Brodhead KIRIS scores seventh best in state

"It is not what you teach, but how you teach it," said Brodhead Elementary School principal Mark McKinney after it was announced last week that Brodhead students had once again scored very high on the KIRIS test. Brodhead's fourth grade students scored the seventh highest score in the state with a 73.7.

"Our staff and our students are committed to making this school a good educational center, we have confidence in what we are doing and we continue to work daily to improve," McKinney said.

Certainly Brodhead must be doing something right because they had the highest score in the county and they improved more than any other school. A year ago Brodhead's highest scores were in reading, this year their writing portfolios got the highest marks. Brodhead scored well above the state average at 55.9.

The KIRIS rates students in four categories, Novice is the lowest and Distinguished students are considered the highest scores. Proficient and Apprentice are the middle levels of scoring.

McKinney says he is most proud of the fact that very few of his students fall into the Novice category. Novice is defined as not scoring at all.

In reading and writing portfolios none of Brodhead's fourth graders were considered in the lowest category or Novice.

In Math and Science less than two percent of Brodhead's fourth graders were considered Novice and in Social Studies less than four percent.

Brodhead students did the poorest in Arts and Humanities, with a new testing category added by the state this year. Over forty-four percent of Brodhead's students were considered Novice in that category. "We spent very little time in that area of study, but we are concentrating more on that area now," McKinney said.

"Educators from across the state have asked me how we are able to do so well, but it really is simply, our staff and our students are committed to doing things right," McKinney said.

Other good news from last week's results include the fact that the Rockcastle High School is no longer considered a school in decline and actually was only 8 short of being listed as a reward candidate.

Martin presents revitalization plan for Livingston, school

Monday night's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County school board was indeed anything but regular.

It could be called the meeting of unfinished business. The council heard from Ruth Martin of the Daniel Boone Development Council, which has yet to complete a proposed buy of the Livingston school property.

"They heard from Tammy Gabbard, who is working to complete pre-school guidelines for county schools which were changed in 1995 and which now have been changed again, back mainly to their original form.

"And they heard from local CPA Joe Clontz, who was awarded the bid for the 1995-96 school board audit, although he hasn't finished the 1994-95 school audit as yet.

The board was also still approving payments for work on the RCHS construction project although the school has been occupied for nearly two school years.

Mrs. Ruth Martin, an employee of the Daniel Boone Development Council told the board that she was working diligently to

complete a buy of the former Livingston school property.

Daniel Boone has had an option on the property for well over a year, but Mrs. Martin said that government red tape had delayed her project for sometime.

Mrs. Martin presented the board with a seven page project proposal for Livingston school.

In Mrs. Martin's proposal for Livingston school, which also includes a community revitalization plan for Livingston, Daniel Boone Development would put ten one-bedroom assisted living apartments on the property, convert the old school building and to a community center complete with office space for Livingston Economic Alternatives Program. There would also be room

the old school building for a trade emporium, conference room, special needs rehabilitation center, day care and education training center. The

It took almost nine hours Sunday for members of the Rockcastle County rescue squad to remove an injured spelunker from the Pine Hill cave.

Kentuckian Jon Carloftis took the two top honors recently at the opening of the New York Flower Show for an herb garden he designed and built in the center of the New York Coliseum.

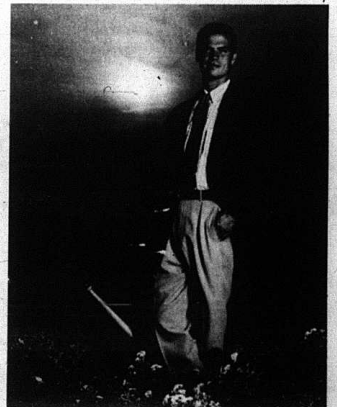

Winning the prestigious awards was just the latest in a quick series of achievements that has made Carloftis the darling of the New York gardening scene.

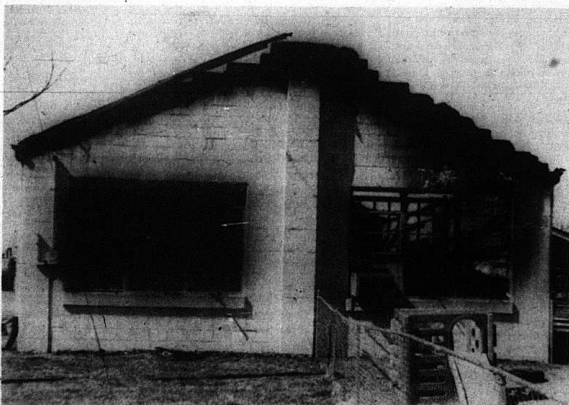

I spend so much time on the phone that my left ear has callouses all over it and so much time on a computer keyboard that the tips of my fingers are, likewise, hardened.

On top of that, I drive more than fifty thousand miles a year and I am amazed that I can handle a steering wheel for hours on end without getting a blister and then pick up a garden hose and be bleeding within thirty minutes. I'm trying to get the tool industry to start making hoe and shovel handles out of the same stuff that steering wheels are made of so my gardeners can finally stop using band-aids and soft-leather gloves.

Anyway, before we lose the point entirely here, I am becoming a virtual legend of sorts in foundation circles because I can drive all over eastern Kentucky and the Appalachian portions of West Virginia, Virginia and Tennessee and get to wherever I want to go without much need of a road map.

Not that that's such an enviable talent. I'd bet that hundreds of you readers can do the same thing just by better than I ever will. We hillbillies simply know the lay of the land and it really isn't much to brag about. However, unlike most of you, I receive frequent requests from foundation types who want to visit little communities or even people they've heard about through grant proposals or some version of news media.

Hardly a week goes by that I'm not loading up some well-meaning, "hear-s-in-the-right-place," out-of-state, foundation representatives and

taking off into the mountains to find a little piece of some obscure zip-code. I love to make these trips as do the folks who ride with me.

What throws my guests for the proverbial loop however, is that I not only know the lay of the land, but they also believe that I know almost everybody who lives on it. When we take these little trips, I never take a road with more than two lanes unless it's after dark. There's not much of Appalachia to be seen from The



FDA approves Olestra as a fat substitute

Several weeks ago, the Food & Drug Administration approved Olestra as a fat substitute. Olestra is a sucrose polyester made by Proctor & Gamble Company. Since it is made up of a huge chain of sugar and fatty acid links that cannot be digested or absorbed by the human body, Olestra contains no calories.

It will be used to replace up to 35% of the fat calories in oils and shortenings and up to 75% of the fat in commercially prepared foods. Olestra will probably be used in the savory snack market first.

Proctor and Gamble stresses that safety testing has gone beyond normal boundaries. Over 100 animal studies and 60 clinical trials have been evaluated and the results show the product to be safe. With olestra consumed in gram

quantities, it was found that the average intake via snacks would be around 3 grams per day and the target intake would be 5 grams per day among males in the 16 to 24 age group. Tests have examined the effects of an intake of up to 32 grams per day. Consuming more than 20 grams per day of olestra can result in some changes in the gastrointestinal tract, including diarrhea, but these are similar to the results of a high fiber diet and its effect on the GI. Further data on safety and levels the public will ultimately consume will be collected and reviewed after the new products are introduced.

Since Olestra is fat soluble, it can trap other fat soluble vitamins, so most products containing olestra will be fortified with Vitamin E. Olestra has not been found to

interfere with drug absorption, such as oral contraceptives.

Whether Olestra will provide any benefit to the obesity problems of

Americans still remains to be seen. Low-fat foods combined with education has resulted in lowering

the amount of saturated fat we consume and decreasing the risks for heart disease in recent years. Fat substitutes may help further this effort. But no fat substitute can replace the benefits of a diet rich in whole grains, fresh fruits and vegetables.

Lice control on beef cattle

Lice populations build up on livestock in the colder periods of the year when the environment on the animal is more conducive to lice survival. The entire cattle lice life cycle (eggs, nymphs and adults) exists only on cattle. None of the life stages can survive off the host. They cannot survive on other types of livestock or humans.

Lice are transferred from animal to animal by body contact. In this fashion, an entire herd can become infested. During the summer, lice numbers are very low and usually concentrate on a few "carrier" animals. Late summer and fall is a good time to try to eliminate lice from the herd. However, if this is not followed, there is still time to eliminate lice before they have a great effect on cattle. Lice biology makes it feasible to totally eliminate these pests from a herd if all

animals are thoroughly treated.

1. All animals must be treated if only one animal is left infested, that animal can serve as the reinfestation source for the rest of the herd.

2. Treat each animal twice -- the first insecticide treatment kills the adult and nymph stage lice but leaves the eggs unaffected. The second treatment, 2-3 weeks after the first, kills the nymphs that have hatched from these eggs.

3. Keep the herd isolated from non-treated cattle -- any non-treated animal serves as a potential reinfestation source. Any new animals brought into the herd must be put through the "Double Treatment" program before they are allowed to join the herd. Also, cattle should be kept out of contact with neighboring herds unless those animals have also been put through a similar "lice elimination" program.

As you think about controlling lice, there are many effective ways and the cost varies with products used. Contact your local vet for the proper type of compound to use. Many products are available in a pour-on form which will allow you to treat animals without using a head gate. As cattle line up at the feed bunk, pour-on's can be applied with very little work.

Using the "Double Treatment" on all cattle can assure you very little chance of lice problems in your beef herd.

All producers who are going to be new producers for the 1996 crop year must have at least a catastrophic level of crop insurance by MARCH 15. This is for new producers only. Producers who already have carried this insurance will be carried over into the 1996 crop year. The \$50 fee will be due when you report your crops in June/July. If you are not growing any crops in 1996, you will need to cancel your insurance contract by MARCH 15. This is to insure that you are not charged the fifty dollar fee.

Some changes have taken place with the conservation program for 1996. We can no longer cost share on SLP practices (Gross, Seeding) nor SLP practices (Ponds, dugouts, pipelines, tanks). We do have other practices available for cost share. If you are interested contact the office for more information.

Dairy Refund deadline is MARCH 15. If you wish to file to receive your assessment back please come in by this date.

FSA makes loans to individual rural youths to establish and operate income-producing projects of modest size in connection with their participation in 4-H, FFA, or similar

organizations. Loans may be made of up to \$5000 for modest-size projects. Payments will be tailored to the type of project for which the loan is made and the regularity of the project's income. In most cases, the loan will be set up with an annual payment due date but may be paid from monthly weekly earnings. To apply for Youth Projects Loans, contact the FSA Office.

Burley tobacco allotment notices will be mailed Friday, March 15. Leasing will begin Monday, March 16. Producers who are not on file on the bulletin board in our office, with a telephone number where they can be reached, if they wish to do so.

Effective January 13, 1996, President Clinton declared a major disaster in the State of KY, based on damages and losses caused by the blizzard of '96, which occurred on January 5 through January 12. As a result of this disaster, the entire state was declared eligible for Federal disaster assistance, including Farm Service Agency emergency (EM) loans for eligible family farmers. EM applications will be received through September 13, 1996 for physical and production losses, and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

Health Department news

This year, "National Poison Prevention Week" designates March 17-23. The health department is promoting poison prevention which is a serious business. Many children are poisoned each year and many of these accidents could have been prevented.

Accidental poisonings occur most often to children under the age of five, but people of all ages are poisoned each year. Some prevention tips which will help you make your home poison free are:

-Purchase medications and household chemicals with child resistant caps.

-Keep poisons (detergents, medicines, etc.) out of reach on a high shelf or locked in a cupboard.

-Pour contents of unused medicine or chemical containers down the drain or toilet and rinse the container before throwing it away (some chemicals may have other instructions for discarding which should be followed).

-Never store dangerous products in food or drink containers; they may be mistaken for something to eat or drink.

-Never tell a child that medicine is "candy" or tastes like candy; and don't take medicine in front of children.

-Many plants and berries are poisonous, including indoor plants and should be kept out of the reach of

small children and pets.

-Syrup of Ipecac should be on hand to give a person who has ingested poison. Ipecac makes people vomit, which can help get rid of poison. But if certain types of poisons are taken, vomiting can make things worse. You should always ask a doctor or poison center before giving Ipecac.

-Children should not be allowed to chew on painted surfaces-some paints contain lead which is poisonous.

Through our well child program at the health department, children from 6 months through 6 years are screened for lead poisoning risk factors and if any are found, then a blood

test is given. Also through this program, syrup of Ipecac is given for poisoning and pedialyte is offered to infants on the well child program to help prevent death due to dehydration. For more information about the well child program, call the health department at 256-2242. To receive printed information about poison prevention or to schedule the health educator to make a presentation to your group, call the health department and ask for Beverly.

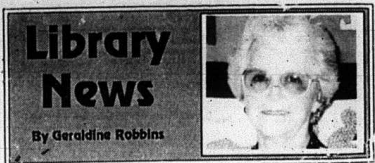

 8. Since participation is of the utmost importance, the combination of clubs for the purpose of presenting a club or specialty act is not permitted.

Now is the time for 4-H'ers to begin their preparation for the County 4-H Variety Show. This event consists of specialty and club acts and is held annually on the county and area level. It provides an opportunity for large numbers of 4-H participants to gain poise and confidence and develop character and sportsmanship while working cooperatively with others.

9. Dramatic readings can be entered as a variety show act.
 10. All acts must use the same P.A. system. No act will be given a trophy if it is on its own system. A record player and tape recorder will be available and must be used by participants.

Clubs planning to participate need to carefully read over and follow the rules and guidelines:

11. Leaders must take care of their own music. (Have tapes set at starting point.)
 12. Each school will sit together until time for their acts. Club leaders are responsible for keeping their group together and quiet. Parents should be recruited to help as chaperones.

1. Specialty Acts shall consist of four (4) 4-H participants or fewer and have a time limit of four minutes. A 4-H club may have up to 2 specialty acts. Specialty acts will be divided up into junior and senior divisions. Anyone in a specialty act who is 14 years of age by January 1, 1996, will be in the senior division.

13. Admission will not be charged.
 14. Clubs must register their act by calling the Extension Office at 256-2403 by FRIDAY, MARCH 22nd. Specialty acts that fail to register will not be allowed to perform. Registration information will include:

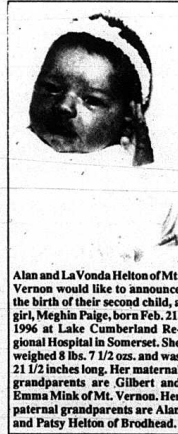

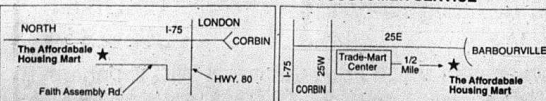

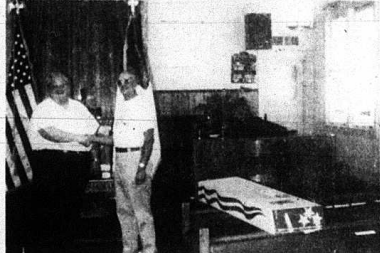

quickly that it wasn't exactly what he wanted.

"I realized whatever job I got was going to be indoors. I knew that was not even an option," he said. So he went back to school, took a year of horticulture classes, then went to Europe to study gardens.

Back in New York, Carloftis' strategy for starting a garden-design business was incredibly simple. He had cards printed advertising his specialty as rooftop gardens and other small spaces.

Then he walked around the upper east side, tucking the cards in doorways of houses and apartment buildings that looked as if they could use the talents of a young, hard-working designer brimming with ideas and enthusiasm.

Call it putting a Kentucky spin on Yankee ingenuity.

His first job was a rooftop garden for Barbara and Eugene Schwartz, New York art collectors who called after finding a business card in their door.

"They entertained a lot, so a lot of people saw the garden," he said. "I started getting clients, mainly by word of mouth."

His big break came in 1992 when Metropolitan Home magazine planned to feature the home of interior designer Bill Robinson in Bucks County, Pa., but the garden Carloftis designed there became the story.

"They fell in love with it and ended up doing six pages pretty much on the garden and put it on the cover," he said. "That really got things going."

Since then, photographs and articles on Carloftis' work have appeared in The New York Times, Child Magazine, House Beautiful, Martha Stewart Living and Interior Design. His own garden was in the February issue of Brides and before-and-after views of one of his rooftop gardens are featured in the April issue of Garden Design, which last year named Carloftis a contributing editor.

Another big break came last year, when The Schwartz garden, and another by Carloftis, were among 10 New York terrace gardens featured on a tour sponsored by Sotheby's

same name that started Ashley Judd, another UK graduate.

The garden is divided into quadrants, each with its own category of herbs: medicinal, culinary, ornamental and aromatic.

"The whole country idea is being close to the land," said Vitale of Country Gardens. "We wanted a lush, lusty overflowing... garden that you could eat from (culinary herbs), that would have aromatic herbs and herbs to decorate with."

It brims with more than 100 different herbs and perennials including peonies, delphinium, foxglove, climbing roses and shrub roses—all forced into peak bloom for the 10-day show.

"Everything in the garden has herbal qualities, even the cedar fence, everything but the sod," said Carloftis, who contracted with five growers to produce the plants on time.

"It's a summer garden in the middle of winter." The New York Flower Show is presented by the Horticultural Society of New York.

Carloftis said his deep interest started with a narrow focus on "small, intimate garden spaces."

For Elizabeth Baker, editor of Art in America magazine, he landscaped a 20-by-5 foot balcony outside her high-rise apartment. The conditions were challenging: The balcony faces south, is windy, gets baked by the sun in the summer and is fiercely cold in the winter.

"It's a small, cramped terrace in bloom almost continuously because of the way he staggered what's in bloom."

"Baker said. She looks out on several trees—including an apple tree that blooms each spring and a profusion of colorful spring bulbs, all in large pots.

"It's very enjoyable to have a garden I largely don't have to take care of," she said.

Recently, Carloftis has expanded into doing English, French country and natural gardens. They share one characteristic: "They're all comfortable. You want to be there," he said.

The place Carloftis likes to be is Bucks County, Pa., a rural area an hour and 15 minutes from Manhattan. He bought an old house there and says the area reminds him of Kentucky.

Growing up in Rockcastle County as one of six children, Carloftis did his share of weeding and hoeing the family garden and spent hours hiking in the woods with his father. His parents, Carlos and Lucille, operated Fort Squoyah, a popular tourist attraction on US 25 south of Livingston from 1955 until it closed in 1995. Brother "Buzz" is county judge-executive there.

In 1994, Carloftis and friend Watts opened the Delaware River Trading Co., a home-and-garden store, in Hunterdon County, New Jersey. Before Christmas, Carloftis opened a second store at 209 Woodland Avenue in Lexington.

A huge place like New York seems so intimidating to most of us, but Carloftis said it's a city of opportunity. However, it's very demanding.

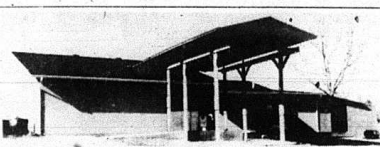

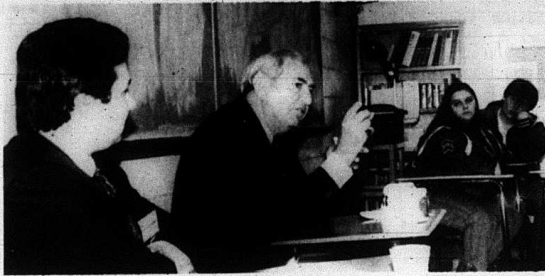

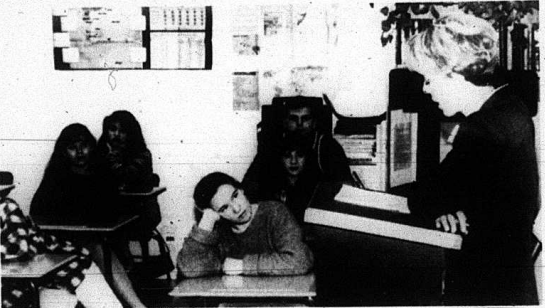

Middlesboro is certainly a long way to travel, but a good showing by the fans would certainly help the teams' efforts in the Region and State Tourneys.

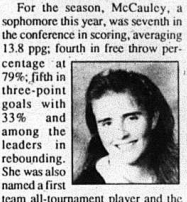
January 20, their record was 4-11 and they went on to win 11 game against only three losses, giving them a 15-14 season record.

Democratic districts are winners

Rep. Danny Ford upset with state's 6-year-road plan

House minority leader, State Representative Danny Ford, of Mt. Vernon apparently thinks the state's 6-year road plan benefits only democratic districts.

Rep. Ford said one project in Lincoln County has been in the road plan for many years. "That causes me to lose faith in our six-year road plan," he declared.

About 300 road projects slipped into the road plan the governor presented earlier this year but Rep. Pete Worthington, Democrat from Ewing, Chairman of the House Budget Committee said, "I tried to move them all up but I just got those that members had asked about."

that legislative leadership, rather than transportation cabinet employees, would determine what road projects are worthy.

Ford contended that only two of the projects are in districts represented by Republicans. "Is there a reason for that?" he asked.

Rep. Worthington said the process is "not Sunday School."

"Amen," Ford said.

Also in an earlier six-year plan was an additional lane up the hill on U.S. 25 north from the I-75 interchange at Renfro to McDonald's Restaurant.

No mention of that project was made.

In other business the board voted to purchase three sets (10 rows each) of portable bleachers for the new softball field and the middle school football field. The cost will be around \$20,000 and the bleachers will seat approximately 460 people.

Approved payment to Gilford Floor Tile of \$12,875 for work at the new RCHS, and \$27,566 to Miracle Lawn and Landscaping for landscaping at the new facility.

Approved a G.E.D. certificate for Julie Burton.

Rejected all bids for phase II of the high school baseball and softball field complex because they were too high and they voted to allow architect Garland Vanhook and finance officer Richard Bray to negotiate a better price under model procurement.

Quite in depth, board members questioned her on the continuous delay in the purchase of the property.

Daniel Boone's option to buy the property expires on March 31 and board members took no action to extend the option. The subject will be brought before the board again in April.

Tammy Gabbard, director of the Rockcastle County pre-school program met with the board to discuss changes in the present program.

Last year, Gabbard told the board that children in Rockcastle County that did not qualify for pre-school, those whose parents make too much money, would more than likely have to be cut from the program because of space problems. At the time several board members indicated they did not like the proposal and wanted to serve all county children who wanted to go to pre-school. But, at that time Mrs. Gabbard told the board that space limitations would not allow for that

to happen, especially at Mt. Vernon.

On Monday the board voted to change the pre-school program back to the way it is currently being operated, with a few changes.

Because of the high number of students at Mt. Vernon, children who qualify will be admitted first. Once they are all enrolled, a lottery will be held to see which children will get the remaining spots. Once those spots are full, students will then be allowed to go to other pre-schools in the county, provided there is space and provided the principal at the school allows and out-of-attendance-zone child to attend.

Mrs. Gabbard said that with the change, basically all students will be served. "They may have to wait until the middle of September to see how the numbers turnout, but we think we can serve 99% of our students," she said.

be and sure enough he was there," he said. "He was drunk when we picked him up," Howard said.

Cawood pled guilty on February 11 to second degree escape for a January 18th escape from the county jail. He was sentenced to 90 days for that escape, but Howard said that he would seek a felony indictment against Cawood this time.

"We've had a few problems at the jail lately, but the majority of them are prisoners on work release or non-violent offenders like Cawood, who you come to trust," Howard said. "There isn't a thing we can do about these prisoners on work release, who decide to walk away from the job," he said. "People should understand that no violent offender has ever escaped from the jail because our security is simply too tight," he said.

"People should understand that prisoners being held for non-violent crimes and prisoners on work release are treated differently from these men that are in here for violent crimes, that is the way jails operate all over the state," Howard said.

Abrams competes in regional art competition

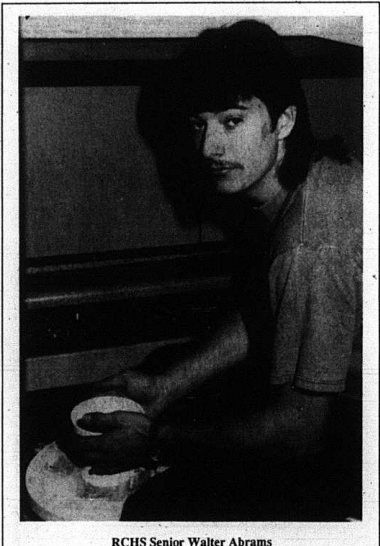

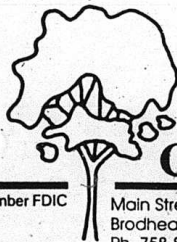

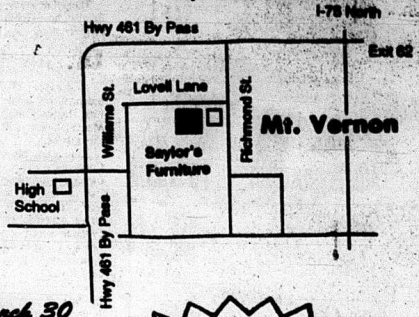
