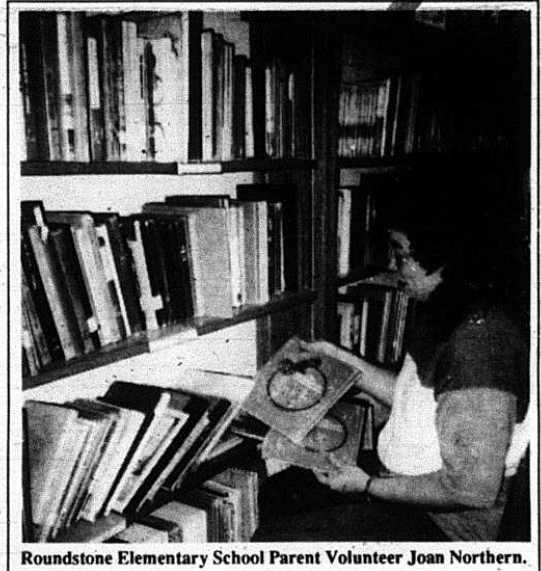
plans.

9. Develop achievement potential

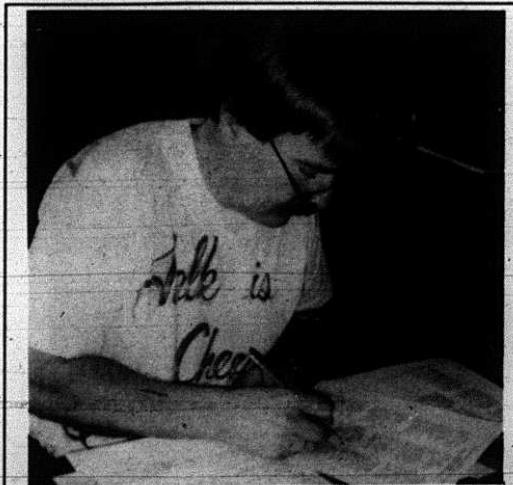

Bringing It All Together - KIRIS

Kentucky Instructional Results Information System (KIRIS) is the state assessment instrument. Rockcastle County teachers in grades 3 (exit level primary), 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 were focused on administering a complete battery of open-response and multiple choice items which addressed the content areas of reading, math, science, social studies and writing. The window for the completion of this section (transitional component) was April 15 - May 3, 1996. All but two (2) schools have met the state assessment requirements for the 1995-96 school year. The portfolio section (writing/math) was finished on April 19, 1996. The performance events are scheduled through May 12, 1996. (Rockcastle County Middle School and Mt. Vernon Elementary are scheduled in May). Rockcastle County High School began their assessment in February; however, for the 1996-97 school year, the high school window will be more in line with the elementaries and middle school.

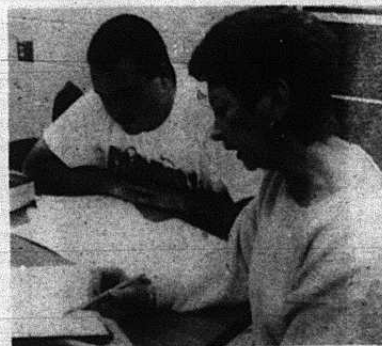
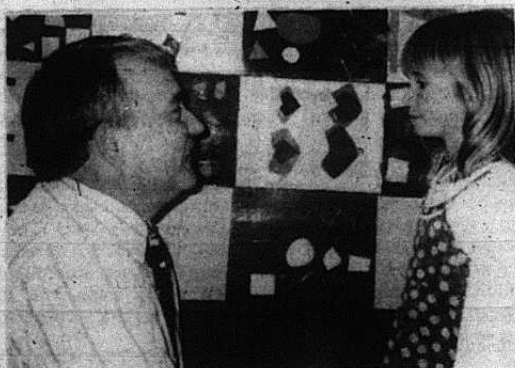
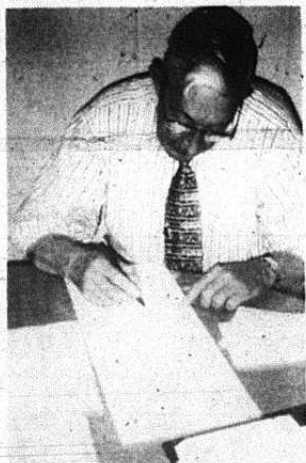
- Content coverage will be increased through the addition of the multiple choice component, and overall reliability is maintained, even though the open response section is slightly reduced.
- Performance events will be temporarily removed from the assessment program and moved into an intensive research and development mode. They will be reinstated once development and administration issues are significantly addressed.
- Portfolio audits will be routinely conducted to better assure the accuracy of the teacher-assigned portfolio scores
- Research will be conducted to further establish the validity of the assessments, including studies on impact on instruction, the relationship of KIRIS to other tests and the relationship among KIRIS test components.

Improvements Projected:

- Spreads the assessment over more grades (4/5, 7/8, and 11/12), thereby easing the work load on students and directly involving more teachers in the accountability system.
- Consolidates the testing window for all grades to a single three-week period normally occurring shortly after the spring break observed by most Kentucky school districts.
- Provides full reports to schools and districts in October following the previous spring's KIRIS assessment
- Provides for national norm-referenced assessments to be administered in reading and mathematics at end of primary, 6th grade, and 9th grade.

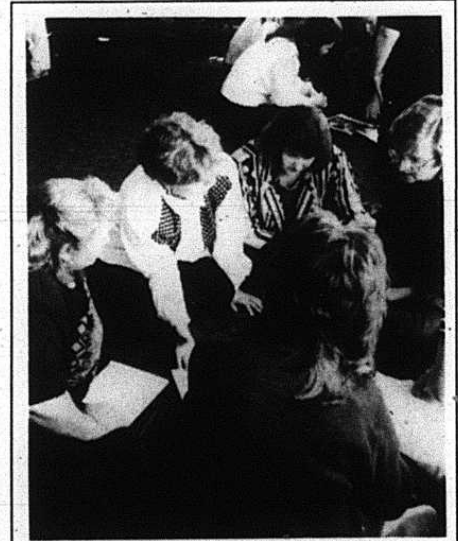

Bige Towery honored for contributions to education

On February 29, Forward in the Fifth honored Bige Towery, former superintendent of the Rockcastle County School System, for the contributions to improving education. Towery received this year's Earl Wallace Award, which is named for the Forward in the Fifth founder who was a leader in Kentucky's education reform movement. Approximately 40 well-wishers joined him for a dinner in his honor which was held at the Boone Tavern Hotel in Berea.

JoAnn James, former Forward in the Fifth Chair of the Board of Directors, said that Towery was the kind of leader Wallace wanted to see in education.

She recalled that in Forward in the Fifth's early days, Wallace often told James that when she had questions about the organization's work, she should call on Towery's wisdom for her answers. "He wanted to make things better for the children of Rockcastle County," James said before presenting Towery with the award.

Towery accepted the award, saying he'll always be grateful that he had the opportunity to work for the children of Rockcastle County.

He spoke about the changes in education in Rockcastle County that the school system made even before they were required to by the Kentucky Education Reform Act. In reflecting on those changes, he acknowledged the contributions of the many educators in the system with whom he had worked. "It (the award) symbolizes so much of what we all did together," Towery said.

Towery also introduced Dixie Holt, his former teacher whom he asked to accompany him to the dinner. He recalled going to school in rural Rockcastle County where Holt taught him in grades five through eight. "She instantly made the difference in my life when I went into her classroom," he recalled. Long before anyone thought about KERA, Holt was using multi-age groupings and integrated learning. Besides helping Towery learn to stay on task and out of trouble, "I remember her saying to me, you could be a good teacher," Towery said.

A number of other guests at the dinner congratulated Towery after the dinner and gave their regards to Holt, who also taught them.

Students discuss school media center

As a Library Power Expansion School, Roundstone Elementary School in Rockcastle County has an opportunity to improve its library media center. School media specialist Lois Cameron has seized the opportunity to upgrade the reference section, replace older books and purchase more Accelerated Reader books. She would also like to focus on nonfiction books, learn how to operate the automatic check-out program and modernize the library by replacing some furniture and shelves.

Most people would think of these as typical ways to improve a school's media center. But when Roundstone teacher Norma Eversole asked a group of students what they would like to see changed in the media center, they offered an assortment of suggestions.

Eversole began by telling students about the purpose of a media center and the duties of a media specialist. She then asked them: If you had \$5,000 for the media center, what changes would you make? Some of the students said they would like to have better research materials for their work on papers and projects, such as more books on historical figures and access to electronic information sources. "I got information on Abraham Lincoln on the CD-ROM at home. I liked it," said Gina McClure, an upper-level primary student.

It would also be easier for the students to find information in reference materials that are up-to-date. Encyclopedias and biographies in Roundstone's center are old, so they aren't as useful to the students. Students experience difficulty finding recent information in books published in the 1970's. "We get left behind if we don't get on the bandwagon," said Eversole.

Students would also like to see more activities in the media center. They said that sometimes they do not have anything to do at the media center when they are in there with a class.

Cameron organized one project that combined social studies and the media center in which students researched explorers and created art projects and stories. "They (the students) came up with their own choices for their

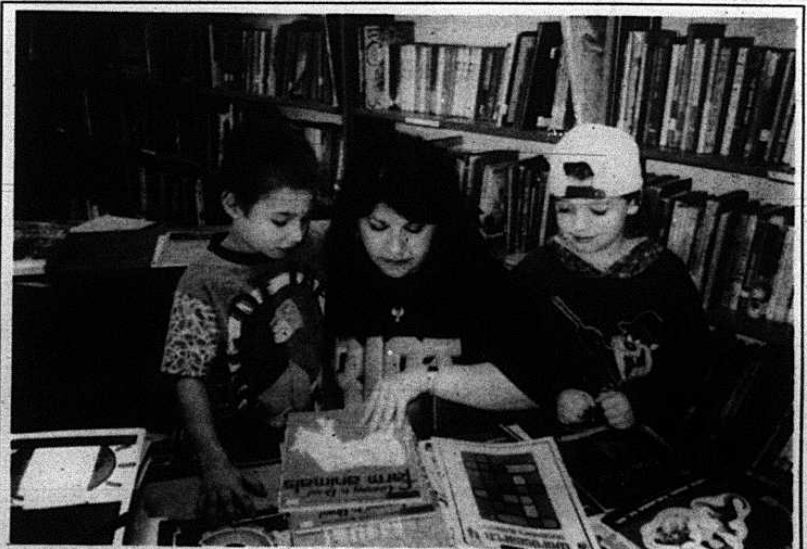
projects. I was very pleased with most of them. They showed lots of effort and a lot of work," said Cameron. She agrees with the students when they say they want more projects in the media center. These activities would encourage students to use the media center more often.

Some of the other changes students wanted to see in the school media center ranged from videos and new books to more comfortable furniture. Jessica Thacker, a fifth-grade student, said that the media center should get new videos that could be used for all students, especially the smaller students. Adam York, another fifth-grade student, said there should be newer books on the shelves. He also said the center desperately needed softer chairs to sit on. Other students laughed and agreed. Kevin Knuckles, a fourth-grade student, thought the media center needed better decorations -- such as posters of real people and pictures of famous historical figures. Amanda Rogers, also a fourth-grade student, felt more biographies of historical figures should be available in the center.

Even when the students came up with these ideas, they knew the rules and standards that would be set in the media center. If they did have more computers to access information, a time limit would be set so that all students would be able to use them.

David Pensol, Roundstone's principal, said the school is planning to make a lot of the changes the students suggested. They have gone to the school council and asked that the funds to be funneled towards the media center, in addition to the large amount of the school budget that has already gone towards the media center.

Pensol plans to make the media center a part of the school's curriculum. To fit it into all the subjects students are studying would help benefit the center as well as the students. "Library power has been good to us. If nothing else, it helps us to kick ideas around with our mentor -- Rosenwald Dunbar," said Pensol. Roundstone has already learned a lot from their mentor school and are very pleased with their media center changes so far.

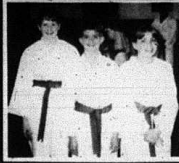

Police seeking former Sheriff Hasty Nineteen arrested on drug related charges

Nineteen Rockcastle' countians got an early wake-up call from state and local police Tuesday morning, after warrants were issued for them in connection with drug related charges.

About thirty police officers began rounding up defendants at 6 a.m. and, by 8 a.m., nineteen people had been arrested, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette. Burdette said that warrants were issued for 21 people, including former Rockcastle County Sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty.

Burdette said that Hasty was not arrested on Tuesday because he was in another state. The arrests were the result of a year-long undercover investigation by Kentucky State Police, according to Rockcastle Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael, who empaneled a special Grand Jury in Rockcastle County last Tuesday. Twelve indictments were returned the other nine people were charged with misdemeanors.

"The Grand Jury returned indictments in each case presented by the state police," said Carmichael. "The state police have done an excellent job and we believe they have very strong evidence against these people," the commonwealth attorney said.

"During the past year we have experienced several drug-related homicides in Rockcastle County,"

Carmichael said. "This morning's round-up sends a message that illegal drug activity will no longer be tolerated nor ignored," he said.

Both Carmichael and Burdette said they plan vigorous prosecutions of those arrested.

Burdette said Wednesday he heard some complaints after the roundup about not arresting other larger possible drug traffickers in the county.

"Tuesday's arrests are a step in the right direction and we feel confident we have put a major dent in the drugs that are sold in the county," he said.

"We have stopped a lot of street sellers and we will continue to work hard to see that this type of crime doesn't go on in the county," he said. Although the former sheriff was not apprehended his son wasn't as lucky.

Chris Anthony Hasty, 20, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of trafficking in a controlled substance. The other eighteen arrested Tuesday were:

Roger Evans, 39, of Mt. Vernon trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of school and trafficking in a controlled substance.

John L. Lamb, 43, of Mt. Vernon trafficking in a controlled substance, third degree, two counts of trafficking in a controlled substance first degree and trafficking in marijuana.

James Ellis Renner, 39, of Mt.

Vernon, trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school, two counts.

Scottie Dale Renner, 19, Mt. Vernon, trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school.

Ottie Monroe Kirby, 33, Mt. Vernon, trafficking in marijuana, two counts.

Charles "Chuck" Sparks, 32, of Mt. Vernon, trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school.

Jessie James Payne, 37, of Mt. Vernon illegal sale of alcoholic beverages, two counts.

Vernon Thomas, 25, Mt. Vernon, trafficking in marijuana and possession of marijuana.

Maude Evans, 45, Mt. Vernon, trafficking in a controlled substance, third degree.

Alvin F. Knuckles, 27, Mt. Vernon, trafficking in a controlled substance, two counts.

Ricky Joseph Caudill, 25, Mt. Vernon, trafficking in a controlled substance.

Ellis Robinson found dead

A Rockcastle County man, missing since October 1995, was discovered last Thursday on a rock ledge above the heavily traveled Ky. 461 Mt. Vernon by-pass.

State highway workers found the body of Ellis Robinson, 31, of Copper Creek, on the middle tier of the steep highway cut along the road, which connects travelers from Interstate 75 to Somerset and Lake Cumberland.

According to a state police news release, Detective Gary Lane said Robinson apparently fell about 75 feet from the top of the cliff. He landed on the ledge and was not visible from the road, said Trooper Billy Madden, the first officer at the scene.

Robinson had been missing since October 28, when he was last seen leaving the home of Darrell Griffin on Negro Town Hill in Mt. Vernon. His body was found not far from Griffin's home.

"He stayed up at the house a lot and usually he walked home," Darrell Griffin said Monday. "He must have gotten turned around and I think he had been drinking," Griffin said.

On Monday Det. Lane and Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said Robinson died from massive head trauma due to the fall, which occurred after nightfall. Lane said au-

topsy results showed that Robinson died instantly in the fall.

When Robinson's family reported him missing, nearly six months ago, members of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad combed the area but could not locate Robinson, probably because there was a snow on the ground.

Police make record number of DUI arrests

Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department made 13 fire runs and assisted the Rockcastle Hospital on numerous occasions in airlifting patients to Lexington hospitals.

Storm loans available

Rockcastle County is among seven Kentucky counties eligible for storm and business loans, the result of home damage in April.

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) named, Rockcastle, Madison, Garrard, Jackson, Jessamine, Clark and Estill and Fayette disaster loan areas, according to the Kentucky Division of Disaster and Emergency Services.

PRECIPOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and sensibilities from the rustling Dell of Wabed, winter home of the late Supreme Court Justice Quigley B. Finn, who once remarked, "What works for you might not work for someone else. So what makes you reckon your way is better?"

Seeing Finn's remark in an old *Wabed Weekly* (later bought out by the *Signal* conglomerate), I set about thinking. (Let the chorus say, "Oh no!") And it was about religion that I was thinking.

The particular line of thought I'm about to impart to you, dearly beloved, commenced for me back in Georgetown College's Pawling Hall, in my dorm room, where a squad of us preacher boys had ganged up on Taki, a brilliant Japanese student, about the same age as the rest of us.

Taki was a Buddhist. That made him a target for every soul-winner on campus. Up to that time, we preacher boys considered the conversion of a Roman Catholic to a Baptist to be the hallmark of soul-winning achievement. But Taki, a *devout* Buddhist, made "savvy" a Catholic pale away into insignificance or whatever things pale away into.

The struggle for Taki's soul was on its way to being over when Taki was a little bit put out, asked, "What makes you so sure your *Christian* religion is the one *true* religion?"

"Because the Bible says so," came a swift reply.

Finally, someone said, "Well, our Bible is right because it works. What it says, it does. Christianity *works*!" And the rest of us who had been stumped were greatly relieved and said things like "Amen!" and "Yea Verily" and "Damn right!"

Taki - gentle he was - let the room grow silent, and then said, "Well, guys, my religion *works* for me." And to that honest confession we had no intellectually-honest rejoinder.

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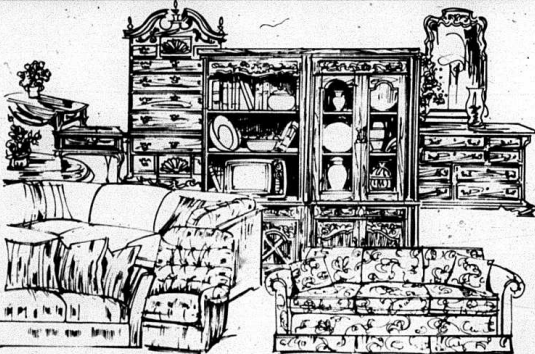

Legislative Update

Legislators may return to Frankfort this summer to address workers' compensation. The governor announced during the regular session of the 1996 Kentucky General Assembly that he would call a special session if his request for legislation was not passed that would delay for one year the collection of \$40 million from the coal industry for the workers' compensation special fund and extend the time the Kentucky Employers Mutual Insurance Authority (KEMA) has to build up its reserves. Both measures were defeated.

A bill that would have made a positive impact on workers' compensation was buried in committee. House Bill 818 would have established definitions for on-the-job injuries and would have excluded aging from the process of determining injury. It would have revised the criteria for determining disability; limited the reopening of claims to within two years from the date of an award or order, and decreased litigation costs. Shortly after the session, the governor instructed the workers' compensation advisory council to hold weekly public hearings in Frankfort to address various problem areas in

the workers' comp system. This eight-member panel is to make recommendations on possible solutions regarding areas such as programs, costs, eligibility, coverage and claims. Testimony will be heard from business owners and business groups, insurance companies about premiums; and representatives from coal industries.

The last three public forums are scheduled for May 16 (Medical Providers); May 23 (Injured Workers); and May 30 (Legal and Rebuttal). Each forum will begin at noon in Room 149 of the Capitol Annex.

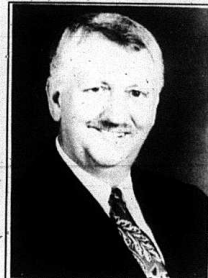

The governor has the sole authority to call a special session and set the agenda. Whether he calls a special session this summer likely hinges on the outcome of these meetings.

The regular session of the 1996 General Assembly ended on April 15. During the 60-day session, 1,333 bills were introduced in the house

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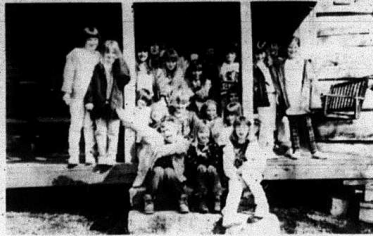

and the senate. Of these, 356 became law. Comparing statistics from the 1992 and 1994 regular sessions, fewer pieces of legislation were introduced and passed into law during the 1996 session. Observers claim this is largely due to the tone set by the democrats restricting plan and the stalemate over a number of issues by both House and Senate members.

A summary of enacted legislation has been compiled into the publication, *General Assembly Action, Regular Session 1996*, and is currently being printed. Copies are now available. To obtain a free copy, contact me or write directly to LRC Publications, Capitol Room 78, Frankfort, KY 40601.

We now head into the time between sessions which is known as the interim. Lawmakers will use the 18 months of the interim to meet with constituents, hold public hearings, examine issues, attend committee meetings and draft legislation in preparation for the next regular session.

Committee meetings will likely resume later this summer in Frankfort. To learn when meetings will be held, you may call the toll-free meeting information line at 1-800-633-9650.

Fifth graders must have shots again

State Law says that every child entering the sixth grade for the first time must have a second MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) and a second physical. These must be presented before your child will be enrolled into the sixth grade this fall. Any student not having these records either already on file or presented upon the first day of school will not be allowed to return to school until he/she brings the required records.

These services can be obtained either at the Health Department or at your doctor's office. Please make an appointment as soon as possible to get this done. Both the Health Department and the doctor's offices will be very busy this summer so it would be advisable to try to get this taken care of before this school year ends. Make an effort to get these records by June 1st so your child will have the

required records to enter the sixth grade, and you will not have to worry about what to do if you are unable to get an appointment this summer.

Be aware that the Immunization Certificate must reflect all the vaccinations that your child has received, not just the second MMR. Also be aware that the sixth grade physical form must be the form approved by the State Department. The correct form is a Sixth Grade Physical form and has the date January, 1993, in the upper, right-hand corner. These are the required records needed for enrollment. If any certificates are incomplete or are on the wrong forms, the parents will be notified and the students will not be allowed to return to school without the corrected records.

By getting these records turned in before this school year is over you

not only will be helping the school but you also will be helping your child's sixth grade year to get off to a good start. Please call the health department or your doctor's office for an appointment today.

The Rockcastle County Health Department and local doctors have the correct forms. If you elect to go outside the county to get these services, please be sure that the correct forms are used. This may prevent your having to make another trip if the wrong form is used or is incomplete. Call your child's school if you think that you may need a copy of your child's immunization certificate (shot record) to take with you to get your child's 2nd MMR. Do this before this summer when there may or may not be someone at school who can make a copy for you.

Your help and cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated.

but this is still the deadline for purchasing coverage. Policies will automatically be terminated if payments are not received in the county office by July 15. Producers may sign the waiver request upon crop certification, signing AD1026 Sodbuster, or anytime earlier.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to extend their contracts or apply for an early release. To apply for an extension or early release application must be filed by May 31, this pertains to

producers who wish to restore their crop acreage bases for the 1996 crop year. For more details contact the office.

Crop certification deadline will be July 15, this is also the last day a tobacco lease may be signed. ALL crops must be planted at the time of certification. It is required this year for ALL producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) file a crop report. It is also a requirement for CRP acreage and fruit or vegetable acreage be reported.

Agriculture News

A one-time sign-up period of May 20 through July 12 has been announced for producers wishing to enroll their farms in a Production Flexibility Contract. The contracts, authorized by the 1996 Farm Bill, are for seven years, beginning in 1996 and ending in 2002.

This is the only opportunity producers will have to enroll and those who fail to do so now will not be eligible at a later date. There will be no further additional signups except for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). This is required by the 1996 Act and there is no discretion to extend this date.

Farms with a planting history in one of the past five years of wheat, corn, grain, sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton or rice are eligible to be enrolled in this program. Farmers

may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and, after sign-up, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty. Base allotment notices will be mailed to producers in early May. Questions are being directed to the FARM BILL HOTLINE at 606-224-7645.

FCIC coverage is no longer a requirement for USDA benefits. Producers who elect not to take out the CAT coverage may waive their disaster benefits and still receive price support benefits. A waiver request form must be signed in the county office if a producer decides not to take the insurance. It is also not necessary to come in by the previous May 2 deadline to cancel coverage.

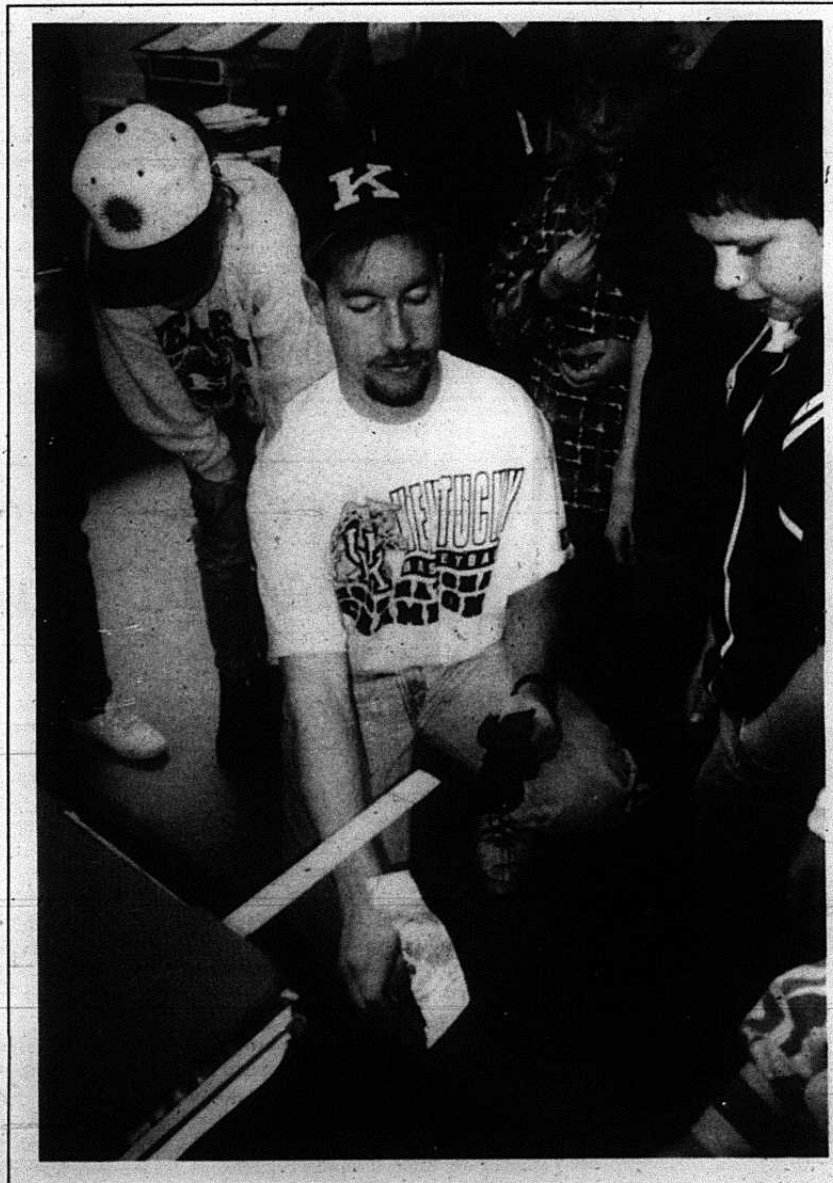

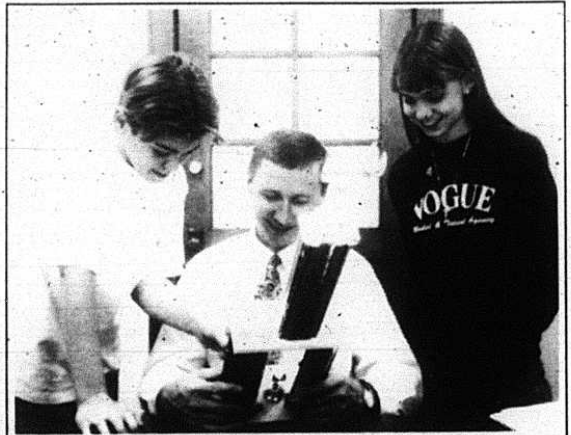
