

# Central Baptist to observe 32nd anniversary

The Central Baptist Church will observe its 32nd anniversary with special services Sunday, June 2, through Wednesday, June 6.

Dr. Bruce Cummons will be preaching for these services. Dr. Cummons is the founder of the Massillon Baptist Temple of Massillon, Ohio, and pastored that church for forty-five years. He also founded the Massillon Baptist College and the Massillon Christian School and served as president of the school and administrator of the Christian School for twenty-two years.

Upon resigning the pastorate of the Massillon Baptist Temple to enter the field of evangelism, he became Pastor Emeritus of the Church and Chancellor of Massillon Baptist Church.

Pastor Cummons was born in Parkersburg, West Virginia, July 25, 1924 and attended elementary schools and Parkersburg High School in that city.

Upon completing three years of service in the U.S. Navy during World War II, he then enrolled in and graduated from McKim Technical Insti-

tute of Akron, Ohio. Mr. Cummons then felt the call of God upon his life to preach the gospel, and graduated from Bible Baptist Seminary of Fort Worth, Texas, under the leadership and training of Dr. J. Frank Norris

and Dr. Louis Entzinger. Pastor Cummons holds a Bachelor of Divinity degree, and an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from BBS. The Bible Baptist Seminary is now Arlington Baptist College, Arlington, Texas.

Doctor Cummons is also a graduate of Christian Writers Institute of Chicago, Illinois, and has taken extension work from Moody Bible Institute. He was awarded another

honorary degree, Doctor of Letters, from Calvary Bible Institute of Toledo, Ohio.

Pastor Cummons is the author of over 35 books and booklets and several of these have been translated into other languages and distributed in other countries of the world.

He is the Editor of the "Baptist Reporter," and sermons from the "Penny Pulpit" ministry, and in several other periodicals, in the numbers of several hundreds of thousands of copies. In addition to the pastorate, he has conducted over 400 Revival Meetings, Bible Conferences, and Faith-Promise Mission Conferences during his years of ministry.

For some twenty years of his ministry the "Grace and Peace" radio broadcast was aired over 45 to 50 radio stations and over-seas stations, which covered 80% of the land area of the world.

Pastor Cummons and his wife, Wanda, have been married for 48 years, and have three daughters and nine grandchildren.

One of Pastor Cummons' favorite statements is, "God has been mighty to this preacher! To God Be The Glory! Great Things He Hath Done!" Sunday School will be at 10:00 a.m. and Dr. Cummons will be preaching at 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

Sunday and 7:00 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Pastor Head and the church extend a cordial invitation to all to attend these services. The church is located on US 25 South in Mt. Vernon.

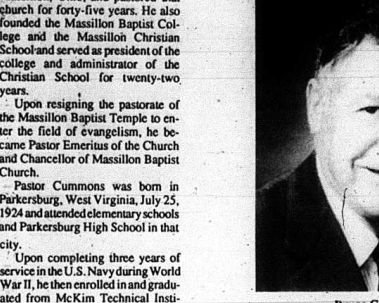

Summer is a very busy time for us here at the library. We always have a lot of visitors from out of state doing genealogy research. And people from this state looking for information on their family history. Our resources are limited but we will do the best we can to help anyone. We have census records from 1840 to 1920 on microfilm and some census books. Also the Mt. Vernon Signal on microfilm from 1887 to the present time with the exception of a few years in the 30's and 40's. A lot of family histories, marriage records and cemetery records are available.

The Summer Reading Program (Everyone a Winner-Read) will be beginning in June and continuing into July. Our theme this year will be centered on the Olympics that will be held in Atlanta this summer. Betty has a lot of interesting things planned for the children, preschool through age 12. I will have the exact dates and more information on some of the planned programs in my next article. We were pleased to have the South Mt. Vernon precinct have the primary election in the library. We were hoping a lot of people would see the transformation that has been made in our library. We are all so pleased with the results and we want everyone else to see the changes.

Again I have to apologize to our patrons for having to be closed for four days two weeks ago. This was necessary because of sewer problems. Hopefully this will not happen again and we will not have to be closed for any reason in the future except for holidays.

Some new books available for your

summer reading enjoyment are 1. THE RUNAWAY JURY by John Grisham. . . In Biloxi, Mississippi, a landmark tobacco trial, with hundreds of millions of dollars at stake, begins routinely then swerves mysteriously off course. The jury is behaving strangely, and at least one juror is convinced he's being watched. Soon they have to be sequestered. Then a tip from an anonymous young woman suggests she is able to predict the juror's increasingly odd behavior.

Is the jury somehow being manipulated, or even controlled? If so, by whom? And, more important why? Another great novel by John Grisham.

2. . . A non-fiction book, IN CONTEMPT by Christopher Darden.

. . . For more than a year, Christopher Darden argued passionately and tirelessly, giving voice to the victims of the O.J. Simpson murder trial. But few people knew that he was fighting a deeper, more insidious battle-against racism that came from all sides. When the case was over and O.J. Simpson was set free, the disheartened prosecutor bore the anguish and disillusionment of millions of Americans. He also carried wounds that perhaps no other black person has ever felt as deeply. Now, out of the sensational frenzy of the "trial of the century" comes a haunting and poignant memoir of duty, justice, and the constant, powerful undertow of American bigotry.

In a country stunned by the wide gulf in perspective among the races, IN CONTEMPT is an important book, one that challenges Americans to turn the civil rights debate toward the ideas that truly matter. "Somehow," says Darden, "we have allowed the murder trial of a simple football player to define race relations in America."

3. . . TIME PRESENT, TIME PAST by Bill Bradley. . . In a memoir at once deeply felt, lively and astute, Bill Bradley

talks about his life, his country, his role in government, and his hopes for the American future.

He speaks with affection about his small-town Missouri upbringing and the values shaped by it. He traces his road from childhood to Princeton to Oxford to ten years of professional basketball to public service in the US Senate. And he brings vividly alive the world of a senator-the rocky road to legislation, the invasiveness of the media, the power of money.

4. GIDEON'S TORCH by Charles Colson. . . The election is barely over and J. Whitney Griswold is still basking in his surprise victory when an assassin's bullet strikes down a controversial doctor in Fargo, North Dakota, sounding a deadly challenge to the agenda of the new administration. Even before he can set a path for his presidency, Griswold finds him-

self propelled headlong on a course of inevitable disaster.

Packed with graphic, behind-the-scenes details only a Washington insider could know, GIDEON'S TORCH rings true because of Chuck Colson's actual experience; his days in the Nixon White House, his nights making the rounds of D.C.'s diplomatic and social circles, and his intimate knowledge of the capital's political elite.

I hope these reviews help you in selecting books. Most of these books may be found in other libraries, not just this library.

I like to have suggestions for purchasing books. This helps me to help others.

I have recently purchased several books of Christian literature for both adults and our younger patrons. I hope you will enjoy these.

## Kiwanis News

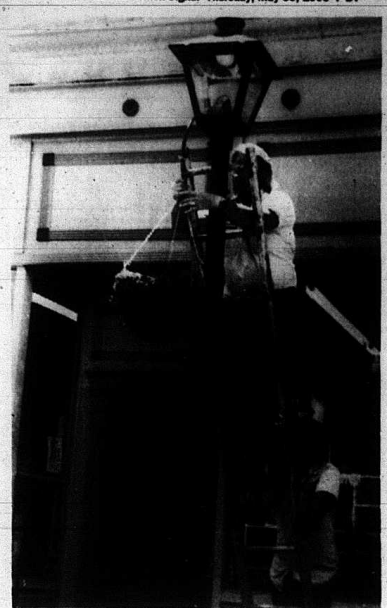

Sign-up has started for the Production Flexibility Program. This program replaces the Wheat and Feed Grain Program which has always been administered through FSA. Sign-up will extend until July 12. This is the only opportunity that producers will have to enroll in this 7 year program, except for producers with land com-

ing out of CRP (Conservation Reserve Program). Any farm with a crop acreage base (CAB) is eligible to participate. Base allotment notices have been mailed to producers who are eligible in Rockcastle County. There are no planting requirements and no set-aside acres for this new program. If at any time a producer who has signed up in the program wishes to terminate his contract within the 7 years, he may do so without penalties. Come in and we will be glad to answer questions about the program and work up the amount of payment your farm would earn in this program. Farms with CABs that do not enroll in the PF Program, their CAB will be reduced to zero.

FCIC is no longer a requirement for USDA benefits. Producers who elect not to take out insurance coverage may waive their disaster benefits and still receive price support bene-

fits. A waiver decides on this option. Waivers may be signed upon crop certification, or anytime prior to receiving marketing cards or Production Flexibility contract payments.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to extend their contracts, or apply for early release. To apply for an extension or early release, application must be filed by May 31, this pertains to producers who wish to restore their crop acreage bases for the 1996 crop year. For more details contact the office.

Crop certification deadline will be July 1st, this is also the last day a tobacco lease may be signed. All crops must be planted at the time of certification. It is important for all producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) file a crop reports. It is also a requirement for CRP acreage and fruit or vegetable acreage be reported.

CRP acreage will be released in all counties nationwide for emergency haying and grazing, based on a national livestock economic emergency. CRP participants may file requests for emergency haying and grazing in all counties in all states regardless of weather condition and production levels. Grazing provisions are effective immediately, and haying provisions are effective July 1. For more information contact the FSA office.

top and lower sides of the leaf. The EPA has been requested to approve Acrobat MZ which has systemic action. Farmers are warned that waiting on this product may leave their crop vulnerable to losses.

Blue Mold has arrived early in the growing season, this presents a much greater threat to tobacco production. Farmers are advised to plant for additional spraying to protect their crop and keep an eye on the situation can change from week to week.

## RCMS transformed into Brazilian Rainforest

On Friday, May 17th the Rockcastle County Middle School Media Center was transformed into a Brazilian (Amazon) Rainforest. Using costumes, songs, plays and foods, the 7th grade Shooting Stars entertained and delighted Ms. Sherry Webb's and Ms. Janice Vanzant's Mt. Vernon Elementary School Primary students while emphasizing the importance of preserving the rainforests.

The unit of study was initiated as a Forward in the Fifth mini-grant drafted by Ms. Gayle Scoggins, Shooting Stars Science Instructor. Additional funding was provided by the Rockcastle Council for the Arts, Title I and the District Basic Arts Program.

As the students talked about the global impact of the rainforest, the students themselves decided in order to have a truly realistic impact, the unit must be brought home to Rockcastle County. They therefore decided to incorporate the following elements into this unit: the effects of deforestation, water pollution, endangered species, loss of habitat/environments and loss of traditional culture of personal lives within native communities.

After much collaboration among the Shooting Stars team of teachers and students, each instructor enthusiastically began developing an abstract of individual activities appropriately aligned with the curriculums in their subject areas. It was decided, in order for the unit to fully develop a 6 week time frame would be appropriate. The primary students at Mt. Vernon Elementary School worked on a two week rainforest unit in preparation for the "Partnership Day" on May 17th.

While emphasizing this project as interdisciplinary, the guiding strength remained media-center based with a thematic life science approach.

The next phase in planning began by meeting with the music specialist, art specialist, and life skills instruc-

tor. It was through this meeting that each specialist began the develop activities or projects that would enhance and reinforce this unit, as well as, being utilized in the execution of the culminating activities.

In music, students composed lyrics to well-known melodies from information they acquired through research about the biodiversity of the rainforest. They also choreographed and taught both to their partners from Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

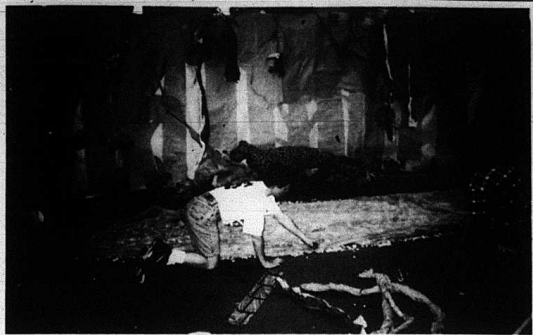
Art activities focused on incorporating various art mediums including 3-D construction techniques to create a large mural, backdrop and free standing objects and animals for the media center (library) setting.

Life skills instruction exposed students to the food crops and their uses in the Brazilian Rainforest. They also prepared some authentic delicacies for consumption on "partnership" day. The Shooting Stars also visited an actual Rainforest setting at the Cincinnati Zoo. Students then compared and contrasted documented facts perceived (from the media center research) with the actuality of the Rainforest setting.

To continue the students' self evaluation of activities gleaned during the unit, a video providing ongoing documentation collected from the beginning of the unit through the culminating activities was produced.

In the "trunk" treasures, this video will provide a basis for other teachers and students to evaluate the potential for use in his or her classroom. It will also provide a visual example of individual projects defined with clear instructions on how to create them.

The Shooting Stars instructional team and support staff included Sharon Thacker, Title I, Mark Brummett, Mathematics, H. Allen Penson, Basic Arts, Teresa Gowler, Sp. Ed., Debbie Bugg, Visual Arts, Claudina B. Cash, Title I Supervisor, Vickie Arnold, Media Specialist, Carla Par-

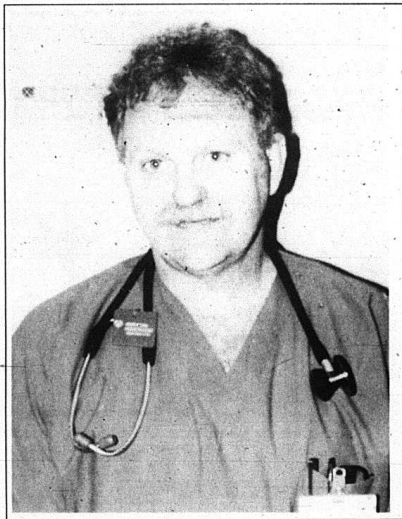

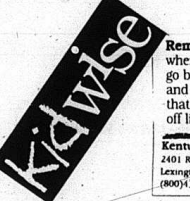

## Whitehead resigns from school board

Rockcastle County School Board Chairman Debra Whitehead has announced that she will resign from the local board of education, effective June 30.

School superintendent Larry Hammond said that Mrs. Whitehead notified the board last week of her decision.

Mrs. Whitehead and her husband Tim are building a new home near Brodhead and therefore are moving out of her current school district.

Hammond said that he had notified Kentucky Education Commissioner Wiltmer Cody of the resignation.

Hammond said that it was his understanding that people in Mrs. Whitehead's district would have to apply to fill the vacancy and that interviews for the job would be conducted by the commissioner's office.

Hammond said that Cody would appoint Mrs. Whitehead's replacement. Mrs. Whitehead has served on the board for seven and a half years and was up for re-election this Fall.

The winner this Fall will serve a full four year term. The appointee will serve only until January, if he or she elects not to run in the Fall.

Hammond said the board will likely choose a new chairman at the July meeting. He said that Dr. G.W. Griffith the current vice-chairman is the likely choice to succeed Mrs. Whitehead in that post.

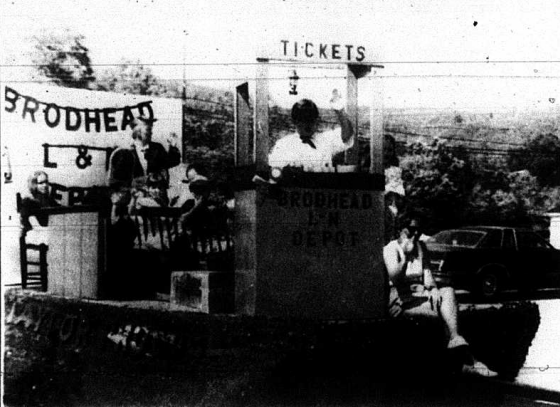
A U-turn by a tractor-trailer caused damage to a Mt. Vernon business last Wednesday.

Voters in Rockcastle County stayed home in droves in Tuesday's primary election.

Only nine percent voted in Rockcastle, probably an all-time low, according to County Clerk Norma Houk.

In Climax precinct, only 18 people voted, with the largest number, 98, voting in both West Mt. Vernon and Brown precincts.

On the Republican side in Rockcastle, U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell, as expected, defeated perennial GOP contender Tommy Klein 493 to Klein's 75.

On the Democrat side in Rockcastle, former Lt. Governor Steve Beshear easily defeated his two challengers. Beshear got 207 votes, Tom Barlow got 27 and Shelby Lanier, Jr. got only six votes.

In the Republican race for state

senate, incumbent Albert L. Robinson of London got 320 votes. His challengers, Michael Dean of London got 148 and Helen Jackson of Tyler got 79. All total, Robinson got 3,694 votes, Dean had 1,568 and Jackson, 688. Robinson will return to Frankfort to represent the counties of Laurel, Rockcastle, Jackson and Knox in the state senate because there were no Democrats that filed to run.

Fifty years in the music business is bound to result in a fan following. In the case of Old Joe Clark, that following includes entertainers who are themselves legends in country and bluegrass music.

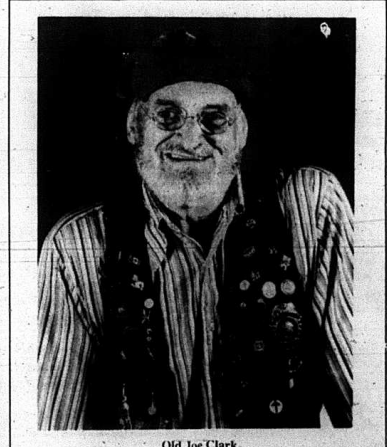
On Saturday, June 1, many of these entertainers will join in a tribute to Old Joe Clark on his 50th year at Renfro Valley.

When my double first cousin, Gene Adams passed away two weeks ago, I knew I had to write about his life. And then Elwood Cornett, his brother-in-law read the following obituary at his funeral and suddenly I knew I had nothing more to say.

**Obituary of Delzie Gene Adams**  
Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning. The birds are singing. The flowers are blooming. The dayspring from on high has visited us. Angels are singing; the saints are rejoicing; a tired, weak and weary soldier has reached home.

Delzie Gene Adams was born into the home of the late James H. and Alpha Adams on October 15, 1931. He entered this phase of eternal life on Tuesday, May 7, 1996 at Seco, Kentucky, making his life on earth 64 years 6 months and 22 days.

Gene was a good soldier, a member of the Army's exclusive Green Berets. During his 21 and 1/2 years in military service to his country he traveled to far away countries in Central America, Europe and Asia. He trained and led thousands of men as they insured the defense of our freedom.

Gene defended the flag that adorns his casket with his honor and his blood. His body still carries the ravages of war. Not only pieces of shrapnel, but also the effects of agent orange, the scars of the emotional strains of war and the disappointment of unsung heroes, especially heroes of Korea and Vietnam. These wounds earned him purple hearts from both Korea and Vietnam. His dedicated service earned him medals and clas-

ters including the Bronze Star and the Silver Star.

On September 14, 1956 Delzie Gene married Norma Jean Schubert. Their names "Gene and Jenie" immediately had that special ring. Sometimes Jenie followed Gene to far away countries and sometimes she waited patiently at home for his return. More and more as he grew older, Gene wanted Jenie at his side. Gene was a man of many talents. He was a comedian. He was artistic. He was a champion fisherman. His work with his hands was always admired.

Not only was Gene a father—he was a daddy and a friend. His guidance and his counsel were respected and loved. He loved his children and grandchildren and they loved him. In addition to his wife, Jenie, Delzie Gene is survived by one daughter, Patricia Kathleen Bates and her husband, Anthony Bates of Alabama; three sons, Bobby Gene and his wife,

Regina Adams of Jenkins, Frank James Adams of Cronoma and Timothy Allen Adams of Louisville; four grandchildren, Rutherford Bates, Robert Bates, Joshua Adams and Danielle Adams; one brother, Bobby Lee Adams of Whitesburg; two sisters, Kathleen Cornett of Blackey and Barbara Griley of Richmond, Virginia and one aunt, Garnett Ruth Webb of Florida.

Through the years nothing made Gene happier than to come home to Jim and Alpha's. He would fix things that were broken, repair things that needed repair and enjoy the big and good family of his generation.

Gene loved his roots, his people

The above is likely true of other notable worthies who either were born in Wabdl or wished they had been, such as Michaelangelo, Sir Isaac Newton, Michael Jordan, Rick Pitino, and Sophia Loren. So, in the future, dear hearts, if you think certain Wabdlans are "quote," think

again. They might just be Wabdl. And remember what they did to the dinosaurs!"

Speaking of remembering, I like many of you, did a lot of flat this past weekend as I meandered through four cemeteries, calling to mind loved ones, friends, and acquaintances.

I like to visit "my" graves alone because I talk about to my parents and others. It helps. A good friend of mine told me that he talks too. Says "he's him, comfort without a sense of grief." I concur.

Come August I will have been living in Wabdl for five years after being away for thirty-one. I hurt a bit when I go to the cemetery and put flowers on the graves of those who loved me to the uttermost. And I hurt also when I realize that in those five years I've noticed that some graves are never decorated. I wish I could afford to put flowers on them, even on those of folks I don't know, folks who have been forgotten.

The ancient Hebrew, like the modern Israeli, had a sense of urgency when it came to recalling his lineage. It is noticeable in some parts of the Old Testament. Those "born begat-died" chapters are not boring to a Hebrew! Having learned to read classical Hebrew - it's getting away from me now that I don't teach - I "hear" often the Hebrew word *zakur* (ZAKUR-CAR), an imperative which means "REMEMBER!"

As a memorial to a person or an event, the ancient Hebrew, turned a stone upon its end and anointed it with oil. Sometimes he made a mound of stones. Rarely was an inscription cut. None was needed because father after father taught his son what the stone's meant.

A journey a father and a son going on a picnic and coming upon one of those heaps of stone.

"Father, what do these stone mean?" the son asks.

"Zakur!" the father replies and then tells his son the history of that marker.

You can bet your bottom dollar that the Hebrew mother had a part in that education, teaching both sons and daughters. The chauvinistic Old Testament doesn't give women much credit for anything. Some readers think that's the case with Paul in the New Testament. Anyhow, there's a hearing of b.c. hanging around, especially in churches, at least in the ones I've known across the years.) One grave I visited was that of my maternal grandfather, who put in eighty-eight years here below before he went away in April of '55. He

rests many graves away from his daughter, my mother. I'm the only person left who marks his plot on Memorial Day.

Standing there, talking with him about some of the pranks I pulled on him, an unwelcome voice whispered: *John, you are barely one generation away from being totally forgotten.* How sad, I told "Grandpa" that as long as I can able he won't be forgotten. I can only hope my children and grand-children will think and do likewise. Heritage, skeletons and all, doesn't seem to count for much with the "now" generation. Come to think of it, it didn't count for much in my epistolary days.





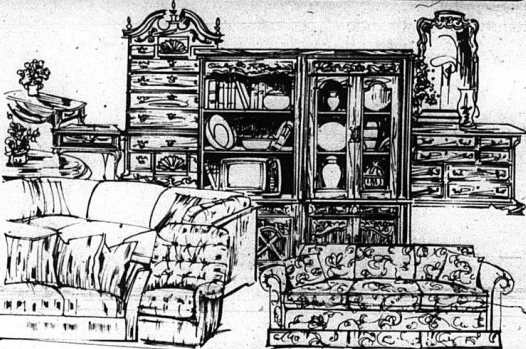

In the Democrat race for President, President Bill Clinton defeated Lyndon LaRouche, Jr., 196 to 18. Statewide for President, Republican Bob Dole increased his lead 76,412. Buchanan, again, was second with 8,399 votes. On the Democrat side, Bill Clinton got 208,716 votes to LaRouche's 19,947.

In the U.S. Senate race, state-senate's number two Democrat leader and Tommy Klein's 11,122. On the

Democrat side, Beshear got 174,762 votes to Barlow's, 64,473 and Lanier's 25,512.

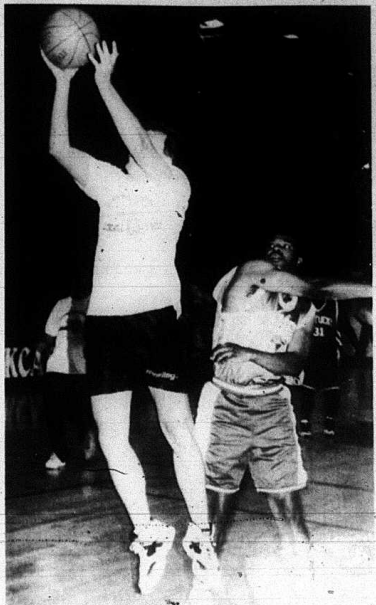

## Brodhead staff honored by Galef Institute

Funding from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation is enabling Brodhead Elementary School to take part in a major multi-year research demonstration school reform initiative in Kentucky. The initiative called *Different Ways of Knowing* offers teachers professional development integrated with primary and upper elementary curriculum that assists in tapping the full potential of every child.

With a \$1 million grant over two years to the Galef Institute, Knight Foundation has supported the professional growth of teachers at Brodhead Elementary and 23 other research demonstration schools across the state.

The grant is also funding a research study of the academic achievement of the primary and elementary students in the 24 schools. The study, codirected by Professors Diane Kyle and Ric Hovda of the University of Louisville, follows teachers and students involved in *Different Ways of Knowing*.

The principal of Brodhead Elementary Mark McKinney and teachers, Joy Graves, Cathy Dyehouse, and Caroline Graves representing their school, were honored recently by the Galef Institute and Knight Foundation at an awards banquet held

in Lexington. Linda Adelman, president of the Galef Institute and Dr. Linda Hargan, executive director of the Kentucky Collaborative for Elementary Learning, presented the award commemorating of pioneering work of the faculty and whole school community of Brodhead.

Brodhead principal Mark McKinney said, "Our participation in *Different Ways of Knowing* has helped us develop tools for teaching kids. It was important to us as a school that our whole staff be involved-if it works then we should all do it. It has given us a sense of community and common purpose."

Creed Black, Knight Foundation's president and CEO said, "This support of Knight Foundation reaffirms our belief in the bold ambitious plans of Kentuckians to improve their education system and the Foundation's interest in *Different Ways of Knowing* as a resource for Kentucky teachers."

In Kentucky, *Different Ways of Knowing* has become part of the professional development of teachers and curriculum in 285 schools, involving 2,700 teachers and 68,000 students. The initiative, developed by the Galef Institute in Los Angeles, is based on the assumptions that all children can learn when provided

appropriate learning opportunities and a positive learning environment, and that children learn best when they are active participants in their learning.

Dr. Hargan said, "Our hope is that the findings from the comprehensive 24-school research demonstration project will influence policy. Knight Foundation's support offers us a unique opportunity to examine the relationship of student achievement to strategies for teaching and learning. Without their support, schools would not have been able to participate fully. If the students show the significant increases we expect they

will in tests of their reading, writing, and knowledge of subjects such as history, geography, the arts, and humanities, then we should seek ways to offer such professional growth opportunities to all of Kentucky's teachers, principals, and others who wish to participate."

By integrating the study of social studies and history with reading, writing, math, science and the arts, *Different Ways of Knowing* offers students multiple ways to learn and show what they know. In addition, it emphasizes the networking of teachers and the inclusion of parents and community in the learning process.

## Twelve students honored for academic excellence

Kentucky's assessment and accountability system has focused much attention on school accountability. However, the main goal is, and always has been, improved student learning towards high standards for every student. The citizens of Kentucky have established very challenging standards for the Commonwealth, embodied in the "Proficient" performance levels on the KIRIS assessment.

On Tuesday, May 21, 1996 at the Rockcastle County Schools Central Administration Building, 12 students were recognized by Superintendent Larry B. Hammond and the entire Central Office Staff with a reception for having met these standards by scoring at least at the "Proficient" level in Reading, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies in the KIRIS On-demand (Transitional) Assessment in 1994-95. A District Achievement Certificate was presented to each student and concluded with Superintendent Hammond reading *Oh! The Places You'll Go* by Dr. Seuss. This accomplishment was achieved by fewer than 2% of the more than 140,000 students who participated in the KIRIS assessment last year.

In addition to being recognized by the Department of Education and Rockcastle County Schools, the students received a "Kentucky Student Scholar 1994-95" pin and a congratulatory card from Commissioner of Education Wilmer Cody.

## "IT IS WRITTEN"

In I Tim. 2:11-12, Paul says, "Let the women learn in silence with all subjection. But I suffer not (permit not ASV) a woman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to be in silence." Paul goes on to say that there are two reasons for the role of subjection. First, "for Adam was first formed then Eve," and the second reason, "And Adam was not deceived, but the woman being deceived was in the transgression," vs. 13, 14.

Our religious world has cast aside these inspired injunctions. It's not uncommon to hear of "women preachers" preaching in the pulpits cross the land, or hear of "women elders" or "women deacons" taking roles of leadership and headship in churches. Women are not to assume or take roles of authority and leadership over men. Paul told Titus to preach and speak with all authority the word of the Lord. Subjection signifies being "under authority," but a woman preaching to a congregation is not speaking under authority but would be exercising authority over men (and women). But women are forbidden to be in this role of exercising authority over men. Her teaching would be "over the man," and thus she would be leaving her God ordained role in relationship to man.

In I Cor. 11:3, we read, "But I would have you to know, that the head of every man is Christ; and the head of the woman is the man, and the head of Christ is God."

The head of Christ is God, does this mean Jesus is "sub-deity"? No, for this is a functional subordination. The head of woman is man, does this mean that woman is "sub-human"? No, for this involves a functional subordination. Women can teach other women, Tit. 2:3-4; they can teach children, II Tim. 1:5, 3:15; they can even teach men, Ac. 13:26, II Tim 2:2 if she teaches in subjection and not teach "over the man." But a woman preaching to a congregation, this would put her in a place of being "over the man" and would violate these passages. I don't know why folks can't be satisfied with the doctrine of Christ on these matters. God set the roles and differences between the sexes. Let's just believe and accept the divine order of things in the church and in the home. Let us know if we can help.

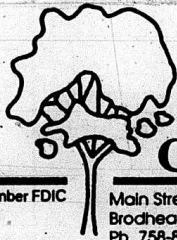

**Herbs: A Healthful Ally**

Herbs are a healthful friend. Using these food and beverage seasonings can cut several hundred calories daily from your diet and help you reduce salt and sugar intake.

Although putting a tablespoon or two of butter or margarine in food doesn't seem like much, it can add 100-200 calories. A tablespoon of margarine or butter has 100 calories. This little dab is pure fat. A tablespoon of regular stick butter or margarine has 11 grams of fat. Reduced-fat products contain about half as much.

Herbs can replace salt if you have a medical condition such as high blood pressure, heart disease and fluid retention where reduced salt consumption is recommended.

Using herbs also deletes the empty calories from sugar. A tablespoon of sugar contains 30 calories, but has no nutritional value.

In addition to the health benefits, adding herbs to foods and beverages creates distinct aromas and flavors such as sweet, tart, tangy, pungent and robust.

Some of the more popular herbs are basil, chives, garlic, marjoram, parsley, pepper, oregano, rosemary and thyme. When buying fresh herbs, look for strength of aroma and color. They should have a strong, fresh smell and a rich, true color. Buy small quantities because herbs lose flavor over time.

Use fresh herbs within a week. Refrigerate washed herbs in an

airtight container to keep them moist. If you can't use all the fresh herbs you have on hand, dry or freeze them.

To receive the maximum benefit, chop or mince herbs before cooking to release the volatile oils that provide the unique flavors. If you substitute fresh herbs, one tablespoon of fresh is equal to one

teaspoon of dried, crushed herbs. Add delicate-flavored or ground herbs toward the end of the cooking time when foods must cook for a long period. This keeps herb flavors from escaping with the steam.

Remember, herbs are meant to enhance, not replace, the natural flavors of foods and beverages.

**Blue Mold found**

Rockcastle County burley (tobacco producers should be warned that Blue Mold has been identified on this year's crop. Extension Agents and Specialists have identified Blue Mold on tobacco growing in Hart, Hardin, Bourbon and Mason counties. Indications are that Blue Mold has been present for at least 3 to 5 weeks. Recent weather conditions have been ideal for this disease to spread.

Farmers are asked to notify the Extension Office if Blue Mold is found in their crop. If assistance is needed, please contact the Extension Office at 256-2403.

Current recommendations are: continue preplant and layby treatment with Ridomil. At present time, tests are being run to see if the Blue Mold strain is resistant or susceptible to Ridomil. Until the tests are completed, tobacco should also be treated with Dithane. This compound is a preventive. The chemical must be present before Blue Mold spores arrive and must be completely over the plant, both

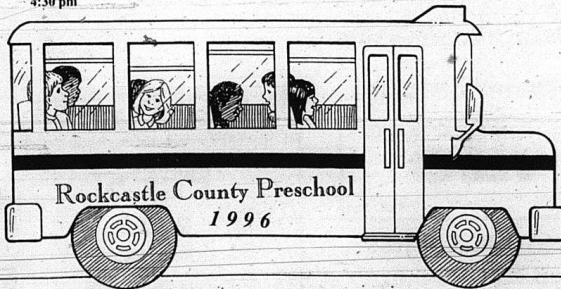

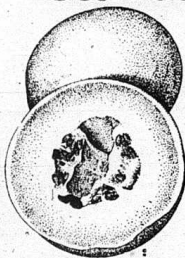
