A huge turnout from Estill County spilled from the small designated seating on the home side to adjoining dirt bank and to the running track which circled the field. As the visitors migrated to these vantage points, the game announcer began admonishing visitors to vacate the track area. Even the Rent-a-Cops were at odds over this. One would state that they only meant the grassy expanse between the track and sideline while another would say the entire track

area was off limits. With confusion reigning and no other place to go (no seating on visitors side), the visitors did what anyone in doubt would do, NOTHING! The security force then spent the rest of the game harassing children and lecturing adults merely for being loud, supportive fans. Even the game officials were subject to the hysteria for stopping the last few seconds of a game already determined to dole out authority and penalties when it was sensible to allow the clock to expire and allow this fiasco to end. 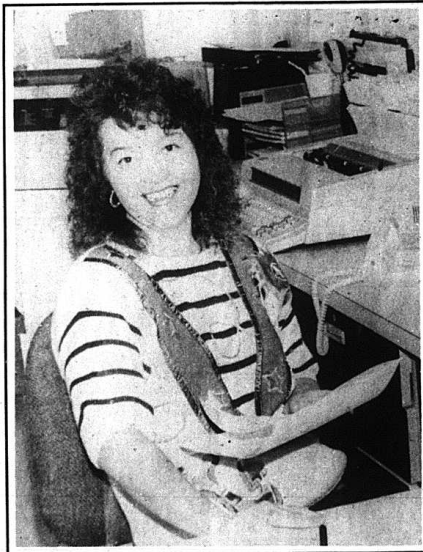

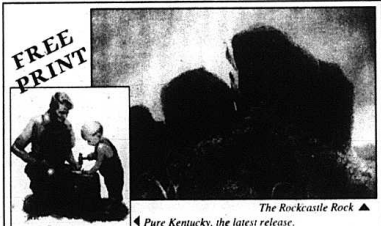

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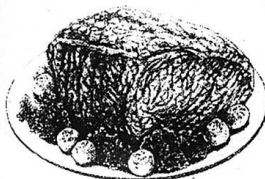
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Play excellent Friday to beat Estill County, 18-10

Rockets roll to district title

Congratulations Rockcastle County Rockets.

For the third time in five seasons the Rockets are district champs, thanks to a 18-10 win over highly touted Estill County Friday night.

Possibly the largest crowd ever to witness Rockcastle County football game, saw the Rockets turn in their best performance of the season.

Head coach Tom Larkey gave Estill a look at the shotgun offense, something the Rockets have not done all season long and it seemed to keep Estill County off balance throughout the night.

Estill was actually a bigger team than Rockcastle and the shotgun formation helped keep the Engineers from stacking up the middle of the defensive line.

The Rockets also did something they have done very little all season, they put together a first quarter drive on their first possession that ate up over nine minutes of clock and resulted in a 28 yard field goal by Raymond Blackburn.

After the Rockets took the 3-0 lead, the Engineers took the ball on a long drive of their own, resulting in a 22 yard touchdown by back Jimmy Farthing, which gave Estill a 7-3 lead.

However the Rockets took the lead back before halftime after mounting another good drive that culminated with a one yard touchdown run by quarterback Jamie Linville. Blackburn added the extra point to give the Rockets a 10-7 halftime lead.

The Engineers tied the ballgame again in the third quarter when place kicker Ander Neace kicked a 24 yard field goal midway through the

quarter. The Rockets were happy to allow the field goal after the Engineers had intercepted a Rocket pass on the 21 yard line. The Engineers got the ball to the eight yard line before the Rocket defense stuffed the Engineers. The Engineers threw a deflected pass to the back of the end inside the ten, but both times he made good plays to knock down the passes.

Rocket head assistant Tony Saylor said that Friday night's defensive effort was the best put forth by the Rockets since they lost to Whitesburg earlier in the season. Saylor said that several Rockets played extremely well on defense especially senior Neil Sparks who had seven tackles and assists on the night. Saylor also had praise for first year player, senior Adam Browning who had two sacks on the night. Jarrod Singleton also played well with five tackles, considering he separated his shoulder in last week's game with Madison South-cm.

The Rockets and the Engineers waged a defensive battle for most of the rest of the second half before the Rockets would take the lead for good on an eight yard touchdown run by tailback Dallas Rigby.

A penalty on the Engineers put the ball on the one and half yard line and head coach Tom Larkey opted to go for the two point conversion.

Back Jon Cromer, who turns in another good performance for the Rockets with 129 yards on 26 carries got the two point conversion to give the Rockets an 18 to 10 lead with about five minutes to play.

The Rockets kept the Engineers out of the end zone to preserve the win, but not before some hoopla in

the final minute.
The crowd at Friday's game was so large that several fans were actually forced to stand on the track around the field to watch the game. Many Estill fans stood around their team on the opposite side of the field and apparently with 52 seconds left in the game, one of those fans made some derogatory comments that prompted the head official to throw a flag. However the Rockets were the team

penalized because the home team is responsible for crowd control. Many fans thought that Estill head coach Hoover Neace was upset with the official and that the penalty was on Estill. However Neace knew his team was best because Rockcastle had the ball and Estill did not have enough time-outs left to keep the Rockets from running out the clock, so Neace picked the flag up and put the official to put it back in his pocket.

Steve Owens had three tackles and a fumble recovery and David Coffey had two tackles and a fumble recovery. Senior Eddie Todd who took over the center duties so Linville could run behind him when he scored the first Rocket touchdown had three tackles and Dallas Rigby played well with four tackles. Vanzant had five tackles, Jason Chisherd, four tackles, Malcolm Shepherd, three tackles, J.B. King and

Jason Weaver each added a tackle. The Engineers ran away from Weaver's side of the line most of the night.

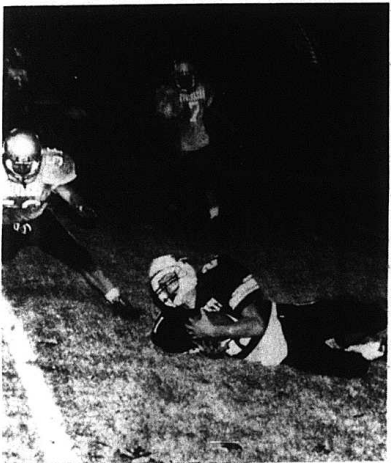
The Rockets were led on offense by Cromers 129 yards and Linville's 98 yards of passing. The senior quarterback completed nine passes mostly from the shotgun formation. "I was very proud of the way our offensive

What Saith the Scriptures

Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane said Tuesday that while he certainly has suspects in the case,

it will be several weeks before all the evidence has been analyzed and arrests made.

"I believe we are dealing with juveniles in this case and I must be positive before I make an arrest," he said.

Stephanic Kuhar, 17, of New

Hudson, Michigan was traveling with her family through Rockcastle County when someone threw a gravemarker footstone off the Sand Hill bridge near the 54 mile marker of I-75. Miss Kuhar was riding in the seat behind the two front seats when she was struck in the chest area by the foot-

stone which crashed through the windshield of her family's Chevrolet van. She died at the University of Kentucky Hospital two hours later.

A fund for the Kuhar family has been set up by local funeral director Roy Martin and several students across the county as well as local

officials wrote letters of condolences to the family.

Martin said that to date \$2,500 has been collected in the county for the Kuhar family. Lane said November 12th will be the deadline to donate to the fund, which will then be turned over to the family.

The bid was by Black Diamond, Inc., of Somerset and totaled \$195,746. The total may be less when all bids are checked.

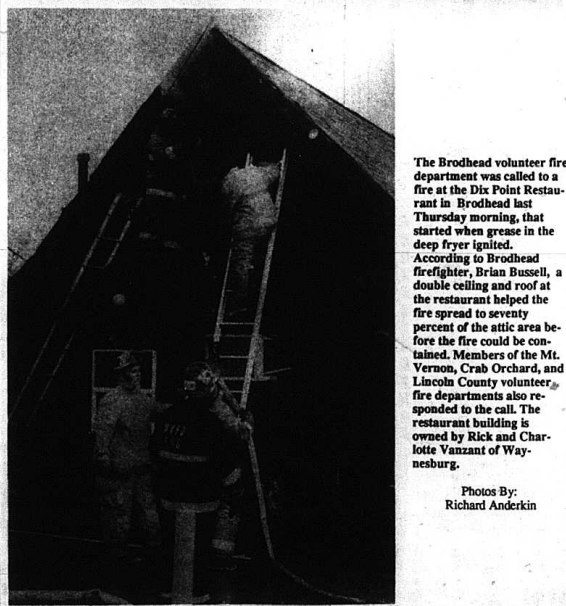
The water distribution system bid went to Kartish Construction of Mt. Vernon for \$117,024.

Juveniles arrested in Brodhead for theft, vandalism

Six Brodhead area juveniles were arrested Friday in connection with two recent burglaries in Brodhead last month.

The juveniles, all males from Brodhead, ranged in age from 10 to 16, according to Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane.

Lane said all the juveniles are males and all were charged with the burglary at the home of Millard Robbins on October 6. Lane said that Robbins was in the hospital when his residence was broken into. Coins and jewelry were taken in the robbery. The juveniles were also charged with criminal mischief regarding the spray-

ing of paint at the residence. Lane said the six juveniles were also charged with the burglary of Mr. and Mrs. Lawson Witt's residence in Brodhead in October.

At the Witt home the juveniles sprayed paint on the house that resembled the shape of the Nazi emblem, according to Lane, who said that each boy was released into the custody of their parents pending juvenile court action.

Brodhead police officer Joe Bussell and members of the Rockcastle Sheriff's department assisted in the investigation.

Holt indicted for escape; Mosgrove, Barnett kidnapping

Eleven people were indicted by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury when they convened for their October session on the 13th.

Kevin Holt, 23, of Orlando was indicted for escaping from the Rockcastle County Jail on September 26.

According to court records Holt had been arrested and was being processed at the jail, when he overpowered a deputy jailer who had opened the jail door to allow someone to enter. Holt was recaptured that night. He is being held without bond until his arraignment November 10.

John L. Lamb, 42, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon was indicted for possessing a handgun by a convicted felon. The indictment stemmed from a July 1 incident in which he was arrested in Livingston for shooting out his car window. He was charged with several other crimes at the time of his arrest, but only one indictment was returned against Lamb.

Lamb is free on bond until his November 10th arraignment.

Gary L. Day, 29, of Brodhead was indicted for complicity to commit arson. Day is accused of helping to set fire to the home of Eddie Sturgill while it was occupied on August 26.

Day is being held in the Rockcastle County Jail under a \$25,000 cash or property bond. His arraignment will be November 10. Another

indictment is expected in this case.

Ricky Mosgrove, 38, of Corbin and Brian Patrick Northern, 25, of Mt. Vernon were indicted for kidnapping Brian Withers on July 12.

When Mt. Vernon police officers stopped the two and Mosgrove's wife in Mt. Vernon for a traffic violation, they heard screams coming from the trunk of the car, where Withers had apparently been placed by Northern and Mosgrove.

Mosgrove, who is free on a \$50,000 property bond, was also indicted for being a persistent felony offender for a 1990 conviction in Perry County for assault.

Northern is being held in the Rockcastle County Jail under a \$100,000 bond. Both men were arraigned Friday. Mosgrove's wife, Margaret Kirby Mosgrove, who was arrested the night of the alleged incident was not indicted by the grand jury.

In other Grand Jury action, summons have been sent for two Conway men charged with cultivating marijuana.

Albert M. Seals, 42, is charged with growing five marijuana plants and Gary Evans, 42, is charged with growing six marijuana plants. Evans' case was continued when he appeared in court on Friday and Seals is scheduled to be arraigned on November 10.

A new set of bleachers; 911 and forget Gatewood

We have a letter to the editor this week from an Estill County fan about Friday night's crowd control at the Rockcastle football game. Although we all are very dedicated Rockerfans we think Mr. Baker has a legitimate gripe.

Rockcastle football is big and each year we attract thousands of fans to our home field on Friday

nights. Our program is the point, where our football program is one of the top in the state and everyone that plays us, especially during the regular season wants to beat us. Teams that have a legitimate chance to knock off the Rock bring a lot of fans and more times than not there is not adequate seating for them.

I have been amazed throughout the past five years or so that a fight

hasn't broken out in the current bleacher section because fans from both sides sit on the same side of the field. It simply is not a good situation. Rockcastle administrators know it is a bad situation and after Friday night's crowd control fiasco, they know all too well that something has got to be done before next season to remedy the problem.

The only solution is to build bleachers on the opposite side of the field for the visiting team and there are, of course, several ways to pay for them. If the board doesn't want to turn loose some of the money they have in interest bearing accounts, just less than \$2 million at last count, there are other ways, fund raisers, donations, etc. Regardless of which course the school system takes to pay for the bleachers, they have got to be in place by next season.


This week Rockcastle Director of Emergency Services, Gary Asher turned over another \$27,000 to the county to be used for emergency services in Rockcastle. Last year he gave them a check for \$15,000, monies that came from the Department of Military Affairs and money that was not budgeted to help run the county. Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolus said Tuesday that last year's \$15,000 has not spent by the county as of yet, therefore the county should have some \$42,000 they can spend on emergency services. I hate to beat a dead horse, but \$42,000 would go a long way toward the implementation of an emergency 911 service. Currently it is costing the county approximately \$2,300 a month for emergency dispatching services from the sheriff's office. It used to cost \$50 from the jail, but the jailer or any of his deputies were certified dispatchers and handling emergency calls for the county is not his job, so it is being handled through the sheriff's office.

Although the fiscal court has made several promises to do something toward the implementation of

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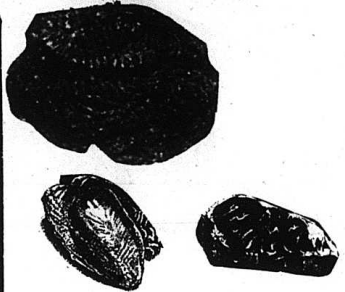
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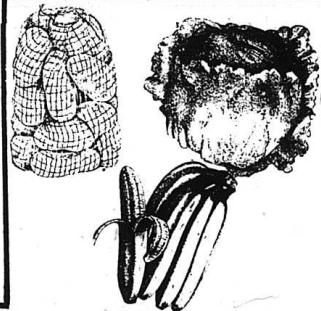

the 911 service nothing seems to be getting accomplished. The \$42,000 could help ease the initial financial burden to the county, if the county would actually try to do something. From all indications the sheriff's office is doing a pretty good job dispatching calls, but a 911 service would benefit more Rockcastle countians and provide quicker emergency services.

I understand that when someone announces an interest in being governor of this great state, the news media is obligated to their audience to provide information on the candidate. I guess that is why Gatewood Galbraith continues to get news coverage across the state although the men has tried and tried again to be elected governor. It simply is not going to happen in Kentucky. He will try once again in November to be elected. He filed yesterday as a write-in candidate saying, "If these other two candidates are telling the truth about each other in their political ads, neither one is fit to hold public office. We're urged to take this action by

sincere, well-intentioned people across Kentucky who want their write-in votes to be fairly counted. They want a better option in this election, and it's an honor to accommodate them." However most Kentuckians believe otherwise, made obvious by the fact that Galbraith has never gotten more than ten percent of the vote. So why does Gatewood keep running? Simple, free advertising for his law practice. Galbraith has gotten almost as much television time as Melbourne Mills Jr., and hasn't had to pay for any of it. I would like to see just once, a large television station or one of the larger radio stations in Kentucky say nothing about Galbraith's latest futile attempt at the governor's seat.

My question is this - does the Bible command that if a man dies and leaves his wife without a son, that the dead man's brother must see to it that she has a son? My wicked old boss at work throws that in my face just to upset me. (Justine Kudwummer, Okalona, Kentucky)

DEAR JUSTINE: I hope this doesn't upset you, but your boss is on the right track.

He is referring to what is often called "levirate marriage." ("Levirate" comes from the word *levir*, that means "a husband's brother.") The command is a legal provision that if brothers live together and one of them dies leaving no son, the other brother shall marry the widow. The first son of this union takes the name of the

brother who died (Deut. 25:5-10).

Now you could say that the passage applies only to brothers who live together, but that would not solve the problem. (The law is "a problem" for those who consider monogamy to be the ultimate biblical standard and also "believe" every word of the Bible.)

The Book of Ruth is a notable illustration of "levirate marriage." The story recites in some detail the efforts of a Hebrew woman, Naomi, to secure a husband for her widowed daughter-in-law, Ruth. But the story goes on to note that Boaz, who eventually marries Ruth, was not the dead husband's brother. In other words, Boaz "rescue" of Ruth extends the levirate custom to other male relatives of the deceased in the event no brother survives.

Well, Justine, that's about all the space I can spare regarding that passage. I am happy to expand to expand upon the matter from your employer's angle by asking the question, "Does the levirate marriage custom apply to us here in the closing days of the twentieth century?"

Oops! I must leave off writing and commence repairing the damage done to our domicile after a three-day visit by our grandsons, Andrew, Alex, and Adam. I love 'em. Meadows to the coast!

Double-oops! The answer to my initial question is "Yes! Alley Oop did marry - his long-time, girl-friend,

Improved Standards of Living

Our first venture into improving the crude way of doing the wash, by the furnace to heat the water, was in the yard close to the furnace that heated the water, was to buy a commercial bench that held two tubs with a hand operated wringer between them. This bench was set on a level place close to the spring with the furnace just next to it. This way the water would not have to be carried up the hill but the wet clothes would have to be so they could be hung on the lines in the yard to dry.

The wringer was a real improvement over hand wringing but it was still a trestle on a shore and had to be turned to it with one hand and turn the handle that operated the rolls that pressed the water out of the clothes with the other. But at least it was progress over the old way of wringing them. And even in the depths of the mountains of Kentucky progress was made.

The next improvement was getting a gasoline-powered washing machine. What a beauty it was, this big white automatic washing machine with wringer attached sitting on the back porch was a dream come true. Now I would not have to use a washboard and scrub the dirt out, the washing machine would do that for me, and the attached automatic wringer was a blessing for now there would be no more blisters made by wringing them by hand and they would dry much quicker. This was not the only benefit the new washing machine brought to us, it also had a charger connected to it that charged the battery to the radio we listened to every Saturday night and, sometimes, if the juice held out, in the evenings when friends came to visit. The radio

was another modern blessing of that time. There was seldom a Saturday night when we didn't have a house full of young people who came to hear "The Grand Old Opry." And after they left there was seldom enough juice left in the battery to listen to John Lair's Sunday morning Gathens! It took several hours to charge the battery, but washing, not only became necessary to have clean clothes it was also necessary if we were to have entertainment the next Saturday night.

About this time we also invested in another important aide to the laundry. This was a gasoline iron. A small tank that held white gasoline was attached to the back of the nice shiny stainless steel iron and acted as a rest for the iron when it wasn't in use. I remember we had to loosen a valve somewhere and pump air into the tank with a pump that came with it, then light it, and soon a sizzling oil was announced and it was time to switch iron and I no longer had to switch irons every few minutes nor keep a fire in the stove. White gasoline for the iron, lamp and lantern which we were now using had to be kept separate from the gas used for our house and an electric automatic timer caused problems when visitors offered to fill them and didn't understand the difference. We also had to keep fuel oil for the refrigerator. Yep, we had one of those also.

Then came the advent of electricity in our area. Now we had water in our house and an electric automatic washer and iron was added to the joy of living in an isolated area. A hot water tank was crowded into the corner of the kitchen, the washer

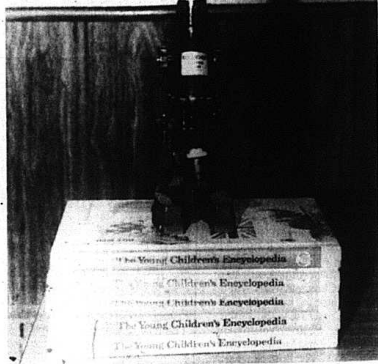

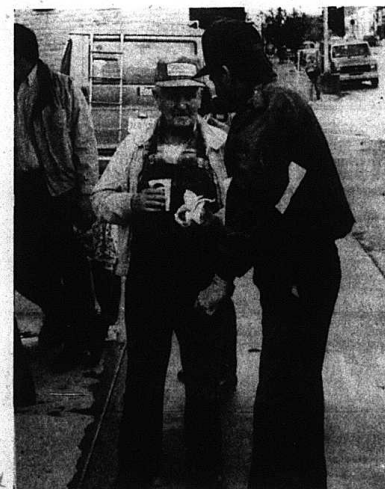

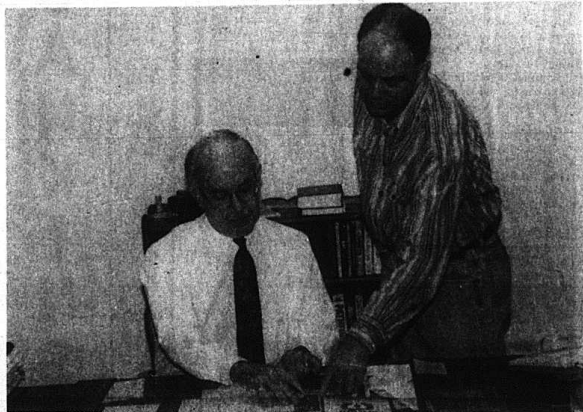
