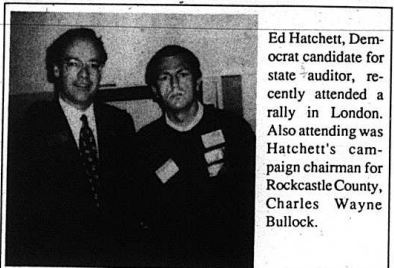

Judge-Executive tells fiscal court

Tool making company may locate in county

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis told the Rockcastle fiscal court last Thursday that a tool making plant was looking at the Rockcastle County Industrial Park II as a possible site for a new plant.

Carlotis said that B & H Tools of Richmond had expressed a sincere interest in locating in Rockcastle County and that at least 35 new jobs would be created with the initial opening of the plant.

"It looks very good," the Judge-Executive said Tuesday, "they have the financing and the know how and evidently some very good contracts," he continued.

B & H Tools in Richmond currently employs over 100 people at their plant in Madison County and Carlotis said that he had been informed that once their Rockcastle operation was in full swing they would employ over 100 people in Rockcastle as well.

The new plant would be called Rockcastle Coating and Assembly and at least one project of theirs would be to build parts for a BMW plant in South Carolina.

Ironically bids for site preparation for the new Rockcastle Industrial Park, which is more commonly known as the Henderson Bottoms, which is located near the current Rockcastle Industrial Park, were opened and accepted at Thursday's

The Sheriff's Department also continues to seek information from anyone who might have seen a white van with a red door driven by a white male, in his mid 30s, weighing 150 to 160 pounds with mid-length dark hair, on the night of Sept. 30 or morning of Oct. 1.

The van and suspect are believed to be involved in the murder of Robbie Lee Miller of Mt. Vernon.

Miller's decomposed body was discovered Oct. 7 in a remote section of south Laurel County off the State Ridge Church Road.

"I have reason to believe that someone saw that van," said sheriff's Detective Lonnie Owens, Thursday afternoon.

Owens confirmed that the suspect and the van description fits Rankins. He said Rankins is a possible suspect.

Owens said the department has had several calls about a similar Chevrolet van seen recently in the area.

He said it is very important that anyone with information report it to the Laurel County Sheriff's Department at 878-7000 or Kentucky State Police at 878-6622.

Two arrested after man robbed on way home

Two men are still in jail under \$25,000 cash bond following their arrest on several charges, Wednesday October 18th.

It all began with Troy Bowles of Orlando and his truck.

Frank Bond and Doug Vanwinkle asked Bowles for a ride to Berea to get a gun on lay-away at Walmart, police reported.

On the way back, Bond and Vanwinkle allegedly pulled a gun on Bowles on Buffalo Hollow Road. They ordered Bowles to take off his shoes and tied him up with the shoestrings, took his pants and money,

and left Bowles on the side of the road, Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas wrote in his report.

Vanwinkle was charged with unlawful imprisonment in first degree and robbery in first degree.

Bond was charged with assault in

fourth degree, terroristic threatening, unlawful imprisonment in first degree and robbery in first degree. As of Tuesday they remained in jail under \$25,000 cash bond.

The truck was recovered by Deputy Sheriff Nathaniel Price on Flat Gap Road.

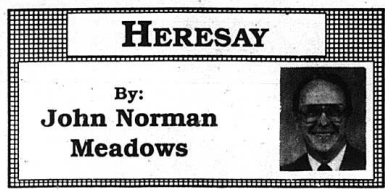
But enough of the pretenders. They get enough press as it already. But please note that they are, again, forecasting a bad winter.

Committee well knew everything would be downhill after that, but they opted for getting off to a good start.)

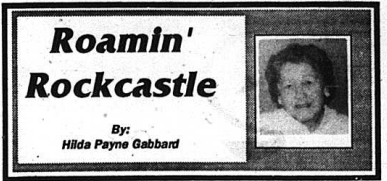

hear it (except as he moved from one side of the pulpit to the other.) And there was Craig Holman, and Eugene Bradley, and Elby Frost, and Elmer Elliott, who could always be counted on for a tirade against "the evils of Catholicism." And, of course, my own pastors, Wendell Belew, and "Mr. Sermoner" himself, Raymond Lawrence.

"Annual meetings" were held in early August back then rather than in October, when farmers could spare a little time before the harvest began. They came from all over the county and were rewarded at non-time with a plentiful "dinner on the grounds," spread before them by the host church.

Nowadays the eating is just as good (with less fat), except for the fact that back then we usually ate outdoors, like the Almighty intended when he ordained the first associational meeting at First Baptist Church in Jerusalem and called for a "dinner-on-the-grounds."

But, dear hearts, Rockcastle Association didn't have a "fly" problem in those days. We had sweet old Sallie Samples, the absolute best at running flies and their buzz-

ing cousins away from a dinner table who ever lived. As best I remember, adjacent associations always scheduled their meetings when Sallie was available. Even took up a "love offering" for her. Old-timers fondly recall Sallie "Shoo-fly!" Samples. And so it should be. Not everyone is so gifted.

I remember the "roll call" of the faithful who had "gone on to glory." The church pianist played some slightly tear-rendering favorite like "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" or "Precious Memories" while the speaker intoned the name of the churches and each "soldier of the cross" who departed this life. To be honest, it was quite touching, especially when the list included someone who had been dear to me.

That fall, two-day affair always closed with the singing of *God Be With 'em 'Til We Meet Again*, a most poignant melody that looks to the day when we will "meet at Jesus' feet."

Were those days as I remember? Was anything back then as I saw it? How often, since moving back "home," have I learned, to my great shame, such was not so and with someone, after thirty-some years of thinking such.

What were those people really like? How I wish I could go back and be an unseen bystander (knowing what I know now) during some of those days. Then, having seen, I might be disappointed - or happily surprised!

Thirty-six years ago today my father died. Because he was an old man, I was his son, I never knew him from an adult perspective. But as I age, I realize how much I am his son.

How well I remember his comment when I told him I'd "surrendered to preach." All he ever said about that

was, "Son, don't you think you could find something better to do?"

He had a marvelous baritone voice, cussed a lot, and drank too much, and behind his gruffness covered a wounded spirit. He got off to a bad start as a young man, real bad, and never got over it.

And I, captivated early in life by a fundamentalist mindset from both sides of my family (but subconsciously angered by it), "learned" not to appreciate him. He was "a sinner," you see, and after all, what does "a sinner" know about anything?

I don't think so of him anymore. He was just another man on a journey into more than one man's share of valleys.

Excuse me, precious souls, if this is too mushy - and open. October brings out the melancholy in me. Next week I'll resume my "mere foolishness."

as they return home. To prevent stomach-aches and arguments, discuss beforehand how much can be eaten Halloween night. Hold firmly to this amount. Distribute the remaining treats throughout the following days and weeks, perhaps as surprises in school lunches or for an afternoon snack. You and your child can decide how to allocate the Halloween treats. While this might sound hard to children, they will be delighted when they have treats left and their friends' Halloween bags are empty!

If you opt for traditional candies, offset those low in sugar or sugar-free.

Party favors are an alternative to food treats. Many children enjoy stickers or plastic spiders. On the practical side, pens, pencils, erasers, small festive note pads or coins are good choices.

Whatever treats you choose, consider the number needed, cost, healthy alternatives, and child safety.

Once your little goblins return home, do some things to ensure that their treats don't turn out to be tricks. First, check for safety. All edible treats should be factory wrapped and the wrapping should be intact. Throw any treat away that is unwrapped, or if the wrapper shows any signs of tampering.

To help children accept the possibility of throwing away treats, discuss the idea with them ahead of time. Explain the potential dangers of eating unwrapped treats or those which might have been contaminated.

Rockets slip by Madison Southern 28-27

The Rockcastle County Rockets are on the verge of winning their third district title in five years, thanks to a fourth quarter comeback Friday night against Madison Southern.

The Rockets slipped by the War Eagles 28-27 after falling behind 27-6.

It was without a doubt the Rockets were performance in a half of football in the past five seasons since they joined their new 2A district.

Head assistant coach Tony Saylor attributed the lackluster performance to "senioritis." "It is hard to get older players motivated every week, they are much less emotional than underclassmen and sometimes they overlook a team they know they are much better than," he said. "On the other hand, I think this team showed a lot of heart in the way they came back to win this very important game," he said.

Much of the Rockets success Friday night was due to the excellent play of defensive back and wide receiver Jason Childress. Not only did Childress score a crucial third down touchdown on an eighty yard pass from quarterback Jamie Linville, he picked off two Madison Southern passes, one that set up an eventual touchdown and one that certainly

should have.

Madison Southern, a team that has showed a lot of improvement since former Berea and Madison Central coach Mike Elkins took over the program, gained 121 yards on the Rock through the air. Southern also threw touchdown passes in the first half, of 30 and 35, although Rockcastle defenders were close enough that the ball down on both plays.

The lackluster play in the defensive backfield cost defensive back Ronnie Vanzant playing time in the second half, after he allowed two Madison Southern backs to catch balls for touchdowns.

The Rockets, now 8 and 1 scored their first touchdown of the game on a 60 yard run by junior Jon Cromer in the second quarter after they had fallen behind 21-0. Cromer's touchdown run was also setup by an excellent kick off return by Cromer as well.

It looked as if the Rockets might get back in the contest before halftime when Jason Childress picked off a Madison Southern pass deep in Southern's territory. The Rockets could not however get it in the end zone failing to score from the four yard line when

quarterback Jamie Linville took the ball around right end.

Not only did the Rockets find themselves behind 21-6 at the half, Southern increased their lead to 27-6 in the third period when they scored on their first possession.

But, while most Rockcastle fans set amazed at what was happening, some even left the game, the Rockets began their comeback.

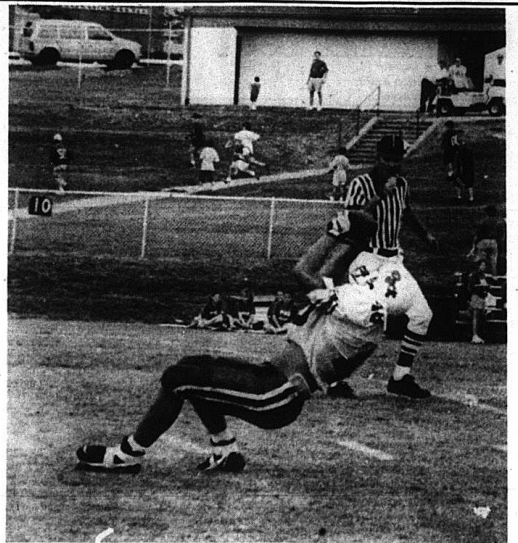

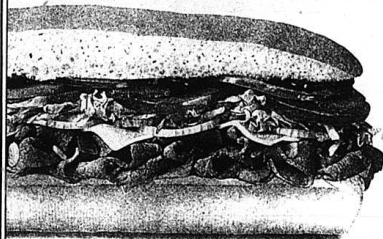

School to Work

\$250,000 grant awarded to counties

A \$250,000 grant was awarded by the Kentucky Workforce Partnership Council to seven central Kentucky counties involved in a School-to-Work initiative. The grant, slated for use in Estill, Garrard, Jackson, Lincoln, Madison, Powell and Rockcastle counties, will support a collaborative effort of elementary, middle, secondary and post-secondary schools and colleges, as well as the business and labor community to provide career-based experience for students at all levels.

Dr. Glen Kleine, Dean of the College of Applied Arts and Technology at Eastern Kentucky University and chair of the Labor Market 16 Local Partnership Council (LM16 LPC) receiving the grant said, "This will be a marvelous opportunity to provide work-related experiences for students in our seven-county area."

He noted that each county has three voting members on the local partnership council and they will jointly determine how funding will be handled.

Kleine added that Larry Hammond, superintendent of Rockcastle County schools, appointed Diane Waddle as the Rockcastle County Coordinator. "As such," Kleine said, "Waddle will spearhead the effort in Rockcastle County."

"Jenny DeBoard Sweet, a native of Rockcastle County and a certified teacher, has been hired full-time to coordinate the School-to-Work initiative in Labor Market 16. She can be reached at the STW office at 606-256-1111," Kleine added.

Rockcastle County is already underway in developing a First Stop Career Center at the Rockcastle County High School. The Rockcastle County Schools also have a variety of other school-based, work-based and connecting activities.

Make nominations for County FSA committee

Farmers and other eligible voters are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 30 for the county Farm Service Agency (FAS), formerly ASCS. The FSA committee was previously known as the ASC county committee.

The FSA county committee election will be conducted from November 24 to December 4 by mail ballot. FSA, an agency of the US Department of Agriculture, administers farm commodity, crop insurance, and conservation programs for farmers and makes farm ownership and operating loans.

Rockcastle County farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve their farm community on the FSA county committee. Farmers may request and receive nominating petition forms from the county office.

Farmers are reminded that to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve, if elected, and must be signed by at least three eligible voters in the local administrative area. Also, the petition must be received in the FSA office by the October 30 deadline.

A list of the names of all known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming elections will be available in the county office on October 5 for public viewing. Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in the election: any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper or who is eligible to participate in any FSA program.
