Passing Your Property On

During our lifetime, each one of us accumulates property. This can be real property such as real estate, cars, furniture, jewelry and other tangible items. It can also be investments including stocks, bonds, life insurance, and retirement plans.

Do you have an estate plan and the proper legal documents for passing this property to others at your death? If you don't have one, the state of Kentucky has one for you. If you die without a plan, it is known as being "intestate". There is a state law that prescribes the distribution of property for "intestate" estates. Your heirs cannot change it.

Some people mistakenly think that their estate is too small and they don't need to make plans. This isn't true. Everyone who wants to be sure that their estate, no matter how small, goes to those he wants it to, should have a written plan.

If you still need convincing, ask yourself these questions. If I were to die tonight, what would happen to my property? Would my family be able to pay my bills? Would they be able to survive economically?

The first step in making out your plan is to list all of your assets. This is a list of everything you own. If you might be surprised at how much you really have to pass on to someone at your death. You also need a list of all of your liabilities. The difference between these two lists will be helpful in determining which estate planning tools will save you the most in taxes and other estate settlement costs.

Then you need to decide what you want to happen with your property. Put your estate plans on paper. Do you want to provide for the economic security of your

spouse? Do you want to be sure that any minor children are cared for? How will you provide for paying the expenses of your estate at your death? Do you want to transfer specific property to specific people? The list can be endless. You need to write down your thoughts and concerns.

There are three basic ways to transfer property at death. It can be done through probate with a will, or with a trust, or by gifting. Find out about each of these options and talk to an estate planning professional about which one or combination of these methods will meet your estate goals. It may take a combination of them.

The laws pertaining to estates and estate taxes are constantly changing. It is worthwhile to consult professional people who keep up to date on these laws and regulations. The money you spend for this professional help will be worthwhile to your family at the time of your death.

The people who can help you with your plans will include an attorney, an accountant and possibly an insurance agent, a financial planner, and an investment broker. It is also helpful to talk to other family members and friends about their experience with estate planning. Choose the professionals you feel comfortable working with. Remember, they are working for you.

You can reduce the amount you spend for professional help by doing some of your homework before you go to see them. Most professionals charge for their time, so the more you do before you see them will save you time and thus money when you meet with them.

Whatever your goals and plans, remember to take charge of your estate plans and don't leave the plans to the Kentucky intestate plan.

Kentucky has 5 million acres of fescue, and most of it is the high endophyte fescue type. We're not going to get rid of it, so we may have to learn to live with it. Earlier breeding is one way to do that.

Last year, Burreis conducted a study on UK's herd at its Research and Education Center in Princeton. He started his breeding program a month earlier, on April 20th. From April 20th to May 20th, he had 17 of 20 cows successfully rebred. From May 20th to June 20th, he had 17 of 21. Then, from June 20th on, he had 8 of 16, only 50% of his cows successfully rebred.

Burreis states that that certainly supports his thesis that an earlier beginning to the breeding program is better. UK is continuing the experiment again this year, but Burreis believes last year's data will be repeated. **Why would a farmer not want**

to begin his breeding program earlier? Many people don't want their cows to calve in February because it's cold. But Burreis feels that February is really not that much colder than March and it might be less muddy which would be an advantage during calving time.

February is also a less busy month for most farming activities which would be an advantage. Also, if the calves were born earlier, the farmer would have increased weaning weights in the fall, because the calves would be a month older.

Managing pyrethroid-resistant horn flies

Development of insecticide-resistant horn flies is a selection process similar to that used to improve a cattle herd. Continuous use of a particular active ingredient can kill susceptible flies. Inevitably

produce offspring that are harder to kill, meaning a control failure. The active ingredient that once gave good control is no longer effective.

Resistance had developed at several locations in Kentucky where cattle ear tags impregnated with synthetic pyrethroid insecticides were used for several consecutive years. So far, no resistance problem has been seen with organophosphate insecticides. These two insecticide classes attack the nervous system of the horn fly differently so rotation keeps from pressuring one activity site.

Here are some tips for using insecticide-impregnated ear tags:
1) Rotate synthetic pyrethroids with organophosphates. Avoid continued use of a particular class of insecticide year after year.
2) Wait to tag. Begin treatment when there are 200 or more flies per animal. This may not occur until early to mid-June. Treating

too early, especially with ear tags, may mean poor control in late summer when the flies are most abundant and can lead to resistance.
3) Change application methods regularly. Use dust bags, back-rubbers or sprays instead of relying continuously on ear tags. Continued use of an insecticide in a slow release form (ear tag) may

Breed cows earlier for better profits

Farmers who begin to breed their beef cows after the traditional recommended May 20 start-up date may be hurting themselves in the pocketbook.

By starting the breeding program a month earlier, University of Kentucky research suggests farmers may achieve a significantly higher pregnancy rate among their cattle herds which graze fescue pastures.

Two years ago, we began to

notice poor breeding rates across the state," said Roy Burreis, Extension Beef Specialist with UK's College of Agriculture. "We noticed that most cows were being bred earlier or they weren't conceiving at all."

So Burreis looked at 10 years data on weather patterns and found that after June 20, the weather typically hovered over 90 degrees. Temperature that high apparently interferes with cattle re-breeding, especially for cattle feeding on high endophyte fescue.

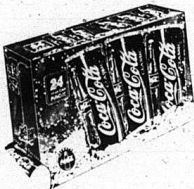

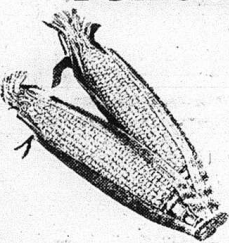

Agriculture News

Sign-up has started for the Production Flexibility Program. This program replaces the Wheat and Feed Grain Program which has always been administered through FSA. Sign-up will extend until July 12. This is the only opportunity that producers will have to enroll in this 7 year program, except for producers with land coming out of CRP (Conservation Reserve Program). Any farm with a crop acreage base (CAB) is eligible to participate. Base allotment notices have been mailed to producers who are eligible in Rockcastle County. There are no planning requirements and no set-aside acres for this new program. If at any time a producer who has signed up in a program wishes to terminate his contract within the 7 years, he may do so without penalties. Come in and we will be glad to answer questions about the program and work up the amount of payment your farm would earn in this program. Farms with CABs that do not enroll in the PF Program, their CAB will be reduced to zero.

FCIC is no longer a requirement for USDA benefits. Producers who elect not to take out insurance coverage may waive their disaster benefits and still receive price support benefits. A waiver request form must be signed in the county office if a producer decides on this option. Waivers may be signed upon crop certification or anytime prior to receiving marketing cards or Production Flexibility contract payments.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to

extend their contracts, or apply for an early release. To apply for an extension of early release, application must be filed by May 31, this pertains to producers who wish to restore their crop acreage bases for the 1996 crop year. For more details contact the office.

Crop certification deadline will be July 1st, this is also the last day a tobacco lease may be signed. ALL crops must be planted at the time of certification. It is important for ALL producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) to file a crop reports. It is also a requirement for CRP acreage and fruit or vegetable acreage to be reported.

CRP acreage will be released in all counties nationwide for emergency haying and grazing, based on a national livestock economic emergency. CRP participants may file requests for emergency haying and grazing in all counties in all states regardless of weather conditions and production levels. Grazing provisions are effective immediately and haying provisions are effective July 1. For more information, contact the FSA Office.

eventually lead to resistance.
4) Lactating cows and growing calves appear to have the greatest potential for loss to horn fly attack. Give them top priority.

Confirmed problems with pyrethroid-resistant horn flies in Kentucky are infrequent but can occur anywhere. The suggestions

listed above should minimize the potential for future problems. However, practices on surrounding farms will have an effect on flies. Should resistance develop, these suggestions are the only way to obtain satisfactory control.

There are many brand names and switching between brands is not the objective of ear tag rotation. Switch between organophosphate and synthetic pyrethroid active ingredients.

Flies will move in from other areas. A recent Georgia study showed that horn flies can move three miles or more (other studies have shown greater flights). This means that dust bags or backrubbers may be needed if fly numbers move in and exceed 200 per head.

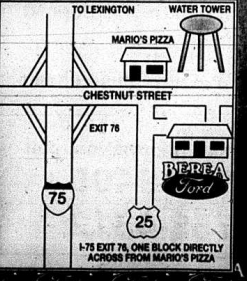

A Brodhead man has been sentenced to ten years in prison for the September 1993 shooting death of another Brodhead man.

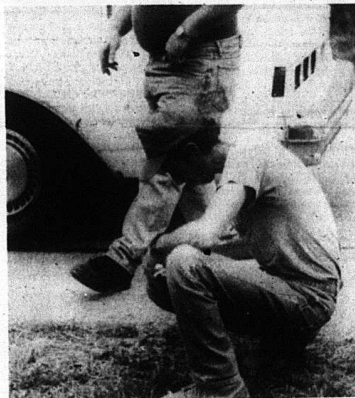
On Friday a Pulaski County Circuit Jury found William J. Ross, 33, guilty of murdering Charles Eddie Hopkins on September 17, 1993.

Baptist preacher killed on 150

A Baptist preacher from Tennessee died in a single car wreck on Hwy. 150 Tuesday afternoon.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said that LeQuine Lee Lambert, 56, of LaFollette, died the day before his 57th birthday from a broken neck.

Lambert was pronounced dead on arrival at the Rockcastle Hospital.

Tommy Renner of Mareburg, who witnessed the wreck, said that Lambert was traveling west at a very high rate of speed, when he pulled out to pass near Houston Point Estates.

Renner said that Lambert tried to pass in a no passing zone and when he got into the eastbound lane he met another truck.

The eyewitness said that Lambert then jerked his 1994 Nissan pickup back into the westbound lane, losing control of the vehicle.

Renner told police Lambert's vehicle went off the right side of the road, then went back into the eastbound lane, becoming airborne and hitting a telephone pole.

Dowell said that Lambert was apparently enroute to his church in Washington County.

Officers found and confiscated 377 cans of beer and 8 bottles of whiskey. Making the Saturday raid were Deputies Randall Reynolds, Jack Weaver and Ronnie Roark.

Former Sheriff to be arraigned Thursday

Former Rockcastle County Sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty, 49, will be arraigned in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Thursday, (today), after he was arrested last week and charged with several drug related crimes.

Hasty has been lodged in the Rockcastle County jail under a \$75,000 bond since he was returned to Rockcastle County last Friday.

Hasty was among twenty-one Rockcastle county residents arrested by state and local police on May 7 after a year long undercover investigation.

At the time of the initial round-up Hasty was not arrested, but a few days later he was picked up in Salen Indiana by Indiana State Police.

Hasty is charged with selling cocaine, marijuana and dextropropoxyphene, a controlled substance.

Three vie for seat in state senate

Many Rockcastle County voters will probably miss next Tuesday's Primary Election, because of a lack of interest.

But, voters should remember they will help elect the next State Senator from Kentucky's 21 District, of which Rockcastle County is a part.

A longtime political figure, a Jackson County educator and a London attorney are all vying for the Republican nomination Tuesday, which will no doubt send them to Frankfort as the state senator. No Democrats are on the ballot and any opposition to the Republican nominee this fall would have to come by way of a write-in candidate.

The winner from the three candidates, incumbent Albert Robinson, of Viva in Laurel County, Attorney Mike Dean of London and Helen Jackson of Tyner, will represent Rockcastle, Laurel, Jackson and Knox counties in Frankfort.

The new senate district was the product of redistricting by the legislature this winter.

Robinson has served as State Representative and State Senator for a total of 17 years in Frankfort.

He was elected to his senate post in a special election in 1994 and

served as state representative for 15 years.

The longtime Laurel businessman said that he does not expect a tough race for re-election, "but I'm not taking any chances," he said.

Robinson, 57, is a real estate agent.

Former Laurel County Trial Commissioner Mike Dean is not only an attorney, he is also a civil engineer.

He is attempting to gain political office for the first time. Dean has owned several small businesses and has practiced law and engineering in Laurel County since 1989.

Jackson County educator Helen Jackson, is Director of Pupil Personnel and a grant writer for that county's board of education.

Ms. Jackson said in a news release on Monday that she thinks education should be the top priority in the race for the state senate.

Jackson said that she had recently been appointed to serve on the National Council of Women Advisors to Congress. She will join women leaders from business, government, political and community organizations from all 50 states.

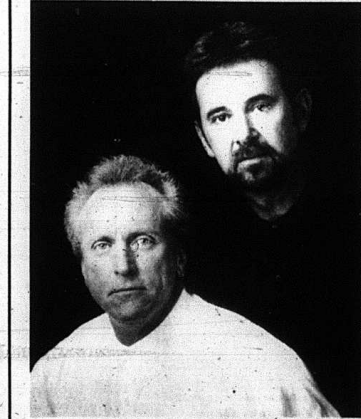
Money for food, shelter in county

"You could have also told me that it wouldn't be daylight at this hour if you'd really wanted to be of any help," I snapped back.

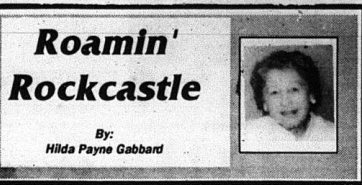

I called Mary Harding to get news from her. She said the revival had gotten over at Clear Creek which was held by their pastor, Sherman Hill and it had been a good one.

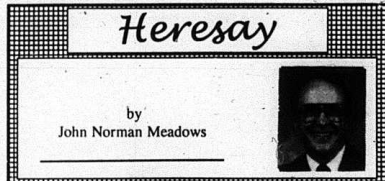
In two or three weeks, a Vacation Bible School will take place there at the church house.

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and abnormalities from the rarely-ruffled Weald of Wabd, that ubiquitous owner of *La Zuerie* in Wabd's French Quarter and part-time columnist for *The Wabsonian Weekly*, who wrote, "Most accidents happen accidentally."

Speaking of accidents and the unexpected, Nancy and I were twice started last week by news from our two sons, Mark and Mike.

Mike, who lives in Indianapolis and works for Eli Lilly Corporation, flew into Boston on a business trip last week. (Many planes come into Logan International from out over the Atlantic. You think you're going into the drink. At least I did, on my very first flight in '66.)

Mike told us that just as the plane was about to touch down the pilot gave the craft full-throttle, and they went "straight-up," it seemed to Mike. Pandemonium ensued, and not until four minutes later were they told by the pilot that another plane

was on the runway! (We know, of course, why it took the pilot four minutes to speak over the inter-com. Pretty good time, considering the near-miss cockpit mess he was in.)

A couple of days later I answered the phone. It was Mark, our LA rhythm and blues son - Bassman, Defender of the Groove, he calls himself.

"Hello, Daddy," he said in a not-so-Markian tone of voice. I immediately tensed. He was in Japan, I knew, on a ten day tour with Johnny "Guitar" Watson's R&B Band. He had called us from there a few days before. Why is he calling now? I wondered.

"We've got us a real problem, Daddy."

"What's wrong, Mark?"

"Well, last night we were into our first song at a concert in Yokohama," he said, "and Johnny had a stroke and died right in front of me."

Last Sunday's *Herald-Leader* had a few paragraphs on Johnny in the "Elsewhere" section of the obituary page. In addition to being a popular recording artist in the late fifties, he had quite an influence on some later great guitarists, including Jim Hendrix and Eric Clapton. Frank Zappa gave Watson the credit for his initial interest in playing the guitar.

And Watson, 61, was ushering our Mark into the "big time." Mark was the only white in the band, but

New method being used

RECC crews begin summer clearing of rights-of-way

Overgrown rights-of-way can be hazardous to your electric service, and Jackson County RECC has joined ranks of utilities across the country that are turning to herbicide spraying to keep them clear.

Crews will begin spraying 115 acres in northern Jackson County and 450 acres in Rockcastle County this week. Almost 1,300 acres in Lee and Owsley County are also targeted for spraying beginning in July.

The spraying program not only provides an economical way to clear overgrown trees and brush, but also comes with an environmentally safe stamp of approval.

The herbicides used for the program are similar to common spray many of us use to control weeds in our own front yards. Roundup," said Jackson County RECC Operations Manager Lee Dunsil.

According to information from the Monsanto Company, which manufactures herbicides used by Jackson County RECC, the chemi-

cals must pass more than 120 different environmental studies before they are registered for use.

Those used by the RECC spraying program have proven to be less toxic than ordinary table salt. The herbicides have also been classified as non carcinogenic by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The chemical is administered by using a backpack sprayer, which enables crews to reach areas that had been inaccessible to mechanical cutters. The backpacks also allow them to spray selective plants and areas, rather than mechanically clearing large tracts at a time.

Spraying also reduces the use of heavy machinery, which can disturb the soil and wildlife nesting areas.

In addition to being environmentally safe, Dunsil said the spray will enable the cooperative to extend the right-of-way clearing cycle. He hopes to eventually spray once every 10 years versus mechanically cutting a right-of-way every three years.

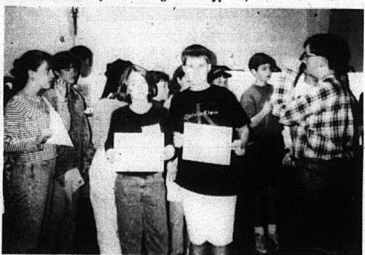

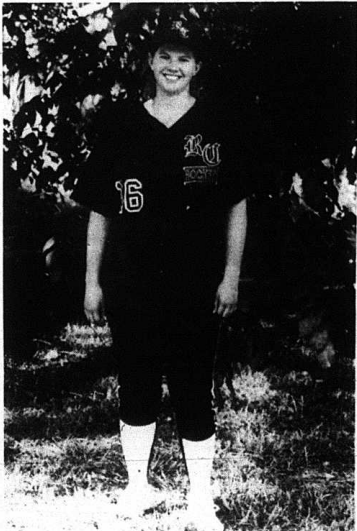

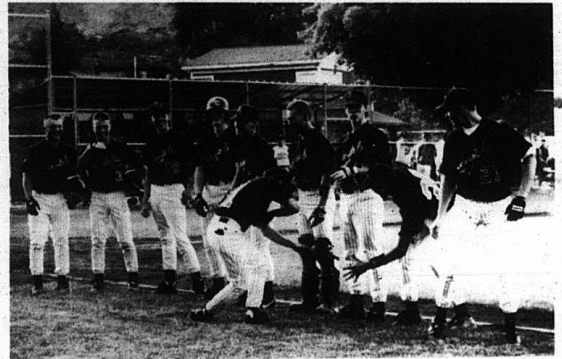
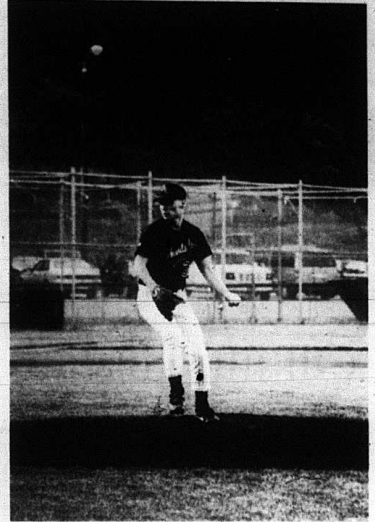
Cotton named to all tournament team

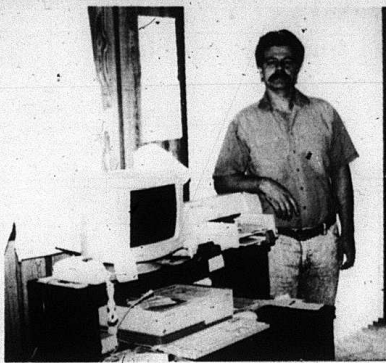

All children will be served the same meals at no separate charge regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, age or handicap.

The following federal income scale is the current criteria for determining eligibility for free meal service to children at camp sites.

The maximum yearly income eligibility standards range from \$13,820 for one family member to \$46,972 for eight.

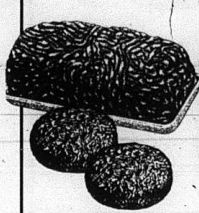

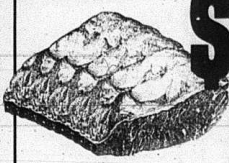

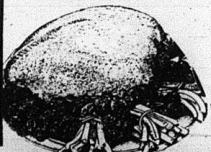

An Experience of a Lifetime

On March 24, 1996, circa 1,000 youths from grades 6-8 gathered in Louisville's Flamingo Hotel and Conference Center for the 1996 East Regional Kentucky United Nations Assembly (KUNA). These young people were prepared to debate global issues.

The first day everyone was in a scurry trying to get ready for the Festival of Nations. Everyone had previously been assigned a country to represent. Dressing in their country's native clothes, people set up their displays. It was interesting tasting all of the different foods each country had to offer. (If you're ever in Germany remember to try the double chocolate cake, with a cherry on top!) There of course, also, was the blaring of native songs, maybe even a national anthem or two, traditional dances and sharing of customs and language.

Following the Festival of Nations all the delegates split up into different committee sessions. In committee number seven I listened patiently and eagerly as the authors read proposals. Everyone was given the opportunity to ask questions and participate in the pro-con debate. Before adjourning the evening session, a runoff election was held for the office of Secretary General.

General Assembly began with a prayer from the Assembly Chancellor, but the delegates separated to their individual council meetings. In the Security Council, proposals pertaining to matters of world-wide security were introduced and voted on. Rockcastle's Fiji delegation's proposal was narrowly defeated by an eight to seven vote.

The General Assembly gathered again later for debate on proposals deemed of international importance. Gaubring back into the council during the afternoon, delegates introduced, explained, debated, and voted on proposals. The Cyprus authors faced an uphill battle with their proposal. It was soundly defeated. Venezuela's proposal, narrowly defeated in committee, met strong opposition in council. The Togo delegation, with an outstanding proposal,

was the only Rockcastle County delegation to have a proposal deemed favorable by committee and council. All 60 delegates should be congratulated for their excellent work.

After a full day, the delegates and advisors were exhausted and famished. They gathered in the main conference room for the delicious Banquet of Nations. While eating, we were inspired by the story of Dr. David Livingstone and touched by the Ambassador of Goodwill Awards.

When many of us first came here on Sunday, we didn't quite know what to expect, including me. But we all met new friends and had many good times. Really, it was an experience of a life time. I think everyone learned a little something. (I know I did!) I enjoyed seeing all of the different native dresses and discovering whole new countries that are a part of my world. It was a great, great time for everyone I believe; well, everyone who didn't get sent home! As I leave, I will remember the pride of each country, the friends I met, and the learning that took place at the 1996 East Regional Kentucky United Nations Assembly. I am certain, as a jet jolly down my face, but there is a next time, there will another KUNA, and I plan to be there.

Food, Shelter Grant for County

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local government or private voluntary organizations chosen to receive funds must 1) be non-profit, 2) have an accounting system and conduct an annual audit, 3) practice nondiscrimination, 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply. Rockcastle County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Development Council and R.E.A.P. participating. They were responsible for providing 7145 meals and 375 nights of lodging.

Other races in Tuesday's election include a statewide race for the democratic nomination to the U.S. Senate and an already virtually decided race for the Republican nomination for President.

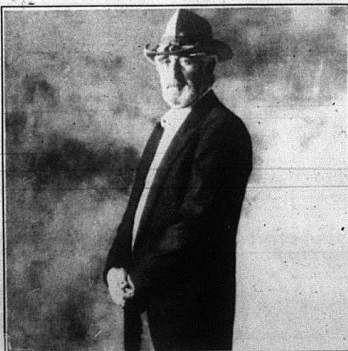
He has numerous television ap-

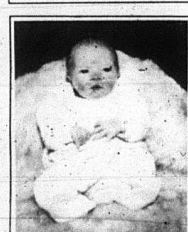

Dr. Sparks dies at Murray

Dr. Harry M. Sparks, 88, president emeritus of Murray State University died Monday, May 20 at Murray-Calloway County Hospital. He was born in Rockcastle County on July 27, 1907, the son of the late Robert A. Sparks and Lena Bentley Sparks. Dr. Sparks began his long career at Murray State in 1948, serving first as professor and then chairman of the Department of Education.

After 15 years on the faculty, he took a leave of absence and served as Superintendent of Public Instruction for the Commonwealth of Kentucky from 1964 to 1968. On January 8, 1968, he became president of Murray State University, serving until his retirement in 1973.

Dr. Sparks began his long and distinguished career of service in education in 1930 in the Breckinridge County Schools. He taught, coached and was principal and superintendent. McDaniel's Elementary School was his first assignment, then Hardinsburg High School and Irvington High School. He then went to Russell High School in 1941 as principal and left in 1944 to enlist in the U.S. Navy. He became principal of Mayfield High School in 1947.

He received his early education in the Mt. Vernon public schools. He attended Bethany College in West Virginia and received an A.B. degree with cum laude honors from Transylvania University in Lexington. He completed both his master's and doctoral degrees at the University of Kentucky.

His military service in the Navy extended from June 1944 through 1946. He was stationed at the 7th Naval District Headquarters in Miami, with the rank of lieutenant

commander.

As a recognized leader in public education, Dr. Sparks received many honors and awards. He was president of the Kentucky Education Association in 1960; named a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Kentucky and Transylvania University; received honorary doctoral degrees from Murray State, Union College, Morehead State University and Eastern Kentucky University and was named "Man of the Year" in 1970 by the Murray Chamber of Commerce.

He served as an educational consultant to the Republic of West Germany in 1964 and, in 1971, he was presented the Outstanding Civilian Service Award by the U.S. Army. He served as consultant on education to the Kentucky Legislature and represented the cause of the public education before various congressional groups in Washington, D.C.

Upon his retirement from Murray State, the Harry M. Sparks Distinguished Lecture Series was established in his honor. One of the University's administrative buildings bears his name.

A member of Murray's First United Methodist Church, he served on the administrative board and was

Sunday School superintendent. He also taught the Gleaners Sunday School class for more than 20 years.

Dr. Sparks was well-known as a humorist and as one of Kentucky's best and most popular speakers.

9,733 Rockcastle Countians registered

Rockcastle Countians contributed to Kentucky's new record high of 2,317,928 registered voters, according to Secretary of State John Y. Brown III, chairman of the State Board of Elections.

The county now has a total of 9,733 citizens registered to vote in the May 28 primary election, according to Brown.

Of that total 1,821 are registered as Democrats and 7,659 are registered as Republicans. Those registered as independents or with no political party preference equals 253.

Ten voter registration across Kentucky this year was nine times greater than the annual average from previous years. Brown attributed the

Hunter Education course offered May 23, 24, 25

A free Kentucky Hunter Education course will be held on May 23, 24 and 25 located at the Rockcastle County Extension Office on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon. The ten hour course, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and the Rockcastle County 4-H Club will include classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting, and ammunition. The last session will include actual range firing and an examination.

Upon successful completion of the course, a graduate card will be issued which is valid in any state where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification.

Effective March 1, 1991, all hunters born on or after January 1, 1975, shall, while hunting, carry a valid hunter education course graduate card in addition to the appropriate Kentucky hunting license requirements. A bow hunter not in possession of a firearm may carry a "National Bowhunter Education Program" course completion card in lieu of the

increase to the fact that the state board mailed letters to 43,350 17-year old Kentuckians to advise them of their opportunity to register to vote in the primary election because they will be 18 by the date of the November general election.

A total of 22,898 responded to the direct mail effort since the last general election in November 1995. Brown said that in prior years only an average of 2500 teens registered annually.

Brown and the state board of elections are hoping for a larger voter turnout this primary election. In the last presidential primary election in 1992 only 26.5 percent of the state's registered voters cast a ballot.
