RECC to raise rates during peak hours, lower them during off hours

It's not limbo, but a new optional residential rate could help Jackson County RECC members see how low they can go on their monthly electric bill.

The rate was recently approved by the state Public Service Commission and is the first rate of its kind offered by an electric utility in Kentucky. Called a time of day rate, it will help

members save money by adjusting when they use electricity.

It offers a lower rate for electricity used during off-peak hours, when demand for electricity is low.

Electricity used during off-peak time will be offered at 3.6 cents per kilowatt hour, as compared to the normal charge of 5.6 cents.

The rate is designed to help decrease energy usage during on-peak hours, when demand for electricity is higher. Decreasing on-peak demand will help Jackson County RECC keep electric rates lower in the future.

The time of day rate also calls for a higher charge for electricity used during on-peak hours. The charge for on-peak energy will be

8.0 cents per kilowatt hour under the time of day plan.

On-peak hours are from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. during May through September, and from 7 a.m. to 12 noon and 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. from October through April. Off-peak hours are from 10 p.m. to 10 a.m. during May

Cattle hotline to help farmers sell, trade

It isn't exactly the information superhighway, but for Kentucky cattle farmers, it's a new way to communicate.

The Harrison Beef Project, an alliance of the farmers, extension agents and state agricultural officials based in Cynthiana, has set up a telephone hotline for cattle farmers to use as a trading exchange. Farmers can call a toll-free number, (800)711-0465, and list cattle, hay or feed stuffs for sale, or they can hear what others have to sell.

"It's a new marketing vehicle for farmers to sell their livestock," said Ralph Quillin, a board member of the Harrison Beef Project. "It's probably the easiest technology we could offer the farmer."

Quillin hopes the initiative, called AgLink, helps farmers get better prices for their calves. Cattle prices plunged 30 percent in 1995, said Lee Meyer, an extension economist with the University of Kentucky. Steer calves sold for an average price of 60 cents a pound this year compared with 90 cents a pound two years ago.

"Everybody is going broke," Quillin said. "There's no use sugar-coating it."

Farmers traditionally sell calves to independent buyers or take them to stockyards to be sold. By using AgLink, farmers can sell directly to other neighboring farmers. This saves on transportation costs and also provides some quality assurance for buyers. Herds are often mixed in stockyards so buyers usually are unaware of the genetic background of calves, said John Stevenson, director of industry relations for the Kentucky Cattlemen's Association.

Quillin said calves might be worth at least an addition \$10 a head when their pedigrees are known. Buyers also appreciate knowing the calves are healthy or what he calls "farm fresh."

The hotline is set up like a voice-mail system. Farmers can access different mailboxes where they can list livestock or hear what's for sale.

Farmers must first register with AgLink and then will receive a personal identification number to access the system.

About 19 farmers have registered in the first month of operation, Quillin said.

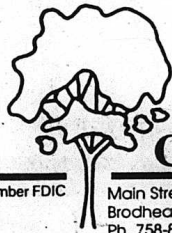

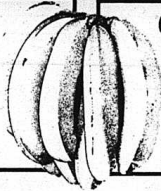

Kentucky Tech-Rockcastle County rewarded for performance

Kentucky TECH Rockcastle County is among 13 schools that will be rewarded for high performance through additional dollars.

State Representative Danny Ford learned today that the local school in his district will receive an additional \$11,135 under a new funding formula developed by the Department for Technical Education.

According to information furnished by the Workforce Development Cabinet, the money from the general fund was awarded to

schools based on factors such as the success rate of students completing training programs, job placement, and partnerships with businesses and industries. Employer ratings of job performance by Kentucky TECH graduates were also considered.

"I know this is exciting news for Kentucky TECH Rockcastle County administrators, staff and students," said Rep. Ford. "This additional money will help this facility with opportunities to continue to provide programs for a trained and skilled workforce."

through September, and 12 noon to 5 p.m. and 10 p.m. to 7 a.m. from October through April.

In addition to the per kilowatt hour charge, members will also be billed a monthly consumer charge of \$8.99.

"This new rate is one way Jackson County RECC is working to offer its members energy management options for their households," General Manager Doug Leary said.

The rate is similar to the one used by members who have elec-

tric thermal storage (ETS) heaters in their homes.

This rate won't save every member money. Leary added, but those who have flexible schedules or are willing to make adjustments to the times of day they use electricity can lower their electric bills.

For example, a family with someone home during the day who could do laundry and cooking during off-peak hours would see more savings than a family whose members worked during the day and could only do laundry and cooking during on-peak time.

Jackson County RECC members who choose the time of day, option must remain on the rate for

at least 12 months and other time of day rates are also available for commercial, small power and three-phase farm service.

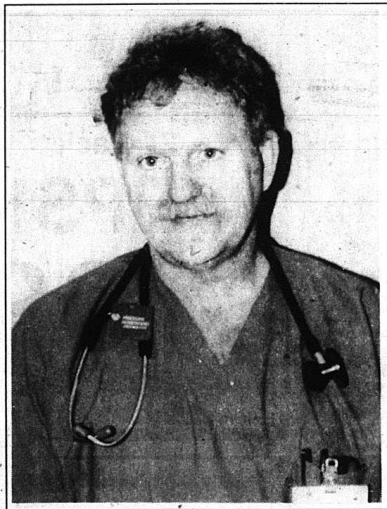

There are EEG (electroencephalograph) services for all ages. These tests allow a physician to detect any abnormalities in the brain waves. These tests are transmitted to Lexington where they are read by a neurologist.

Pulmonary Function testing is also available. This type of test helps determine if lung function is impaired and to what degree. Another use of these tests is to determine eligibility for Black Lung Benefits. You can also see the amount of improvement achieved after using a bronchodilator.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.

Thieves took nearly \$5,000 in tools from the First Christian Church construction site recently, according to police and others who investigated.

The tools were located at various areas at the site and most belonged to sub-contractors for the job.

Vincent C. Zitter, job superintendent for Harbour, Inc., general contractor for the project, lost about \$550 worth of tools, including drills, batteries, levels, hammers and extension cords.

Harbour, Inc. lost nearly \$1,000 in the form of a miter saw and 12 saw blades.

The church itself lost nearly \$1,000 in items which included an air compressor and a grinder.

Holman Heating, Plumbing and Air of Lexington lost a fiberglass ladder, valued at \$120.

Mike Cameron of Mt. Vernon was a big loser with over \$1,000 lost in items of all kinds used by construction crews.

City policeman Barry Adams investigated the burglary.

Grant for city

Mt. Vernon was notified Tuesday that the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) had approved a \$350,000 sewer grant for Mt. Vernon, according to Mayor Gary R. Cromer.

The project will take care of Jeri Lane, the new high school and industrial parks.

The ARC reported it had put the money into a reserve account for the city to use as needed.

The project is expected to be bid in early 1996 and completed by late summer.

Pre-construction conference for local industrial park II

A pre-construction conference was held Thursday between County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlifus and persons awarded bids on roads and water and sewer at Industrial Park II at Mt. Vernon (Henderson Bottoms).

Kinco of Mt. Vernon, Cleary Construction of Tompkinsville and Black Diamond of Somerset were the successful bidders on the project.

They have until April 1 to begin work on the project expected to cost \$421,614. The park is expected to be completed by the end of July.

B&H Tool and Dye of Richmond plan to start work on their building before the park is completed. The company has said they will start their workforce here with 35 employees.

Earlier bids on the project totaled \$589,979, and were too high. The project was then divided into separate projects which brought the cost

in line with Economic Development Agency estimates.

"When the \$421,000 price for the project was reached it was possible to continue," the judge said. "Also, it was all made possible when local contractors were sought to bid on it."

Library renovation to begin in January

Beginning in January 1996, the Rockcastle County Public Library will proceed with its long-awaited renovation and expansion plans. These plans were first developed in 1992 as part of a five-year, state-mandated process.

After looking at the Library survey for the Rockcastle County Public Library for 1992, the Library Board of Trustees recognized that the largest percentage of response (60%) were between 9 and 40 years of age.

Fifty percent of adult respondents completed high school and twenty-five percent have some college training. Therefore, the Library needs to focus on the pre-school through college population and support the educational process in this county as the major source of information. From this data, the Board recognizes the Library's mission as providing access to materials and services to help community residents obtain information which meets their educational, personal and professional needs. In addition to placing special emphasis on supporting students at all academic levels, emphasis is also given to leisure reading and personal information needs of county residents.

Over the past three years, the Library has increased materials by 5% yearly, hired one part-time worker and children's program Librarian, required each staff member to attend continuing education activities, weeded the

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EPOCH, greetings and year-end similitudes from The Meadows House first in the heart of Wabd County, home of the late Georg R. Steinmetter, who more than once said to his Sunday School class at the Blue Moon Baptist Church, "Men, there is a lot of history, that isn't fit to repeat itself, but it does."

Speaking of the past, I'm inclined to think that '95 was a fairly good year for Wabdomans, i.e., more good things took place than did bad ones. And I'm sure you will appreciate my using today's *Signal* space to remind you what *did* happen. Here are a few more notable events.

The Year that Was in Wabdl.

Mr. and Mrs. Whately Abshire attended the baptism of their third

grandson Being Baptist to the core, they didn't care too much for that church's mode of baptism, i.e., sprinkling. And being "closed communion" Baptists, they didn't partake of the "sacraments." Nonetheless, when they got home, the couple of deacons from Wabdl's Mercy Baptist Church, where the Abshires are members, were waiting on their porch to tell them that if they ever again attended "one of them then churches, they would be dismissed from Mercy's roll forthwith.

Wabdl's Hierarchical Association of Ministers (WIAM) disbanded in November, the reason being that Mulvoney's Methodist Chapel hired a woman as pastor. The male ministers weren't about to take part in anything that involved a "woman preacher." Consequently, the annual community-wide Thanksgiving service was cancelled.

Wabdl's Tourism Board, headed by yours truly, failed in its bid to buy Queen Elizabeth's royal yacht, *The Britannia*. Had the deal gone through, the vessel would have been set up somewhere near The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, if our magistrates ever make up their minds as to where to erect that tomb. (The ashes of the unknown taxpayer are temporarily housed in a back room of Cox's Hardware branch store in downtown Wabdl.)

Entrance was gained through a basement window. The Loom is located on U.S. 25 north, adjacent to Hardee's Restaurant.

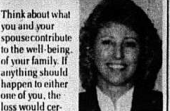

According to Mt. Vernon assistant fire chief Bud Cox, the mobile home also caught fire last week.

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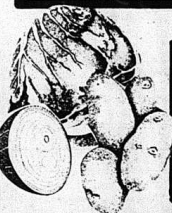

Being a long-distance parent

Grandparents are very important to their families. Even if you live miles away, you can be a source of comfort and stability to your grandchildren. Here are a few ways to spice up your relationship with grandchildren who live at a distance:

1. **Send Postcards and Letters.** Young children especially love colorful picture postcards. When you write letters, send pictures of yourself, your pets, scenes from a trip, or pictures of the child from a previous visit. You can also sprinkle your correspondence with trivia questions and riddles.

2. **Mail audio cassette tapes.** The children can play them over and over again and a taped "letter" is easier for a young child to understand than a written one. Young children can reply with their own tape. Ask the parents to interview the child on tape. The child might also play a piece recently mastered on a musical instrument.

3. **If you need to watch your budget, save your phone calls for special occasions.** Sometimes events that are occasional, rather than regular, take on special significance.

4. **Invite one grandchild to visit at a time.** This prevents sibling rivalry and will help assure a relaxed time for both of you. Limit the first visit to no more than a week, in case of homesickness. Before the visit, make some plans with the child, by letter or phone. Plan something special to do early in the visit: a trip to a museum, an amusement park, or a fishing spot.

5. **Take a trip together.** Go to a lake, a state park, historic places, or stay at a motel with a swimming pool. Be guided by the child's age and changing interests.

To be important to your grand child, you don't need everyday contact. You can maintain emotional contact from a distance. And when you're together, they thrive on the undivided attention you can give, the unconditional love that grandparents are so good at providing, and the opportunity to learn new things about this interesting world.

The Rockets next action will be the a tournament at Campbellsville where they will play Campbellville Thursday night at 7:30.

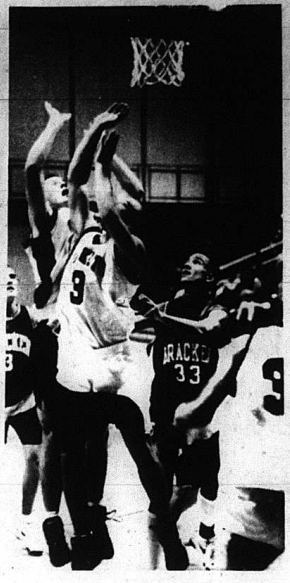
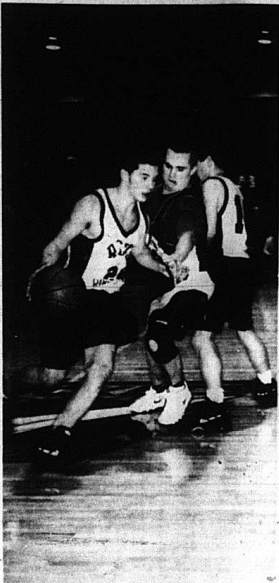
Rocket Jayvees lose second game of season to Bracken Co. 55-49

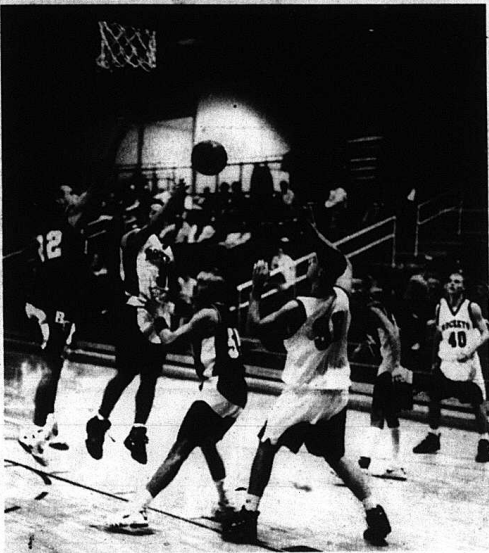

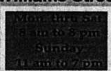

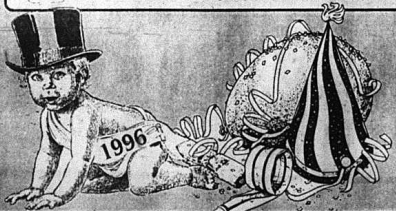
