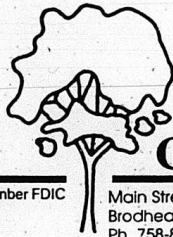



lican legislators will be honored during the National Conference of State Legislatures' Annual Meeting scheduled later this month in St. Louis, Missouri. Called the "largest gathering of state legislative officials in the nation," this meeting provides a forum for the lawmakers to discuss issues, share ideas and solve problems.

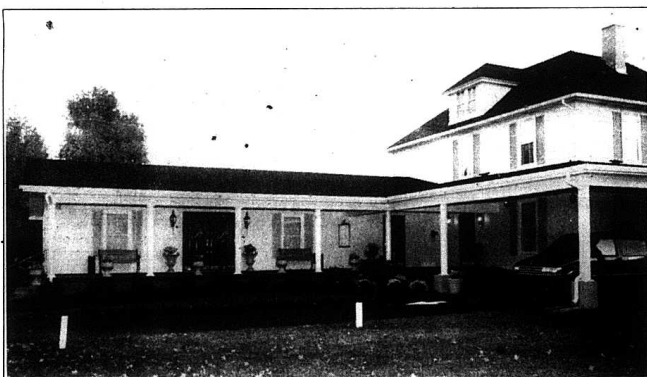

Ohio family killed in wreck here

Police think the use of drugs and alcohol may have caused a head-on collision near Mt. Vernon last week that wiped out an entire family from Ohio.

Kentucky State Police accident reconstruction specialist Craig Sutton said Tuesday that he was awaiting results of blood tests and other tests performed at the wreck scene before he presented the case to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

"It appears at this time however, that drugs and, or alcohol were a factor in the wreck," he said.

Killed in the Thursday morning accident on the Hwy. 461 by-pass were C. Romie Schumaker, 38, his wife Cindy Schumaker, 40 and their son, Gustin Schumaker, 9, all of Pataksala, Ohio a suburb of Columbus.

Injured were Charles Mullins, 34, of Lexington, who is still listed in serious condition at the University of Kentucky Hospital and Amanda Schumaker, 11, also of Pataksala. Amanda Schumaker was treated at the Rockcastle Hospital for cuts and abrasions and released to family friends.

Amanda Schumaker is a niece of the deceased couple. Gustin Schumaker was also transferred to the University of Kentucky Hospital where he died at 8 p.m. that evening.

According to Sutton the wreck occurred at 2 a.m. when Mullins, of Lexington who was northbound, drove his 1996 Ford service van into the path of the Schumaker's vehicle, which was headed south.

Trooper Sutton said that neither driver applied their brakes before the collision.

"It was a very violent collision, there were no skid marks and although the airbags deployed in the Schumaker vehicle, (a 1996 Chevrolet Tahoe) no one had seat belts on except the young girl," he said.

The state trooper said that at least two people saw the accident, but because it was dark, they could not tell how fast the vehicles were traveling.

There was another group of people traveling with the Schumakers, who were following behind them when the wreck occurred and they said they were traveling the speed limit, but no one was certain how fast the Mullins' vehicle was traveling," Sutton said.

Sutton said the Schumakers were traveling with friends for a water skiing vacation at Lake Cumberland.

The trooper said that C. Romie Schumaker's mother also apparently lives in Somerset.

Sutton also said that ironically Amanda Schumaker's mother was killed in an auto accident last year.

The Schumakers were buried in Pataksala on Tuesday.

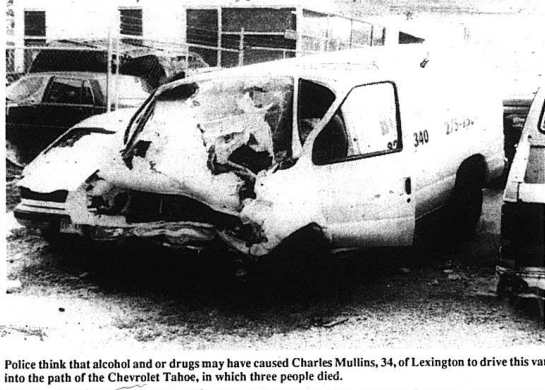
The fatal wreck occurred across from the blacktop plant on the by-pass and was the first fatal accident of the July 4 holiday weekend.

During the official travel weekend 16 people died on Kentucky highways. State police said that only four of the 16 killed were wearing seat belts.

Board approves four new rooms at MVES

The Rockcastle County Board of Education approved the construction of four new classrooms at Mt. Vernon Elementary School at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The rooms, two pre-school and two regular, will cost the board an estimated \$400,000.

An architect's estimate was presented to the board, which requested the proposal at last month's meeting after MVES principal Rose Brown voiced her concern over space at the county's largest school.

Mt. Vernon has approximately 900 full and part-time students, the most of any school in the county.

The four new classrooms will be added on the side of the school facing Williams Street and next to the Walter Shepherd property.

School finance officer Richard Bray said the four classrooms will be built in a two story fashion, with the pre-school classrooms on the bottom floor and should be ready for occupancy by the start of school in 1997.

The new classrooms will not affect any of the roadways around the school.

School Superintendent Larry Hammond also told the board that he and vice-chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith attended a ceremony in Frankfort on

Tuesday, in which Kentucky Governor Paul Patton presented a check for \$42,000 to the Daniel Boone Development Council for the purchase of the Livingston school property.

School finance officer Richard Hammond said the legal work on transferring the property was underway and should be completed soon.

The board also voted to raise school lunch prices for the coming school year at all levels.

Lunch prices for students in the elementary schools will go from .85 to .90 and lunch prices at the middle school and high school will go from .90 to \$1.00. Adult lunch prices will rise from \$1.30 to \$1.50.

The court voted 5-1 with second district magistrate Jack Bradley abstaining. County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotts made the motion for a second a final reading of the ordinance, which will become law after it is published in this week's Signal.

Third district magistrate Bill McKinney asked the court to change the wording of Part A of the parental duties and curfew for minors. He didn't like the word locked and asked the court to change it to inaccessible. They complied.

Magistrate Bradley said following the meeting that, "there were a few things I didn't agree with."

For example, he said, "if a parent tried to correct a child for a deed he or she had done, they could potentially be held for child abuse, and, in some cases, good children, in a bad crowd could be punished for what others do."

The ordinance states in section 1, "in enacting the curfew, the County of Rockcastle acknowledges juveniles' lack of experience and immaturity judgements, as well as a substantial increase in juvenile detention costs directly related to increasing juvenile criminal activity."

The bottom line for the court involves increased expenditure to house juvenile offenders in other counties.

Judge Carlotts said juvenile detention costs have skyrocketed in the past year.

"At one time we spent about \$5,000 a year to house juvenile prisoners, now it's about \$5,000 a month," the judge said. "The county is bound by law to bear the cost and all taxpayers are paying," he said.

When parents fail to exercise reasonable parental control the ordinance is considered violated, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette who drafted the ordinance for the county.

First time violators will be subject to a fine of \$75 to \$100. Second offense violators could be fined \$100 to \$500 and a third conviction calls for a possible fine of \$200 to \$500 and 90 days in jail.

A person in the audience from the Christian Appalachian Project asked Judge Carlotts what would happen if

Dowell said that it appeared that hay had become bunched up in front of the baler and that when Wynn tried to kick it away, his pants got caught and he was pulled into the baler.

Dowell said hay apparently ignited inside the baler, after Wynn was jerked into it, but that he was apparently dead before the fire.

The coroner said that Wynn's brother Billy, who was digging a basement nearby, saw the smoke and was the first to scene.

The coroner said it took about two and a half hours to free Wynn's body from the baler.

The men were George W. Perkins, Jr., of Dayton, Ky. and Jesse Ricketts of Trotwood, Ohio. They both post a \$3,000 cash bond.

They were charged with trafficking in marijuana, DUI and substance abuse. Alcohol was not involved.

Over the last several days I've been accompanying a film crew from the Netherlands up the hollers and across the hills in Rockcastle and Jackson Counties. Don't even think about asking me to pronounce, much less spell, any last names but my new friends are Yost, Mariann and David. Actually Dave's last name is relatively easy, Hammelburg, but the other two—forget it.

Anyway, these folks are from Holland's equivalent to PBS and they're doing a short little piece on what life is like in the mountains when you get a few miles out of town. Brush Creek, for example, ain't a lot like Mt. Vernon nor Sand Lick much like McKee.

Highway 89 up Indian Creek, from Livingston to McKee, is much narrower than 25 and homes are few and far between. And the more rural you get, the more that lifestyle and values differ from folks who live in town. It's sort of a natural progression from come when you're invited to come in and rest your feet anytime you show up.

You don't have to make any appointments out in the country. You don't have to call and let folks know you're coming. You just decide to go over and see if the VanWinkles are at the house and if they ain't, you go to the Collinses and if they ain't, you go to the Robinsons until you eventually find somebody at home who

has a fresh pot of coffee brewed or a good cold pop that they've been saving for whoever shows up. It's the kind of attitude I wish everybody had, but I'm off the point a bit.

My new best friend and co-worker at The Christian Appalachian Project, Glenna Robinson, (who is also officially known as "Mom") by several dozen teenagers and younger kids who frequent the Rockcastle Teen Center where she tries to keep some semblance of order) invited the Dutch visitors and yours truly to Church last Sunday and even convinced the Pastor, Reverend Doug Collins, to let us film part of the service at New Hope Baptist

Church. Glenna's mom, Viola, who looks more like her sister, also came along. (It wouldn't do for me to be a single man if either of them were available. But pleassssssse don't tell Loretta I said that).

New Hope is a long ridge off Brush Creek in Rockcastle County a few short miles from the Jackson County line. About all that's left of a community that once rested on the mountain top is the Church but it's like a homecoming every weekend. Folks drive nearly 20 miles each way from several surrounding communities to worship God in this little country church and they'll tell you about long gone homesteads that you used to be able to see from the front yard as you socialize in the parking lot before the bell starts ringing.

However, when that bell does start ringing, I believe with all my heart that the Angels assigned the task of overseeing New Hope Ridge, themselves, start singing. And when you get inside the Church you know without a doubt that you are in the presence of the Lord.

Heresay

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and hyperbolisms from the ever-entrancing Dell of Wab, home of the late Solomon DeBar, a "brilliant, long-time breeder of Rhode Islands Reds and part-time metaphysician, who reasoned that "there is none more miserable than he who once believed but now cannot."

Eventually, a doctor saw me. A dour-looking fellow he seemed to me. His name was R. C. Hosp. What a most unusual handle for someone from the Orient, I mused. (Beloved, I wouldn't have known his name had he not put it on a prescription.) Our daughter-in-law was a Hoopes, and I've known folks named Hoops and Hoops, but I'd never come across anyone named Hosp in all my born days here beneath the Great Veil.

Dr. Hosp stood in front of me and said, "What's wrong?"

"Probably bronchitis," I replied and then explained that I would have wanted to see my regular physician were it not for that noon Lexington appointment.

look in my ears and at my throat, listen to my lungs, give me a shot of something, and send me on my way with a prescription. So, I sat there assuming such would again transpire.

After a bit - I was shivering - a nice little gal entered, smiled, "I'm here to stick you."

"I prefer to take it in the hip," I said.

"Oh, no, I'm going to draw blood," she said, "I only take out. I wouldn't know how to put in."

"Why do that?" I said.

"So we will know whether your infection is bacterial or viral, and how to treat it," she said.

"Good answer! Good answer! I thought. If only Dr. Hosp could do that!

She made sense, but I felt a culture was unnecessary, seeing that my regular doctor never did such.

"We'll know in about five minutes," she said. I was pleased to hear that Dr. Hosp thought I had something.

I'll be out of here soon, I thought.

Yeah, after an X-ray and an albuterol-oxygen breathing treatment. It was then that I understood what Dr. Hosp had said to the nurse - "Sock it to him!" (By the way, albuterol is a sophisticated name for WD-40.)

Beloved, I eventually got home - without the botanist cinema I fully thought I'd get before I got out of there. And I got no restful sleep because of having to sit up and suck lozenges to mitigate against the nasal drainage on my throat.

I did keep my appointment in Lexington. I felt awful but had high hopes. They, however, are on the back burner after a doctor named Quiddle asked a bunch of questions, talked mostly into a recorder, and scheduled another appointment next week.

Precious souls, I was totally disillusioned. With good reason, too. Let me elaborate, since you're just dying to know.

First of all, the visit to the ER was not worth the time and certainly not the expense.

Second, when the ER nurse asked her questions, I told her I take trazodone regularly. Beloved, with the above I'm copying even the fact that I did not get my shot in the hip. But one thing really has me beside myself: DR. HOSP DID NOT TELL ME TO SAY "AH-H-H."

"Ordinance"

a parent could not afford to pay a fine, the judge replied, "If they can't, they go to jail."

The curfew part of the ordinance does not affect any child 16 years of age or older, although children under the age of 18 are considered minors by the ordinance.

Part (2) of the ordinance, Parental Duties and Curfew for Minors, follows.

(A) It is the continuous duty of the parent of a minor to exercise reasonable control to prevent the minor from committing any delinquent act.

(B) Included (without limitation) in this continuous duty of reasonable parental control are the following parental duties:

- (a) To keep illegal drugs or illegal firearms out of the home and legal firearms inaccessible in places that are inaccessible to the minor.
- (b) To know the curfew provisions

of this ordinance and to require the minor to observe the curfew, which shall be:

(i) No child under the age of twelve years shall be permitted or allowed to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

(ii) No child under the age of sixteen years shall be permitted or caused to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

(iii) Subsections (i) and (ii) of this sections shall not apply when the child is with the parent, legal guardian, or adult selected by the parent or legal guardian to be with the child or if the child is over twelve years of age and is upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian and has proof of such permission, or when exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly, provided that written notice signed by the minor and countersigned by a parent is in the possession of such

minor specifying when, where and in what manner said minor will be exercising such First Amendment rights. (C) To require the minor to attend regular school sessions and to forbid the minor to be absent from class without parental or school permission.

(D) To arrange proper supervision for the minor when the parent must be absent.

(E) To take the necessary precautions to prevent the minor from maliciously or willfully destroying real, personal, or mixed property which belongs to the County of Rockcastle, or is located in the County of Rockcastle.

(F) To forbid the minor from keeping stolen property, illegally possessing firearms or illegal drugs, and to seek help from appropriate governmental authorities or private agencies to law.

(G) To be responsible for incarceration costs should the minor be incarcerated related to any of the above.

(H) The above listed sections do not in any way exclude or take away

from Kentucky statutes applying to same or similar situations, and where in conflict, the applicable statute should take priority.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said Wednesday that there were many misconceptions about the ordinance that most all parents would not be affected by its adoption. Burdette will explain the ordinance in detail in next week's Signal.

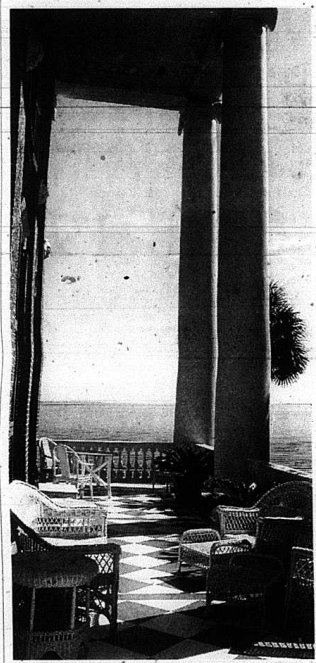

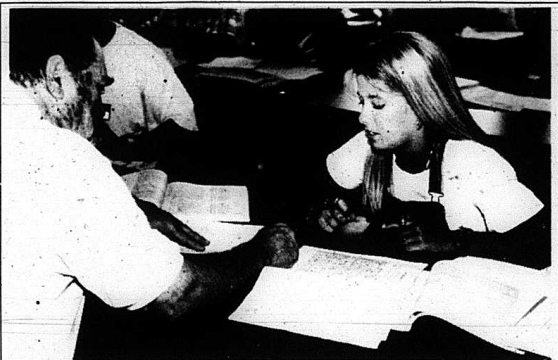

Head Start Volunteers honored at annual event

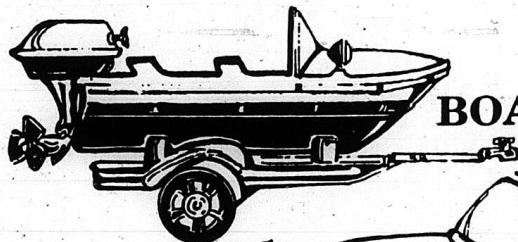
Renfro Valley was the setting for the Kentucky River Foothills Head Start Annual Volunteer Appreciation Event.

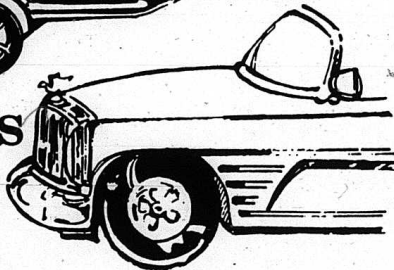

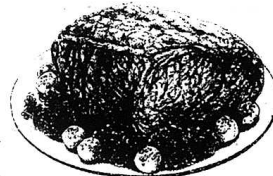

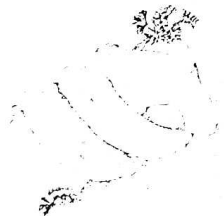

Despite sizable deficit KAcO still insurance program for Rockcastle County

Although a sizable deficit has been reported KAcO still remains the insurance program for Rockcastle County.

With that in mind, Rockcastle County attorney, Jeff Burdette said last week that the Rockcastle Fiscal Court should "seriously consider other options for the county's insurance coverage after recent concerns about KAcO" (Kentucky Association of Counties All Lines Fund).

But County Judge/executive Buzz Carlotis had another point of view.

"We can only seriously con-

sider other options if we have the money to pay for them," he said.

The county took the low bid of KAcO when bids were opened two weeks ago by the court. KAcO bid \$32,396. The next low bid was by Accordia of Lexington at \$48,349.

Judge Carlotis continued, "If we choose a more costly premium, the only way to pay for it would be to cut back on road repairs and other services."

"An important thing to remember," the Judge said, "is that KAcO has never failed to pay a claim turned in by counties. Why, therefore consider change? It preforms

exactly as an insurance coverage should, and is, generally at one half the cost to the county."

He concluded, "I will consider changing only if it is proved to be in our best interests. At present it is not in our interests to change companies."

Controversy over the all Lines Fund caused a furor among local governments, most of which were preparing new budgets when Kentucky Insurance Commissioner, George Nichols III estimated KAcO to be in debt over \$9 million.

About 100, or more, counties

and hundreds more smaller agencies such as ambulance and library boards, had liability coverage through the fund for the fiscal year that ended Sunday.

Although many counties pulled

out of KAcO, they have since returned, probably because of the lower premiums.

Nichols said he made a promise the Department of Insurance will do everything possible to keep the program afloat.

Judge Carlotis said last week, the All Lines Fund had a \$25 million bond in a Cincinnati bank to use if it claims warrant.

The Judge put off opening bids originally to a later date in order to get more bids for Rockcastle.

"I remember when we couldn't get quotes on insurance," he said.

The delay proved profitable when two additional bids were received Acordia of Lexington and Patton, Chestnut, Binder of London who bid, \$59,588.

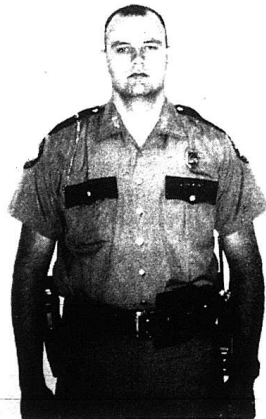

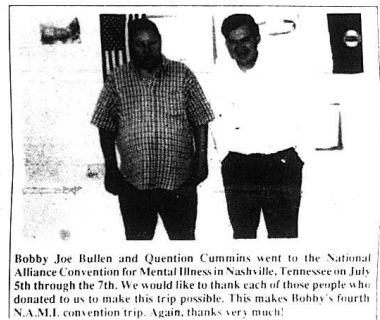

Agriculture News

PRODUCTION FLEXIBILITY CONTRACTS (Wheat and Feed Grain Program) Eligible producers (Producers associated with farms having a crop acreage base) can enter into 7-year market transition contract. Signup for the new program began May 20 and extends through July 12. We stress that this is the ONLY opportunity producers will have to enroll and those who fail to do so now **WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE** at a later date. There will be no additional signups except for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. Some exceptions are made for fruits and vegetables, with an acre-for-acre loss of payment. There is no haying and grazing restrictions for this program, (no set-aside). Alfalfa and other forage crops can be grown on contract acreage without loss of payments. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and, after signup, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty.

Annual contract payments, will be made no later than September 30 of each fiscal year 1996-2002/ For FY 1997-2002, a 50% advance payment will be made at the option of the owner or producer on December 15 or January 15 of the fiscal year. Advance

payments for the 1996 program year will be made no later than 14 days after COC approval of the contract.

Producers must also remain in compliance with the highly erodible/wetland conservation practices and the payment limitation/eligibility requirements.

For more information concerning this program, or if you have any questions you would like answered, contact this FSA Office.

Crop certification dates have been extended to August 1st for all crops not insured. Crops that are insured through FSA must be certified no later than July 15.

Last date to purchase FCIC insurance from FSA (for producers who had insurance last year) is July 15.

A new LTA (Long Term Agreement) sign up is underway for July 8 thru August 8. This sign up is for ALL practices currently in the State Program. For more information, contact the office.

ACP (Agricultural Conservation) practices need to be applied for no later than July 31.
