

A Rockeaste County Circuit
Court Jury deliberated until almost
midnight Tuesday before returning
without a unanimous decision in a
murder case.
Paul Gayheart, 36, of Brodhead
will remain in jail, after the jury told
Circuit Dan Venters they could not
reach a unamious decision.
Gayheart is accused of shooting
Clayton Frith, 33, of Copper Creek to
death on February 18 of this year. His
trial lasted two days.
Frith died from a single gunshot
wound to the chest ghat pierced one of
his lungs and caused massive internal
bleeding.

At the time of the shooting Gay-heart told police that he was acting in self-defense, because he feared for his life. And during the trial, Gay-hard's court appointed attorney told jurors that his client was only trying to portect himself from Frith, while the two men drank together that Sat-moday.

urday.
Gayheart's attorney said that Frith told his client his was going to kill him because he (Gayheart) had been seeing his wife and caused he (Frith)

him because he (Gayheart) had been seeing, his wife and caused he(Frith) and his wife to separate. However, assistant Commonwealth attorney David Tapp kept hammering away at the fact that Frith was not armed at the time of the shooting and that the gunshot that Gayheart fired was at very close range or a "contact shoot." According to a spokesperson in Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller's office, the jury deadlocked at eleven to one. Eleven jurrors were for acquital and one was not. Gayheart, who has been unable to make bond since his arrest will remain in the Rockeastle County jail while he awaits further court proceedings.



Former administrator Charles' Truck" Baker said the onset of medicare caused many small hospitals to have difficulty meeting the requirements of the program and Mrs. Brown would work the double shifts to meet the requirement of an R.N. on duty.
After leaving Rock-caste Hospital in 1990, Mrs. Brown worked for a while at Berea Health Care Center before her etirement.
