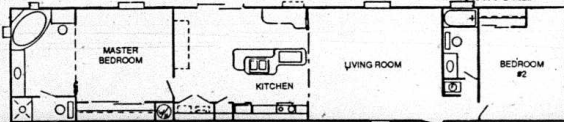

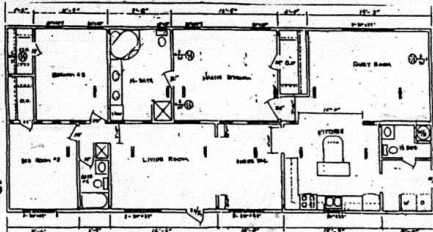

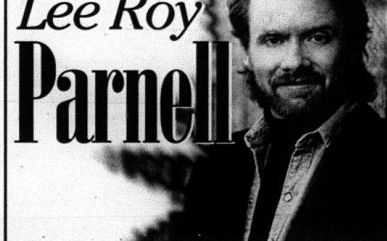

This Ordinance provides for the regulation of direct and indirect contributors to the municipal wastewater system through the issuance of permits to certain non-domestic users and through enforcement of general requirements for the other users.

Water Pollutant Discharge Limits, Pretreatment Program, Administration, Establishing The Right of The City To Charge Fees For Administering The City's Reasonably Necessary Functions Related To Sewer Use, And Delineating Powers And Authority Of Inspectors And Setting Forth The Methods And Procedures Of Enforcement Of The Ordinance And Penalties For Violation Of Same And Repealing Prior Ordinances.

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This Ordinance sets forth uniform requirements for direct and indirect contributors into the wastewater collection and treatment system for the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky and enable the City to comply with all applicable State and Federal laws required by the Clean Water Act of 1977 and the General Pretreatment Regulations (40 CFR, Part 403).

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This Ordinance provides for the regulation of direct and indirect contributors to the municipal wastewater system through the issuance of permits to certain non-domestic users and through enforcement of general requirements for the other users.

authorizes monitoring and enforcement activities, requires user reporting and provides for the setting of fees for the equitable distribution of costs resulting from the program established herein.

This Ordinance shall apply to the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky and to persons outside the City who are, by contract or agreement with the City users of the City Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTW). Except as otherwise provided herein, the Superintendent shall administer, implement and enforce the provision of this Ordinance.

Use of Public Sewer

This section of the Ordinance discusses the requirements for mandatory connections and the requirements for discharge points. In addition, this section establishes that no pollutants/waters (i.e., water from downspouts, etc.) should be discharged to any sanitary sewers and furthermore, prohibited discharges are identified.

Private Wastewater Disposal

Requirements for operating private sewage disposal facilities when public sewers are not available are discussed along with the requirements for installing private sewage disposal systems.

Building Sewers and Connections

A permit application and fee shall be paid to the City by each applicant for each connection to the City's sewer system. Prohibited connections such as roof downspouts, exterior foundation drains, or other surface water drains will not be permitted. Connections must comply with design and installation criteria in the Ordinance and be tested and inspected.

Pollutant Discharge Limits

Listed discharges (i.e., wastewater containing more than 50 milligrams per liter of petroleum oil, garbage not properly shredded, hazardous wastes, toxic wastes, etc.) are restricted. No user shall dilute a discharge to achieve compliance. Pretreatment facilities (i.e., grease, oil and sand interceptors, etc.) shall be provided, if necessary, for the proper handling of discharges.

Industrial Pretreatment Standards promulgated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency are included in this Ordinance. Any person who transports sewage sludge, industrial wastes, etc. must first obtain a Discharge Permit from

City before they discharge such wastes to the City's sewer system. Any person discharging wastewater exceeding the maximum allowable concentration noted below will be subject to a surcharge fee for each pound loading over the limit.

Parameter & Maximum Allowable Concentration Without Surcharge: Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD5), 325 mg/l; Total Suspended Solids (TSS), 325 mg/l; Ammonia-Nitrogen (NH3-N), 25 mg/l; Oil & Grease (total), 50 mg/l.

Pretreatment Program Administration

All significant industrial users shall obtain an Industrial User permit before connecting to or contributing to the City's sewer system. Users shall complete and file with the City an application and fee for a permit. Permit requirements and compliance reporting requirements are set forth. Violations and penalties are addressed as well as the need for pretreatment.

Fees

Applicable charges or fees shall be set forth in the City's User Charge Ordinance.

Powers and Authority of Inspectors

The powers and authority of inspectors of the City along with their rights to enter premises and to obtain information regarding a discharge are set forth in this section.

Enforcement

To insure compliance with this Ordinance, the City through 40 CFR Subchapter N, and 401 KAR 5:055 may take steps such as injunctive relief, civil and criminal penalties, publication of a list of significant violators annually, etc. against users in non-compliance with the Ordinance.

Penalties

Any user found to be violating any provisions of this Ordinance can receive penalties of at least \$1,000.00 per day per violation. Permits may be revoked and the user will be liable for any expense, loss or damage by reason of such violation. Criminal prosecution will follow for anyone violating this Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 2-96
SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE
JULY 12, 1996

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE USE OF AND THE SERVICES RENDERED BY THE MUNICIPAL SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF SUCH RATES AND CHARGES.

This Ordinance establishes user charges in the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky to provide funds needed to pay for the operation, maintenance and replacement (OM&R) and debt service expenses associated with the City's municipal sewer system.

Monthly Sewer Charges for Resident Sewer Customers
The following monthly rates for sewer service for all resident sewer customers of the City's municipal sewer system shall be based on the customer's monthly water consumption or measured flow to the municipal sewer system and will take into ac-

count (a) the OM&R costs of the municipal sewer system; and (b) the debt service requirements of bonds and loans issued on behalf of the City's municipal sewer system.

(i) Minimum Bill-First 2,000 Gallons or less-OM&R \$7.30; Debt Service \$1.90; (ii) All over 2,000 gallons \$3.50 per 1,000 gallons; (iii) The monthly sewer rates for low income single family residential customers using 6,000 gallons of water or less shall be billed at a rate of fifteen (15%) percent less than the above rates. "Low Income Single Family Residential Customer" is defined as any residence with a household income below the Federal poverty level or any residence designated as low income under Kentucky law.

Also, all non-residential sewer customers located in the Renfro Valley Revitalization and Expansion Service Area and the Industrial Park Revitalization and Expansion Service Area shall pay in addition to the regular monthly sewer bill, a Surcharge as set forth below.

Monthly Sewer Charges for Non-Residential Sewer Customers
The rates for non-residential sewer customers will be 1.5 times the rates for resident sewer customers except for the Surcharge rates listed below.

Renfro Valley Revitalization Expansion Service Area Surcharge
All non-residential sewer customers located in the Renfro Valley Revitalization Expansion Service Area shall pay, in addition to the above OM&R and debt service sewer charges, a Surcharge for the total debt service requirements, including the serving fee and the replacement and maintenance reserve, for the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) loan issued in 1991 for the Renfro Valley Revitalization and Expansion Service Area. The Surcharge will be allocated based on the water usage for the non-residential sewer customers in the Renfro Valley Service Area as follows:

$S = (Vu/Vi) \times [DS/D2]$
Where:
S = Monthly surcharge per non-residential customer
Vu = Monthly water usage per non-residential customer (minimum 2,000 gallons)
Vi = Total monthly water usage from all non-residential customers
DS = Debt Service on 1991 KIA Loan
The monthly Surcharge calculated will be added to the regular monthly sewer bill issued by the City for each non-residential sewer customer in the Renfro Valley Revitalization and Expansion Service Area.

Industrial Park Revitalization Expansion Service Area
All non-residential sewer customers located in the Industrial Park Revitalization Expansion Service Area will pay, in addition to the above OM&R and debt service sewer charges, a Surcharge for the total debt service requirements including the serving fee for a portion of the 1996 Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) loan and the replacement and maintenance reserve required by the loan agreement for the upgrade of the Industrial Park pumping station. In addition, \$1,500.00 of the required replacement and maintenance reserve will be allocated to all non-residential sewer customers located in the Industrial Park Revitalization Expansion Service Area. The Surcharge will be allocated based on the water usage for the non-residential sewer customers in the Industrial Park Revitalization Expansion Service Area as follows:

$S = (Vu/Vi) \times [DS/D2]$
Where:
S = Monthly surcharge per non-residential customer
Vu = Monthly water usage per non-residential customer (minimum 2,000 gallons)
Vi = Total monthly water usage from all non-residential customers
DS = Debt Service on 1996 KIA Loan Allocation
The monthly Surcharge calculated shall be added to regular monthly sewer bill, issued by the City for each non-residential sewer customer in the Industrial Park Revitalization and Expansion Service Area.

Connection Charges
The Ordinance also establishes the fees and connection charges to the sewer system for individual customers as well as for the owner of a sewer collection system, and any applicant

agreeing to install at their expense a main extension to the City's municipal sewer system.

Deposits
No deposit shall be required for sewer service.

Billing, Collection and Penalties
The rates or charges aforesaid shall be billed monthly on or about the first day of each month, and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable twenty (20) days after issuance. A penalty equal to ten percent (10%) of the charges (other than sales tax) will be required when any bill is not paid within the first twenty (20) days after issuance. Furthermore, if a bill is not paid after remaining delinquent for twenty-five (25) days, the water will be turned off and any reconnection of such service shall not be made until the customer, user or owner pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of twenty-five dollars. (\$25.00).

All Former Provisions Repealed

3/4-inch, \$50.00; 1-inch, \$60.00; 1-1/2-inch, \$80.00; 2-inch, \$100.00 and 3-inch, \$160.00.

Billing, Collection and Penalties
The rates or charges aforesaid shall be billed monthly on or about the first day of each month, and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable twenty (20) days after issuance. A penalty equal to ten percent (10%) of the charges (other than sales tax) will be required when any bill is not paid within the first twenty (20) days after issuance. Furthermore, if a bill is not paid after remaining delinquent for twenty-five (25) days, the water will be turned off and any reconnection of such service shall not be made until the customer, user or owner pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of twenty-five dollars (\$25).

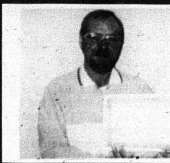

One dead, one injured in shooting

An argument that began at the home of Howard Johnson on Burnt Ridge apparently ended with one man dead and another man wounded. According to police reports, Marcus W. Lakes, 31, of Richmond and formerly of Berea was shot and killed by Thavechart Cline around 2:30 a.m. Sunday at the "Rock" on

Burnt Ridge Road near Big Hill. Cline is also accused of shooting Mike Vanwinkle, 27, of Richmond twice with his .9 mm weapon. Vanwinkle was transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he is listed in serious but stable condition. Lakes died from a single gunshot

wound to the head, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, who requested an autopsy on Lakes' body. Police say the argument between Cline, Lakes, Vanwinkle and another man apparently began at Johnson's home and involved Johnson's daughter.

However police have made no arrests in the case pending a more extensive investigation. Police said results from the investigation will be presented to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury. (See complete Obituary of Marcus M. Lakes on Pg. A-8)

County's parental responsibility law Cities may have to pass "ordinance"

It has been in effect for one week, however no Rockcastle coumian has been cited for being less than a stellar parent.

Last week the Rockcastle county fiscal court voted to pass a new law that makes parents responsible for the actions of their minor children.

The law was passed mainly because of the increasing costs to the county to house juvenile offenders, but many Rockcastle countians think it is an infringement on their rights and the rights of their children by government.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffery T. Burdette, who drafted the ordinance and who is responsible for prosecuting juvenile crime said this week that most all Rockcastle countians will not be affected by the ordinance, "because they know where their children are and what they are doing."

"We will deal with those problems one case at a time and we will do whatever we can to help parents with problem children get proper counseling and other help for them," he said. "The ordinance basically mirrors

other laws already in effect and in every case where the other laws apply they will take precedence," Burdette said.

"One major thing we have tried to do with this ordinance is make parents of juvenile offenders responsible for paying for their incarceration, so that Rockcastle county taxpayers do not have to bare the brunt of a few bad children," Burdette said.

But Burdette said he thought the most significant part of the ordinance is the curfew, which affects children under 16 years of age. "Hopefully, this will create a new public awareness that parents should know where their children are late at night," he said.

Something most people in the county don't know is that although the ordinance was passed by the fiscal court, the cities of Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston must pass the ordinance for it to become law. Burdette said that he was in the process of meeting with officials from each city to start the process of getting the ordinance passed by each city council.

Four inches of rain

A total of 4.25 inches of rain fell at Mt. Vernon in the 24-hour period Friday through Monday, according to figures at Cox Funeral Home.

To date in July, a total of 4.88 inches has fallen giving yards and gardens a fresh drink of water. The Mt. Vernon Fire Department investigated several calls for inspection after thunder and lightning strikes lit up the night Sunday.

The high for July to date was 89 on July 1, 2 and 8. The low was 55 on July 10.

Monthly totals in 1996 are as follows: January, 5.59 mostly melted snow; February, a low for the year of 1.92, mostly snow; March 4.73 snow and rain; April, 4.75; May 7.16 most for the year to date; June, 4.63 inches.

500 "pot" plants destroyed here

State and local police have had a busy time in the past few days cutting down over 500 marijuana plants around Rockcastle.

State police and the Sheriff's Department found and destroyed 314 plants on Flat Gap Road, 10 plants on Clear Creek, 15 plants in the Desputana area and 21 plants on Level Green Road.

State Trooper Billy Madden reported 185 plants were discovered and destroyed on Alvin Ping farm in the Brodhead area.

Madden said charges are pending before the grand jury.

To date, the state marijuana task force, has not reported the number of plants found and destroyed in Rockcastle this growing season but the amount is not expected to be as large as in past years due to the activities of the Governor's Task Force.

Drug charges

Connie Bussell, 20, of Brodhead has been charged with trafficking marijuana after police raided the residence in Castle Village in Brodhead.

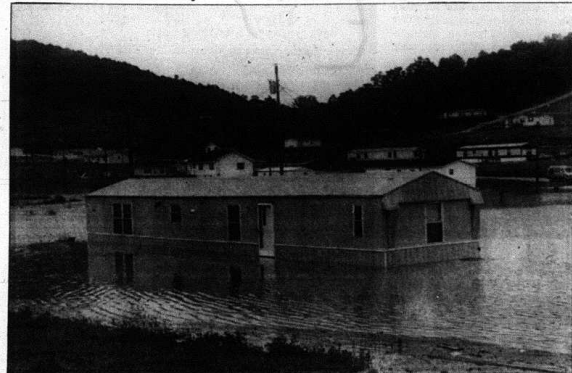

I realize that the roadsides need to be mowed now and then. Heaven knows that when the weeds and Johnson grass get as high as they do by mid-July, our ditch-lines become havens for all manner vermin and reptiles that could pose a danger for pedestrians and hitch-hikers.

Over the last few days I've seen at least half a dozen cooperheads and two rattlesnakes lying dead on the road where traffic had run over them. I'd hate to hear that some poor hippie hitch-hiker had been bitten to death on Highway 25 South of Mt. Vernon where I recently saw three dead cooperheads in a five mile stretch. I also see folks scouring the ditch lines for aluminum cans now and then. That's really putting your life on the line.

Of course the reason the cooperheads are in the ditch lines to begin with is to catch mice and rats and the

reason the vermin is there is because people keep leaving a few french fries or morsels of their favorite fast food burgers in the wrappers they toss out of their automobile windows. It's a food chain that has been established for so long that it almost seems like a natural phenomenon. And it doesn't end with snakes.

Possums and skunked cat snakes which is why it's not unusual in our neck of the woods to see road kill more frequently than you do mile markers. I've even applied for a patent on a device that you can use to close your nostrils without much pain so that you don't have to put up with the stench of skunk spray.

The last time I hit a skunk I had to sleep outside on the front porch for a week and park my truck way out in the middle of a pasture so the rest of my family could eat and sleep in

peace. That's been more than ten years ago, but I remember it like it was yesterday. If you hit a skunk and get even the tiniest bit of that spray on you, the most loyal dog in the world won't come within fifty feet of you. My closest personal friends would let you die before they'd administer CPR. In many ways a skunk is as dangerous as a copperhead.

So, like I said earlier, it's probably a good thing that the roadsides get mowed every once in awhile.

What gets me though, is that for the last several years the highway department's mowing crew waits until the chickery gets in absolute full bloom to commence their mowing.

Chickery is that sky blue flower that grows about two feet tall and it smells exactly the opposite of the season lasts about three weeks and on many stretches of highway it is as thick as hair on a dog's back on both sides of the road. Chickery in full bloom is, by my sense of aesthetics, one of the most beautiful seasonal scenes in all of Kentucky. It's right up there with dogwoods and redbuds and it comes at a time of year when we need something to break up the monotony. It makes you feel glad to be up at sunrise while it's glistening with dew because it is such a wonderful sight to behold.

ing crews are concerned, it's just another weed that needs whacking, and whack them they do.

Highway 52 between Richmond and Danville looks like it has just been raped. One morning last week as I drove into work, I bet I didn't get any faster than 25 miles per hour because I was literally relishing the chickery and spotting out places that I might set my camera up to photograph it because I figured it was going to peak in four or five days.

That afternoon, the vistas were gone. Replaced by ragged stubs and the ever present view of paper bags along with Colonel Sanders, Famous Recipe, McDonalds, Burger King, Wendy's and a host of other fast food boxes.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if the fast food places could wrap their stuff in aluminum cans. We'd have the cleanest highways in the world and except for the occasional cooperhead bite, a wonderful new recycling industry would spring up. But that's another story altogether.

In the meantime, I would like to suggest to the Governor that he force the state highway mowing crews to take a couple of weeks vacation while the chickery is blooming. Chickery is about the only nice thing you ever see that close to the road and we ought to be doing everything we can to make that sight last as long as nature will let it.

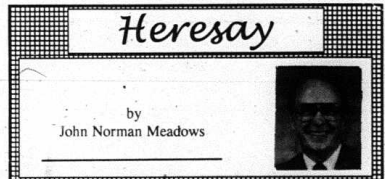

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and hennematics to you and yours from the wet, wild, and wonderful Weald of Wab'd, one-time winter home of that ubiquitous sage-

journalist for the *Slow City Chronicle*, Elvira Willoughby, who said: "Kissing is the most pleasant way of spreading disease germs yet devised by people."

Beloved, Elvira's line brought a question in my mind, namely, "Whatever happened to the biblical 'holy kiss'?" Did not St. Paul, the apostle, exhort us to greet one another with a holy kiss? Yes he did, in his missives to the Southern Baptists churches of Corinth and Rome. So, why aren't Southern Baptists doing so, now that they believe every word of the Bible? (My query applies also to lesser denominations who nonetheless aspire to be faithful to Scrip- ture.)

So intrigued was I with the absence of saintly lip-locking, that I turned off one of my favorite television programs, Christian Bass-Fishing on TBN, and went to my library, and the Wab'dNet, to search for a historical explanation on the demise of that one time ecclesiastical greeting. And I'm sure that you, my faithful readers with inquiring minds, want to know also.

Well, dear hearts, a thorough search did not pinpoint exactly what caused the church to let up on kissing. And I consulted tomes of information, everything from Hurlbut's *History of Ecclesiastical Customs* to McGuffey's *Eclectic Reader* (Second Revised Edition) to *The Grapes of Wrath* to *The Readers' Digest* to *The Monthly Moody*. I did, however, find a number of allusions to a factor that might be at the heart of the disappearance of kissing in church, namely, that St. Paul did not specify where one should kiss another.

Should Christians kiss each other on the cheeks (French-like, for example), on the hand, or on the lips? (We have no problem, however, ascertaining what Paul would have had some his enemies kiss.)

The resolution went on to advocate kissing on the lips but "without Devilish lingering."

Throughout church history, from the organization of Earth's first ecclesia, the River Jordan Baptist Church (31 A.D.), to the present day, there have been a number of convention and local resolutions forbidding all kissing in church because it encourages the attendance of homosexuals, lesbians, transvestites, sodomites, and chickadees. Auto Insurance: Getting Your Money's Worth

WANT TO SAVE 20% ON SUMMER ELECTRIC BILLS?

Here's a tip that costs less than \$50 and could save more than 20% of most homes' electric bills. Home residents that work all day can save a lot of money by setting their electric thermostats way up so that air conditioning units don't have to run so much.

It should take an hour or so after they return and reset the thermostat for the house to cool down. But many don't do that because they don't want that less-than-comfortable first hour.

So here's the tip: An automatic thermostat that costs less than \$50

can be set to do this for you about an hour before you're due to get home. It will have the house already comfortable when you get home...and save the average homeowner 20% or more on electric bills.

Other things can also save on those electric bills: *** Check equipment to make sure it is in working order. A serviceman may be needed to oil motors and add refrigerant, but home residents should replace or clean filters regularly.

*** Close curtains on east windows in the morning and west windows in the afternoon. Sunlight in the windows can be a big source of added heat to the home.



Bluegrass State Games to begin this weekend

More than 16,185 Kentucky amateur athletes from 113 counties already have registered to compete in the 1996 Bluegrass State Games.

Participating from Rockcastle will be Gary Langford, Ray Kirby and Kevin Bullock in archery; Allison Anderkin, Heather Hammond, Stuart Hammond, Lauren Clontz, Victoria Clontz and Kayla Bryant in swimming; James Browning in wrestling and Jeff Bullock in softball.

The 12th annual Games, featuring 25 different sports, will be held July 26, 27 and 28 in Lexington and surrounding counties.

As of today, the two largest team sports are softball, with 36 teams representing 5,856 players, and soccer with 300 teams or 5400 individuals. Three-on-three basketball has 177 teams and volleyball has 127 teams.

Track and field is the largest individual sport at this point with 504 participants followed by Gymnastics with 454. Other large individual sports are tennis, 355 entries; swimming with 341 participants; martial arts with 248 and equestrian with 213.

Other individual sports and entries to date are archery, 79; bowling, 129; canoeing/kayaking, 8; chess, 60; croquet, 48; cycling, 13; diving, 14; fencing, 13; golf, 88; horseshoes, 20; power tumbling, 115; racquetball, 85; shooting, 126; table tennis, 70 and wrestling, 45.

Mike Frederick of Corbin and George Theopolis of Lavinia, Michigan both edged the Par 4, 132 yard Par 3 at Marriott's Griffin Gate Golf Course, the week of July 1-6. They are now qualified for a shot at \$1 Million on Sunday, July 21, 1996 at the Mariott.

Frederick and Theopolis earned \$5,000 each for their respective holes-in-one. They will receive their \$5,000 checks at a ceremony prior to the \$1 Million dollar shoot out on July 21st.

A total of 20 participants will take part in the Million Dollar Shoot, which

Guaranteed Housing Loans

The Rural Housing Service (RHS) announced the creation of a new guaranteed multi-family housing loan program. USDA's Rural Development mission will accept applications through August 1, 1995 from lenders and developers proposing to build rental housing in rural America. Approximately \$25 million in guaranteed loans is available on a demonstration basis in FY 1996.

"This new guarantee program will support private sector lender's efforts to provide quality, affordable housing to low and moderate income rural Americans. It complements our ongoing direct multi-family housing loan program targeted at very-low and low income households," said Rural Housing Service Administrator Maureen Kennedy.

For 25 years, RHS has provided direct loans at 1 percent interest to developers of low cost rental housing. The guaranteed multi-family housing loan program provides a federal guarantee to private sector lenders financing rental housing for moderate income tenants. RHS expects the guarantee program will be used frequently with Low Housing Tax Credits and other financial incentives.

Proposals under the demonstration program will be analyzed based on the following criteria: 1) flexibility, innovation and variation of funding models; 2) level of partnering and leveraging; 3) geographic distribution; and 4) other factors to best explore program structure and effectiveness.

PRODUCTION FLEXIBILITY CONTRACTS (Wheat and Feed Grain Program) Eligible producers (Producers associated with farms having a crop acreage base) can enter into a 7-year market transition contract. Signup for the new program began May 20. Late-filed provisions have been approved for farms to be signed up until August 1. We stress that this is the ONLY opportunity producers will have to enroll and those who fail to do so now WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE at a later date. There will be no additional signups except for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. Some exceptions are made for fruits and vegetables, with an acre-for-acre loss of payment. There are no haying and grazing restriction for this program, (no set-aside). Alfalfa and other forage crops can be grown on contract acreage without loss of payments. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and after signup, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty.

Annual contract payments will be made no later than September 30 of each fiscal year 1996-2002. For FY 1997-2002, a 50% advance payment will be made at the option of the owner or producer on December 15 or January 15 of the fiscal year. Advance payments for the 1996 program year will be made no later than 14 days after COC approval of the contract.

Producers must also remain in compliance with the highly erodible/wetland conservation practices and the payment limitation/eligibility requirements.

For more information concerning this program, or if you have any questions you would like answered, contact this FSA Office. To date, 86% of the eligible farms in Rockcastle County have signed up to participate in this new program.

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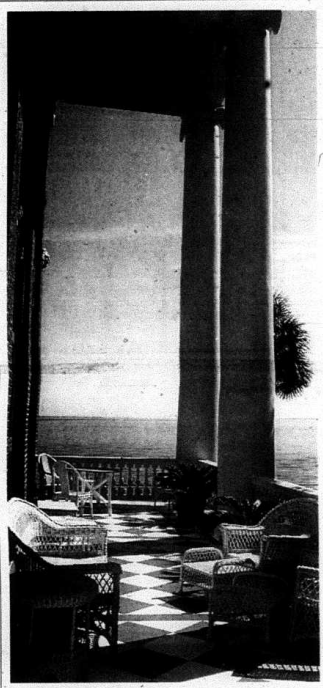
