This ogram replaces the Wheat and Feed program replaces the Wheat and Feed Grain Program which has always been administered through FSA. Sign-up will extend until July 12. This is the only opportunity that producers will have to enroll in this 7 year program, except for producers with land com-

Waivers may be signed upon crop certification, or anytime prior to reciving marketing cards or Production Flexibility contract payments.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to extend their contracts, or apply for early release. To apply for early release. ### **RCMS** transformed into **Brazilian Rainforest**

On Friday, May 17th the Rockcastle County Middle School Media
Center was transformed into a Brazilian (Amazon) Rainforest. Using language of the Markey of the Markey

Title 1 and the District Basic Arts Program.

As the students talked about the global impact of the rainforest, the students themselves decided in order to have a truly realistic impact, the unit must be brought home to Rock-casile County. They therefore decided to incorporate the following elements into this unit: the effects of deforestation, water pollution, endangered species, loss of habitat/environments and loss of traditional culture ori/personal lives within native communities.

After much collaboration among the Shooting Stars team of teachers lents, each instructor enthusi astically began developing an abstract of individual activities appropriately aligned with the curriculums in their aligned with the curriculums in their subject areas. It was decided, in order for the unit to fully develop a 6 week time frame would be appropriate. The primary students at Mt. Vernon Elementary School worked on a two week rainforest unit in preparation for the "Partnership Day" on May 17th

While emphasizing this project as While emphasizing this project as interdisciplinary, the guiding strength remained media-center based with a thematic life science approach. The next phase of planning began by meeting with the music specialist, art specialist, and life skills instruc-

Art activities focused on incorporating various art mediums including 3-D construction techniques to create a large mural, backdrop and free standing objects and animals for the media center (library) setting. Life skills instruction exposed students to the food crops and their uses in the Brazilian Rainforest studies to be food crops and their uses in the Brazilian Rainforest setting the content of the standing objects of the consumption on "partnership" day. The Shooting Stars also visted an actual Rainforest setting at the Cincinnati Zoo. Students then compared and contrasted documented facts perceived (from the media center research) with the actuality of the Rainforest setting.

To continue the students' self-evaluation of activities gleaned during the unit, a video providing ongoing documentation collected from the beginning of the unit through the culminating activities was produced. ### Homemade foodsdon't be misinformed

A number of enterprising people are tempted to perfect a favorite recipe and put it on market for some extra income. That is all very fine and can be accomplished with some and can be accomplished with some effort and cooperation with the state's food standards, according to Steve Midkiff of the Rockcastle County Health Center. First, there are some questions which need to be considered.

questions which need to be considered.

Ask-yourself, "Is my kitchen at home acceptable for preparing the food product I intend to sell?" The answerts, "No." The Kentucky Food Establishment Act and State Retail Food Code prohibits the use or sale of any foods prepared or processed in the home.

"If my home is not acceptable, then where can I prepare my product?" An ordinary room or building that is separate from the home's domestic living operations may be the first step. This "facility" must be properly equipped with sanitary sinks, ahand washing sink and anemployee toilet room. Of course, plans for the construction, alterations and plumbing must be submitted and reviewed by the local health department prior by the local health department prior to being sent to the state Department of Housing, Building, and Construction in Frankfort.
In addition, the water supply and

In addition, the water supply and the sewage disposal system must be approved by the appropriate authori-ties unless on a municipal system. Once all equipment and sanitary facilities have been installed and

construction, etc., is completed in ac-cordance with approved plans; a health department representative must conduct an inspection of the establishment and determine if the operations are in conformance with the regulations. If foods are to be laced in retail incharge before sale placed in retail packages before sale, labeling must conform to state and federal labeling requirements. A permit fee is sharged to help defray the cost of administering this vital consumer protection service.

The public depends on health and regulatory officials for protection from foodborne illness. 


