Extension Home Economics News Putting Your Winter Wardrobe To Rest

Now that Springtime is here, most people can't wait to get out of their winter woollens and into something light and cottony. Don't let your haste, though, prevent you from storing winter clothes away properly. An ounce of prevention now could save you a pound of cherished sweaters next fall. Here are some recommendations:

- Clean garments prior to storage.
- Many insects, especially moths, thrive on greasy food stains. Also, clothes that have not been cleaned may have "invisible" stains. If these stains contain sugar, they will oxidize over the summer months, causing a yellow or brownish stain.
- Don't use starch, though. It, too, can serve as food for some insects.
- Hang coats and heavy suits on padded or wood hangers.
- Fold knits and sweaters flat, with layers of acid-free tissue paper between the folds to prevent crease lines or discoloration.
- Store items in a cool, well-

ventilated area, away from artificial or natural light.

- Avoid plastic dry cleaner bags. They can trap moisture which causes mildew.
- Holes-in garments recently taken out of storage are a sure sign of moths or other insect infestation. In such cases, more drastic measures must be taken:
- Completely wash and dry all the garments stored in the container or closet where the moth damage occurred. This will remove any insects or larvae.
- Thoroughly clean the container or closet, then wash it down again using a disinfectant or disinfectant cleaner.
- To help prevent future infestation, store clean garments using mothballs or cedar chests. The scent of these items repels moths and insects.

Kentucky Springtime and Fertilizing Lawns

It is Kentucky's April

awakening, and everyone is ready to fertilize their lawns. But, hold that nitrogen, springtime may not be the best time to fertilize a

Kentucky lawn. The bulk of fertilizers on lawns of cool-season grasses should be applied during autumn months, not during springtime.

Leaves of cool-season grasses grow fast enough in the spring on their own. Any excess nitrogen fertilization during the springtime causes abundant leaf growth on grass as well as summer weeds. Fertilizing in the spring can mean more mowing in the summer as well.

In addition, excess nitrogen can aggravate certain diseases, such as brown patch on tall fescue and leaf spot and melting out of Kentucky Bluegrass. An acceptable amount

is a light springtime application of not more than one-half pound of nitrogen per one-thousand square feet. This is 1 1/2 pounds ammonia nitrate per 1,000 sq. ft., almost too small an amount to spread. Most nitrogen fertilizer should be applied after Labor Day. The best time is late-October up to Thanksgiving. Nitrogen applied in the fall strengthens fescue root systems without fertilizing weeds. Excess nitrogen leaches out over winter and doesn't cause excessive mowing.

"IT IS WRITTEN"

Some religious groups teach that it is unscriptural and sinful for God's people to wear any kind of jewelry, even a wedding ring. Passages like I Tim. 2:9-10, I Pet. 3:3-4 are cited, that are supposed to uphold this contention. May we look closely at these matters.

Notice the passage in I Pet. 3:3-4, "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." They say, "Peter says not to wear gold, for godly women are concerned about the inward man, wearing gold and jewelry are worldly activities."

Now notice if this reasoning were accurate from I Pet. 3, the passage also tells the women not to put on apparel, in the same verse that says don't wear gold! If this passage says don't wear gold or jewelry, it also says don't wear clothes, who can believe it?

No, the point Peter is making is that inward adorning is far more important than outward adorning. Nothing wrong with getting your hair fixed, what jewelry you wear, or what particular fashion of clothes you wear (as long as it's modest and decent, I Tim. 2:9).

Peter is teaching, put emphasis on the inward beauty, that meek and quiet spirit, that is in the sight of God of great price.

Jesus used the same kind of argument in Jn. 6:27 about working for food, "Labour not for the meat which perisheth, but for that meat which endureth unto everlasting life." Is Jesus saying we should not work for physical food? No, he is saying that spiritual food is more important and should be our first concern, and we should labour for it, and then labour for physical food secondly.

No, wearing jewelry or gold is not wrong, but godly people know that outward beauty of modesty, shamefacedness and sobriety are the more important issues of life. If wearing jewelry is wrong, God did something sinful in the thing he did for Israel his "wife" in Exk. 16:8-14! Beloved, let no man deceive you by a false humility on the matters, Col. 2:21-23.

19 acres of land on U.S. 25 in Mt. Vernon was sold for over \$555,000 at public auction on Saturday. The above service station tract was sold for

\$61,000. Ms. Peg Mills bought the majority of the property for \$411,500. Ms. Mills said this week that she will develop the property.

The chatter of the auctioneer was heard Saturday as Ford Brothers, Inc., Realtors sold the estate of the late Ruth Leach for a total of \$555,900. It was a major sale, if not the largest ever in Rockcastle.

Jury finds man guilty of sexual abuse

A Mt. Vernon man was found guilty of second degree sexual abuse after a one day trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Monday.

But, Robert McGinnis Warren, Jr., 28, of Floyd Street in Mt. Vernon was released from jail as soon as the verdict was read in circuit court Monday evening.

Warren was released because the penalty for his lesser conviction carried only a one year prison term and Warren had been in jail since his arrest, a total of 18 months.

Warren was on trial for the 1995 rape of an 11-year-old Mt. Vernon girl at his Floyd Street home.

However, Warren testified during his trial that he did not rape the girl, because he was too drunk and that the girl and her sister came to his home of their own will.

Bussell injured in car accident

Ricky Bussell, 38, of Castle Village Drive, Brodhead, was seriously injured in an auto accident on Hwy. 70 last Thursday.

According to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas, the car Bussell was driving left the road, hit a tree, an embankment then struck a second tree.

Bussell, who was alone in the car was taken to Rockcastle Hospital and later transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center by helicopter.

Dr. Edwards's wife, Kim, who was a passenger in the car, died from the injuries she received in the wreck, Madison County Coroner Emory Curry said.

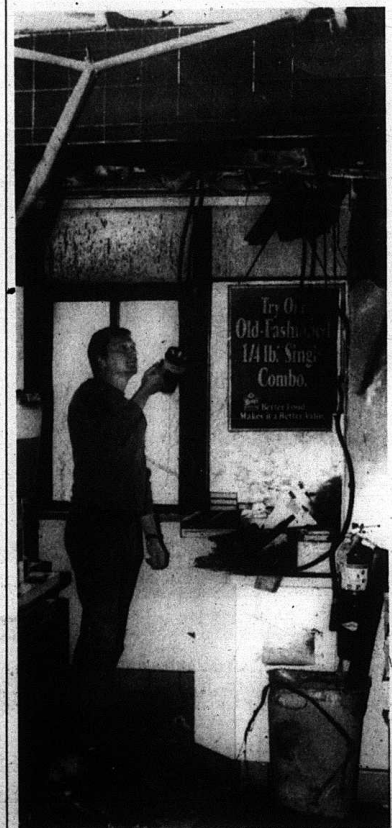
According to preliminary autopsy reports, she was pronounced dead at

Settles had nothing but praise for the Mt. Vernon Fire Department. "They did a great job, containing the blaze and the water damage, we appreciate what they did," he said.

Only six customers were in the restaurant when it caught fire, none of whom were injured.

Three local teachers receive awards

Eighty-three Kentucky public school teachers were honored April 20 by 30 school districts and Campbellsville University at the Tenth Annual Excellence in Teaching Awards Ceremony.

Selected by their school districts, teachers in the elementary, middle and high school levels were recognized for outstanding achievement in the classroom.

Addressing the audience of over 200 educators, family and friends was Dr. Wilmer S. (Bill) Cody, Kentucky's commissioner of education.

Cody, speaking in the newly-named Lawrence and Sharon Hall Center on the Campbellsville University campus, said teachers and administrators need to keep in mind not just the difficulties of implementation of education reforms but the ideas behind the changes.

"Let's not lose sight on a day-to-day basis of the concepts and principles behind reform," Cody said.

He listed 11 key ideas involving reform including: the concept of equity of resources available being taken seriously; the belief in the capability of all children to learn; it is in everyone's interest to gather information about whether children are learning;

Results have to count for something and be of value; decisions need to be moved to local levels on how to carry out tasks; professional development is a must;

Learning is a function of time; pre-school programs work; the idea behind Kentucky's primary program is sound; success of a child is also the responsibility of the family and family resource and youth service centers are a big help, plus children must be able to use computers.

"These 11 principles are the heart and function of Kentucky's reform," the commissioner said. "Some are going smoothly, and some need work. We need to make some changes, and those improvements are on the way."

Three teachers from the Rockcastle County School System were among the 83 Kentucky teachers honored at the luncheon in the Lawrence and Sharon Hall Center.

The local teachers include: Rockcastle County School System—(Larry Hammond, superintendent)—Katreka Cash, primary, grade four, Broadhead Elementary School; Vickie

Lynn Arnold, library media, grades six-eight, Rockcastle County Middle School; and Jennifer Mattingly, English, grades 10-11, Rockcastle County High School.

Cash has been teaching fourth grade at Broadhead Elementary School since 1991. She taught at Livingston Elementary School from 1977 until 1990.

Cash is married to Ronnie D. Cash and lives at Route 3, Broadhead. She has two children, Lura K. and Rachael J. Cash and is the daughter of John T. and Imogene Fowler of 216 Adam St., Berea.

Arnold has been a library media specialist in grades six through eight and school technology coordinator at Rockcastle County Middle School since 1994. 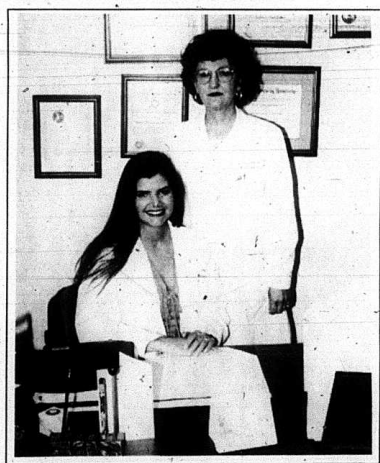

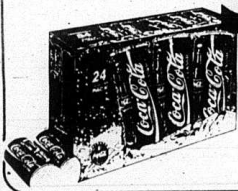

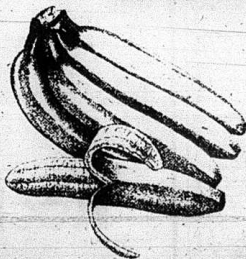
