WATER POLLUTANT DISCHARGELIMITS, PRETREATMENT PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION, ESTABLISHING THE RIGHT OF THE CITY TO CHARGE FEES FOR ADMINISTERING THE CITY'S REASONABLY NECESSARY FUNCTIONS RELATED TO SEWER AND DELINEATING POWERS AND AUTHORITY OF INSPECTORS AND SETTING FORTH THE METHODS AND PROCEDURES OF ENFORCE MENT OF THE ORDINANCE AND PENALTIES FOR VIOLE AND PENALTIES FOR VIOLE TON OF SAME AND REPEALING PRIOR ORDINANCES.

#### Purpose and Policy

This Ordinance sets forth uniform requirements for direct and indirect contributors into the wastewater collection and treatment system for the city of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky and enable the City to comply with all applicable State and Federal laws required by the Clean Water Act of 1977 and the General Pretreatment ations (40 CFR, Part 403)

The objectives to the Ordiance are:

 to prevent the introduction of pol-lutants into the municipal wastewa-ter system which will interfere with the operation of the system or con-taminate the resulting sludge; 2. to preven the introduction of pollutants into the municipal wastewater sysinto the municipal wastewater sys-tem which will pass through the sys-tem inadequately treated into receiving waters as to cause violations of the City's KPDES permit or the atre or otherwise be incompatmospinere or otherwise be incompar-ible with the system; 3. to improve the opportunity to recycle and re-claim wastewaters and studges from the system; 4. to provide for equi-table distribution of the cost of the municipal system; and 5. provide for the safety of the treatment plant employees.

This Ordinance provides for the regu-lation of direct and indirect contributions to the municipal wasterwater m through the issuance of per-to certain non-domestic users mits to cer and through enforcement of general requirements for the other users, authorizes monitoring and enforce-ment activities, requires user repor-ing and provides for the setting of fees for the equitable distribution of costs resulting from the program established herein.

established herein.

This Ordinance shall apply to the City of Mr. Vennon, Kentucky and to persons outside the City who are, by contract or agreement with the City, users of the City Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTTW). Except as otherwise provided herein, the Superintendent shall administer, immlement and enforc the nrovision implement and enforc the provision of this Ordinance,

Use of Public Sewer
This section of the Ordinance discusses the requirements for mandatory connections and the requirements for discharge points. In addition, this section establishes that no unpolluted waters (i.e., water from downspouts, etc) should be discharged to any sanitary sewers and furthermore, prohibited discharges are identified. Private Wastewater Disposal

uirements for operating private age disposal facilities when pubers are not available are discussed along with the requirem for installing private sewage disp

uilding Sewers and Connections A permit application and fee shall be paid to the City by each applicant for each connection to the City's sewer system. Prohibited connections such as roof downspouts, exterior foundation drains, or other surface water drains will not be permitted. Consections must comply with design nections must comply with design and installation criteria in the Ordinance and be tested and inspected.

Pollutant Discharge Limits

It's a food chain that has been estab-lished in rural eastern Kentucky for so long that it almost seems like a natural phenomenon. And it doesn't

Possums and skunks catch snakes which is why it's not unusual in our neck of the woods to see road kill more frequently than you do mile markers. I've even applied for a patent on a device that you can use to close yourn constrils without much pain so that you don't have to put up with the stench of skunks gray.

The last time I hit a skunk I had to steep outside on the front porch for a week and park my truck way out in the middle of a pasture so the rest of my family could eat and sleep in Possums and skunks catch snakes

peace. That's been more than ten years ago, but I remember it like it was yesterday. If you hit a skunk and get even the tiniest bit of that spray on yesterays. It you mit a skuth aim get-even the tinises bit of that spray or you, the most loyal dog in the world won't come within fifty feet of you. Your closest personal friends would let you die before they'd administer CPR.. In many ways a skuth is as angerous as a copperhead. **Auto Insurance:** Getting Your Money's Worth

WANT TO SAVE 20% ON SUMMER ELECTRIC BILLS?

Here's a tip that costs less than \$50 and could save more than 20% of most homes' electric bills.

Home residents that work all day can save a lot of money by setting their electric thermostats way up so that air conditioning units don't have to run so much.

It should take an hour or so affective return and reset the thermostat they return and reset the thermostat

It should take an hour or so after they return and reset the thermostat for the house to cool down. But many don't do that because they don't want that less-than-comfortable first hour. So here's the tip: An automatic thermostat that costs less than \$50

can be set to do this for you about an hour before you're due to get home. It will have the house already comfortable when you get home...and save the average homeowner 20% or more on electric bills.

Other things can also save on those electric bills:

\*\*\* Check equipment to make sure it is in working order. A serviceman may be needed to oil motors and add refrigerant, but home residents should replace or clean filters a regularly.

\*\*\* Close curtains on east windows in the morning and west windows in the afternoon. Sunlight in the windows can be a big source of added heat to the home.



For 25 years, RHS has provided direct loans at 1 percent interest to developers of low cost rental housdevelopers of low cost rental housing. The guaranteed multi-family housing loan program provides a federal guarantee to private sector lend-rest financing rental housing for moderate income tenants. RHS expects the guarantee program will be used frequently with Low Housing Tax Credits and other financial incentives. PRODUCTION FLEXIBILITY CONTRACTS-(Wheat and Feed Grain Program) Eligible producers Producers associated with farms having a crop acreage base) can enter into 7-year market transition contract. Signup for the new program began May 20. Late-filed provisions have been approved for farms to be signed up until August 1. We stress that this is the ONLY opportunity producers will have to entroll and those who fail to do so now WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE at a later date. There will be no additional signups There will be no additional signups except for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program

(CRP).
Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain curcumstances. Some exceptions are made for fruits and vegetables, with an acre-for-acre loss of payment. There are no having and grazing restriction for this program, (no setated). Alfalfa and other forage corps can be grown on contract acreage without loss of payments. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the farm's contract base acreage in the program and after signup, may re-quest a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty.

Annual contract payments will be made no later than September 30 of each fiscal years 1996-2002. For FY 1997-2002, a 50% advance payment will be made at the option of the owner or producer on December 15 or January 15 of the fiscal year. Advance payments for the 1996 program year will be made no later than 14 days after COC approval of the contract.






