Most of her life she has cared for her beautiful, erratic younger sister, Laura; her self-sacrificing physician husband, Pom; and her lovely, fragile sixteen-year-old daughter, Glynn. Now, in this strange summer of unannounced warm weather and growing pressures, she is caring too for her husband's destructive, controlling mother, who is ill with advanced Alzheimer's disease. Exhausted and confused, Merritt no longer knows quite who she is or what is important to her. She only knows that something deep inside is about to crack.

When all the fault lines converge and erupt those of the heart and those buried deep beneath the mountain lodge, each woman must seek within herself the bedrock core of strength and courage that will save and change her life. With a wrenching, deeply moving climax and the masterfully drawn characters that are a sparkling hallmark of Anne Rivers Siddons' rich story telling powers, **FAULT LINES** is a swift and remarkable novel.

The old testament men and women of faith, urge us on, as a cloud of witnesses to cheer us on, by their faith, and example they have set. Surely if they can gain the victory of faith, then we can too, under the leadership of the chief shepherd, Jesus Christ.

James tells us, "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing." Jm. 1:2-4. Yes, we can let the trials, tribulations, temptations of life get us down and destroy us, or we can let God use them in his providence to shape and mold us. Stones in our path can either be stepping stones or stumbling stones. We can let the trials of life make us bitter or make us better. Endurance is a quality that the Lord desires we have; but comes and is developed in our lives in no easy way.

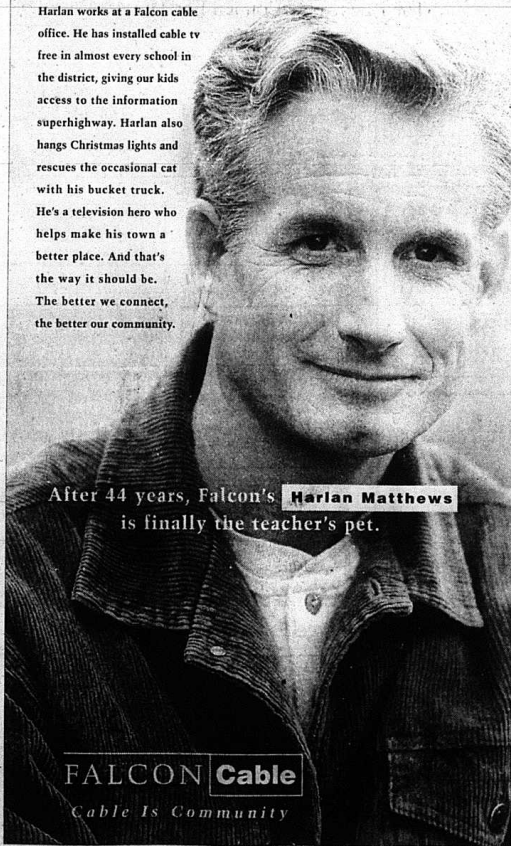

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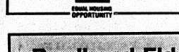

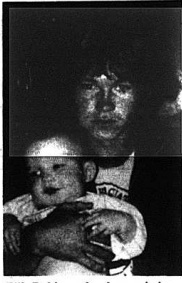

U.S. Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset announced this week that \$170 million in funding for the Appalachian Regional Commission had been approved by Congress and President Clinton.

That is very good news for 300 some Rockcastle County families without city water.

In March, Kentucky Governor Breton Jones told members of the Rockcastle County water association and members of the Rockcastle fiscal court that he was recommending that the ARC spend \$600,000 in Rockcastle County to extend water lines to over 300 customers of the water association. The \$600,000 is part of a \$1.7 million expansion planned by the association.

However after the newly elected Republican Congress got their budget ax out in Washington the ARC was one of the first places they started to chop. Those moves put the water project for the county in great jeopardy, because the \$600,000 in funding was only a recommendation from

the Governor and had not been budgeted by the ARC.

But, water association president David Ballinger said Tuesday that it looked very good for the project now. "Nobody knew for sure how much money, if any, would be left in the ARC budget, but we have been told now, that our project has a very good chance of being completed," Ballinger said.

"We will know a lot more about the project's chances of being completed in the next few days," he said. Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlifus said Wednesday that he too felt good about the fate of the project, after talking with officials in Lexington and Washington.

"I have worked with the state director of the Farmers Home Administration in Lexington, and he says that now that ARC has their funding, this project will probably be completed," the Judge-executive said.

Farmers Home Administration is the governing body responsible for coming up with the bulk of the \$1.7 million in funding, besides ARC's \$600,000. The Judge-Executive said that officials in Senator Wendell Ford's office had also indicated that the project was going to be completed.

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Eagle Echoes

The Fifth Grade Class at Roundstone Elementary has recently been studying neighboring countries to the south. During this unit of study, Mrs. Midkiff's classroom presented a play, "The Search for the Magic Lake", based upon a South American folk tale.

With the assistance of Title I teacher, Mrs. Eversole, the students auditioned for roles; took on responsibilities for production often overlooked by an audience, such as set design, stage crew, stage manager, and costuming. Students and Mrs. Midkiff designed scenery that cre-

ated a "heaven-in-the-round" effect with the audience seated in the center of the action. Students decided on their costumes and props and used musical instruments and taped music from the Rain Forest to add to their authenticity.

The class presented their play on two succeeding days, first to the fourth grade and then for their families and peers.

Shown in the pictures are a scene of the throne room where the young prince lies in wait of a cure; and the poor mountain family that comes to the rescue.

ACTIVITIES

The fourth grade class at RES was recently involved in a week-long study of "Shakespeare and His Times." Although the teachers were somewhat reluctant at the prospect of getting nine and ten year olds interested in a subject which they had not

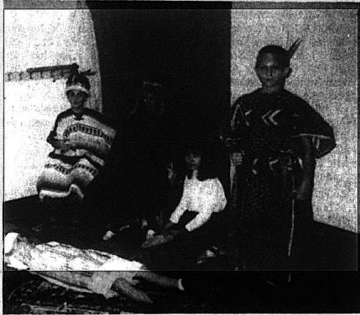
particularly enjoyed in high school, it did not take long to catch the enthusiasm generated by active, young learners.

One of the first activities was to take a trip back in time by use of a time line made on adding machine tape. As the tape was unrolled, the number 2000 was the first to appear as the students saw how close the current year was to a new century. The concept of century was explored

as to why it was always one year more than the current date. As the tape unrolled in fifty year segments, students held the tape and read historical events that happened at that time. Every student was actively involved in "going back" in time and the room was soon filled with the time line, with more tape still on the roll even after they had gotten back to Shakespeare's time, the sixteenth

"Shakespeare" presented by the Louisville Shakespeare Theater. The students were involved in critiquing the various scenes which were performed in three different time periods: modern day, turn of the century and Elizabethan. The students were very knowledgeable about the plays, having previously compared "Taming of the Shrew" to a Jack tale; "Hamlet" to a ghost story; and "The Tempest" to a magical fairy tale. The cast appeared surprised at the knowledge displayed by their young audience.

The class completed their study by taking on a different role, such as an actor, historian, playwright, archeologist, or costumer; and writing how they would change the plays, production or preserve history.

The sophomore center led the team in scoring with 16 and also in rebounding.

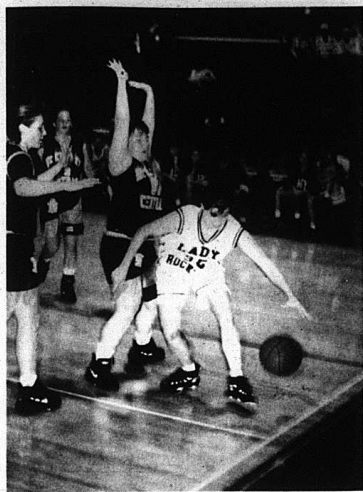

A correction from last week's article is in order. 18 weeks is 3 1/2 months.

This week, I would like to share some facts about a topic that is becoming more and more frequent, thanks to a man named Dr. Jack Kevorkian.

Euthanasia, what is it? In keeping with the root definition of "euthanasia" literally "good death" contemporary proponents of euthanasia insist they are talking about helping a terminally ill patient in inufferable pain die a dignified death - at the patient's request.

But this description bears no resemblance to the true picture of the actual practice of euthanasia in the United States and elsewhere.

As currently practiced, euthanasia often involves withholding food and water from a patient whose death is caused by starvation and dehydration rather than the patient's underlying disease.

Voluntary euthanasia is when a patient specifically requests to be killed. In non-voluntary euthanasia, the patient's wishes are unknown and another person requests that the patient be killed. With involuntary euthanasia the patient is killed even though the patient has expressly stated that he or she does not want to be

killed. Euthanasia was championed by the most respected physicians in Nazi Germany even before Hitler came to power, and the killing started with children. By 1939, "mercy killings" and "the duty to be healthy" were accepted and implemented by Hitler's followers. It started with deformed and handicapped children, and escalated to the killing of 3 to 4 million

In this carefully structured setting, children may discuss their feelings in groups, tell stories about their experience, express themselves through art or participate in physical challenges designed to build trust. In addition, the physicians were updated on the latest health implications of obesity.

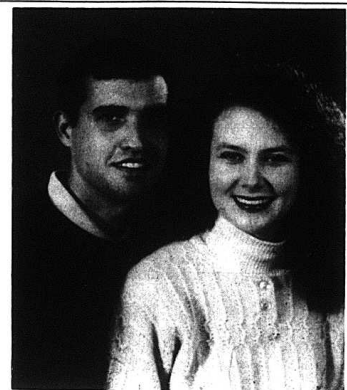

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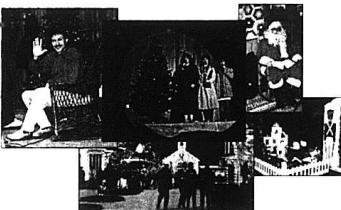

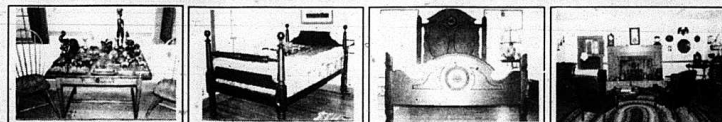
