Committee organized by court to study 911

A committee was set up by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, Tuesday to study the feasibility of the emergency number 911 for Rockcastle County.
The committee will be made up of 17 members with magistrates approving two members each, as well as members from civic groups.
The committee's approval came only after considerable discussion between County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotis and Mrs. Betty Castro.

Mrs. Castro told the court she has been over two years and the court still hasn't said yes or no to 911 and that many people have requested it.
Judge Carlotis told Mrs. Castro the court hasn't done much regarding 911 simply because of the cost to set it up, estimated at considerable amount, and the cost must be paid by telephone customers, of which there are about 5,400 in the county.

Suppose 2,000 customers say no to the service in which case the county would have to foot the bill and make up the cost," the judge said.
"It's quite an undertaking to set it all up," the judge said. "We have to pay the same amount for equipment for 5,400 telephones as 11 cost counties of much larger population, for example Laurel County with 17,000 phones."

The judge said the committee should come up with a report by the August meeting.
The court also spent a considerable time discussing juveniles and what to do with them in Rockcastle. It pointed out the considerable costs involved.

The report from the jailer showed Montgomery County, \$200; Pulaski County, \$110; Clark County, \$325; Madison County, \$1500 and Daviess County, \$600. Transportation to and from detention centers by the Sheriff's Department showed \$950.

Mrs. Castro during her visit inquired about the community room to be available. She was told the community room, adjoining offices of the county judge will not be ready for awhile.

Persons interested in a community room can use the former circuit court room on the 3rd floor of the courthouse for a \$50 clean-up fee, if a clean up is needed.

A group of residents from the Buffalo area of the county asked the court to improve Arnold Cemetery Road for about one-half mile.

Judge Carlotis told the group the court always take care of the upkeep for cemetery roads, but said he had not heard of the cemetery.

The judge said he would visit the area by next week and report back to the court. It was mentioned that the road involved is across property owned by Zil Graves of Mt. Vernon.

Leonard Nicely asked the court to remove Nicely Campground Road from the county road work program. The court approved.

The court renewed garbage hauler and convenience center permits to BEE Garage, Linda McWhorter, Cassie Littrell, Owen Mink and Laurel Garage.

After the meeting Judge Carlotis praised the efforts of outgoing Democrat County Chairman Larry Doyle.

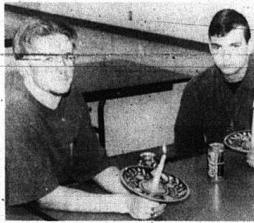
"Larry has been very cooperative with the county during his tenure and we certainly appreciate everything he was able to help us complete during his term," the judge said.

Miracle indicted Deputy jailer pleads guilty to official misconduct

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury has declined to indict a former Rockcastle County jailer for allegedly trafficking in drugs, but they did indict him on a lesser charge of official misconduct.

Lawrence Allen, 33, of Mt. Vernon was arrested last week and charged with trafficking in a controlled substance, promoting contraband and official misconduct.

But, on Friday the grand jury did not find enough evidence to indict Allen on the drug and contraband charge, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

Burdette, who wrote the original complaints against Allen, said Monday that the grand jury apparently did not believe Allen had done anything wrong except detour from his route when transporting prisoner Raymond Miracle to the dentist on Thursday April 4.

When Miracle returned to the jail from the dentist office, he was searched and drugs were found. Miracle was arrested the same day as Allen and charged with promoting contraband and possession of a controlled substance.

Apparently Miracle had obtained Cocaine, Valium and Marijuana either on the way to the dentist or enroute back to the jail.

The County Attorney said that Allen has pled guilty to the official misconduct charge, which is a misdemeanor.

Allen will be fined \$250 plus costs and receive a six month probation sentence. He will also be required to serve eight days in jail and resign as deputy jailer, a position he has held six months.

Burdette said that Allen's plea

must be accepted in Rockcastle Circuit Court before it is final. The Grand Jury did not however look as kindly on Miracle.

He was indicted on three counts in connection with arrests last week. Miracle was indicted for promoting contraband, possession of a controlled substance, (cocaine), introducing drugs into the Rockcastle County jail and for being a persistent felony offender.

He will be arraigned on May 23. Anthony Turner, 22, of Sand Gap, who was also arrested at the same time as Miracle and Allen, pled guilty in Rockcastle District Court on Wednesday and received six months for promoting contraband.

Elmer Boyd Stewart, 34, of Orlando was indicted for possession of a controlled substance on March 13. He is accused of unlawfully having 96 Tylox pills, a schedule II controlled substance in his possession.

Stewart was also indicted for being a persistent felony offender. Stewart has been of three other felonies in Rockcastle County since 1992. Two of the convictions were drug related.

Stewart is free on bond until his arraignment on May 23.

Troy Kirby, 30, of Mt. Vernon was also indicted for allegedly trying to obtain a controlled substance from Saylor's Pharmacy in Mt. Vernon.

According to the indictment, Kirby tried to pass a forged prescription on February 8. He is also free on bond until his arraignment on April 26.

Two inmates escape from county jail

Two Rockcastle County jail inmates are still at large after they escaped from the local lock-up Friday night.

Billy Jack Rayburn, 18, of Pine Hill and Virgil Keith Carpenter, 18, of Jackson County escaped from the county jail around 10:30 Friday night, according to Rockcastle County jailer Joe Howard, who said the two men escaped after overpowering a deputy jailer.

Howard said that an extensive search of Mt. Vernon and surrounding areas was conducted Friday night after the jail break by he and other law enforcement officials, but nothing was found.

"I'm confident we'll find them," Howard said.

The jailer said that he was also reviewing current security procedures at the jail and some changes would probably be made because of the

extremely high number of prisoners housed there.

On Tuesday morning 36 prisoners were being held in the county jail. "It is a lot different than it used to be when you only had 20 to 25 prisoners on the average," Howard said.

No jury

The murder trial of William J. Ross, 33, of New Albany Indiana was scheduled to begin in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Monday, but attorneys were unable to seal a jury.

Ross is accused of killing Charles Eddie Hopkins, 29, of Brodehead on September 17, 1993.

According to court records, there were not enough jurors who did not know anything about the case or did not know members of each family.

The case was continued until Thursday, (today).

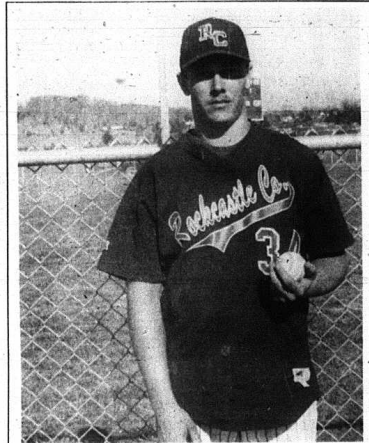

The Rockets only loss of the season came at the hands of McCreary Central last Wednesday night, 7-6, in a game that saw the Rockets commit 10 errors in the field.

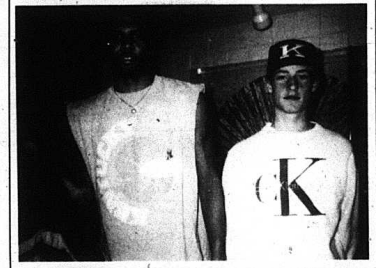

Earth Day is April 22

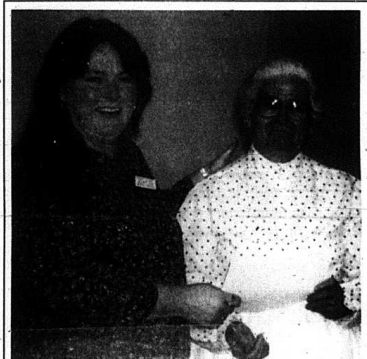

Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,
 This has been one of the worst winters ever. That is something that no one could help. However, the way some of the 24 days of school Rockcastle students missed due to all that snow is being made up could be done in a letter way by far.

First of all, I disagree with the decision that our district made when it chose not to take the five calamity

days offered by the state. All we would have had to do to get five days "knocked off" was go to school on scheduled days off on April 11 and 12, and May 27 and 28.

With going those four days and getting the five calamity days, we could have gotten out of school on May 31. There would have been no disgrace in taking these days, since many surrounding districts are doing so. Also, if the state thought this was inappropriate, they wouldn't have passed the law permitting calamity days. In other years when this has been an option, our district has used the calamity days, so this wouldn't have been the first time.

I know that our superintendent and others felt that it was a bad idea to take calamity days because of the loss of instruction time. However, do five days at the end of the school year

really make that much of an academic difference? I don't think so.

Also, I don't think it would have been that big of a disservice to the community if students went home five days early while teachers and other staff were being paid to be here. I'm sure they could have done many worthwhile things, such as planning and preparing for next school year.

It's not so horrible that we are being required to stay at school an hour and twelve minutes later than normal on some upcoming Wednesdays, and we are expected to come to school a half a day on Saturday, June 8. Most students don't enjoy extra time in school, but no more time than this really isn't all that much extra time to spend at school.

However, it will probably be bad because of the inconvenience it will cause students with after-school jobs.

That's what has some students upset about this.

This extra time at school still only eliminates four of the snow days, moving the last day of school back to Saturday, June 8.

Therefore, for the first time EVER that I know of, seniors will not graduate until all of Rockcastle's students are out of school; on Sunday, June 9.

Not taking the calamity days was our district's decision. However, not letting seniors out a few days early of school a few days early was a well-deserved reward for seniors. But no more.

We have been in school 12 or 13 years and have gotten our elementary and secondary education. Letting us graduate a few days before the other students get out wouldn't make any difference; it didn't seem to hurt those who went before us.

The state should realize that seniors deserve to graduate a few days

Using Urea Nitrogen as Fertilizer

Solid-granular or prilled Urea (45-46% N) has become widely available in Kentucky, as has 28% nitrogen solution (UAN solution), which is half Urea and half ammonium nitrate. When applied to a field, Urea is transformed to ammonium N soon after application. The rate of transformation is greatly increased by urease, the enzyme found to varying degrees in soil and on plants and plant residues. Due to the chemical reactions involved as urea nitrogen undergoes transformation, there is some degree of likelihood for volatilization loss of some N. Whether such a loss will occur, and how much N will be lost if it does occur, relates to temperature, moisture, degree of contact with soil and pH of the soil. Effect of Temperature - Enzymes which convert Urea to ammonium are not very active until the weather warms. Research in Kentucky indicates that it will usually be early April before this rate of transformation will be great enough that risk of volatilization is economically important. Effect of Moisture - There are two thoughts to keep in mind about moisture: (1) If soil, plants or residue onto which Urea is applied are moist, enzymatic activity will be increased and Urea will rapidly convert to ammonium, assuming the temperature is warm enough and (2) If applied onto soil, plants or residues and enough rain occurs within 1-2 days to soak the Urea into the soil, volatilization loss will be minimal.

Degree of Contact With The Soil - As Urea converts to ammonium, the ammonium will react strongly enough with soil to minimize volatilization. The less soil contact with Urea or UAN solutions when the N is applied, the greater the risk for volatilization loss of N.

When surface-applied to bare soil and worked in, there is little risk unless soil pH is above 6.5. When surface-applied to no-till corn, the risk can vary from great where there are rough residues to prevent much soil contact, to slight where residues are thin enough that most of the N contacts the soil. When top-dressed onto grass sod where there is little initial contact

with soil, risk is great after mid-spring.

Effect of Soil pH - This has little effect on N loss except where Urea is spread onto bare soil where Urea worked in. Under such conditions, risk of volatilization can be great if surface pH of soil is above 6.5. If using starter fertilizers which have been blended using Urea, do not place the fertilizer in contact with seed since concentration of ammonia resulting from urea breakdown can be toxic to germinating seeds. Solid Urea (46% N) contains 920 pounds of actual N per ton of material; UAN (28%) contains 560 pounds of actual N per ton of material (approximately 3 pounds actual N per gallon); ammonium nitrate (33.5%) contains 667 pounds actual N per ton of material. Carefully consider the price per pound of actual N together with convenience in application and the relative risk of N loss for the particular crop when deciding which source of N is best for you.

Keep in mind that Urea and ammonium nitrate are very close in price this year. If you plan to spread fertilizer where soil contact is impossible or rain not likely, go with ammonia. Also keep in mind that most fertilizer like 19-19-19 is mixed with Urea as nitrogen source.

Agriculture News

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman today announced a one-time sign-up period of May 20 through July 12 for producers wishing to enroll their farms in a Production Flexibility Contract. The contracts, authorized by the 1996 Farm Bill, are for 7 years, beginning in 1996 and ending in 2002.

"Despite the time constraints we face due to Congress' late passage of the Farm Bill—USDA is working hard to get accurate information to producers and the public as quickly as possible," Glickman said. "I wish to enroll and those who fail to do so now will not be eligible at a later date. There will be no further additional signups except for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). This is required by the 1996 Act and I have no discretion to extend this date."

"Farms with a planting history in one of the past five years of wheat,

corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton or rice are eligible to be enrolled in this program," Glickman said.

Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. A Producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and, after signups, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty.

Payment loan rates will be announced soon. Grain producers need to keep good farm records to establish Actual Production History (APH). This raises your production yield and allows you to get more of your crop insured for the same fee. Copies of

If this cancellation occurs, producers will be billed for this insurance, as this is a continuation of coverage. Once a policy is bought by a producer it stays in effect until it is cancelled. Producers may also purchase corn insurance up until May 2. Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to extend their contracts, or apply for an early release. To apply for an extension or early release application must be filed by May 31. For more details contact the office.

Pain control, therapy, exercise and patient education are all a part of Rockcastle Hospital's Physical Therapy Department's treatment for back injuries. "When people first come to us with their back injuries, we generally begin with the use of pain control modalities. We may use heat or ice, ultrasound, electrical stimulation or a combination of these to promote healing and reduce or block the pain. These are all short term treatment strategies. Long term, we teach strengthening exercises, proper lifting techniques and proper posture. We have an exercise gym that includes aerobic equipment which we like to progress our patients to."

"What makes our program special is that we try to do a lot of patient education. We have great equipment and we are very pro-active in believing the patient should learn everything about their diagnosis, treatment, exercise program and basic care so they can prevent future recurrence. We are very high on back injury prevention and do a significant amount of patient and community teaching on back injury issues. The answer lies in prevention: posture, exercise and proper lifting. We want everyone to have a healthy back."
