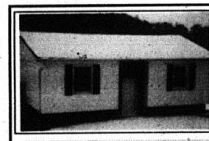

Court closing of county road upsets resident

Internet technology will benefit students

Rockcastle County Schools are fast moving into the 21st century, especially in the field of computer technology.

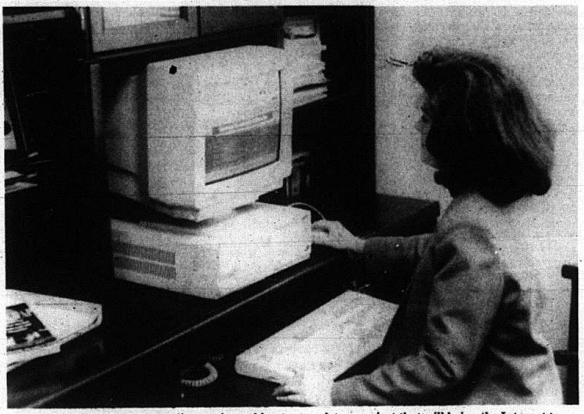
Kelli Pensol, technology coordinator for the district, said this week that each school in the county will soon have access to the vast information available on the Internet.

"We are very excited about this new service to the students. This will give them the ability to find more information than ever before right in their own school," Mrs. Pensol said.

While all 176 school districts in Kentucky now have access at the district level to the Internet, Rockcastle County Schools was the first in the Region 6 Service Center area to implement a wide area network of this type.

Rockcastle County received their connection in late April 1995 and began planning immediately to take advantage of this "free Internet connection" and give access to the schools and the vocational school. All five schools committed to the time line purchase of equipment to have Internet and electronic mail access at their location and, at this time, all schools have access except Roundstone where phone lines had to be upgraded by GTE. Teachers are now in the process of being trained in the Internet's use and parent/teacher forms are being obtained.

Costs for the date line installed to the district is being paid directly by

the Education Technology Trust Fund, therefore, the district does not incur any cost for these lines. The only on-going expenses is the cost of a leased 56K line from the school to the central office. All leased lines were under \$100 per month and some were as low as \$33. This allows several stations at one time to be connected and there are no long distance phone bills no matter how long the student/teacher is connected. Internet use by students will be for the purpose of furthering educational goals. It opens vast resources for students such as making contact with weather stations, newsrooms,

hospitals, libraries and even some levels of government. Students can "visit" college libraries, corporate libraries and scientific libraries all over the world. They can sign the White House guest book and leave a message for the President, take a virtual tour of the Louvre in Paris and visit universities and sites all around the globe.

Along with the wonderful resources available, there are also drawbacks. The state level Internet provider has turned off a number of sites, but there still might be access to offensive material. However, a student will not "accidentally" access inap-

propriate material on the Internet. Internet access will be loaded only on designated machines in the school and use will be supervised by staff. The Rockcastle Board of Education has adopted a policy concerning network use and any student who wishes to access the Internet must have a signed release form which sets out the rules and regulations. These forms will be sent home this year by each school when that school is ready to allow student access and thereafter, requirements and restrictions will be included in the Student Code of Conduct handbooks.

Jail fund hit hard by women/juvenile inmates and medical bills

A Rockcastle County woman accused Rockcastle County Judge Buzz Carlotis and County Attorney Jeff Burdette of lying to her, about the fate of a county road.

Trish Bullock made the remarks at Tuesday's meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court a few minutes after the court voted to close the Eagle Creek Road in the Pongo area of the county.

The court was basically following a ruling in Rockcastle Circuit Court on December 5th that closed the road and followed the settlement of a lawsuit between land owners in the area.

Both Carlotis and Burdette took exception to Mrs. Bullock's statement and said they had never lied to her about the fate of the road.

In September of 1993 landowner Bobby Burdine, sued landowners Ronald Mink and other members of his family because they said the closing of the road had locked them. However the road actually had not been used since 1942 and, in 1982, Ikert & Bandy Coal Company built a silt pond in the middle of the road making it impassable.

Mrs. Bullock told both Burdette and Carlotis they had lied to her while they were campaigning for office.

Carlotis said that there certainly could have been a misunderstanding, but that he had to do what was best for the entire county and not just a few people. Carlotis also said it would not be feasible to keep the road open since it would cost about \$1,000,000 to move the silt pond and rebuild the road.

Burdette said he had told Bullock that he wasn't in favor of closing county roads, but that he nevertheless signed the closing of the road and he certainly never lied.

Mrs. Bullock later told Carlotis and Burdette the word "lied" may have been too harsh, but that she had

been under the impression the two would try to keep the road open.

The fiscal court also discussed the mounting jail bills with County Treasurer Joe Clontz.

Clontz told the court that it was becoming increasingly difficult to pay bills to house juvenile and women prisoners. Clontz also said that medical bills for prisoners continue to take their toll on the jail budget.

The magistrates and judge agreed that more dialogue should take place between the jailer and medical support people when it comes to prisoners.

Magistrate Bill McKinney went as far as to suggest that Howard not take in a prisoner that he knows is sick or has a pre-existing illness. "The county can't afford to keep these people up to the police arrest off the interstate, it shouldn't be our responsibility," he said.

Carlotis said that he had requested the history of the some of the patients that had been treated so the county would know exactly what they were paying for.

Female claims for juvenile and inmate detention at other facilities and medical bills totaled \$6,952.58.

In other business, the court voted to pay a bill from Mt. Vernon Precast for work at Copper Creek during the last month. The court voted today \$28,757 of the bill out of the Federal Emergency Assistance Fund and repay it to fund at a later date. The entire project at Copper Creek will cost approximately \$104,748.

RCHS has been selected as one of fifty-one schools in the United States, one in each state and the District of Columbia, to host a Horatio Alger Youth Seminar. The seminar will be held on March 12 with the award presentation at 8:30.

William E. Bailey, CEO Direct Account Marketing, Inc., will address the student assembly on the ideals of personal success, bringing the message of opportunity to our nation's young people. He will also meet with groups of students to share experiences, exchange ideas, and to offer encouragement.

As a highlight of this day, Mr. Bailey will present two Horatio Alger Scholarship Awards, each of \$5,000, to two outstanding students who have demonstrated self-reliance, individual initiative and integrity, leadership in school activities, academic achievement, and a commitment to public service. The scholarships are applied toward tuition costs and college expenses. The students who will receive the awards, Marcia Coffey and Jessica Albright, will travel to Washington D.C., during April to participate in the National Scholars Conference. The Conference will focus on America's free enterprise system and civic education. Students will meet with association members and will attend the

annual awards ceremonies.

Whitaker also told the board that a financial aid seminar for parents and students has been scheduled for March 19.

Whitaker said the seminar would focus on the financial aid that is available to students from all economic situations. The counselor said he would publish more information about the seminar in the coming weeks.

Other guests at the meeting included Dreama Gentry, coordinator of the LIIFT project at RCHS.

The high school and Berea College are working on the project together which will run for three years. The main goal of LIIFT is to encourage students to attend college and to get them thinking about college early in their high school years so they can be more prepared.

Harry Sparks Vocational seniors Rachel Hamm and Brian Brown also gave a short presentation to the board about the recently integrated class at HVS.

Brown and Hamm explained to the board how the welding class and computer class at the school combined to expand their knowledge of each others craft. Teacher Ralph Baker, who headed the integrated class project was also on hand.

In other business, the board approved G.E.D. certificates for Maisha J. Harris and Kimberly A. Sandlin.

Eighteen school days missed to date; year extended to June 5

It is probably a good thing that all Rockcastle County schools are now equipped with air conditioning because unless this winter's weather pattern changes for the better very soon, students will be going to school well into June.

After Tuesday's snow day, the eighteenth of the year, Rockcastle students will now have to go to school until at least June 5. That is of course, if they do not miss any more days which is highly unlikely.

Rockcastle County students have already had as many unscheduled vacations this year as they did last year when school was cancelled 18 times.

The 1994-95 school year ended on June 7. Rockcastle County School Calendar Chairman Loretta Powell said Tuesday that no discussions have been made as to any drastic moves to make up the missed days. "We are currently just adding them on at the end of the school year," she said.

To date students have missed 17 days out of a possible 30 since Christmas break. They missed only one day in December.

If students get back in school this week, they will have another scheduled day off on February 19 for Presidents' Day. Spring break has been cut down to two days, April 11 and 12, which is actually being taken off for Kentucky Education Association meetings.

The only other scheduled days off in the calendar are Memorial Day Monday May 27 and primary election day, Tuesday, May 28.

None for murder

Grand Jury returns eleven indictments

A Mt. Vernon woman was indicted Friday by Rockcastle County Grand Jury in connection with a December 1995 incident at Ramsey Trailer Park.

According to the indictment released Tuesday, Lydia Darlene Blackburn, 24, of 205 Davis Street, is charged with assaulting two of her neighbors, Angela Rountree and Jessica Rountree.

According to a report filed by Mt. Vernon police officer Barry Adams, Blackburn allegedly shot one of the girls in the eye with a pellet gun and stabbed the other in the back of the head.

Blackburn, who is free on bond, is scheduled for a March 8 arraignment to answer the two count first degree assault indictment.

Troy Kirby, 29, of Mt. Vernon was indicted for tampering, with physical evidence and cultivating marijuana. The two count indictment stems from a January 17th incident in which police found eight marijuana plants, a growing light and timer in his Carter Drive home.

Kirby who is free on bond is scheduled for a February 23rd arraignment.

Jeremy M. Holt, 20, of Livingston was indicted for a December 16th break-in in Livingston.

Polli is charged with stealing cigarettes in excess of \$300 from Lee Mullins' Grocery. He is lodged in the Rockcastle County jail awaiting a March 8 arraignment.

Billy Jack Rayburn and James A. Dawson, both of Mt. Vernon, were indicted for receiving stolen property in connection with a January 22nd break-in at the home of Jeff Robinson on Cove Branch.

Rayburn is in jail and Dawson is free on bond. Both men will be arraigned March 8.

Eleven people were indicted Friday, but no indictments were returned for the murder of Frankie Hensley of Mareburg on New Year's Eve.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffrey Burdette said the investigation by Kentucky State Police into Hensley's death is continuing.

I'm pretty sure that it happened in the first week of May in 1963. Maybe it was the second week but I know for sure that it was around the middle of the month.

I was an eighth grader at Blair Branch Grade School and William Terry Cornett was in the same class at Whitesburg Elementary. Anyway, that's when we became acquainted—at that county-wide spelling bee which he finally won, but not before I gave him a run for his money.

Had won the spelling bee at Blair Branch and Jayane Blair, who now teaches at Leitcher High, finished second in the local competition. Jayane was normally better at anything than me in school, but for whatever reason, I won that particular contest. It must have been a trick word because I know that Jayane can outspell me now as well as she could then.

Anyway, early that Saturday

Morning in May of '63, along with the representatives from 34 other grade schools in the county, Jayane and I squared off in the auditorium at Whitesburg High School with the best spellers in Letcher County.

I was so scared that I can still remember the way that auditorium smelled. Like it was the most important place in the world. Old oil and mothballs. And expensive books. Important and more than anything else, important. A hot-shot place to be. You could say your name out loud and it would echo back five times. Scary.

Other schools had fans made up of moms and dads and uncles and cousins and siblings filling up the seats. Jayane and I had my dad our teacher, the late Monroe Caudill, sitting somewhere in the crowd. It was an absolutely awesome place to be. Scary multiplied by ten. But finally

it got down to the point that Jayane and I and Terry were still standing along with five or six other kids. Then it got down to Jayane and Terry and me and I thought we had him cornered. Terry was representing a class of more than 100 students. Jayane and I represented a class of eight. And finally it was just me and Terry. I was scared to miss a word. Then I spelled "seen" when it should have been "scene" and wound up with a \$10 savings bond when I might have had \$25.00.

After the spelling bee was over, the winner, William Terry Cornett, came up to me and swore that the judges were wrong. We'd been through words with twelve letters or more and he was genuinely upset that the match had been decided on a spelling technicality. He even went to the judges and protested! On my behalf!

That's the way that I met William Terry Cornett and I know then, as I know now, that I would never be acquainted with a more intelligent or caring person. We've been friends ever since.

William Terry Cornett died last week at the age of 46. The doctors and the coroner say he had a heart attack. I suspect that he died of hard work and hard caring—of love if the truth be known—because hearts that cared and worked as hard as Terry made his work seldom reach old age.

Terry and I spent four years together at Pikeville College where we both majored in English and where Terry was more qualified to teach than any professor we ever had. He didn't ask questions about Shakespeare or Keats or Shelley or the Brownings to show off. Terry questioned our professors because he was light-years ahead of them. He was the only real genius I've ever known and I learned more from him in our dormitory rooms while we were students than in all the classes I ever took.

Terry could have been a scholar at any Ivy League School of his choosing. He could have studied abroad and earned good money in the process. He could have studied and

taught at Yale or Harvard or Princeton and been well-off in the process but he completed his graduate studies at The University of Kentucky and Vanderbilt and came home to his beloved Whitesburg in Letcher County because he wanted to make a positive difference close to home.

Whitesburg now has a community college, a branch of the University of Kentucky, that is technically an extension of the Hazard and Southeast campuses. Lots of people raised money to make that facility possible, but Terry, who could have been teaching anywhere else and earning four to five times the money—one of UK's finest and certainly the finest scholar we've ever produced—stayed at home to teach his own and ultimately made the Whitesburg Campus a reality. And worked himself to death (I

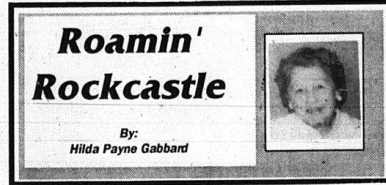
believe) in making it happen.

I don't live in Whitesburg anymore. But I'd move back for a year or two and lobby hard with the business and education communities just to make sure that something important gets named for my good friend, William Terry Cornett.

Eastern Kentucky needs to recognize its geniuses. And somewhere, down the road, we'll come to know that William Terry Cornett was about the best that we can do.

In the meantime, let us grieve the loss of this kind and gentle man who gave his heart and soul and every ounce of his energy for the land and the people that he loved.

Rest well, Terry Cornett. Know that you are loved. Know you always will be. Rest well.

The day is Saturday, January 6,

1996 and the time is approximately midnight. The place is Rockcastle Co. Middle School in a Red Cross Disaster Shelter. At this time there

was close to 24 inches of snow on the ground and the temperature was dropping to a very dangerous level

for anyone who was out on the road

and not inside somewhere keeping dry and warm.

Ann Amyx, asst. shelter manager and I were doing some of the necessary paperwork that is always involved in a project of this type when two young ladies of Bethel Presbyterian Church Youth Group approached the table and said that they had just finished their Bible study and they would like to read to us a passage that was in their study. They began to read Matthew 25:36 to us. With tears in their eyes, and tears in ours, they told us they felt that we were the answer to their prayers. Believe me there were many tears shed that night in thanks giving.

We were blessed with 40 beautiful youth who had traveled to Pigeon Forge, TN, for a Church Youth Conference and were returning home with six adults when they became unable to continue on I-75 to Columbus, Ohio because of horrible weather conditions. They were unable to see the other vans and they had to pull off at the Burr Exit. We got a call from the Shell Station saying that the vans

could not get up the incline into Mt. Vernon. Calls went out to get snowplows out so that they could get up to the Courthouse where the shelter was opened that afternoon. We got them into the courthouse and then determined that we would need larger quarters for these 46 travelers, plus

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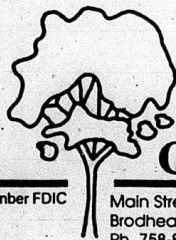

the 10 we already had, and several more that were still to come. We put in a call to Mr. VanWinkle to go ahead and open the school, but first this also had to be plowed. Members of the fire department and others got the job done and we made our move at approximately 10 p.m. to RCMS.

We had two fellows from Americorps who were going to Morehead and had to stop off with us and they played guitar and one of the youth group also played the guitar and mandolin and everyone sang songs and finally faded off to sleep about 1:30. It was so quiet. We had Antonio, who had walked 75 miles from Cincinnati to Lexington and was going to Nashville to be with his grandparents. He had not eaten in that length of time and he was very cold, wet, and hungry. The minute he walked thru the door he wanted to help. He swept, shoveled snow, cleaned up and did whatever he could

to help out. He was so appreciative of having a place out of the storm. Buses did not run from Saturday morning until Tuesday morning, but we were able to get him on a bus and headed home on Tuesday.

The shelter was closed at RCMS Monday afternoon, although we still had Antonio and neither Ann, nor I could get home and some of our other volunteers could not get home, so we opened a shelter at Ashlee's House Homeless Shelter and were open for two more days and nights. Because we were under a "State of Emergency" by both the county and the state, it was hard to get enough snow plows and other vehicles to take care of the many emergency calls for assistance that we received. We had many people volunteer their services to take medicine, wood, food, and bring people into the shelter and it is deeply appreciated by everyone. Volunteers brought in food, towels, games and other things that were needed and it meant a lot to all of us. We also had several new volunteers added to the Red Cross Disaster list. It takes many people to make every-

thing fall into place and the most important thing is the well being of people. Those who had four-wheel drive vehicles were really a blessing to all of us. Many people had gotten supplies but none thought it would be as bad as it was.

Thank you to everyone who helped us in any way. I am thankful that the Red Cross is able to be there when we are needed. This was a National Disaster and it's not over yet. The flooding is very bad and will be included in the overall amount that this disaster will cost us. Donations are greatly needed for us to keep our work going. We do not get any money from the government. The American Red Cross is supported thru donations. If you would like to help us out you can mail donations to The American Red Cross P.O. Box 60, Mt. McCauley got a game high 23 points, hitting 7 of 12 from the field including 4 of 5 from three point range. She also was 6-7 from the free throw line.

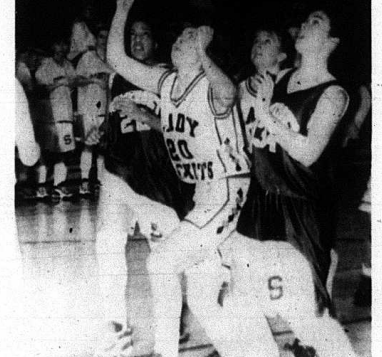

Marshall has a 10-12 record and is 6-4 in the Southern Conference, where they hold second place.

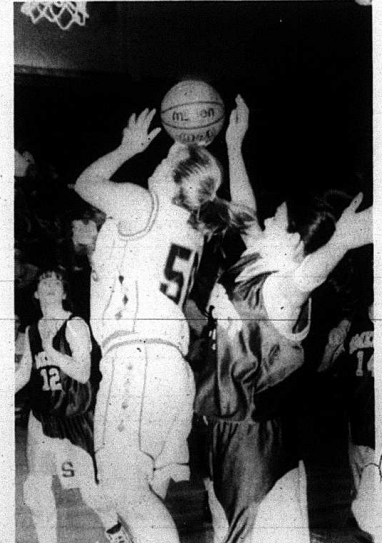
Bussell's season at ECU begins Feb. 16

Changing Structure in Kentucky Families

The family as we know it is changing. Fewer than 10% of all American families today qualify as "Leave It To Beaver" families (traditional, two-parent ones with the father as a major breadwinner and a mother who stays at home full-time caring for the household and family members).

Single-parent families are the fastest growing family form in America. In the U.S., one-fifth of white families and one-half of black families are maintained by a single adult.

Informality of family life and independence are positive traits mentioned by members of single-parent families. Children in single-parent families may be given greater responsibility and may have a strong sense of the value their contribution has in the family.

About 75% of divorced people eventually re-marry. That means that about 25% of all married couples are stepfamilies, a relatively new family form that has unique characteristics in complex relationships and demands on resources. In stepfamilies, the need to negotiate different methods of child rearing and family styles has been cited as both a strength and stress.

On the surface, both single-parent families and stepfamilies seem to be different from the traditional family, yet all families offer the same services for their members. The pattern of behavior may differ, but children can receive the same sense of security and stability. The family is still the center in which children experience love and are allowed to grow in independence in preparation for adulthood.

All families play a significant role in shaping a child's sense of responsibility to the values and laws

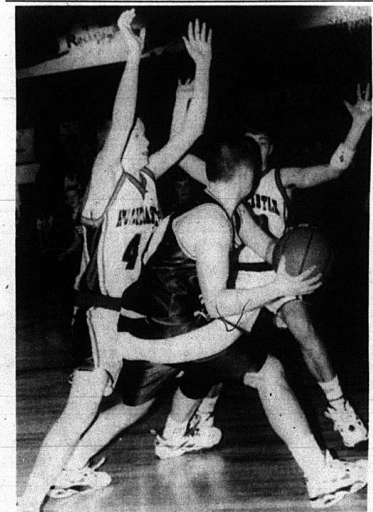
of society. This family function has not changed through the years.

As Kentucky approaches the 21st century, the family is alive and well, although it is changing to keep pace with the needs of its members. Kentucky communities need to improve the parenting function of families regardless of their structure. Single parents may have reduced amounts of time and financial resources, just as stepparents may have multiple financial obligations.

Whether a family has one or two parents, the unit should be seen as potentially healthy, in possession of the same dreams and objectives that families have always yearned for: nurturing their young; connecting to a community; and maintaining economic stability allowing them to meet their goals.

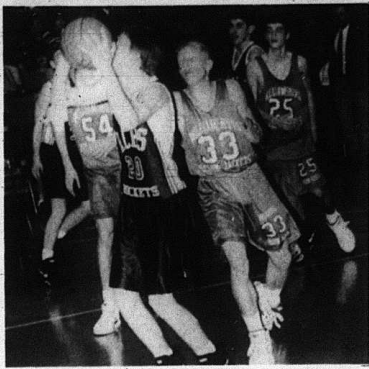

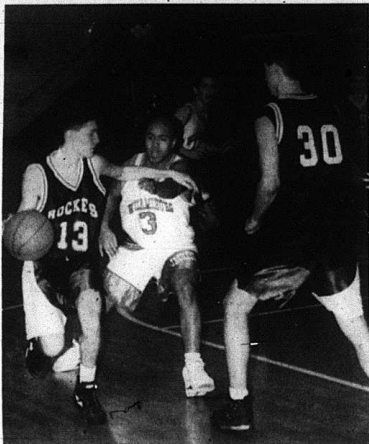

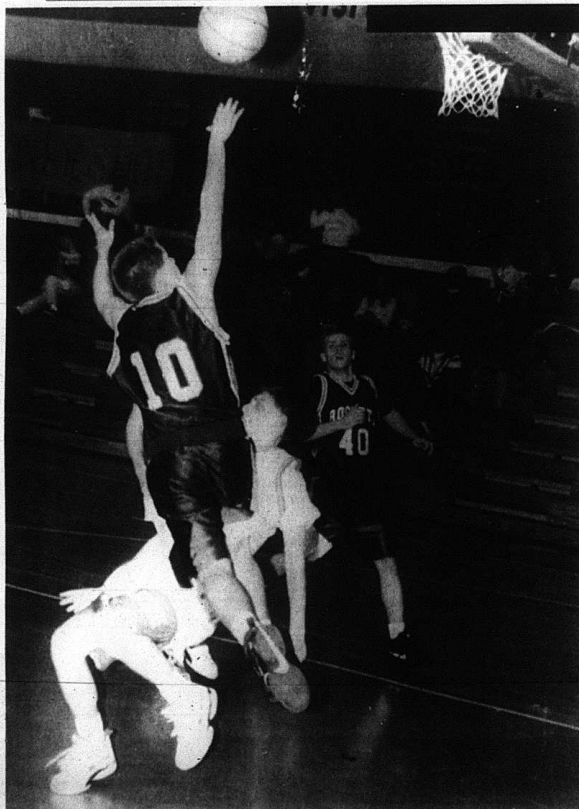

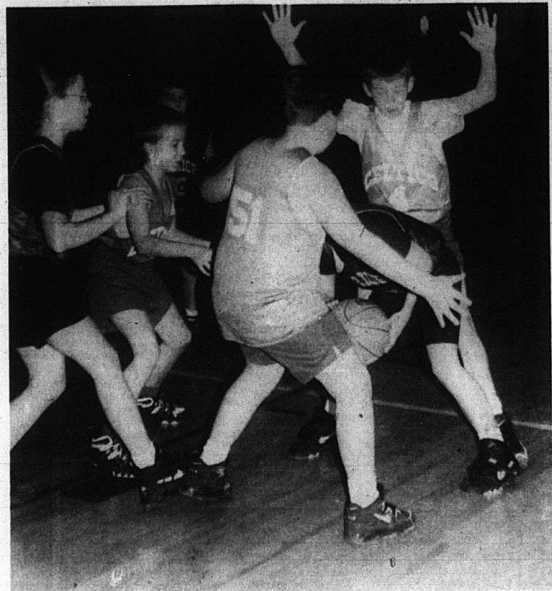
District tournament starts the next week at Jackson Co. when the boys take on Jackson Co. Monday night and the girls play the Lady General Tuesday night.

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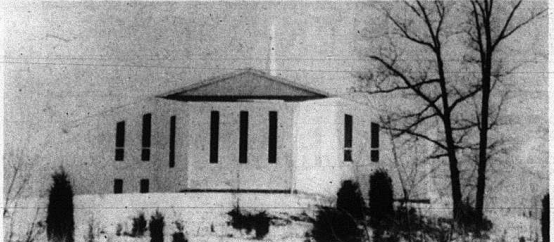

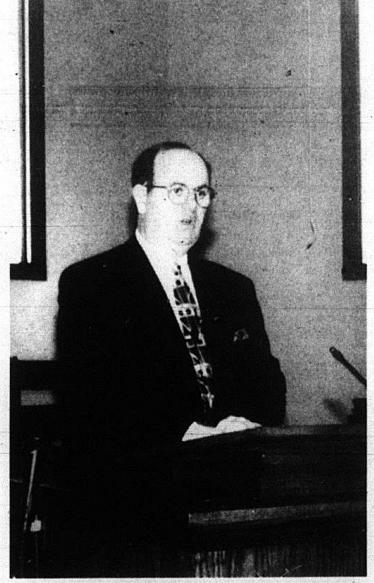

Bible Baptist congregation moves into new building

 Good things come to those who wait, as the old cliché goes, and members of the Rockcastle County Bible Baptist Church know the meaning of that saying all too well. Seven years ago, the congregation voted to purchase eight acres of land in Mt. Vernon on which to build a new building. Only ten weeks ago, the congregation got to hear their first sermon in the new auditorium.
 The church membership had simply outgrown the meager confines of their facility which was located at that time in Burr.
 "God has truly blessed us," said Pastor Don Stayton, who has preached for the congregation since 1981.
 "We have a beautiful facility where we can worship God and one in which we can offer more and more things to our congregation," Stayton said.
 "We offer a lot of programs for our young people, as well as programs that deal with the aspects of

Christian life, this new facility will certainly help us learn more about building a strong Christian life," he said.
 "Obviously the goal of any congregation of Christians is to glorify God and win souls to Christ," he said. "We know that is first and foremost whether we are worshipping God in a prayer group in the basement of a fellow Christian's home or whether we are having services in our new facility," Stayton said.
 The new 10,000 square foot facility is located in Mt. Vernon near McGuire subdivision just off U.S. 25. The congregation has occupied at least part of the building since November and has used the main auditorium since December 3rd.
 Bible Baptist Church was organized in the 1940's, when some members of the Pine Hill Baptist Church left the Southern Baptist Church to form the Independent Baptist Church that has a membership of about 200.
 The first church building was lo-

cated at Pine Hill and then at Burr for nearly 30 years. Extensive growth in the early 80's forced the congregation to begin looking for a new home.
 The trustees and deacons began trying to purchase property near the church building in Burr, but they had no luck.
 Building project chairman Sam Ford, who also serves as a deacon, said that he was very proud of the fact that the new church was built by local people and much of the work was actually done by church members.
 "We were very frugal in our efforts not to place a financial burden on our congregation, yet we knew we needed more room, it has all worked out very well," he said.
 "Jeff Robinson was the contractor and he did an excellent job," Ford said.
 Besides the auditorium and balcony which will seat 400, the building also has 12 classrooms for Sunday school.
 Bible Baptist's average Sunday attendance is 140, but the churches' preaching and teaching reach many more parishioners than those in attendance in Mt. Vernon.
 Bible Baptist supports the efforts of many missionaries, but they solely support one missionary in Mexico. Benjamin Mendez Garcia works with people in Mexico teaching them about God. He has been able to start three churches in Mexico and he visits Bible Baptist from time to time to keep the congregation up to date on his progress. Garcia has been a missionary of Bible Baptist since 1987.
 Members of the congregation also visit him (Garcia) at least every two years to see his work first hand.
 "He works very hard to spread God's word to people who have never even heard of the Bible and of salvation and he gives them hope. He is a special person," Stayton said.
 Bible Baptist also offers special programs for children and they are always trying to keep young people interested in the word of God.
 Bible Baptist offers transportation and like most all other churches meet regularly on Sunday and Wednesdays.
 Sunday School begins at 10 a.m. on Sunday and worship service is at 11 a.m. Evening services on Sunday are at 6 p.m. Wednesday night is at 7 p.m.
 Pastor Stayton's son, Scott, serves as youth director. He was educated at Liberty University in Virginia, a school many of Bible Baptist's youth have graduated from.
 Trustees of the church are: Oscar Fain, Bill Fain, Billy Wayne Bryant, Lee Fain and Mike Renner.
 Deacons are: Danny Hinton, Danny Ford, Sam Ford, Joe Fain, Arnel Taylor and Curtis Miller.

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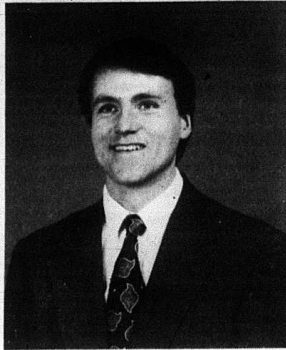

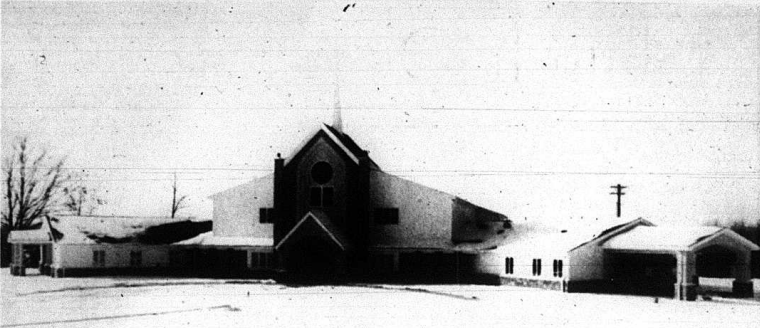

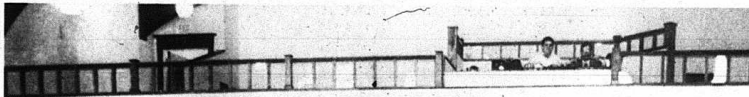

come into the FSA Office no later than March 15. Persons wishing to cancel coverage through FSA must come in and sign a cancellation form or they will be billed for insurance charges. Producers who seek insurance from agencies outside of FSA are responsible for submitting proof of insurance to FSA.

This year through FSA, added provisions will allow producers, covered under one tobacco marketing card to be insured as one entity under one policy (applies to CAT policies only) if the following applies: All shareholders agree in writing, the insured is the producers named on the application, all landowners must be listed as having a

substantial beneficial interest, regardless of their actual interest in the acreage.

Dairy farmers have until March 15 to apply for their refund through the Dairy Refund Payment Program. The Rockcastle Farm Service Agency will be closed for President's Day on Monday, February 19.

Producers who have not returned their marketing cards need to do so as soon as sales are final. The cutoff date for recording sales has been set for January 26. Notices for the '96 crop year are scheduled to be mailed March 1. Producers who have a sale after January 26 are urged to bring the tobacco sale bills for reconciling the marketing prior to the '96 notices being mailed. Producers who fail to bring the sale bill will not receive the '96 quota notice until a later date.

Again in 1996 the CAT insurance will be required for persons who will market tobacco, and for persons who will plant corn for grain. Producers who purchased insurance in 1995 through the FSA Office may renew their policy at the time for crop certification (crop reporting). Deadline for crop certification is July 15 and administrative fees for renewal must be collected by this date (\$50 to tobacco/\$50 com). Producers who were waived from paying the fee must

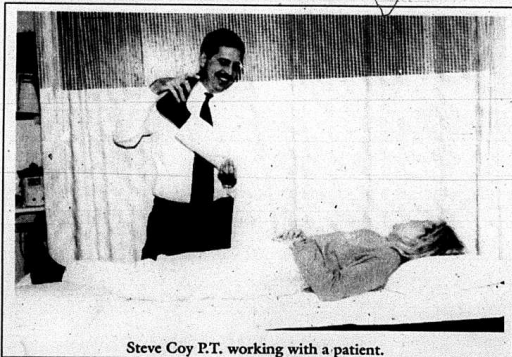
