a parent could not afford to pay a fine, the judge replied, "If they can't, they go to jail."

The curfew part of the ordinance does not affect any child 16 years of

age or older, although children under the age of 18 are considered minors by the ordinance.

Part (2) of the ordinance, Paren-tal Duties and Curfew for Minors.

follows.

(A) It is the continuous duty of the parent of any minor to exercise reasonable control to prevent the minor from committing any delinquent est.

(B) Included (without limitation) in this continuous duty of reasonable parental control are the following parental duties:

(a) To keep illegal drugs or illegal drugs.

rental duties:

(a) To keep illegal drugs or illegal firearms out of the home and legal firearms inaccessible in places that are inaccessible to the minor.

(b) To know the curfew provi-

sions of this ordinance and to require the minor to observe the curfew, which shall be:

(i) No child under the age of twelve years shall be permitted or allowed to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 10:00 pm. and 6:00 a.m.

(ii) No child under the age of sixteen years shall be permitted or caused to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

(iii) Subsections (i) and (ii) of this sections shall not apply when the child is with the puter, legal guardian, or adult selected by the parent, plegal guardian to be with the child or if the child is over twelve years of age ian, or adult selected by the parents legal guardian to be with the child or legal guardian to be with the child or if the child is over twelvey ears of age and is upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian and has proof of such permission, or when exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly, provided that written notice signed by a parent is in the possession of such

minor specifying when, whereand in what manner said minor will be exercising such First Amendment rights. (C) To require the minor to be absent from class without parental or school permission.

(D) To arrange proper supervision for the minor when the parent must be absent.

(E) To take the necessary precautions to prevent the minor from malicularly of the preventions to prevent the minor from malicularly of the preventions of the minor when the parent include you willfully destroying real, personal, or mixed property which belongs to the County of Rockeastie, or is located in the County of Rockeastie.

(F) To forbit the minor from keep-ing stolen property, illegally possess-ing firearms or illegal drugs, and to seek help from appropriate govern-mental authorities or private agen-cies to law.

(3) To be responsible for incar-cration costs should the minor be incarcerated related to any of the above.

(H)The above listed sections do in any way exclude or take away

from Kentucky statutes applying to same or similar situations, and where in conflict, the applicable statute should take priority







additional signups except for land
coming out of the Conservation

Reserve Program (CRP).
Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under cer-tain circumstances. Some exceptain circumstances.
