



Our state's population of those

and better medical care. Another
factor for the increase is that many
retireer return to Kentucky to live.

Urban Research Institute on the state's

According to a 1995 study by the Urban Research Institute on the state? aging population, 19.6 percent of older Kentuckians are tiving below the poverty level, and 45.3 percent of those 60 years or older live in rural areas. The study also revealed that women outnumber men in the age group of 60 to 85 and older.

With this in mind, state and federal agencies and private organizations have formed commissions and task forces to study issues that affect older Kentuckinan in areas ranging from health services to transportation. These groups make recommendations, to lawmakers.

During the regular session of the 1996 Kentacky General Assembly, several important pieces of legislation were passed as a result of work done throughout the interim by legislators, the Legislative Research Commission (LRC), and advocates for the aging.

I would like to highlight some of the major-bills that will impact offer Kentuckians. The bill summary below was compiled and furnished by the LRC staff.

SENATE BILL 162 provides for the voluntary certification of assisted living residences. The federal government has dollars available to assist in the construction of assisted living residences. hereby amended by the adoption of a PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY ORDINANCE, as follows

PUNITYSE
This Ordinance is declared necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the people of the County of Rockcastle, and is intended to address situations where parents have failed to act responsibly and reasonable in the supervision of their minor children to the detriment of the general public.

AFFECTS MINOR CHILDREN under age of 18, with special provisions of minors under ages of 16 and 12.

PARENTAL DUTIES Include, but not limited to, require the minor hildren to adhere to all sections and subsections of said ordinance (school attendance), curfew, continuous proper supervision, etc.); (school attendance), curfew, continuous proper supervision, etc.); for the parents (or an <u>adult</u> acting in their stead, whether permanently or temporarily) to accept <u>full responsibility</u>, for the minor child's actions, etc. Parents will be held <u>responsible</u> for <u>all</u> incarceration costs (presently up to \$1.00/day <u>plus</u> any and all other charges (transportation to and from facility, to and from court, etc.) that have, before this ordinance, been bome by the residents of Rockeastle County and paid by the Fiscal Court of Rockeastle County.

PENALTIES TO PARENTS:

\$75-\$100 <u>plus</u> incarceration costs (if required by the Court) of at least \$100/day <u>plus</u> any and all related charges.

\$100-\$500 plus all related incarceration charges, plus completion of court-approved probation program, as required, and possible imprisonment for 30 days.

Third and Subsequent Violation:

\$200-\$300, and imprisonment for up to 90 days, as ordered by the





Child Safety In The Car

In October 1995, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) issued a Administration (NHTSA) issued a warning on an air bag danger to children. The NHTSA warns that children who are not protected by a seat belt could be seriously injured or killed by an air bag; and in the strongest possible terms urge that children ride belted in the back seat whenever possible.

In a crash, the air bag inflates very quickly. It hits anyone close sery quickly. It hits anyone close to the dashboard with enough force to cause severe injuries or redeath. Air Bag Safety Tips

Everyone in the front seat should use seat belts properly and be seated as far back from the dash board as possible.

All young children should be properly secured in a child safety seat and older children have a lap/ shoulder belt.



Ticks common in Kentucky: their description and diseases

The American dog tick and lone star tick are the most common types found in Kentucky.

These two ticks don't appear to carry Lyme disease which is transmitted principally by the black etterne for the star time to the carrier for the carrier for Rocky Mountain Sported Fever. The lone star tick also transmits this disease but to a lesser extent.

Infected ticks must be attached at least 12-24 hours to transmit pathogens for either disease.

Both diseases are fairty rare in. Kentucky. About 20-30 cases of Lyme disease and approximately 10-30 cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever are reported here in the Kentucky annually. raisin. Since immature ticks feed almost exclusively on small wild rodents, only the easily spotted adults are found on humans and pets. Adults are active in Kentucky from spring through mid-summer. The adult female lone star tick

has a distinct white spot on the back. Adult males have pale lacy back. Adult males have pale lacy white marks on the rear edge of the back. Immature lone star ticks are very tiny and readily attack humans, unlike the immature American dog tick. A person walking through vegetation with a clump of immature lone star ticks might find hundreds crawling on the body. Crop reports are currently being taken at the FSA Office. The dead-line to file a crop report is July 1s for farms with tobacco, July 1sh for farms with chacker, July 1sh for farms that are provides a record of cruffication. It is important for ALL producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) to file eroports. This provides a record of crops grown on the farm for disaster purposes, such as disaster leasing, etc. Crop reports are required from farms that are participating in the Production Flexibility Program and the Conservation Reserve Program. An appointment will be scheduled at your convenience to file the crop, acreage report.

Signup is currently underway for the Production Flexibility Program from the Production Flexibility Program and seases for wheat and/or corn can sign a Tyear contract to receive payments. Late Planting Agreement. This form Late Planting Agreement. This form should be filed PRIOR TO JULY 1. It will insure FCIC coverage of y icco.

Money has been allocated to Rockcastle County for the following Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices: Diversions, critical areas, sediment retention, crosion or water anime water control, stream protection, animal waste systems, permanent wildlife habitats, and shallow water wildlife habitats, and shallow water areas for wildlife. These practices must be applied for no later then July 31. A special allocation has been funded for the BEE LICK AREA for water quality practices. Producers who have concerns and are interested in practices for this area should contact the office.
