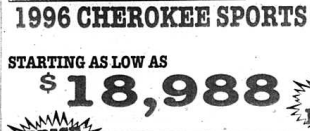

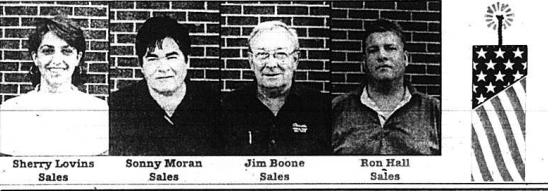
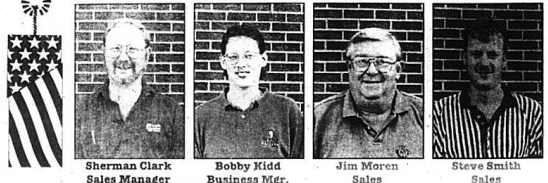

## County to receive funds for roadways

Governor Paul Patton continues to improve roads throughout Kentucky. Rockcastle Countians should spot improvements in the coming weeks. Highway projects included in this year's Rural Secondary Program have been scheduled and include: 3.4 miles of Brush Creek (KY-1004) and 2.9 miles of Brush Creek-Orlando (KY-1912).

Transportation Secretary Fred N. Mudge says while projects funded throughout this program are typically smaller and less prominent, they are some of the most important road projects implemented by the Cabinet. "Our smaller state and county-owned roadways are vital to Kentucky's overall transportation network. These roads carry our children to school each day and our citizens to work and home each night. These are the routes we depend on every day."

## Points East

This is the story of Trish's and Loretta's gardens. Trish, also known as Mrs. Dave Maggard and Loretta, the better half of your truly, both have gardens about which they spend considerable time bragging.

Visit either one of them and the first thing they'll say to you is, "Oh you have to come and look at my garden."

They'll tell you about fourteen different kinds of tomatoes setting on the vines and cabbage heads bigger than basketballs. They'll tell you about cucumbers that will be ready to pickle by weekend and they will rave about robust half-runners and blue lake beans.

They may even pluck a zinnia or marigold or cosmos, stick it up to your nose and make you agree when they ask, "Doesn't that smell just wonderful?"

And they will insist that you can't leave without taking a big mess of lettuce, some green onions and a head of broccoli or cauliflower or some new potatoes home with you. And you will go tell all your friends and neighbors about what wonderful green thumbs Trish Maggard and Loretta Adams have.

"You wouldn't believe it," you'll insist, "now there's two women who ought to have their pictures on the cover of a seed catalogue. There's you some gals who know what gardening is all about!"

Trish's garden started out when she talked Dan Ledford into plowing up a little plot about fifty by seventy five feet in what had grown orchard grass for the last fifteen years. The sod was about eight inches thick with roots as stout as piano wire growing as thickly as hair on a cat's back. The

sod was growing in thick yellow clay that is roughly as soft as a cast iron skillet when it's dry, and has the consistency of lukewarm rat tur when it's wet. If you stepped in it when it's wet, you could kiss your shoe goodbye. Quicksand would be a safer bet if you wanted to go walking.

Dave and I then spent every evening for a solid week getting beat to death with my big Troybilt tiller until we finally got Trish's garden reasonably close to level. We, along with Dave's boys, Travis and Paul, spent another week of evening hauling fifty gallon garbage cans full of dirt in two manners and dumping it about ten inches thick on top of the clay pit. (A herd of deer had wintered in an old barn at Dave's place for several years and the stuff was knee deep. If you're curious, it comes in little black balls about the size of jelly beans.)

We spent another week plowing the deer poop under and Trish's garden was ready to plant.

Loretta's garden was a piece of cake. It's the same one she's had for the last several years and the tiller goes through it like a knife through hot butter. And Leroy Griffith had already spread nearly a ton of good cow manure on it.

Dave and I had previously ordered 573.58 worth of seeds from a company called Totally Tomatoes (ie, the 14 varieties mentioned above) and from Parks Seed Company. We spent another \$25.50 at Southern States and around \$20.00 at the discount stores. We decided to plant different things in Trish's garden than we did in Loretta's so they could share and swap back and forth. We had spent a weekend back in February building a miniature green house and by the time the women's gardens were ready to plant we had way over a thousand plants—tomatoes, eggplants, pepper, flowers and so forth ready to put in the ground.

Dave and I have spent most of our spare time this spring in either Loretta's garden or Trish's. We have planted and hoed and worm calloused on our knee-caps while we crawled

through row after row of veggies pulling out careless weed, lambs quarter, hog thistle, crab-grass and a host of other undesirable vegetation that we didn't plant. We've been eyeball to eyeball with a million tater bugs before we squashed them.

Loretta and Trish are observed to each other that it's nice that both Dave and I enjoy working in their gardens because it wouldn't be nearly as much fun for one person. Loretta and Trish actually visited their gardens three or four times during the planning, plowing and cultivating. When the lettuce and mustard greens and green onions started getting big enough to eat they would casually stop by their gardens and drop little hints like, "Some of that stuff would be good for supper if you have time to pick it for me."

We'd take stuff into the house and one or the other of our better halves would yell back out in the sweetest of vocal tones, "Oh Honey, exactly how do you like a lot of water or just a little? Do you like it salted or peppered? How long should I cook it for you? Do you want me to put anything else in it?"

Very considerate women, Dave's spouse and mine, and we are so fortunate that they will share their wonderful gardens so unselfishly with us, don't you think? They even let us pick their beans and squash for them. What else could a man ask for from gardeners like Loretta and Trish?

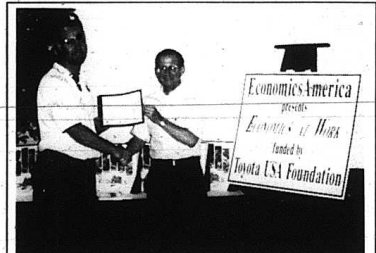

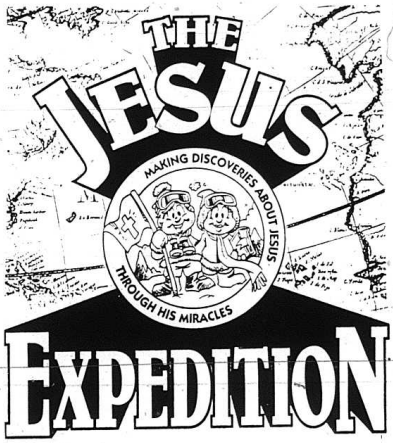

### Learn the catch-and-release method

The thousands of anglers already out stalking the waters know that whether you're fishing to keep or just for sport there are times you'll have to use the catch-and-release method.

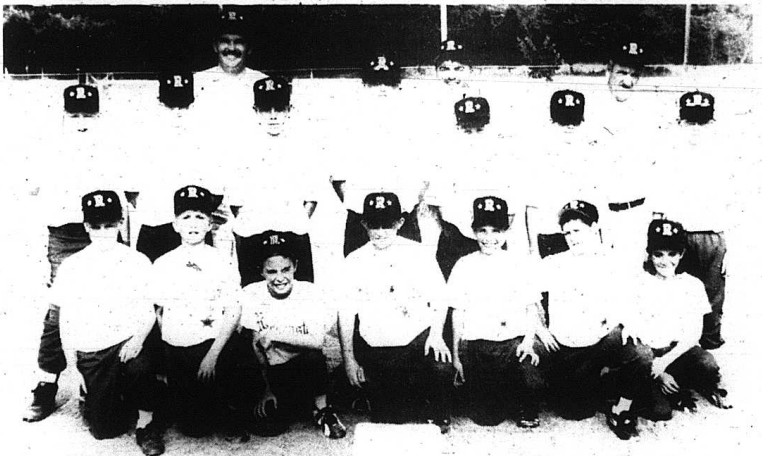
The most basic element of catch-and-release is to keep the fish in the water as much as possible. Use a net to keep the fish from flopping on the boat or ground, and make sure that your hands are wet and that you avoid touching the gill or eye areas when handling. Remove the hook quickly

If done properly, releasing a sport fish is an excellent conservation tool helping to maintain quality fishing opportunities. However, if a fish is improperly or roughly handled it may die.

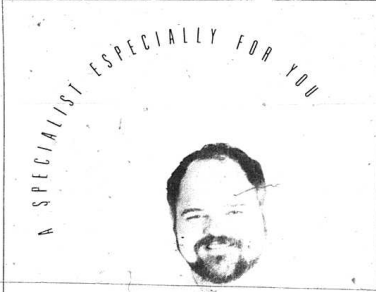

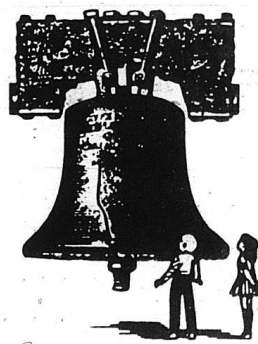

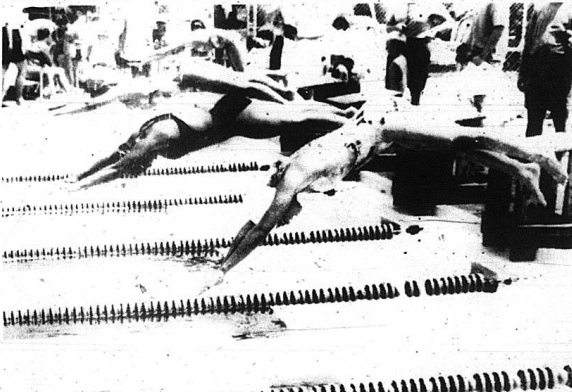

## Five ordinances finalized

Five ordinances were finalized by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a meeting Monday night.

There was a sewer use ordinance, a sewer user charge, a water user charge, a final reading of the city budget for 1996-97 and an ordinance on city employees' retirement.

The ordinances will be published in the next issue of the Signal except the budget ordinance which is found on another page in this issue.

The council also approved Cumberland Valley Area Development District to prepare financial application documents for the city, and authorized the mayor's signature. The documents are for Mt. Ver-

non water treatment distribution system improvements. The city now covers 85 percent of water users in the county. The water plant treats 1.7-million gallons a day. With the improvements, it will up production to 4 million gallons a day. The entire amount for improvements totals \$4.5 million. The city will contribute \$7,000 to the cost from the city's water and sewer fund.

The improvements broken down shows a Community Development block grant of \$500,000; Rural Development will provide \$1,700,000 and Kentucky Infrastructure will provide \$2,300,000 in a low interest loan. A delegation interested in a

\$10,000 grant for plans for downtown revitalization was scheduled to talk to the council but did not appear. Mayor Gary R. Cromer said he would contact them to discover the reason.

Police Chief Bill Mink gave the council the June security report. It showed: citations issued, 105; total hours, no report; DUI arrests, 17; calls for service, 369; accidents, 15; other agency assists, 58; motorist assists, 14; criminal cases opened, 3. The Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department made 15 fire runs in June.

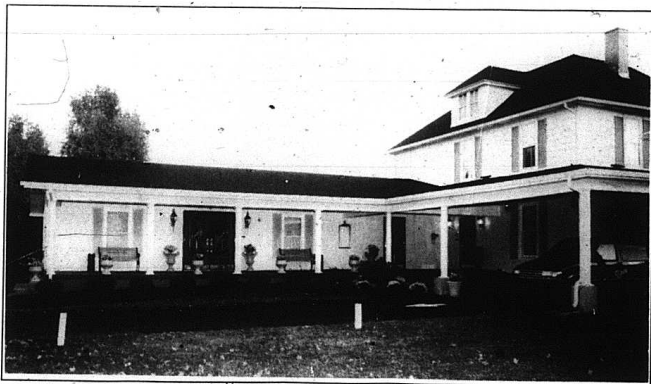
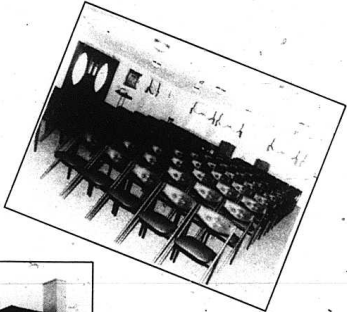
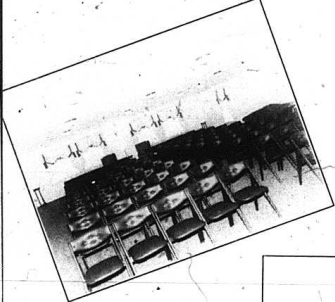

# More Kentuckians may be eligible for federal nutrition program than realize

Kentuckians who qualify for the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program for food and other services do not have to be unemployed or on welfare to receive benefits.

Marvin Miller, nutrition services manager in the state Department for Health Services says even a family of four with a monthly income of \$2,405 may qualify.

WIC is a supplemental nutrition program for women who are pregnant, postpartum or breastfeeding, infants and children under five years old.

Health Service Commissioner Rice Leach, M.D. said "I urge all Kentuckians who are entitled to the benefits for the WIC program to use it. Meeting the nutritional needs of Kentucky children today will mean a healthier Kentucky in the future."

WIC clients receive nutritious foods such as infant formula, milk, cereal, juice, peanut butter, cheese, raw carrots, tuna fish, dried beans and eggs, as well as nutritional information.

"Proper nutrition combined with other appropriate health services helps maintain health and promote normal growth and development," said Miller. "Proper nutrition is vital for both the physical and intellectual growth of children, especially during pregnancy and during their early years."

About 119,000 low-income Kentuckians are being served monthly by the program. About 77 percent of the people who are eligible in Kentucky participate. To qualify, participants must be at nutritional risk and in a family that is at or below 185 percent of the federal poverty level.

"The Kentucky WIC program is serving a higher percentage of its potentially eligible citizens than most states. But we still have room to

grow," said Miller.

Studies show that many serious health problems can be prevented with proper nutrition and both financial and physical costs can be avoided through early care.

Several Kentucky health indicators improved from 1983 to 1993 because of the WIC program. The number of children with anemia dropped from 28.2 percent to 17.1 percent, the number of underweight children with anemia decreased from 3.6 percent to 2.8 percent and the number of low-birth-weight babies

fell from 11.4 percent to 8.8 percent, Miller said.

National studies of the WIC program have shown that WIC significantly increased the head size of infants whose mothers received WIC foods during pregnancy. Head size normally reflects brain growth. In addition, pregnant women who participated in WIC had fewer premature births, and sought prenatal care in pregnancy.

The program is open to all persons and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex or disability.

## July 4th holiday to spark strong travel volume, says AAA

Motorists planning to travel the Fourth of July period may find relief in sight as the average gas price slipped nearly a half cent per gallon in the last month, according to AAA Blue Grass/Kentucky.

The auto club's most recent Fuel Gauge Survey shows the average price of self-serve regular unleaded gasoline nationwide is \$1.303 per gallon for June compared to \$1.307 in May. This month's price is 7.5 cents more than a year ago when gasoline averaged \$1.228 per gallon. For July 4th holiday travelers, this increase amounts to 30 cents more for gasoline on a 100 mile-trip, compared to a year ago.

Statewide, the average of self-serve regular unleaded is \$1.238, while in Lexington the average is \$1.20. The local survey included 30 stations and reflected a range in price from \$1.17 to \$1.24 a gallon.

Seventy-eight percent of the sta-

tions surveyed will be open over the holiday and 38 percent will operate 24 hours.

This decrease in gas prices will be welcomed as this Fourth of July period is expected to generate the highest number of travelers for that holiday in eight years, reports AAA. Up 2 percent from last year, AAA's holiday projects show 35.7 million Americans plan to take a trip of 100 miles. Eighty-five percent will drive. This projection is the highest since 1988, when 26 million people traveled over the Independence Day period.

The most popular July 4th destination will be cities and towns, mentioned by 24 percent of those surveyed. The next most popular destination is the ocean or beach.

AAA Blue Grass/Kentucky is a not-for-profit motoring organization serving 118,000 members in Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia.

**Auto Insurance:  
Getting Your  
Money's Worth**

Even though Kentuckians spend more than \$5 billion a year on insurance premiums, many consumers have only a vague understanding of what they are buying. Car insurance is no exception.

The main purpose of automobile insurance is to protect you from the cost of damage caused by your car and the cars driven by other people. Each facet of this protection is covered by a different component of the policy (for example, "liability," "collision," "uninsured motorist"). Each has a separate purpose and a separate price. While a certain basic level of liability insurance is required by law, most of these parts can be adjusted to suit your individual needs. Choosing different kinds and amounts of coverage can raise or lower the cost of your policy.

As the cost of all insurance takes a bigger and bigger bite out of your family's budget, it is important for you to buy the best coverage at the best price. In addition, you should buy from a company that can demonstrate customer satisfaction with its claim service. Premiums are based on a number of factors. Therefore, they may vary from one company to another for the same policy. Companies take into account factors which

affect the chances of your having an accident, such as previous driving record, population density, etc. The higher the risk, the higher the premium.

Once you determine the insurance premium factors that apply to you, you can shop for the company that will make a firm commitment to insure you. Always remember, you want adequate coverage and efficient policyholder service. **IMPORTANT:** A low premium rate is not the only factor to consider. The insurer should have adequate claims service to your community. Friends and neighbors can tell you about companies that serve them well. You may be better off paying a few more premium dollars for better service from an insurance agent or company representative of your choice.

For more information on insurance, drop by the Extension Office for a free copy of the Consumer's Guide to Homeowners and Auto Insurance, published by the Ky. Department of Insurance. The publication lists individual insurance companies and their standard rates as well as explanations of the type of coverages, discounts and insurance laws.

For more information concerning this program, or if you have any questions you would like answered, contact this FSA Office. Crop certification dates have been extended to August 1st, for all crops not insured. Crops that are insured through FSA must be certified no later than July 15th.

ACP (Agricultural Conservation) practices need to be applied for no later than July 31.

The Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996, signed into law on April 4, 1996 specifies that deficiency over payment amounts shall be automatically deducted from Production Flexibility Contract (PFC) payments.

Producers that enter into the Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA) by signing Form CCC-478, "Production Flexibility Contract," agree to have their PFC payments automatically reduced to satisfy outstanding deficiency overpayment amounts. Some producers had submitted early offset or multiple payment arrangements. These agreements are now void.

1996 final PFC payments, issued by September 30, 1996, will be automatically reduced for wheat, barley, oats and upland cotton deficiency over payments. 1997 advance PFC payments will be automatically reduced for corn and grain sorghum deficiency over payments and any remaining outstanding over payment amounts. Interest will not accrue on over payment amounts offset from PFC payments.

Producers may also elect to have their 1996 advance PFC payment reduced to satisfy deficiency overpayment amounts. Producers wishing to offset their 1996 advance PFC payment must provide written notification to the FSA Office.

Contact the FSA office with any questions regarding repayment of 1995 deficiency over payments.

**Agriculture News**

**PRODUCTION FLEXIBILITY CONTRACTS-** (Wheat and Feed Grain Program) Eligible producers (Producers associated with farms having a crop acreage base) can enter into 7-year market transition contract. Signup for the new program will begin May 20 and extend up until July 12. Westward that is the only opportunity producers will have to enroll and those who fail to do so now WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE at a later date. There will be no additional signups except for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. Some exceptions are made for fruits and vegetables, with an acre-for-acre loss of payment. There are no having and grazing re-

strictions for this program, (no set-aside), Alfalfa and other forage crops can be grown on contract acreage without loss of payments. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and, after signup, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty.

Annual contract payments will be made no later than September 30 of each fiscal year 1996-2002. For FY 1997-2002, a 50% advance payment will be made at the option of the owner or producer on December 15 of January 15 of the fiscal year. Advance payments for the 1996 program year will be made no later than 14 days after COC approval of the contract.

Producer's must also remain in compliance with the highly erodible/wetland conservation practices and the payment limitation/eligibility requirements.

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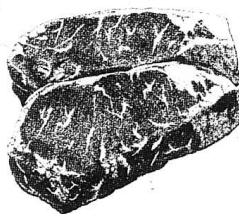

I, and the magistrates, adopted this new approach, the responsibility of the All American Club (now called Rockcastle Litter Patrol) grew to encompass all of Rockcastle County's roadways.

Rockcastle County's Fiscal Court has, with the Litter Patrol, been able to pick up roadside litter thrown from cars by using local people who, the Fiscal court believes, owe something back to their community. Given state recognition for their unusual and dedicated service, the Rockcastle Litter Patrol has made it possible for the Fiscal Court to provide a much-needed service at only a fraction of the cost other counties must pay by hiring a full time deputy to oversee either prisoners or community service workers.

According to reports turned into the judge's office, several parts of the county are much worse with unsightly litter (mostly from fast food restaurants) than others. Highway U.S. 25 from Renfro Valley north, State Route 1004 for approximately one-half mile from U.S. 25, the roads around the lake, and a few others appear to be most heavily littered. Some areas in the county, however, have practically no litter problems.
