that ample supplies will be on hand for future growth.

Q. Do you feel that everything possible is now being done to help the project?

A. Absolutely everything. I don't believe that we have left a stone unturned. We are now waiting to hear from the officials involved.

Rules for Rockcastle County 4-H Poster Contest

The Rockcastle County 4-H Council is once again holding its Annual Poster Contest. Posters are due October 13th, 1995 and the First Place winner will receive a Trophy. Rules for the Contest are as follows:

1. Each poster must be created by a currently enrolled 4-H'er.
2. Well-known cartoon figures cannot be used because they are copyrighted. (For example: Peanuts, Orphan Annie, Charlie Brown, etc)
3. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, 0.016 ply construction poster board (solid fiber board) of 14 in. x 22 in. dimensions (1/2 a standard poster board size). They may be horizontal or vertical. Posters may be produced by any medium... watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, or collage, so long as they are not three dimensional.
4. 4-H is to be the topic for the poster. You can show what you think 4-H is, what you do in 4-H, or what you think 4-H does for young people.
5. Themes similar to those used on the National 4-H Week posters "4-H: Freedom To Be", "4-H: Room To Grow", "4-H '76 Spirit of Tomorrow", "4-H: We Can Make It Happen", "4-H Gets It All Together", etc., should not be used.

6. The 4-H'er's name, age, FULL address, county, area, teacher, school grade, and a brief artwork interpretive statement must be affixed to the back of the poster board in the upper left-hand corner. Call me at 256-2403 if you have any questions on the Poster Contest.
