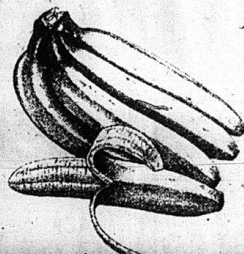

Storm dumps 20.5 inches of snow here

Snow storm lowers boom on county

The Blizzard of '96 rolled across Rockcastle Saturday and Sunday, dropping 20 and 1/2 inches of snow in its wake.

The snow cover prompted residents to stay at home. Those who chose to brave the chill sometimes got caught in a snow drift too deep to cope with.

On Red Hill, drifts were measured to six feet.

Red Hill wasn't the only location with problems. Broxhead and Livingston, and all the county, got its share. The low Sunday was 7 and the high was 18, depending on where you were. Those figures were recorded at Cox Funeral Home in Mt. Vernon. It was even lower Monday with a temperature of 4. Jacksonville, Fla. had a low of 0 on Monday. Cincinnati had a wind chill of -18.

If you were snowed in, just stay there or wait for help, you were told. Mt. Vernon has one truck with a snow blade.

Mayor Gary Cromer said Monday the truck personnel was working and they'll get "to you" when they can. Subdivision had to wait for snow plowing.

The mayor called off the January meeting of the council for a second time, saying they would get around to it (any business) in February.

Rockcastle County road crews worked from daybreak Saturday through Monday evening when fatigue took over.

Judge Carolotis said county crews helped clear state roads before they could be on the 500 miles of county roads with only four salt/snowplow trucks available.

"We've done everything possible to clear roads," the judge said. "We've had complaints, but residents do not realize roads covered up again after we went over them."

Gary Asher, director of disaster and emergency services and Judge Carolotis declared a state of emergency in the county Saturday and Judge Carolotis also ordered all vehicles, except those with four-wheel drive, to stay off the roads Monday.

On state roads, the judge said the county opened KY 1249 all the way, Chestnut Ridge state road two times, KY 490 from Livingston to Lamero and 10 miles of KY 1955.

County crews plowed Copper Creek Road two times and it was snowed over before it was completed.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court called off a Tuesday meeting.

At the height of the snow, motorists were coming off I-75 as it grew dark.

A shelter was opened on the third floor of the courthouse. They were later transferred to the middle schools as about 60 motorists sought a warm dry place to stay. The shelter was

operated by the local chapter of the American Red Cross.

But, as usual, county road crews did a stellar job. One daily commuter to Lexington said Monday that there was a world of difference when you left Rockcastle going into Madison County's share of the interstate. The commuter reported that the road crews even had the emergency lane clear in Rockcastle, not so in Madison.

At the Rockcastle Sheriff's department, only Deputy Karen Alcorn got to work Monday. Judge Executive Carolotis made it in but left later. Deputy Alcorn said she cleaned off her drive in Livingston three times and still couldn't get her car out. She said the department had no reports of serious wrecks, only "fender benders."

Eastern Kentucky bore the brunt of the storm. Two feet of snow was the norm.

Malls closed early in Lexington and weren't even open Sunday and those who hadn't stocked up earlier packed grocery stores. Churches throughout the county and state cancelled Sunday services, businesses were closed, including Rockcastle Manufacturing which was still closed Wednesday. Banks in the county opened for three hours Monday. Very little, except emergency agencies, was open with the fire department and police transporting medical and other supplies.

The most snowfall ever recorded in the area for a 24 hour period, was 19.8 inches in March, 1993. National Guard Troops were called in along the east coast to snow piled up Monday.

It was a lot like January, 1994 when a blizzard buried Kentucky deep in snow and ice and forced Gov. Brereton Jones to close the interstates, including I-75.

Whitley County Judge Executive declared an emergency and asked the National Guard for help in transporting employees to the Corbin Medical Center.

Local officials in Laurel County asked the National Guard to open its armory to motorists stranded on I-75.

Some areas in Bell County and Harlan just gave up when snow piled up in valleys. "We'll get out in July," one resident said.

Some cities and their snow totals were: Roanoke, Va., 22 inches; Washington, D.C., 23 inches; Cincinnati, 12; Dayton, 14 and Indianapolis, 12.

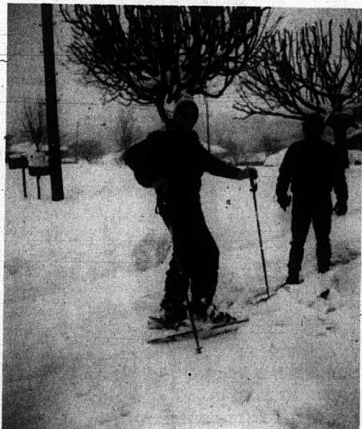

Redistricting bill drawn

The General Assembly of Kentucky has been at it again, trying to find a redistricting bill that will pass the courts.

It will be the third bill to be passed by the Kentucky House of Representatives and one that could be brought out again.

House and Senatemenbers are expected to approve new Senate and house boundaries some time this week.

The House plan still splits 22 counties, down from 48, and the Senate splits three counties, down from 19 in the last plan.

The Kentucky Supreme Court threw out the 1991 plan because the boundaries divided too many counties.

State Rep. Danny Ford, Republi-

can from Mt. Vernon, said "We're very disappointed the majority party would further use its power to destroy the two-party system by redistricting in such a way as to eliminate Republican seats."

But, Ford had barely glimpsed the final plan and was surprised at its early release.

"Most of the same -- the people's business done behind closed doors," Ford said.

The plan has five districts where incumbents, two Democrats, would have to run against each other. Three districts would have two Republicans each, and two districts would have a Democrat and a Republican.

The plan also would create five districts where no incumbent resides.

The new plan is on the fast track. "We're going to pass that in five days and hopefully the governor will sign it that day," said House Speaker Jody Richards, Democrat of Bowling Green.

Under the new plan, Republican Ford will only run in Rockcastle and Lincoln counties. It takes him out of McCreary County and puts McCreary in with Wayne and parts of Pulaski.

The largest parts of Laurel and Pulaski Counties will comprise the 85th district, but both counties are each split into five districts.

In the Senate redistricting Rock-

castle, Jackson, Laurel and Knox would make up the 21st Senatorial District. Lincoln, Garrard and Madison would be in the 34th district.

Police close to arrest in fatal shooting

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffrey Burdette said this week, that state police were close to making an arrest in connection with the shooting death of a Maretburg man on New Year's Day.

In short, to win a spot in the legislature this year, you will probably have to knock off the person holding the job. Most lawmakers plan to seek reelection.

Burdette said that police have one prime suspect and are close to charging him with murder.

Setting it straight

A check of police in Mt. Vernon a second time showed Randy Graves did not, "Shoo" police away when they came to his home to take him into custody for parole violation.

It was some else who police said stood in the street and waved his arms.

Graves is in the county jail awaiting a hearing, probably Friday.

Also Timothy Carpenter and Satacia Vance were reported hurt in an accident in last week's Signal when they were actually uninjured.

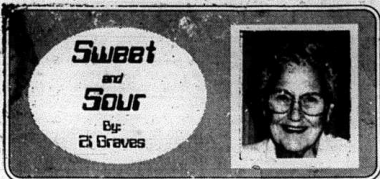

A cheery good morning to you all. A couple of birds streaking beneath a cloud, the sun trying to peek through the clouds by shining down on the snow and bringing out the sparkle of diamonds that seem to have been scattered over the surface, icicles hanging down from the eaves of the garage, and a lone man walking down the street is a beautiful sight to one who loves such scenes.

Since there is nothing to talk about but what one sees on the T.V.—crime, scuttlebutt, crooked politicians and the snow, I will settle for the snow. That is much more to my liking for it is at least clean looking and covers the dirt beneath for a time.

Listening to the radio and watching the snow news on T.V. telling everyone to stay off the highways brings back memories of days when snow was the normal weather pattern for winter, especially during the months of December through February and one wasn't expected to stay inside and miss work or school. But that was the days before school buses and crowded highways, snow plows and tons of salt used on the roads. Those were the days when kids walked to school and had to dress for the occasion. Wearing sturdy shoes covered by overshoes or galoshes, a sweater under a heavy coat, gloves covering the hands, a heavy scarf wrapped around the throat and a big knit cap pulled down over the ears and that kid was ready for any and all kinds of weather. The walk to school or the store was only a frolic and a chance to play in the snow. Sometimes drifts were hard to get through and would make them late for school but they usually managed. There was one place on the road, between our home and the one room school our kids attended that was a natural for snow drifts and often they would have to wade through it waist deep. Their walk to school was a little short of two miles and walking about midway so one half of their walk was

done with snow clinging to their clothes from the waist down. But when they arrived at the school house a big fire would be going in the pot-bellied stove and when they got home the same thing with usually a pot of hot cocoa or some other drink waiting for them. One of their favorite drinks was hot jello. I bet they don't remember that.

Those were the days when the snow was clean enough to make snow cream which was a special winter treat. A big bowl of freshly fallen snow with a generous amount of fresh cream skimmed from the top of milk, sugar and flavoring of your choice made one of the very best treats possible. We preferred it to ice cream. And a big icicle hanging from the eaves was licked like a stick of candy. There were snow people in our front yard, and angels, made by one lying down flat on his/her back and moving their arms up and down, guarded the space between them. When we ran out of popcorn we made parched corn and liked it just as well and perhaps someone like a wee bit better than the old standby, popcorn. First the heat better and when ones pockets were filled with it before going out for a sled ride it kept them warm. A couple ears of old fashioned field corn would be shelled, the trash blown away as it was carefully poured from hand to hand and the faulty grains thrown away, then dumped into a big iron skillet, about half full, that had been heating on the "cookstove", then shaken or stirred until it was a swollen, golden brown, sometimes almost cracked open like popcorn, a treat fit for the most fastidious eater of snacks.

Now for sure everything wasn't fun for there were duties to be performed that weren't easy to do in a land covered by snow and sometimes ice. Animals had to be fed, wood and coal brought in for the fires, and water carried from the spring. That little spring was one of the prettiest

scenes around when snow covered the hillside and everything else but the small hole of dark water that showed between the fringe of thin ice that covered the edges. The water had to be dipped out one dipper full at a time and usually two big buckets had to be filled. It was really easier to carry two than one, they balanced you as you climbed back up the narrow path to the house. Getting wood was messy and sometimes we would have to get the old crosscut saw out and go to the woods for a fresh supply. Yes, I also learned how to use a crosscut saw and swing my weight with it anytime. There is a rhythm to using one that everyone can't learn but I had good teachers, necessity and I had. There were plenty more hardships such as cold floors and

water buckets frozen over when one got up in the morning. I can still almost hear a Mat shaking the ashes down in the big heating stove and readying the cook stove for a fire in the wee small hours of morning. But all the heat he could coax out of that big stove could not warm the floors. I always had cold feet. Since there was no warm bathroom to go to in the morning the path to that cold little building out back had to be used and there was no lingering while one read the morning paper there.

Does all this sound romantic? Not to me, for I was I who experienced the hardships then and am now enjoying the results of progress, warm house, bathroom, roads being cleared by machinery, and no carrying of water from the spring or carrying out the ashes.

But, beloved, we can hope that in trying to control our predilection to "make-believe" we will let a little light into the closets of our souls — and into this wonderful and terrible thing called "life."

Tips to Help Remove Stickers and Labels

Removing stickers and labels from holiday gifts or household items can be a frustrating experience. It's often a matter of trial and error as you try different procedures and count to ten a time or two.

Avoid strong abrasives or solutions that might be harmful. First try an inconspicuous spot to be sure you won't soften, scratch or discolor the gift or household item.

These suggestions might help you remove stickers applied with pressure-sensitive adhesive.

You can remove stickers or labels with pressure-sensitive adhesive simply by peeling them off. Then rub off the remaining adhesive with your fingers — much the same way you "thumb-roll" rubber cement into small pieces.

Another way to remove pressure-sensitive adhesive is with a solution of warm water, liquid dishwashing detergent and vinegar or ammonia. Other substances to remove the adhesive include oil, fingernail polish remover and acetone.

Depending on the surface, you

might be able to remove adhesive by using a commercial pre-wash spot remover. Apply a generous amount, try to get it under the adhesive film.

Cleaning fluid will remove some adhesives. However, it can soften some plastics if left on the surface for an extended period of time. Saturate a folded cloth or paper towel with cleaning fluid and put it over the label or sticker. Leave for several minutes. When the adhesive softens, rub with the cloth or paper towel until all traces are removed.

To remove stickers or labels applied with water-soluble glue, wet several layers of white paper towels with warm water and apply over the label until it loosens and can be removed. While this warm-water soaking method usually removes water-soluble glue, it can make pressure-sensitive adhesives more difficult to remove.

Purple price marks are easy to remove from kitchen countertops. Dampen a cloth with a solution of half chlorine bleach and half water and rub the surface.

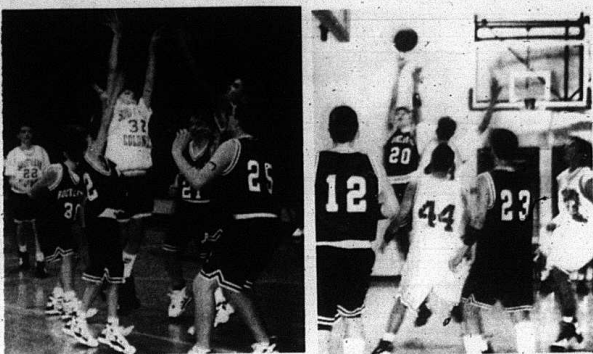

1995: full of good news for many, bad for some

For many Rockcastle countians, 1995 was an eventful, joyful year, for others it was filled with tragedy and sorrow.

January

In January, State Representative **Amny Ford** was elected minority leader of the Ky. House of Representatives and Dr. G.W. Griffith and Dwight Griffin were sworn-in as members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

The Daniel Boone Development Council indicated they wanted to buy the former Livingston School property and the school board gave them an option. However, Daniel Boone still has not purchased the property although they are apparently still interested. If they do get the property, they reportedly intend to construct assisted-living units for the elderly.

Also in January, the fiscal court discussed home incarceration for juvenile offenders with County Attorney **Jeff Burdette** and **Timothy Couch**, 30, of Bear Branch, died in an accident on Hwy. 461.

Warden Alexander was named head of the consolidated Farm Service Agency, replacing **Harold Ballinger** and **Jimmy Lee Mason** walked away from the Rockcastle County Jail.

Rockcastle Judge Executive told the Rockcastle County Water Association that Governor Jones was supporting a water project that would provide water to over 300 more Rockcastle families and the fiscal court began a futile attempt to regular cable television.

Another inmate walked away from the county jail and **Dallas Graves** and **Mt. Vernon** met famous astronaut **Dr. Story Musgrave**.

Judge **Carloftis** said in January that the county could not pay the utility bills at a new senior citizens center and **Margaret Offutt** and **Cleith Thacker** filed as candidates for Rockcastle County Property Valuation Administrator.

Farmers learned they had to buy insurance on their tobacco crop and officials began talking about 911 for the county.

February

In February, icy roads were to blame for the death of **Penny Lovell** and **Doug Bullock** and **Billy Reynolds** joined the race for county P.V.A.

Heather Deckard was crowned basketball homecoming queen at RCHS and former Rockcastle County Judge Executive **Roland Mullins** took physical issue with current Judge **Buzz Carloftis**.

Armed robbers hit **Saylor's Pharmacy** and test scores from the Rockcastle County school district were good, except at RCHS where they were lower.

Parents voiced concern about the RCHS boy's basketball program and local attorney **John Clontz** was fired as Mt. Vernon City Attorney. **Lloyd Cain** was appointed to the Mt. Vernon council.

Margaret Offutt was appointed Rockcastle P.V.A. by Governor Jones and Brodhead sewer rates increased by \$6.61 a month.

Roland Mullins learned no charges would be filed against him over the incident with Judge **Carloftis** and **Paul V. Gayheart** was charged with killing **Clayton Frith** of Copper Creek.

The **Cash and Carry Grocery Store** in Livingston was destroyed when a wall fell in and bids for a major renovation project for Northern Rockcastle Water Association were approved.

Former Rockcastle County Attorney **James H. Lambert** filed as a candidate for state treasurer.

March

In March: **Tracy Dauidl**, 22, of Orlando was shot to death, allegedly by her boyfriend **Dean Kirby**, and Rockcastle Circuit Judge **Dan Venner** revoked the bond of **Charlotte McClure** of Brodhead after she charged her guilty plea. McClure was returned to jail. She and her boyfriend, **Allen Charles**, also of Brodhead, were charged with sexual exploitation of minor children in 1994.

The RCHS boys and girls finished dismal seasons when they both lost to Clay County in the first round of district basketball action.

The Rockcastle Middle School Math Counts team advanced to state competition and **Debra Lambert** was hired as the new Mt. Vernon City Attorney.

Bridgette Lear, a MVES fourth grader, friends and family were the guests of U.K. Coach **Rick Pitino** at the U.K.-Florida game because **Bridgette** raised the most money in the state for **Earl** seats during a basketball shoot-out.

Both squads of the RCHS cheerleaders won the district championship and accused killer **Junie Kirby** was released on bond.

Bill Belcher of Richmond, a guidance counselor with the Christian Appalachian Project, was indicted for practicing law without a license. **Belcher** was accused of helping to cause **Charlotte McClure** to change her guilty plea in her sex abuse case. Three people were indicted for promoting gambling at **Derby City South Truck Stop** and **Amberty Renner**, 4, of Mt. Vernon found out she would travel to New York for talent interviews.

Ky. Gov. **Bretton Jones** announced that Rockcastle County and the City of Mt. Vernon would receive \$950,000 in funds from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

The Jackson Co. Fiscal Court passed an insurance tax, which enabled them to pay the Rockcastle Fiscal Court a large sum of delinquent charges for keeping prisoners and the local McDonald's Restaurant was sued over too hot coffee.

Local 4-H'ers, **John Dyehouse**, **Martha Hayes**, **Melissa Hayes**, **Donovan Adams**, **Jeremie Reynolds** and **Brad Speaks** won a statewide competition.

Republican **Larry Forgy** brought his campaign to the county and **David Sowder** was hired as the new dog warden for the county.

April

In April: one of the most tragic events of the year struck a Rockcastle County family living in Pulaski County.

Three members of a local family were found dead in a barned home in Pulaski County. Several days later, **Gary McKinney** was charged with killing his wife, **Shirley Faye Bowles** and her two children, **Brian Lee**, 11 and **Amy Michelle**, 3 before burning their bodies in the home.

Many Rockcastle County teachers shared \$256,578 in reward money from the state for improved test scores and Lincoln Federal Savings and Loan opened a new office in the county.

The second week in April, two people, one two-year-old from **Stanford**, drowned in **Lake Linville**.

Jessica Saylor, 2 and **Roman Dale Brummett**, 23, drowned after a 1993 Datsun, driven by **Shane Burke**, plunged into the lake. **Burke** was later charged with manslaughter.

Betty Lewis was honored for her work with children and the Rockcastle County Kiwanis Club sponsored a fashion show.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education gave then superintendent **Bige Towery** a new four-year contract and the first of nine dry fire hydrants was installed at **Lake Linville**. The other hydrants were installed in farm ponds throughout the county.

Jeremiah Taylor and **Melissa Gaykins** were selected as Governor's Scholars and 230 children hunted for Easter eggs at **Renfro Valley**.

Rockcastle County school bus drivers told the board of education they needed more pay and **Kelli M. Lovell** of Livingston, a third grade student, attended the annual **Easter Egg Hunt** at the White House.

Daniel P. Owens testified that **Gary McKinney** told him he killed his family and **Junie Kirby** was indicted for killing **Tracy Cauidl** in March.

203 people attended the annual **Brodhead High School Alumni Reunion** in April and Judge **Buzz Carloftis** threw out the first pitch to open the **Little League** season in the county.

A Rockcastle County jury took only 15 minutes to acquit **Clarence Kirby** of carrying a concealed weapon. A false arrest suit, in connection with the case, was filed in federal court.

May

In May: The Rockcastle County

Kiwanis Club began taking donations for victims of the bombing of the federal building in **Oklahoma City** and vandals wrecked tombstones at **Elmwood Cemetery** in Mt. Vernon.

Louie Rayburn, 37, of Mt. Vernon, was found shot to death near **Fletcher's Cave** and 20 year classified employees of the board of education got an 11.6% raise.

The **Lady Rockets** won the district title in softball and later advanced to the state. **Dale Payne** was charged with killing **Louie Rayburn** and **Creshaven Memorial Gardens** opened in Mt. Vernon.

The RCHS baseball team advanced to the district finals and **Margaret Offutt** won the race for P.V.A.

Rockcastle County Schools superintendent **Bige Towery, Jr.**, announced his retirement and **J.B. Alexander** was shot to death near

Crooked Creek.

The **Rockets** baseball team was knocked out of the regional tournament by **Cumberland** and the **Lady Rockets** were eliminated from fast-pitch regional competition by **Middeboro**.

After 54 years, **Charles and Patsy Fletcher** closed their store in **Brodhead** and the annual **Brodhead Homecoming** was held during **Memorial Day** weekend.

After about six years, the **United States Court of Appeals** ruled in the favor of **Gibson Greeting Co.** The company had fired 240 striking workers in 1989.

Rebekah L. Blanton was named **Salutatorian** and **Rebecca F. Blanton** was **Valedictorian** of the class of 1995 at RCHS.

E.J. Smith retired from the Rockcastle County School System after 41 years.

June

In June: The **Rockcastle Lady Rockets** won the slow-pitch regional championship on **June 3** and **Tinsley Robinson** was reported missing on **May 31**.

A group of former U.K. basketball players pummeled a local team of players at RCHS and the **Kiwanis Club** raised over \$4,000 to send to victim's families in **Oklahoma**.

Harvey McFerron celebrated his 100th birthday and **Proctor and Gamble** company became upset when a letter to the editor appeared in the **Signal** stating they were associated with satanic worship.

Tinsley Robinson, 46, was found dead after an apparent heart attack, in **Cave Hollow** and **Michael D. Hamilton** graduated from the **University of Kentucky Medical School**.

Ralph Baker, a teacher at **Harry Sparks Vocational School**, was named **Technical Education Teacher of the Year** and the **Rockcastle County Fiscal Court** delayed action on 911 again.

The **Lady Rockets** were knocked out of the state tournament and former **Rockcastle School Superintendent** **Neureul Miracle** died at age 86.

Alice Hamm and **Zella Stencil** celebrated their 100th birthdays and the **Rockcastle school system** found out they would receive \$250,000 as their share from a settlement by milk companies who confessed to a price-fixing scheme.

25 people applied for the top job - **Rockcastle County Schools Superintendent** - and **Larry Hammond** was eventually hired to replace **Bige Towery, Jr.**

And NAPA Auto Parts and Rockcastle Hospital and speech department. My little girl was loved dearly there. God bless you all and Mt. Vernon Elementary School where little Kellie attended. We love you all. My

wife was killed in a terrible accident January 29, 1995 at 10 p.m., 1 1/2 miles south of Livingston on US 25. She had been to London to pick up our daughter-in-law from work at Bonanza and was heading home. A

cardriven by a girl were her little four-year-old son in it, was heading south on 25 in the northbound lane. My wife was coming north and the girl ran headon into my wife killing her instantly. The Rockcastle Sheriff

Department and Kentucky State Police worked the accident. I asked them if the girl was drinking or on drugs and all they said was she didn't appear to be. They didn't see any beer cans and they didn't do any tests on her. They said they couldn't figure out why the girl was driving on my wife's side of the road. Little Kellie hugged and kissed her mom goodbye when she left that night. I put her to bed and was waiting on my wife and mother of our little girl which has really suffered over losing her mommy. We had Farm Bureau Insurance. I went and made a report to them and the agent said, "We will pay you for your car in 2 or 3 days." He said, "Go over to Berea to Little Rent A Car and they will have a vehicle waiting for you." So I picked up the car and Farm Bureau kept avoiding paying for my car. I went to Jeff Burdette and he couldn't get anything from Farm Bureau, they kept stalling. Jeff would call then about the rental car and they would say, "Tell him to keep the rental." But then, after two months, they paid for my car and I returned the rental the same day, then Farm Bureau only paid part of the rental. Little Car Rental sued me for over \$700 and that really hurt me and little Kellie. Kellie and I moved to Marion Ark.

There was just too much hurt here.

But I would also like to thank Cox Funeral Home for everything they did. Buddy Cox did everything to make us feel better. My wife was laid out beautifully. God bless you all. We love you all.

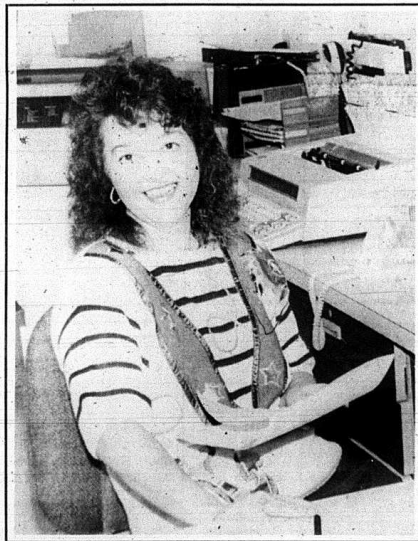

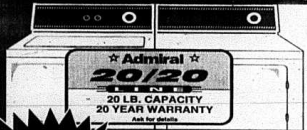

1996, in the County Extension Office. Voter registration and voting will take place on the same day, except for absentee registration and voting. Absentee registration and voting forms are available, upon written request, either by mail or in-person January 16-January 26 for the County CES Office. 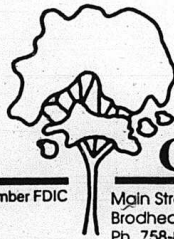

Pesticide card meeting

Farmers who purchase and apply restricted-use pesticides are required to keep their certification up-to-date. To do so requires farmers to attend one update training every 5 years. Farmers may check to see if their card is about to expire by checking the last two numbers in the serial number. The last two numbers are the year in which the card expires (on December 31st). Any card with 95 (or below) as the last two digits will need to be updated before purchases can be made.

On Thursday, January 18th at 7:00 p.m. in the Agriculture Service Center, Richmond Street, Mt. Vernon, farmers may attend a training session to qualify for a new card. We encourage tobacco farmers who plan to purchase methyl bromide in early spring to attend this session. The Department of Agriculture in Frankfort issues the cards, and long delays have been common in the past. For that reason, we encourage early attendance.

"It is Written"

In Ac. 16:30, we read of the Phillipian Jailer, a lost man, asking "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" The response came from two preachers of the gospel, who said, "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house."

Now a lot of people want to stop right here, close their Bibles, and say, "Now all you have to do to be saved is believe in the Lord Jesus Christ, and that's it!" Yet if we stopped at vs. 31, that verse says nothing about the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus. Must one believe in the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus in order to be saved? Are not these facts essential to understanding and belief? Yes, verily, Rm. 10:9-16, 1 Cor. 15: 1-4 shows that all of Christianity rests upon these fundamental facts and that they must be understood and believed.

So, we must go back to Ac. 16 and read a little further. In vs. 32, we continue, "And they spake unto him the word of the Lord, and to all that were in his house." We must learn of Jesus in order to come unto him, Mt. 11:28-30, Jn. 6:44-45. Paul and Silas spoke the word of the Lord to them, telling the jailer and his family both what to believe, and what to do in order to please God and find salvation. In vs. 33, we read, "And he took them the same hour of the night, and washed their stripes; and was baptized, he and all his straightway." The washing of their stripes is evidence of Repentance. They were baptized the same hour of the night. How did they know anything about baptism or repentance Verse 32 said they spake the word of the Lord to them, that's how they knew. Why didn't they wait one, two, three or more weeks to baptize them as the sects and denominations do today? Because baptism is one of the conditions of salvation. Mt. 28:18-20, Mk. 16: 15-16, Act. 2:38; and this man wanted to be saved, vs. 30. That's why the jailer and his family were baptized the "Same hour of the night."

Friends, if you have followed the doctrines of men when it comes to the plan of salvation, why not repent and turn to the Lord's plan of salvation. It's the only one that can save you in the end.
