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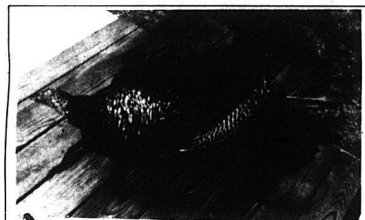

Mt. Vernon Policeman Lake Owens investigated the accident that happened near the boat dock.

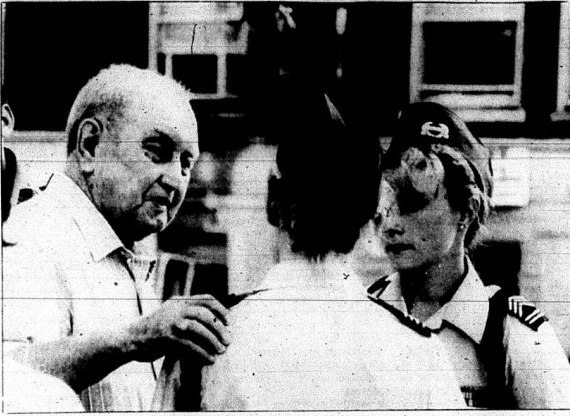

# Hospital constructing 25,000 feet Medical Arts facility

"If you build it, they will come," said baseball great "Shoelless" Joe Jackson about a baseball diamond in the hit movie "Field of Dreams."  
Rockcastle Hospital Administrator Lee Keene said the phrase also is true for medical buildings.  
"If you want to keep good doctors and recruit new ones, you have to have modern, convenient office space for them," said Keene. "We're ensuring that people of Rockcastle County won't have to travel out of the area for the very best medical care."  
CB&S Construction broke ground May 6 for a 25,000 square foot Rockcastle Medical Arts Building, which will cost \$1.6 million dollars and is expected to be completed in May 1997.  
Keene isn't just hoping physicians will come to the medical office complex that his hospital is building; he has commitments that they will come. A number of local primary care physicians and surgeons are looking forward to moving into the new facility, and he

has gained the interest of specialists who want to practice in the county on a part-time basis.  
Dr. Karen Saylor said convenience is one reason she plans to move her internal medicine practice there.  
"The new medical office building will centralize patient care. Many of the area's physicians will be there, along with visiting specialists. Having lab facilities in the same building will be much more convenient for patients. It will be very valuable to the community," said Dr. Saylor.  
Other occupants will include Drs. Stern, Graham and McElwain and Dr. Mike Hamilton, who will complete his residency at the University of Kentucky in May of 1997, and plans to open his practice in Rockcastle's Medical Arts Building.

Bill Ackerman of Bank of Mt. Vernon have joined together to provide financing. We would much prefer to do business with local banks than to have to go out of town."  
"The fact that these banks can underwrite such a significant sum and that they are willing to work together says a lot for this community and the hospital," he added.  
The building's basement and first floor will contain physician suites, a laboratory, medical records area, waiting area, and additional offices and work area. The second floor will be left open, to be completed once the other two floors are (Cont. to A9)

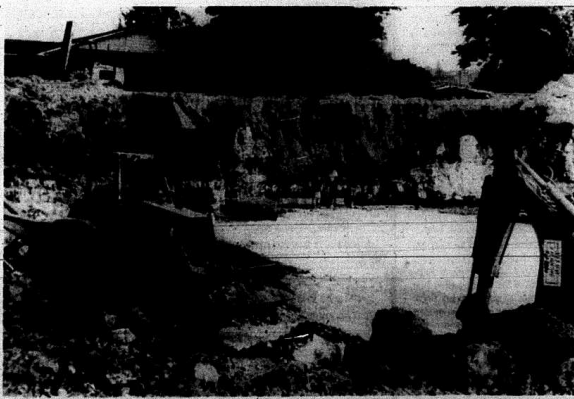
## County working on roads, except in Benton Bullock subdivision

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolitis said Monday the county "is trying to maintain as many county road miles as our budget will permit."  
The Judge said that with near 500, or more, miles of county roads on the books the county must watch closely its finances.  
"A major slide is well on the way to repair on Copper Creek Road. The roadway if yet to be blacktopped, and several other clean-up concerns are to be addressed," the judge said.  
The Copper Creek project, a problem for many years, is 1500 feet. The \$100,000 plus project has been

made possible through state and federal grant funds.  
The judge said it evidently, is the "first major effort by any of our county's fiscal courts (county judge and magistrates) to solve the problem."  
The judge stated the county road department has been strip-patching segments of deteriorating roads, and surface roads whose pavement has fallen apart.  
"A few areas of the county yet remain to be worked in," the judge noted, "and there are a few roads that have had 'soft' places dug out and backfilled with rock."  
He said "where there is evidence

of continuing settlement in these areas, blacktopping, will probably be delayed."  
He explained the county is going from cold mix to hot mix. About 80 percent of the cold mix, which doesn't hold up on hills, is now gone, Carlolitis said.  
The judge then took another look at roads in Benton Bullock subdivision, or any subdivision.  
Several visitors and residents of Bullock subdivision near Mt. Vernon, came to a meeting of the court last week to plead for help in blacktopping subdivision roads. The res-

And the answer was, "Probably more than you want to know about." In all fairness, it did seem to me that everybody was busy last Friday evening and they worked until it got pitch black dark. One guy was in front driving a car with a big truck with a wire brush on it scrubbing down the old paint. Behind that one was another truck with a sign that said something about wet paint following. Then there was the paint truck behind that one that seemed to be loaded down with more paint when the first one ran out.

So the answer is five or six at least and a convoy of fairly impressive machinery.

But remember, they have to make three trips. One for each side of the road and another one down the middle. That gets us up to \$162.00 per mile. So ten miles is \$1,620.00 if our math is reasonably close to accurate even though I'll bet we're conservative by at least \$380.00. Because I'll bet that the cost is more like \$200.00 per mile. Not cheap but

probably worth the cost if it's done right.

So that's what was going on at dark on Friday between Richmond and Paint Lick.

Guess what was going on at the crack of dawn on Saturday. What seemed to be all the asphalt trucks in central Kentucky were riling by the house—arr all over their wheels and messing up the new paint job. An hour or so later I discovered they were doing more than that. They were literally paving over it!

And what I want to know is why it was so damn important to be working over-time on a paint job that was scheduled to be wiped out within twelve hours. You'd think that these people would talk to each other once in a while. I'm tired of seeing these big signs that advertise the fact that my tax dollars are at work every time a construction project comes along.

What I'd really like to have is some assurance that a brain or two was also functioning.

I've learned the hard way though, to stop holding my breath.

## Frankfort Update

By Rep. Danny Ford

**Older Kentuckians** are no longer considered the "rocking chair" generation; they are on the move and continue to lead productive lives.

Our state's population of those age 60 and older is on the upswing, partly because of lifestyle changes and better medical care. Another factor for the increase is that many retirees return to Kentucky to live. These in this are range made up 17 percent of Kentucky's population in 1995. By the year 2000, the number would reach 24 percent.

According to a 1995 study by the Urban Research Institute on the state's aging population, 19.6 percent of older Kentuckians are living below the poverty level, and 45.3 percent of those 60 years or older live in rural areas. The study also revealed that women outnumber men in the age group of 60 to 85 and older.

With this in mind, state and federal agencies and private organizations have formed commissions and task forces to study issues that affect older Kentuckians in areas ranging from health services to transportation. These groups make recommendations to lawmakers.

During the regular session of the 1996 Kentucky General Assembly, several important pieces of legislation were passed as a result of work done throughout the interim by legislators, the Legislative Research Commission (LRC), and advocates for the aging.

I would like to highlight some of the major bills that will impact older Kentuckians. The bill summary below was compiled and furnished by the LRC staff.

**SENATE BILL 162** provides for the voluntary certification of assisted-living residences. The federal government has dollars available to assist in the construction of assisted-living residences, and the purpose of this bill is to access those dollars. An assisted-living residence will provide older Kentuckians with an alternative to nursing homes by allowing independent living in a supported setting.

**SENATE BILL 181** provides for annual increases for state employee retirement pensions, based upon the Consumer Price Index, to a maximum of 5 percent. This does not affect judicial or teacher retirement.

**HOUSE BILL 492** permits taxat-

cabs to operate city and county-wide. Previously, some taxis were only permitted to operate within city limits. This bill should increase the availability of transportation to older Kentuckians living in rural areas.

HOUSE BILL 504 relates to health insurers that provide maintenance organizations issuing contracts in Kentucky. If the maintenance organizations provide hospital, medical or surgical expense benefits for treatment of breast cancer by chemotherapy, it is required that bone mar-

row or stem transplantation be covered.

HOUSE BILL 584 sets criteria for voter assistance forms which will be completed by voters certified as needing assistance on a permanent or annual basis because of disability.

HOUSE BILL 611 requires at least one person with a disability (or his or her relative) to be appointed to serve on task forces, committees and commissions created by state agencies that review or recommend services for persons with specific disabilities.

HOUSE BILL 699 provides that the Consumer Protection provisions relating to pre-need funeral services and merchandise contracts shall apply to services or merchandise sold as burial insurance policies which are regulated by the Department of Insurance.

HOUSE BILL 782 requires health insurance policies to guarantee that covered persons will have direct access to the primary chiropractic provider of their choice without referral from another provider, therefore possibly increasing the availability of services to older Kentuckians.

Recently, the LRC Special Advisory Commission of Senior Citizens met in Frankfort, and once I receive the summary of this meeting I plan to share that information with you. This Commission, made up of 100 senior citizens from across the state, is di-

vided into five subcommittees: Consumer Affairs, Health and Human Services, Insurance, Taxation, and Transportation. Committee members make recommendations to the General Assembly.

dents claimed Bullock sold them the property indicating the roads would be blacktopped soon.

The judge related that "there are state laws that spell out exactly what a county fiscal court can and cannot do."

"Our fiscal court also has enacted ordinances and regulations for subdivisions," the judge continued, "a fiscal court is not permitted to be less restrictive than state laws."

"I think one of the questions that always arises with subdivision roads is this: Is it really the responsibility of the county's taxpayers to make major improvements to subdivision roads, or is it basically, the responsibility of the subdivision's developer who has sold lots in the subdivision to make these improvements?"

The judge said, "as stated during our last court meeting, the county attorney will look over the statutes and report to the fiscal court."

"Although the county Judge/Executive and magistrates have a responsibility to provide, to the best of the county's abilities, a myriad of services, they cannot arbitrarily black-top roads in violation of ordinances and state statutes," the judge said.

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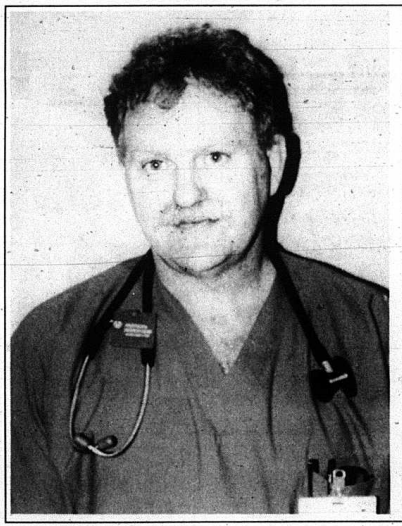

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# Roundstone conducts Hands-On Science Fair

How does a tornado form? How do you build a circuit? What makes a light bend? How do pulleys work? How can water help solve a mystery? How fast do you react? Do different lengths of string produce different pitches?

These are just some of the questions you could find an answer to at the Roundstone Elementary Science Fair held June 5. However, this was no ordinary science fair with just exhibits to observe, the RES 4th grade science students in Mrs. Gabbard's class had created a new type of science fair - a Hands On Science Fair, in which the visitor was actively involved in science by "doing" an experiment.

The creation of this type of science fair arose from the students own class experiences and the discovery that science was not hard if one was interested and involved in science. The students also felt they had learned well enough to be good teachers and wanted to get others interested in science.

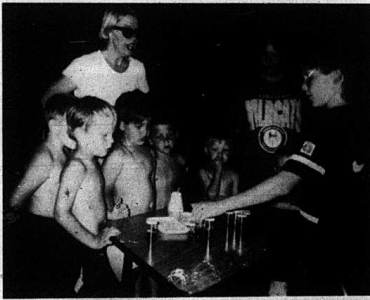

## At Roundstone Fourth grade projects

Mrs. Gabbard's 4th graders were involved in many learning experiences this school year, but Shonda King remembers the counting project. "It all started with Josh Renner. He brought a box of seeds to school and said he thought there was about 1,000,000 seeds in the box." Since we were studying both plants and place value we wanted to find out, "What value a 1,000,000 seeds in the box?"

We decided to count the seeds in Josh's box. Before long we found there wasn't even 100,000 seeds in the box. This led us to question, "What would a million seeds look like?" We were determined to find out.

It took a lot of co-operative teamwork to count and group the seeds correctly, keep accurate data and to find seeds to count. After several minutes of counting we began to realize, "It is hard to find enough seeds to count," as Steven Coffey noted. Krystal Kelly agreed thinking that is

was entirely possible that we couldn't "...find or buy a million seeds!"

However, we kept counting until June 7, after we analyzed our data, we found we had NOT made it to a million. We had only counted to 830,620, even though there had been an average of 50 students counting 1,109 minutes each (that's 18.5 hours). We were still proud of our effort, as Jeni Durham says she "...now has great counting and grouping skills." All of us involved now have a better perspective of the meaning of a million, and as Josh McFerron wrote, "We have learned to respect the number 1,000,000!"

By the way, we did have one last question, "What would 830,620 plants look like?" (But that's another project for another year...)

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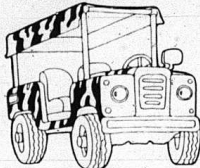

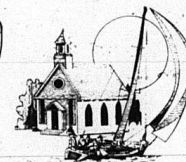

honorary doctor of laws degree.

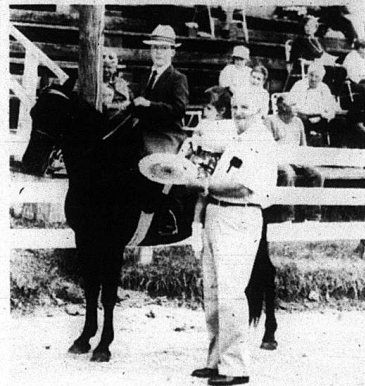
Following the university-wide ceremony, each of the nine academic colleges sponsored receptions for the new graduates at various campus locations.

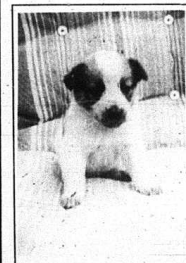

## PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY ORDINANCE COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, KENTUCKY ORDINANCE 012

The County of Rockcastle ordains that its Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the adoption of a PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY ORDINANCE, as follows

**PURPOSE**  
This Ordinance is declared necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the people of the County of Rockcastle, and is intended to address situations where parents have failed to act responsibly and reasonable in the supervision of their minor children to the detriment of the general public.

**AFFECTS MINOR CHILDREN** under age of 18, with special provisions of minors under ages of 16 and 12.

**PARENTAL DUTIES Include**, but not limited to, require the minor children to adhere to all sections and subsections of said ordinance (school attendance), curfew, continuous proper supervision, etc.; for the parents (or an adult acting in their stead, whether permanently or temporarily) to accept full responsibility, for the minor child's actions, etc. Parents will be held responsible for all incarceration costs (presently up to \$100/day plus any and for all incarceration (transportation to and from facility, to and from court, etc.) that have, before this ordinance, been borne by the residents of Rockcastle County and paid by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County.

**PENALTIES TO PARENTS:**  
First Offense:  
\$75-\$100 plus incarceration costs (if required by the Court) of at least \$100/day plus any and all related charges.

Second Offense:  
\$100-\$500 plus all related incarceration charges, plus completion of court-approved probation program, as required, and possible imprisonment for 30 days.

Third and Subsequent Violation:  
\$200-\$300, and imprisonment for up to 90 days, as ordered by the Court.

Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will hold Second Reading and Final Adoption of County of Rockcastle, Ky. "Parental Responsibility Ordinance" at a called meeting of the court to be held at the hour of 10:00 A.M. on July 9, 1996 in the Rockcastle County Courthouse, Mt. Vernon, Ky.

The ordinance in its entirety is available for public inspection at the office of the County Judge/Executive during normal business hours.

## Twenty attend JROTC Summer Camp

Craig is a 1992 animal sciences graduate of Eastern Kentucky University and a graduate of Rockcastle County High School.

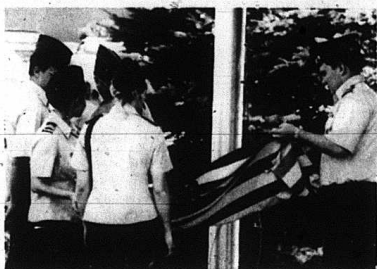

# Child Safety In The Car

In October 1995, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) issued a warning on an air bag danger to children. The NHTSA warns that children who are not protected by a seat belt could be seriously injured or killed by an air bag; and in the strongest possible terms urge that children ride belted in the back seat whenever possible.

In a crash, the air bag inflates very quickly. It hits anyone close to the dashboard with enough force to cause severe injuries or even death. Because the back of a rear-facing child seat sits very close to the dashboard, the seat could be struck with enough force to cause serious or fatal injuries to a baby. Air bags could also seriously injure or even kill an unbuckled child or adult who is sitting too close to the dashboard or who is thrown toward the dash during pre-crash braking. The injuries result from being hit by the deploying air bag or from being propelled by the bag into

structures within the car.

**Air Bag Safety Tips**

- The rear seat is the safest place for children to ride.
- If a vehicle has a passenger side air bag, rear-facing child seats must be used in the back-seat.
- Everyone in the front seat should use seat belts properly and be seated as far back from the dash board as possible.
- All young children should be properly secured in a child safety seat and older children have a lap/shoulder belt.
- Properly install all child seats.
- Read and follow vehicle owners manuals and safety seat instructions.

# Ticks common in Kentucky: their description and diseases

The American dog tick and lone star tick are the most common types found in Kentucky.

These two ticks don't appear to carry Lyme disease, which is transmitted principally by the black-legged tick and is more common in the northeast, upper midwest and extreme northwest. However, the American dog tick is the primary carrier of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. The lone star tick also transmits this disease but to a lesser extent.

Infected ticks must be attached at least 12-24 hours to transmit pathogens for either disease.

Although Lyme disease has received more news coverage, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is potentially the more serious disease. Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever can be fatal within several weeks after a tick bite if not diagnosed early and treated with antibiotics. Lyme disease is more debilitating. It can be treated successfully with antibiotics, especially if diagnosed in the earlier stages. As the disease progresses, it can result in chronic arthritis, heart disease or neurological disorders.

Both diseases are fairly rare in Kentucky. About 20-30 cases of Lyme disease and approximately 10-30 cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever are reported here in Kentucky annually. Considering the number of people bitten by ticks each year, these diseases are relatively rare.

The problem is that both diseases cause flu-like symptoms that often go untreated in the early, more curable stages. This is why it's important to see a doctor if you have symptoms several days or weeks after being bitten by a tick or have spent time in common tick habitats, such as overgrown woody areas, tall grass, weeds and brush.

The most characteristic symptom of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is a rash on wrists and ankles about the second to fifth day after tick

attachment. This rash later spreads to other parts of the body. Other symptoms include headache, chills, muscle aches and a very high fever (104-106 degrees F.) that can begin 2 to 12 days after attachment.

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection named after Lyme, Connecticut, where it was first reported in 1975. The most obvious early sign is a gradually expanding circular or oval red rash at the site of the bite that appears 3 to 30 days after attachment. However, this rash develops in only about 60-70% of infected individuals. It often disappears in a few weeks and might be overlooked.

Lyme disease is hard to diagnose because early symptoms mimic the flu and can include fatigue, headache, fever, swollen glands, and pain or stiffness in the neck, muscles or joints.

If you and your pets have been in common tick habitats, it's important to examine yourselves and animals and remove ticks promptly and carefully.

Adult American Dog Ticks are about the diameter of a small pencil eraser. They are brown with a silvery-gray, shield-like plate covering part or all of the back. Adult females full of blood are slate-gray and about the size of a raisin. Since immature ticks feed almost exclusively on small wild rodents, only the easily spotted adults are found on humans and pets. Adults are active in Kentucky from spring through mid-summer.

The adult female lone star tick has a distinct white spot on the back. Adult males have pale lacy white marks on the rear edge of the back. Immature lone star ticks are very tiny and readily attack humans, unlike the immature American dog tick. A person walking through vegetation with a clump of immature lone star ticks might find hundreds-crawling on the body.

Lone Star ticks are most common in western and south central Kentucky and are especially abundant in the spring and summer.

# Crop certification time

Crop reports are currently being taken at the FSA Office. The deadline to file a crop report is July 1st for farms with tobacco, July 15th for farms with crops other than tobacco. ALL crops must be planted at the time of certification. It is important for ALL producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) to file crop reports. This provides a record of crops grown on the farm for disaster purposes, such as disaster leasing, etc. Crop reports are required from farms that are participating in the Production Flexibility Program and the Conservation Reserve Program. An appointment will be scheduled at your convenience to file the crop acreage report.

Signup is currently underway for the Production Flexibility Program (formerly the Wheat and Feed Grain Program). Farms with crop acreage bases for wheat and/or corn can sign a 7 year contract to receive payments. There are no planting requirements and no set aside acres required. The contract may be terminated by the producer anytime during the 7 years to get out of the program. Deadline to

sign up for this program is July 12. If you have any questions concerning this program, feel free to stop by or call us at 256-2525.

Deadline for signing burley tobacco leases is July 1st. There are numerous leases in the office which require signatures before being complete.

Producers who elected to continue the FCIC insurance, and will not be able to get their tobacco planted by the July 1st planing deadline, need to come into the office to file an FCIC-9, Land Planting Agreement. This form should be filed PRIOR TO JULY 1. It will insure FCIC coverage of your tobacco.

Money has been allocated to Rockcastle County for the following Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices: Diversions, critical areas, sediment retention, erosion or water control, stream protection, animal waste systems, permanent wildlife habitats, and shallow water areas for wildlife. These practices must be applied for no later than July 31. A special allocation has been funded for the BEE LICK AREA for water quality practices. Producers who have concerns and are interested in practices for this area should contact the office.

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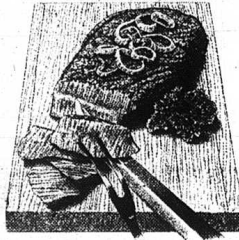
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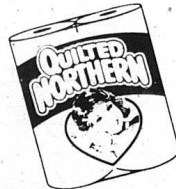
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
