

Advance in play-offs for fifth straight year

Rockets blank Western 27-0

The Rockcastle County High School Rockets have advanced to the second round of the state class 2A play-offs for the fifth time in as many years.

The Rockets easily defeated Western Hills High School from Franklin County 27-0 Friday night at the RCHS field.

The extremely cold weather and the weak opponent caused Rocket fans to stay at home in droves and Western Hills, a team that had managed only three wins during the regular season brought a small group of supporters to the contest.

The small group that did make the trip, saw their team manage only 39 yards of total offense on the night. They also saw their team fall behind early and never really be in the contest.

The Rockets wasted very little

Play Boyle County at home Friday, game time 7:30 p.m.

time jumping on Western Hills, taking the opening kick-off and driving the ball to the end zone on their first drive.

The Rockets first score came on an excellent run straight up the middle of the field by fullback Neil Sparks, who scored from the 35 yard line. Sparks, who also played well on defense, intercepting a pass while picking up two solo tackles.

During the opening drive the Rockets were penalized twice and warned once because their coaches

were too far out on the field.

Western Hills showed a little bit of spirit when they got the ball on their first possession, but after two first downs the Rockets shut the Green Dragons down and forced them to punt.

The Rockets would score again in the first quarter to take a 13-0 lead into the dressing room at half-time.

Their second score came on a three yard run by junior tailback Jon Cromer, who rushed for 111 yards on 17 carries. The Rockets workhorse back was selected as WKYT-TV and Dairy Queen's player of the week in high school football last week for his effort against Estill County. Cromer had 120 yards, caught three passes and scored a two-point conversion against the Engineers.

The Rockets defense, anchored by their excellent defensive line of

Eddie Todd, Jason Weaver, Stevie Owens, Slade Calhoun and Adam Browning held the visiting team to just 39 yards of total offense and no points. To date the Rockets have outscored their eleven opponents 349 to 102. They have also held all eleven opponents to just 521 yards on the ground and 778 yards of offense through the air.

The Rockets have gained 2,671 yards rushing the football and quarterback Jamie Linville has thrown for 904 yards.

The brightest spot for the Rockets Friday night was junior running back

Jason Brown, considered the fastest man on the squad.

Brown, who was plagued early in the year with a knee injury and missed most of the Estill County game because of the flu, gained 100 yards on 14 carries. Brown also scored a second half touchdown for the Rockets Friday night.

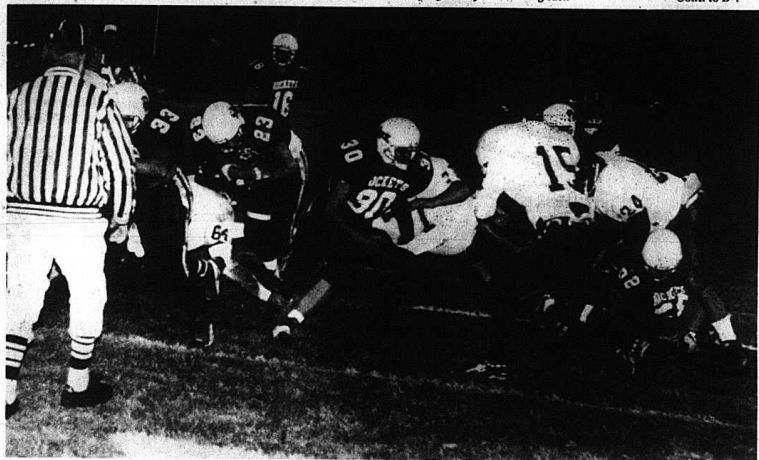
Jon Cromer also scored again in the second half and placekicker Raymond Blackburn was three for four on extra point attempts to round out the scoring for the Rockets.

defense Friday night with five tackles, while Brown had three tackles and two blocked punts.

"Jason had his best game of the year, Friday night, he is just now getting 100 percent healthy and should be a big contributor throughout the rest of the season," said head coach Tom Larkey.

"He will certainly help us on offense with his good speed, but he is also able to shore up our pass defense, something that has been a little suspect all season long," Larkey said. Other Rockets with tackles Friday night were Jarrod Singleton, 2, Sparks, 2, Stevie Owens, 2, Slade Calhoun, who played injured, 2, Eddie Todd, 1, David Coffey, 1, J. B. King, 1, Adam Browning, 1, Malcolm Shepherd, 1, and Ronnie Vanzant, 1. Vanzant also picked off a Western Hills' pass and Chris Bullock recovered a fumble for the Rockets.

Besides Cromer's 111 yards and Brown's 100, Neil Sparks had 58 yards on just four carries. Rigby had three on one carry, Dusty McCutere carried the ball twice for six yards and Chris Bishop got one carry for no gain.

Quarterback Jamie Linville, who received more pressure from Western Hills than most expected, had a good game passing with 101 yards on six completions. Linville had one pass picked off in the second quarter, but it was deep in Western Hills' territory.

The Rockets leading receiver on the year, Jason Childress caught three passes for 39 yards and Chris Bullock caught two balls for 38 yards. Rigby caught the other Linville completion for 24 yards.

The Rockets, now 10 and 1 on the season play host to the Boyle County Rebels Friday night. The 7:30 p.m. contest is sure to be a dogfight.

"Boyle County may be the best team we've played all season," said Coach Larkey.

"We've got to go out and execute well to win, it will be a tough, tough game," he said.

Boyle County has lost only two games this season, one of those losses was to crosstown rival Danville the last game of the regular season.

The Admirals beat Boyle 18-10, but the Rebels actually won three of four quarters against Danville.

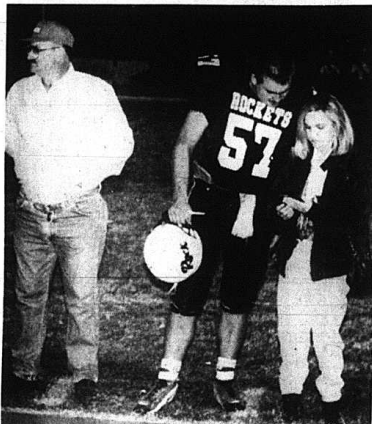

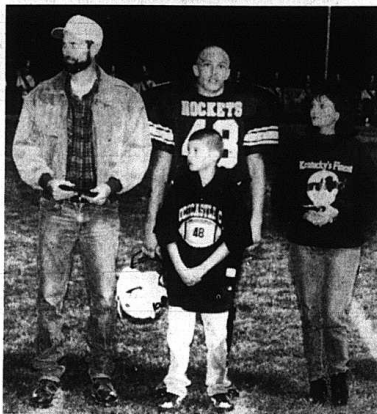
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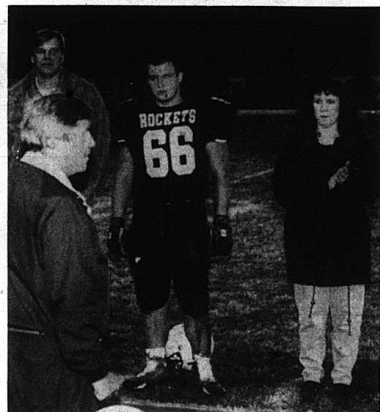

If you have built a new house, garage, barn, etc., purchased or sold a mobile home or made any changes in your existing property since last year, it is especially important that you notify us. The Homestead Exemption for 1995 will be \$23,100. If you own and occupy your home and will be 65 years of age any time during the year, you must file an application with the PVA in order to be eligible for this exemption. If you are already receiving the Homestead Exemption, \$23,100, will automatically be deducted from your 1995 assessment, and it will not be necessary for you to fill out an additional application.

•Attention Disabled Persons•

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is **TOTALLY DISABLED**. In order to qualify for this, you must receive 100% disability payments for the entire calendar year and must reapply each year. The PVA Office is located on the third floor of the Courthouse and is open from 8:00 - 4:00 Monday - Friday.

Hung jury in Gayheart murder trial

A Rockcastle County Circuit Court Jury deliberated until almost midnight Tuesday before returning without a unanimous decision in a murder case.

Paul Gayheart, 36, of Brodhead will remain in jail, after the jury told Circuit Dan Venters they could not reach a unanimous decision.

Gayheart is accused of the shooting Clayton Frih, 33, of Copper Creek to death on February 18 of this year. His trial lasted two days.

Frih died from a single gunshot wound to the chest that pierced one of his lungs and caused massive internal bleeding.

At the time of the shooting Gayheart told police that he was acting in self-defense, because he feared for his life. And during the trial, Gayheart's court appointed attorney told jurors that his client was only trying to protect himself from Frih, while the two men drank together that Saturday.

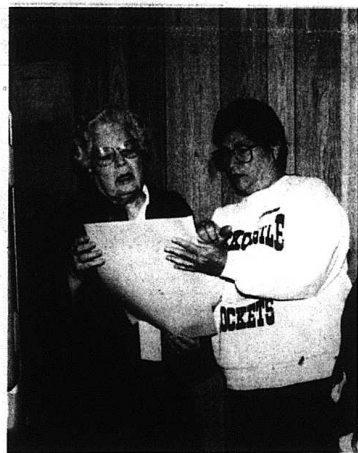
Gayheart's attorney said that Frih told his client his was going to kill him because he (Gayheart) had been seeing his wife and caused her (Frih) and his wife to separate.

However, assistant Commonwealth attorney David Tapp kept hammering away at the fact that Frih was not armed at the time of the shooting and that the gunshot that Gayheart fired was very close range or a "contact shot."

According to a spokesperson in Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller's office, the jury deadlocked at eleven to one. Eleven jurors were for acquittal and one was not.

Gayheart, who has been unable to make bond since his arrest will remain in the Rockcastle County jail while he awaits further court proceedings.

Forge wins here; Patton takes state

By: Ray McClure As expected, Rockcastle voters chose Republican Larry Forge in Tuesday's General Election.

Forge won Rockcastle 2,020 votes to Lt. Governor Paul Patton's 1,012.

Forge carried East Mt. Vernon 169 to 80; South Mt. Vernon, 206 to 68; West Mt. Vernon, 326 to 117; North Mt. Vernon, 210 to 90; Conway 248 to 88; Roundstone, 219 to 81; Climax, 53 to 19; Orlando, 110 to 39; East Livingston, 130 to 26; West Livingston, 64 to 19; Bullock 61 to 19; Brown, 237 to 141; West Brodhead, 303 to 113; North Brodhead 216 to 87. Forge took the absentee vote as well 68 to 25.

Gatwood Galbraith got 21 write-in votes in the governor's race.

In the Mt. Vernon City Council race, Charles Wayne Bullock was elected by way of a write-in vote. Bullock got 26 votes and will take Wayne Gregory's place on the council.

At Brodhead Democrat County Chairman Larry Doyle got 102 votes running unopposed and in Livingston Katha Carpenter was elected from the ballot and Earl Baker was elected as a write-in candidate. Baker got six votes, Mrs. Carpenter got 26. Both will go on the council.

Rockcastle had an excellent turn out Tuesday with 3,797 casting votes.

Lt. Governor carries Pike, Jefferson; loses Fayette

By: Ray McClure Lieutenant Governor Paul Patton became Kentucky Governor Paul Patton in Kentucky's General Election Tuesday.

It was the closest race in twenty-eight years. Patton nosed out Republican Larry Forge, 498,788 to 476,280.

Although the spotlight was on the governor's race it was dimmed slightly by State Auditor Ben Chandler's race for Kentucky Attorney General.

Chandler led the Democrat ticket with 558,404 votes, or sixty percent to his opponent Will T. Sarty's forty percent or 373,410.

John Y. Brown III received 526,890 votes to his opponent Steve Crabree's 394,872. He will be the new Secretary of State.

It was the closest governor's race since 1963. Patton carried Eastern Kentucky, handily brought back the first district in western Kentucky to

Sewer project for Mt. Vernon will cost \$1 million

By: Raymond McClure Upgrading of Mt. Vernon city sewer, to take care of expanded growth, will cost about one million dollars.

Richard Moore, sewer project engineer, told the Mt. Vernon city council Monday night that bids would be called for in December, opened by mid-January and awarded about the first of February.

The city will get help with the project. A \$350,000 grant has been approved by the Rural Economic and Community Development Agency from the Appalachian Regional Commission, formerly the Farmers Home Administration.

A loan of \$647,650 will be approved for the city from the Mt. Kentucky Infrastructure authority.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer said the upgrading of the sewer would serve about 42 more customers including the Rockcastle High School, Image Entry and residents in the subdivisions in the area of Jeri Lane.

After several notices the Mt. Kentucky city council has finally sold the caboose located in the city parking lot beside the railroad tracks.

The city accepted a \$500 offer from Perry Pink who will move the caboose.

The city gave him 60 days to make arrangements to move the caboose. The \$500 will go to the Jaycees to repay the club for money and time

spent over the years on the caboose. When contacted Mick said he and Gary Miracle planned to move the caboose to "on the hill" meaning Miles' area south of Mt. Vernon "put in some heat and just use the caboose," as a gathering place.

Councilman Terry Owens abstained on the sale to say he "didn't want to sell it in the first place." The vote was four to one. Councilman Clark "Joe" Mullins did not attend the meeting. He called to say he was caught in traffic in Lexington.

Anna Wilson returned to the council Monday night to ask the council to help her or suggest how she could prevent late night noise at her home near the car wash in Mt. Vernon.

She told the council the problem is "getting dangerous," and that she has been unable to sleep because of drag racing and other problems.

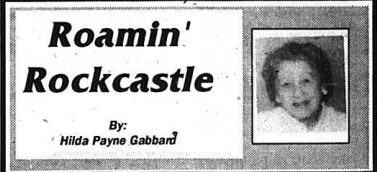
ballot in 1999 to get my vote for whatever office he may be seeking. In the meantime, let us pray for Kentucky. I'm dead serious.

do your courting where your chairs sit close side by side."

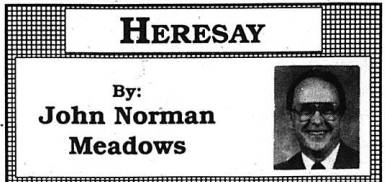

Agriculture News

By Warren Alexander, County Executive Director

Producers interested in the Wool and Mohair program should be aware of the "guaranteed minimum price" option that could be used during this period of depressed market conditions. This option allows sales documents without disbursement and the producer will be paid at least the guaranteed minimum sales price at a future date.

The delivery of wool and mohair on consignment to a marketing agency to be sold for the producer's account constitutes a marketing, and the producer shall be entitled to the proceeds of such marketing when by December 31, 1995, the marketing agency has guaranteed a minimum sales price, was unable to sell the wool or mohair for more than the minimum sales price, with the producers' consent, takes possession of the wool or mohair at the minimum sales price, or indicates on the sales document that the price is the "guaranteed minimum sales price." The guaranteed minimum sales price must be finalized by December 31, 1995. Producers will be required to provide acceptable documentation of the minimum price guaranteed date on or before December 31, 1995.

County committee election ballots will be mailed by November 24, 1995. Final date to turn in your ballot will be December 4. Producers are urged to vote for candidate of choice in your LAA (local administrative area) or district.

Third annual Field Day

The Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service held its third annual Farm Field Day in October. Forest Ranger Marvin Stone and members of the Livingston Volunteer Fire Dept. spoke about forest fire prevention and safety. They also demonstrated some fire fighting techniques.

Bill Beach and Ken Thompson, from the Ky. Department of Forestry, showed how to determine the age of trees. They also discussed how and when to harvest trees.

Members of the RCHS FFA spoke for the Corn Growers Association about products made from corn. They also gave a talk about the students joining FFA when they get to high school. The FFA was represented by Amy Prewitt, Darrin Cook, J.C. Harris, Billy Graves and Leigh Ann Sigmon. They also gave out chocolate covered corn nuts and plastic rulers in biodegradable plastic bags, all made from corn.

R.N. at Rockcastle Hospital for 31 years

Joyce Brown, 62, dies at home

Joyce Whitaker Brown, a fixture at the Rockcastle County Hospital for 31 years, died Wednesday, November 1, 1995 at her home from an apparent heart attack.

Mrs. Brown had been in ill health, suffering from diabetes and kidney disease, her husband, John, said.

A native of Venon in Harlan Co., Mrs. Brown worked in Florida and Minnesota before coming back to Rockcastle County in 1959 and beginning her career at Rockcastle Hospital.

"She was the hospital," said Dr. G.W. Griffith. Griffith also called Mrs. Brown "very dedicated and knowledgeable," and went on to say, "When Joyce called you and told you somebody was sick, they were sick."

For a great many years, doctors had to be called to the hospital in an emergency and LPN Linda Martin of Mt. Vernon, who worked with Mrs. Brown for many years, told of an incident where a man came into the hospital with deep cuts on his arms from a chainsaw accident.

Martin said if he had had to wait until a doctor arrived, he would undoubtedly have died, but Mrs. Brown took control, stopped the bleeding and, in

effect, saved the man's life. In Mrs. Martin's mind, Mrs. Brown "kept the hospital going during its early years."

"She would often work double shifts because there would not be an R.N. on duty when her regular shift ended, so she would stay on, catching what sleep she could in the nurse's lounge so as to be available if needed," Mrs. Martin recounted.

According to Dr. Griffith and Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Brown "did it all." She was an operating room nurse, "a great OB nurse," Dr. Griffith said, took x-rays in an emergency and served as director of nursing and as administrator for a short time.

Former administrator Charles "Tuck" Baker said the onset of Medicare caused many small hospitals to have difficulty meeting the requirements of the program and Mrs. Brown would work the double shifts to meet the requirement of an R.N. on duty.

After leaving Rockcastle Hospital in 1990, Mrs. Brown worked for a while at Berea Health Care Center before her retirement.

She was the daughter of Maggie Jackson Whitaker of Rt. 1, Brodhead and the late Edward S. Whitaker and,

In Moscow, on October 19 through October 30, 1943, an agreement for the United Nations Organization was reached by the big four allied powers: the United Kingdom, the United States, the USSR, and the Republic of China. On June 26, 1945, representatives of fifty nations signed the United Nations Charter. On July 28, 1945 the United States Senate ratified the U.N. Charter, 89-2. Senators

William Langer (R-North Dakota) and Henrik Shipstead (RRR-Minnesota) voted "Nay." Langer warned the Senate, "The United Nations is fraught with danger to the American people and to the American institutions." On October 15, 1945, the U.N. Charter was ratified by a majority of signatory nations. This past month (October) the U.N. celebrated its 50th year of existence.
 What is the purpose of the U.N.? One of the reasons we are given, the U.N. is flooded to protect human rights. The U.N. did little or nothing about Ida Amin's policy of genocide in Uganda or Pol Pot's slaughter of

three million in Cambodia. It was silent in the face of the continued violation of human rights in the USSR and Soviet block nations. And the most recent violence in Rwanda, Somali, and Bosnia just proves how ineffective the U.N. can be when it comes to peace-keeping or serving as great humanitarians.
 Here is something you may not know about the U.N. The policies that are voted into law or resolutions that are passed, supersedes any law or policy that we as a sovereign nation have. On February 16, of this year, Ambassador Madeline Albright, under the direction of President Clin-

ton, signed a U.N. treaty that would take away God given rights that parents and families have, as sole authorities of their children. Under this treaty our children would have the freedom of privacy such as: the right to an abortion without notice to parents and the use of contraceptives; the right to benefit from child-care services and facilities and the government would be required to provide children with "family planning education and services."
 The U.N. treaty on child rights, sanctions government control over families. It endorses the rights of children to decide their own futures

Thursday, November 9, 1995 P-83 and directly attacks the nurturing role of mothers and fathers in the moral and spiritual development of their children. It is against such abuse of power that our founding fathers set up our democratic system of government with its checks and balances. They believed strongly that each individual has natural God given right, and that no government can take them away. A moral people with strong faith, and a nation living in strong families, were seen as the natural protections against unchecked government and the growth of tyranny.
