Eighth grade boys lose two

The Rockets took an early lead in their game against Clark Moore on Monday, Nov. 30th, and never lost it, to improve their record to 2-0, with a 29-18 win.

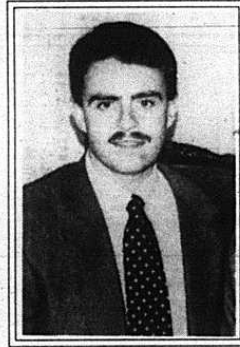



Middle school student voluntarily withdraws

A Rockcastle County Middle School student has voluntarily withdrawn from school for the remainder of the 1995-96 school year.

The volunteer withdrawal came before the Rockcastle County Board of Education could hold an expulsion hearing on the matter Monday night.

Charges against the eighth grade student apparently were the result of an incident at the Rockcastle County Middle School in November, in which he was accused of sexual misconduct, involving a female student.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond, said Tuesday that RCMS principal John Hale had recommended expulsion of the student, after the alleged incident.

After a closed session with the school board, the student, who was represented by local attorney Debra Lambert, admitted to sexual misconduct and withdrew voluntarily. Because the student admitted to conducting himself in a manner that would warrant expulsion, the board agreed with Lambert's proposal.

According to Hammond, the board accepted the withdrawal and the stipulation that the student will be home schooled during this period. The student will also be eligible to return to the Rockcastle County school system in August 1996 if he successfully completes all re-entrance exams.

Public hearing gets no response on water system

A public hearing on planned Waste Water Treatment Facilities and Sewer Collection System failed to draw response at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The city will seek proposals, bids from engineering firms which will study the city water system and go ahead with a possible remedy to the area needs.

Among services are preliminary engineering construction design and resident inspections.

Bids will be received until 4 p.m. December 18, and will be opened at noon December 19.

The Council gave Mayor Gary R. Cromer permission to appoint a

Bus fired into; middle school student questioned

Police have interviewed one middle school student in connection with the shooting of a Rockcastle County school bus on Tuesday.

According to Rockcastle County Director of Transportation David Perkins, a bus being driven by Randall Adams was shot into as it traveled along Chestnut Grove Road near Brodhead on Tuesday.

Police think the juvenile shot into the bus with a pellet gun. The single shot traveled through the bus and broke out two windows. No one was on the bus, except Adams. Adams told police that he saw the juvenile fired into the bus.

In another bus incident, a middle

school student's parents have been billed for damages done to a school bus at Brodhead school about two weeks ago.

According to Perkins, two middle school students began fighting as Everett Cash's bus entered the lot at Brodhead school after school had been dismissed. The fight between the two students was broken up by a teacher, but while the fight was going on, another student in the back of the bus "decided to kick out two windows," according to Perkins.

"The student's actions had nothing to do with the fight," Perkins said. The student was removed from Cash's bus, but was not suspended.

Governor Jones makes it official It's a go, water will flow, for 326 residents

After years of trying to get water and months of waiting to hear final word, members of the Rockcastle County Water Association can rest easy. The water is going to flow.

Kentucky Governor Breton Jones told a group of Rockcastle County residents during an unprecedented fourth trip to the county on Tuesday that "26 more homes in Rockcastle County would finally get water."

The water will come from the Rockcastle County Water Association, thanks to a \$1.73 million funding package from the state and federal government.

Governor Jones, who is chair-

man of the Appalachian Regional Commission, had pushed the project for the past year.

Sixty-three miles of new water-line will extend into Pongo, Cleft Rock, Buffalo, Brushy Ridge, Bud Clark Ridge, Sand Springs, Red Hill and Sand Hill, according to Rockcastle Water Association President David Ballinger.

"We are excited, to say the least," Ballinger said. "A lot of people have worked very hard to get this project approved," he said.

There are about thirty check list items that must be completed before the project can be bid, but Ballinger said that this association has until July

Governor helps dedicate Town Hill Project



A host of dignitaries, public officials, county office holders, business people and interested citizens, gathered at the Town Hill Project in Mt. Vernon Tuesday to officially open four new homes for low and moderate income families Tuesday.

Kentucky Governor Breton Jones was the guest of honor and chief ribbon cutter.

The Town Hill Project, which was administered by the Daniel Boone Development Corporation, in cooperation with the Kentucky Housing Corporation, will enable four Rockcastle County families to live in new homes. The amount of rent each family pays will be based on their income, according to Betty Carter, local director of the Daniel Boone Development Council.

The four recently completed homes will be occupied by Friday, according to Mrs. Carter, who said that each house cost approximately \$42,000 to construct.

Two duplexes will also be built on the Town Hill site, which will enable four more local families to acquire good housing on a low income payback.

The Rockcastle County Housing Authority, The City of Mt. Vernon and the Rockcastle Fiscal Court helped with the project.

"One of the good things about this project is that most of the money spent, was spent with local people and some work was even done by prisoners of the county jail, under supervision," Mrs. Carter said.

Other low income homes have been built throughout the county by Daniel Boone Development.

Nancy Meadows is Director of the Rockcastle County Housing Authority.

Points East

Our electric bill every month, here on Fairview Ridge has been less than \$100.00 no more than two or three times since we moved here, four years ago. Normally it's closer to \$200.00 and we moved from a residence three miles down the road and three times larger than the one we live in now, wherein we used about twice as much juice and we used to quarrel when the bill was over \$60.00.

The difference between now and then is that we used to be served by Kentucky Utilities. We have no choice now but to purchase our electricity from the Inter-County Electric Cooperative. Which means that someone in the household darned well better be cooperative if we expect the lights to come on. But let the record show that it ain't me.

Loretta is the member, representing our family, of this so-called cooperative and the bill comes in her name. She signs the check when the bill comes in. I don't want any part of the scheme because a friend of mine got in trouble with the mob in New York when he tried to start a competitive numbers racket. At least I assume he got in trouble. We haven't heard from him in about ten years and as I recollect, his business only lasted about three weeks.

In the meantime we have purchased a gas cook-stove and a gas clothes dryer because the "cooperative" wants us to cut down on our use of "energy." We dry all our clothes and do all our cooking for \$28.00 every two months or so by having Parson's Gas Company in Wildie,

drop off a tank now and then. We basically heat the house with a wood burning stove but we do have window air-conditioners. We also have a water heater that runs on electricity and a fridge and a freezer, and of course we play the television and burn the lights a lot more than we probably ought to.

We've even got a micro-wave. Dam, I wish they'd make one of those that runs on gas. When I look at the power bill I feel guilty because I love naked hot-dogs. But I figure it costs me at least a quarter to cook a Frankfurter that came out of the package worth less than a nickel. It's gotten to the point, if you get your power from the co-op, that you can't even eat without feeling guilty. And you're probably hell bound if ever you turn the heat up above freezing.

Of course that's assuming you believe everything they print in the Kentucky Living Magazine that comes "free" with your membership in the cooperative. The magazine is, of course, about as free as overpriced kilt-watt that goes through your meter.

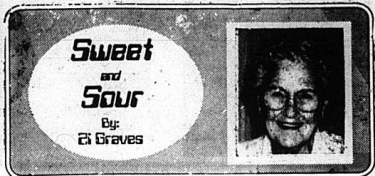
The same people at the electric cooperative who encourage you to save on your electric bill turn right around and advertise electric appliances on their behinds and ask you to go electric all the way when gas is remarkably cheaper. The fact of the matter is that your electric cooperative hopes you will use as much juice as you possibly can because that's the way they make money. They get big bucks from the government, on

the other hand, to encourage you to cut back. And they do a remarkable job at balancing one side of their face against the other.

What I'd really like to have is a choice in the matter. If the Inter-County Electric Cooperative really wants me to heat and cook and light with electric power, then I want them to know that I'd love to do just that. But I'd like to buy my power from Kentucky Utilities at a price I can

afford and I'd like to have my lights kept burning and my television kept on playing every time the wind blows real hard.

I'm tired of the hypocrisy and I'm looking for a new home and a place to build one with affordable electricity. I'd love to hear an explanation from some cooperative higher-upper that justifies the higher price we reluctant co-ops have to pay for power and the poorer service than our neighbors get from Kentucky Utilities.

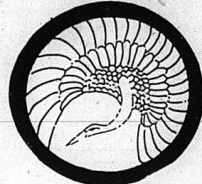
The voice said "John, watch the skies. Watch the skies, John."

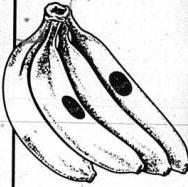

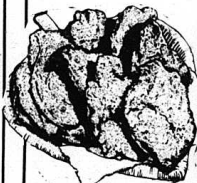

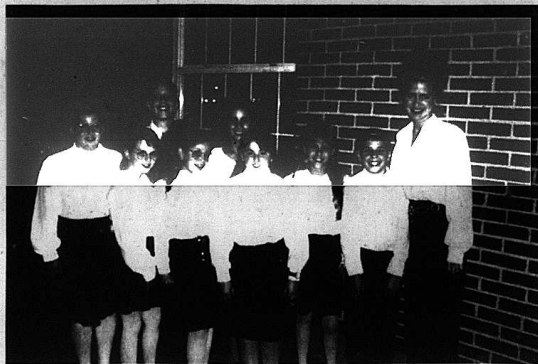

25, 1996 to complete those items. "It will not be any problem to get that done by then" he said.

The Governor told the group that he started pushing the project after a visit in Frankfort from William and Rena McClure and County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis.

"They stood in line up there and when they came in William was carrying a jug of dirty water, just to show me how bad it was," the Governor said. "He was trying to embarrass me," the Governor said as he laughed. "The goal for government should be to help people, and I decided to

help those folks. I decided this county needed this water project," the Governor said.

Traveling with the Governor on Tuesday was the federal director of the Appalachian Regional Commission, who praised Jones' efforts as well as those of U.S. Representative Harold Rogers, who has always been a strong supporter of ARC.

Besides a \$600,000 grant from ARC, which the Governor pledged earlier in the year, the funding will come from a grant of \$536,000 from the Rural Economic Community Development Administration, (formerly FHA), a \$300,000 loan from the same people and a local contribution of \$98,000. The \$98,000 will be paid by potential customers at \$300

each for initial hook-up to the water line.

Ballinger said that potential customers have no choice, but to pay the \$300 because it is part of the regulations involved in the funding package.

Construction of the water lines could begin as early as next fall. The minimum rate for new customers will be set at \$10 per month for the first 2,000 gallons of water used. The second 1,000 gallons of water will cost \$5.00 per month.

Association President Ballinger said he wanted to thank Doug Moore, the local representative for RECD, who Ballinger said, worked very hard to get this project approved.

County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis also said he wanted to thank Governor Jones for his efforts on the project, especially his doubling of the ARC grant, which was initially only \$300,000 until the governor stepped in and increased it.

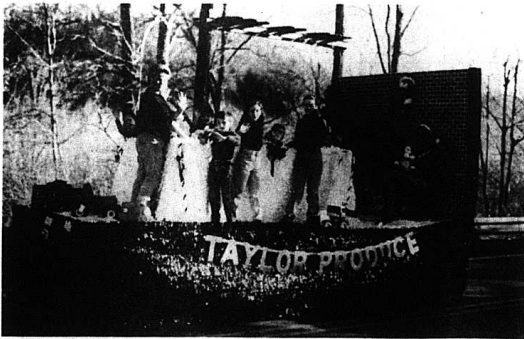

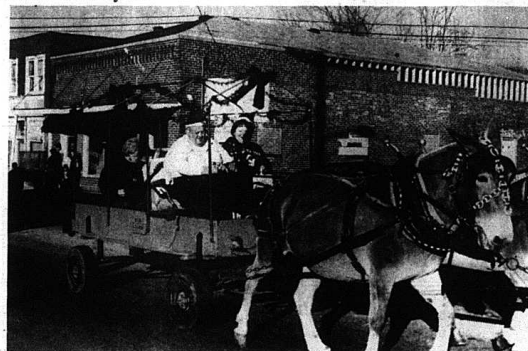

Unlike the varsity, the Jayvees were more successful from the free-throw line where they were 14 for 18.

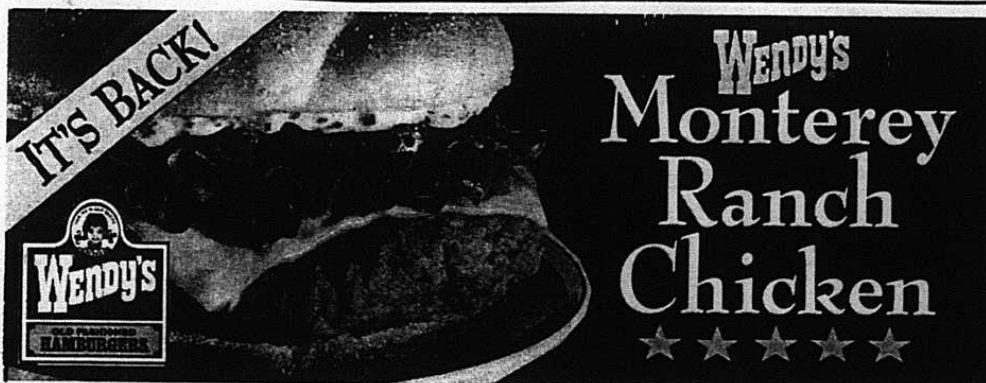
