

Brodhead's fourth grade students scored the seventh highest score in the state with a 73.7. 'Our staff and our students are committed to making his school a good educational center, we have confidence in what we are doing and we continue to work daily to im-prove.' McKinney said. Certainly Brodhead must be doing something right because they had the

something right because they had th highest score in the county and they improved more than any other school. A year ago Brodhead's highest

were in reading, this year their

scores were in reading, this year their writing porffolios got the highest marks. Brodhead scored well above the state average at 55.9.

The KIRTS rates students in four categories, Novice is the lowest and Distinquished students are considered the highest scores. Proficient and Apprentice are the middle levels of scoring.

and Apprentice are the middle reof scoring.

McKinney says he is most proud of the fact that very few of his students fall into the Novice category.

Novice is defined as not scoring at
all.

In reading and writing portfolios none of Brodhead's fourth graders were considered in the lowest category or Novice.

In Math and Science less than two percent of Brodhead's fourth graders were considered Novice and in Social Studies less than four percent.

Brodhead students did the poor-Brodhead students did the poor-est in Arts and Humanities, a new testing category added by the state this year. Over fourty-four percent of Brodhead's students were considered Novice in that category. "We spent very little time in that area of study, but we are concentrating more on

very little time in that area of study, but we are concentrating more on that area now, "McKinney said.
"Educators from across the state have asked me how we are able to do so well, but it really is simply, our staff and our students are comeitted todoing things right," McKinney said.

Other good news from last week's results include the fact that the Rockresults include the fact that the Rock-castle High School is no longer con-sidered a school in decline and actu-ally was only .8 short of being listed as a reward candidate.



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FDA approves Olestra as a fat substitute

Several weeks ago, the Food & Drug Administration approved Olestra as a fat substitute. Olestra is a sucrose polyester made by Proctof & Gamble Company, Since it is made up of a huge chain of sugar and fatty acid links that cannot be digested or absorbed by the human body, Olestra contains or others.

the human body. Olestra contains no calories.

It will be used to replace up to 35% of the fat calories in oils and shortenings and up to. 75% of the fat in commercially prepared foods. Olestra will probably be used in the savory-snack market first.

Proctor and Gamble stresses that safety testing has gone beyond normal boundaries. Over 100 animal studies and 60 clinical trials have been evaluated and the results show the product to be safe. With olestra consumed in gram

quantities, it was found that the average intake via snacks would be around 3 grams per day and the largest intake would be 5 grams per day among males in the 16 to 24 age group. Tests have examined the effects of an intake of up to 32 grams per day. Consuming more than 20 grams per day of olestra can result in some changes in the gastrointestinal tract, including diarrhea, but these are similar to the results of a high fiber diet and its effect on the GIT. Further data on safety and levels the public will ultimately consume will be collected and reviewed after the ew products are introduced.
