

#### School bus misconduct prompt new regulations by school-based council

Recent incidents of misconduct
by Rockeastle Co. Middle School
students on buses have concept on the control of the cont

During the past few weeks middle school students have kicked windows out of buses, shot into a bus and been involved in more than one fight on

involved in most section buses.

According to the conduct policy any student who is referred to the principal's office at the middle school for a second offense on a school busing the section buses to a letter to parent warms. is subject to a letter to parent warn-ing of possible suspension of riding

privilege. Third offense could result in three

Third offense could result in three day of suspension of riding privilege and letter of warning of suspension for ten days.

Fourth offense involving a school bus will result in ten day suspension for ten days.

Fourth offense involving a school bus will result in ten day suspension of student from riding school bus and letter of warning of possible suspension of student for the up to one year.

Fighting on a school bus will result in a teventy day suspension for up to one year for additional problems.

Smoking on the bus will result in a twenty day suspension for up to a twenty day suspension for first offense and suspension for up to one year for additional problems.

Some offenses outlined in the conduct policy may be appealed to Rockcastle school transportation director David Perkins or Middle School Principal John Hale.

original, older than the Bible, sense of the word-not in today's corrupt use of the term as a synonym for that which is "untrue, false, and misleading." I can honestly say, "Yes!

A cast and crew of First Baptist folk staged Dischens' A Christmas Carol. Floyd Owens was Scrooge, and Virgil Stokes played Bob Cratchet. 





Nutrition education program helps Kentucky families in poverty

Families in poverty in 52 Kentucky counties are improving their diets and using their resources more efficiently as a result of the Expanded Food: and Nutrition Education Program. ERNEP Focusements executed indicates that children don't reach indicates that children don't reach their full potential if they are malnourished up to 3 or 4 years old.

Last year, EFNEP Assistants
Judy Hudson and Brenda Saylor
worked with 170 families in
Rockcastle County. They visit
homes to work with families, teach group classes in communities, and work with children through schools, 4-H clubs and summer

EFNEP Assistants give basic

lessons on dietary guidelines, primary putrients in food groups, mead planning, grocery shopping and stretching the food dollar, sanitation, and food storage, old-lessons deal with weight control, gardening, food preservation, nutrition during pregnancy, infant and young children nutrition, special diets, snacks and budgeting. Most EFNPE families graduate after one to one and a half years in the program.

Add mixtures together and mix well. Fold in nuts and raisins, and mix well.

If mixture is a bit dry, add a little more milk. Pour into well greased and sugared (mix cinnamon and sugar) loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour and 10 minutes or until done.








## Students landscape area at Rockcastle Middle School







#### **State Police encourages** safe holiday driving

Kentucky's highway fatality toll is still running far ahead of last year and the Kentucky State Police are are stressing motorists exercise caution this busy holiday season.

On December 13, 804 people had been killed on state roads this year. That's 53 more than on the same date last year and that, says commander of K5P Operations, Lt. Col. Roy, Stur. gill, calls for higher visibility of officers on the roads. "We've been high distaled sobriety checkpoints' during the first National Holiday Lifesaver Weekend." We're in the first major thrust of the "Get Stuppidl Get Busseld" campaign, which emphasizes driving sobr, driving the speed limit and buckling-up. We really hope these publicized enforcement campaigns will remind drivers of their responsibilities when they get behind the wheel."

Year's holiday periods last year, 16 people died in 13 vehicle crashes on Kenucky roads (five faatlities three crashes during Christmas; 11 fatalities in eight crashes during Christmas; 11 fatalities in eight crashes during Christmas; 13 fatalities in eight crashes during Christmas; one during New Year's). Motorists can help keep the roads safe not only by driving sober or

designating a sober driver, but by calling police at a toll-free number, 1-800-222-5555, when they spot a suspected drunken driver. Just stop somewhere you can call and give the dispatcher a description of the vehicle, where it was spotted and the direction headed, and a license number if possible. Callers can remain anonymous. anonymous.

During Christmas and New Year's

last year, nine (three during Christ-mas; six during New Year's) of the 16 killed were not wearing safety restraints and four were completely

or partially ejected from their vehicles. Buckling your safety belt and placing all young children in federally-approved child safety restrains are two of the best preventive measures you can take when out on the road—and both are enforced by law in Kentucky. Motorists can be fined up to \$50 if children, 40 inches and under, are not placed in a safety seat. The safety belt law, which is a secondary offense, carries a penalty of up to \$25 if a motorist is not buckled-up.

Drivers can also be cited if none of their passengers are wearing safety

Drivers can also be cited if none of their passengers are wearing safety restraints.

Lt. Col. Sturgill also reminds motorists to allow plenty of travel time to get where they're going so "they don't feel pressure to go over the speed limit" and make sure vehicles are in good running order for the winter months.
