

## **Rockcastle Manufacturing** expanding current plant

Rockcastle Manufacturing in-formed the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, at its meeting Tuesday, that it plans to expand its Mt. Vernon plant by 5,700

square feet.
The cost of the expansion is esti-mated at \$260,000 and, when completed, the company would add about

mated at \$20,000 and, when completed, the company would add about 10 employees. The \$250,000 cost will be financed by Kentucky Highlands, bringing the total of the company's indebtedness to that group to \$965,094. The company has \$144,1721 equity in the building.

The court had the second reading of an ordinance to close Nicely Camppround Road and approved the closing of nelson. Jones Road in the Copper Creek area, if work is completed as requested and an easement is granted the county for a humaround. The magistrates also voted to extention an agreement with Montgomery County for juvenile incarceration

for \$100 a day and to raise rates for housing Jackson County inmates --charging adults \$22 a day and mental inmates \$32 a day, Rockcastle had 11 Jackson Co. inmates as of Tuesday.

Taking up the most time of the court was a discussion of the jail remodeling project that is required by the state Corrections Cabinet.

Jim Woodrum, president of Architects for the project, reported to the court that the remodeling is 'coming along.' Phase 1 of the construction remodeling totaled \$204,000 and was the most involved phase, Phase. 2 totaled \$114,000 and the decision for the court is now whether to proceed

the court is now whether to proceed with Phase 3 or delay it. Phase 3 would include a 10-bed dormintory on the west side of the cournhout on the west side of the cournhout of replace the 12 beds lost in Phase 2 and would also provide Jailer Joe Howard with an office. The 10 additional beds would bring the occupancy total of the jail to 42.

Woodrum was told to proceed with

drawings and specifications for Phase 3 and bring them to the court who would decide on further action. The court was told that bills for housing juveniles outside the county are still heating up. Montgomery County, charged the county \$200, Lincoin Co. billed \$120, MettSon County charged \$200 and the Big Sandy Regional Jail in Prestonsburg charged a whopping \$3,357. The Rockeastle Co. Sheriff's department got \$7175 for transportation costs.



Food Safety Tips: From Purchase through Consumption

> By: Hazel Jackso County Extension Agent for Home Economics

Symptoms of nausea, stomach cramps and vomiting may indicate more than just the flu. They may also point to food-borne illnesses caused by bacteria. Following flue three steps of keeping food cleen, keeping hot cold from purchase through consumption will keep foods safe and prevent possible illnesses.

At the store, watch for dented cans- or dramaged packages which may cause food spoilage. Avoid cracked or dirty eggs, and take foods home right after shopping so they don't get warm in the car. Once at home, perishable foods such as milk, eggs and meat should be refrigerated or frozen immediately.

Read labels to see which foods Read labels to see which toods need refrigeration, and refrigerate items such as salad dressings- and canned foods after opening. Foods in cabinets should be tightly sealed and away from heat and cleaning products which might contaminate food.

Recommended refrigeration temperature is 37 degrees, and all foods should be wrapped canned foods in glass or plastic containers to prosent metallic least containers to provide the prosent process of the prosent least to the prosent lea



#### Rotational grazing means more money By Tom Mills, County Extension Agent for Agriculture

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of grass needs a recovery time, and totating between fields allows grass stores grow between grazing cycles. The cheapest feed on a livestock. The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals haryest for themselves. Nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grazin.

Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase pasture utilization by at Grage or the store of the grazing cost lives of 50% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed.

Nutrient cycling reduces the need

use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed.
Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures.
Less than 10% of the forages' phosphorus and poussium are removed by livestock; they return most of it as dung and urine.
Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water, and gate areas.

tend to rise near shade, water, and gate areas.

Nutrient removal is much less when pasture is grazed than when it is used to make hay. Thus, starting a good rotational system reduces fertilizer topdressing needed compared to making hay.

Forage quality improves when Animals allowed continuous access to a pasture trample and defecate on significant amounts of forage. These areas often grow up, becoming more mature and lower in quality.

Rotating puts livestock on

Rotating puts livestock on pasture when the forage is at or near its peak nutritive value. Rotated pastures have higher digestibility because forage is key in a vegetative and growing stage with less dead and over-mature material, compared to continuously

grazed pástures. Animals tend to select only the best and leave the worst.

Rotational grazing systems also allow use of species that are more productive and responsive to management including alfalfa,




