## Jury finds Denny guilty of second degree sexual abuse

Last week a Rockcastle County District Court Jury convicted a Rockcastle County man of second degree sexual abuse.

George Lee Denny, Jr. 37, of Mt. Vernon received the maximum sentence under law for the crime.

Rockcastle County Attorney, Jeff Burdette, who prosecuted the case gave credit to the members of the jury. "The citizens on the jury are always to be commended for their attention and consideration, and deserve credit for seeing justice served," he said.

Denny was sentenced to twelve months in jail and fined \$500 for the June 1995 incident, in which he was found guilty of sexually abusing a female under 14 years old who was a friend of his daughter. "I believe the penalties for these type crime should be greater, but when you get the maximum, a jury has done all they can," Burdette said. After the day long trial Denny was remanded to jail.

## Moberly pleads guilty

In another case in district court last week, Donnie Moberly, 26, of Mt. Vernon pled guilty to third degree criminal abuse.

Moberly received two year's probation and must receive counseling for slapping his girlfriend's daughter on June 25.

## School starts Aug. 5 for teachers, Aug. 12 for pupils

It is almost school time again in Rockcastle County. Teachers are scheduled to report in for service at their respective schools on Monday August 5 and students will enroll one week later on August 12, according to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond.

Hammond said the August 12th start date was the earliest ever for Rockcastle students and came about because of the fewer days now required for professional development for teachers, when they are the only ones required to attend. Districtwide professional development day is set for August 12 at RCHS. Students and teachers will get their first vacation day on September 2, when Labor Day will be observed.

## Little World's Fair to run July 29 through August 3

The 101st Little World's Fair at the Rockcastle County Fairgrounds in Brodhead is scheduled to begin on Saturday morning when the Rockcastle County Dairy Show starts at 12 Noon.

The Rockcastle County Agricultural Fair, which is held each year in conjunction with the Little World's Fair, will also start on Saturday when competitors can begin entering their exhibits. Exhibits will be judged on Wednesday beginning at 2 p.m.

At 6 p.m. the same night, an Antique Tractor Pull is scheduled. Sunday a horseshoe pitching contest will be held at 1 p.m. and the midway open at 6 p.m. on Monday night. All-Terrain vehicle races are scheduled for 8 p.m. that night.

Bull Mania is set for Tuesday and Wednesday nights at 8 p.m. with the annual Demolition Derby set for Thursday and Friday nights at 8 p.m. Mud Races are scheduled for Saturday night beginning at 7:30 p.m. (See a complete schedule for the agricultural fair beginning on Page B-1 of this week's Signal.

## Two-Car accident

Four persons escaped serious injury in a two-car accident on KY 1004, better known as the Brush Creek Road last week.

Eugene Overbay of Livingston, driver of one car, was on the "wrong side of the road," Sheriff's deputy Ronnie Roark reported. Overbay was charged with drunk driving, his fifth offense.

Overbay reportedly struck a car driven by Tracy Dodds of Berea who was alone in the car.

Passengers in the Overbay car were Ellis Kirby and Claude Mink. They were reported uninjured.

## Immunizations due

Jeanne Parsons, R.N., county-wide school nurse, is reporting that immunizations and physicals necessary for students to enter the sixth grade in August are "lagging well behind."

Mrs. Parsons said all students, sixth graders and those who have expired immunization certificates, must present new, up-to-date certificates the first day of school in order to be enrolled.

If you want to turn in your certificate before school starts, please turn in the form at the Rockcastle County Board of Education office on Richmond street, marked to the attention of the school nurse.

## Clarification

The parental responsibility ordinance the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court passed earlier this month is indeed enforceable county-wide, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

Burdette said the sheriff's department can enforce the law even within the city limits of each city, but before city police officers can actually enforce it, it probably will have to be passed by each city council.

Burdette said he thought Brodhead and Livingston would pass the ordinance, but he did not know what Mt. Vernon was going to do.

## Wrong Farm

A recent report of 185 marijuana plants, found on the Alvin Ping farm in the Brodhead area, was in error.

The plants were found on the Alvin Pigg farm, sheriff's deputies report.



## Heavy rains damage county roads

Friday night's heavy rainfall throughout Rockcastle County heavily damaged some county roads including the Copper Creek area. County road workers worked all day Saturday to replace a 6x55 foot culvert that washed away Friday night. The heavy rainfall created a 28 foot gorge in the roadway when it washed away the culvert. Some areas of the county reported six inches of rainfall Friday night. Judge Carlofus has asked the governor for emergency assistance for road repairs due to this recent flooding.

## Cars torched at Calloway

Someone poured gasoline over Caleb Lamb's car parking in his drive at Calloway Hollow and set it afire Monday night.

The car went up with a whoosh! as the gasoline caught.

Police reported someone came up to the car about 2 a.m. Monday and set the gasoline afire.

The persons then went out to the road in front of the house and set fire to Michelle Lamb's (Caleb's daughter's) car which was only damaged in the rear bumper and tail light area.

It is not certain if the gas was poured on Michelle's car before or after her father's car was set afire.

No motive has been established but the investigation by Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas and the state arson squad is continuing.

A plastic milk jug, smelling of gasoline, was found at the scene.

Deputy Thomas also recovered a 12 gauge shotgun Monday night that was stolen in North Carolina in 1994. Police have a suspect and a warrant has been issued.

## "Pot" plants destroyed

A total of 18 marijuana plants were found and destroyed by the Rockcastle Co. Sheriff's department and State Police during the past week.

Also found at the home of Donnie Lunceford at Burr, in addition to the plants, was a small amount of Valium, a large quantity of drug paraphernalia and marijuana seeds, officers reported.

The case will be presented to the Grand Jury.

Making the discovery were State Trooper Billy Badden, Sheriff Shirley Smith and deputy Randall Reynolds.

A Total of 10 plants were found and destroyed behind Video Fantastic on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

Sheriff's deputy Nathaniel Price, who found the plants, said the investigation is continuing.

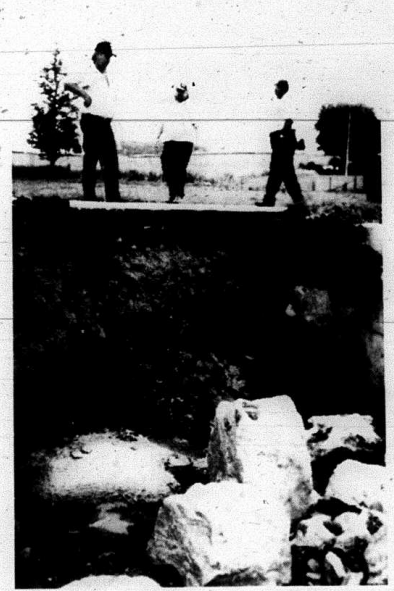

# Rockcastle Agri-Business Tour 1996

The Rockcastle Agri-Business Tour of 1996, under the leadership of Roy G. Brown, left the courthouse at Mt. Vernon, July 8, 1996 for their annual tour.

Our first stop of interest was at the Botanical Gardens at Birmingham, Alabama.

We left Birmingham on Tuesday, July 9 and arrived at Auburn, Alabama, mid-morning where we toured the Auburn University Campus' enormous football stadium. We proceeded to the Auburn University School of Veterinarian Medicine. Arrangements for the tour were made by Dr. Christopher Craig, son of Gatliff and Nell Craig.

Mr. Sam Hendrix, assisted by the Dean, Dr. Gary Beard received and hosted us the entire meeting. Practically all treatment and techniques were explained by the two. A particular interest was the fact that very important research is done on animals relating to human diseases and deficiencies.

Mr. Hendrix then hosted lunch for us at a fine steak house.

We then proceeded on to Tuskegee Institute. The Institute is famous for Booker T. Washington's scientific experiments with the peanut for which he discovered over 100 uses. We spent Tuesday night at Montgomery, Alabama.

Wednesday, July 10th, we traveled

to Gulf Shores, Alabama and had rooms facing the beach. Most of us walked or hunted shells along the beach. Vernon Price had a little health problem while at Gulf Shores. He visited the doctor and was better the next day.

We left Gulf Shores for a stop at the Battleship Memorial Park at Mobile, Alabama and then traveled to Natchez, Mississippi. While there, we ate at the famous "Cock-of-the-Walk" on the Mississippi River.

July 12, we left Natchez and traveled to Mendenhall, Mississippi. The County Agent, Perry Lee (a friend of Tom Mills) and Joe McGuffee of the

"Polled Hereford Farm" met us at the County Agent's office and took us on tours of two experimental cattle farms. They called their experimental cattle the Senapol Hereford. This breed is almost 100% pasture fed. The pasture consists of forage of bermuda grass, rye grass, and oats. Only the momma cows are fed other grains. They get a special feed for about six weeks after calving. While in Mendenhall, we ate at the famous "Revolving Tables" where you sit and the revolving table, loaded with food, revolves to you. You wait until the dish you want comes to you. You get the dish off and, when finished, re-

turn the dish to the revolving table and so on until you have everything you want.

We were taken to this unique restaurant by County Agent, Perry Lee and Dr. Joe McGuffee.

We traveled to Memphis, Tennessee, the bus driver, Jerry Barrett, said we were the eatingest bunch he had ever seen. We had a flat tire in Memphis and there was about a 40 minute delay. We enjoyed the delay since we got to shop at a large truck stop that was like a mini mall.

We arrived in Mt. Vernon about 5:45, Saturday, July 13th. Everyone had a wonderful time.

If you would like to sell produce but don't want to join LEAP, all you need to do is pay a \$10 booth fee to LEAP and you're welcome to sell for the season. For buyers, vegetables can be purchased in any amount — by the pound or by the bushel! Some vendors will also take advance orders.

## Cumberland College announces Leadership Grant recipients

On Sunday, June 22, 1996, eighty-one incoming Cumberland College freshmen were awarded the Bert T. Combs Leadership Grant. The recipients were honored at a ceremony where the awards were presented by The Honorable Judge Sara Combs, widow of Bert T. Combs.

Bert T. Combs was born in Manchester in Clay County, Kentucky on August 13, 1911. His father was a farmer and his mother was a school teacher. He first attended a two-room school at Bee Creek and then Oneida Baptist Institute. He graduated from Clay County High School at the age of fifteen. An alumnus of Cumberland College, Bert T. Combs went on to the University of Kentucky, where he received a law degree in 1937. In 1939 he was elected Governor of the State of Kentucky, the first Kentucky Governor since 1927 who was from

the eastern region of the state.

This award was established to honor the memory of Bert T. Combs. The grant works with federal and state aid to cover a year's tuition cost and the grant is renewable for up to four years.

Criteria for the Combs Leadership grant is as follows: (1) must be a full-time student; (2) top half of graduating class; (3) score at least 19 on the ACT or 910 on the SAT; (4) must have applied for financial aid and be eligible for Pell Grant; and (5) Kentucky students must be eligible for the Kentucky Tuition Grant.

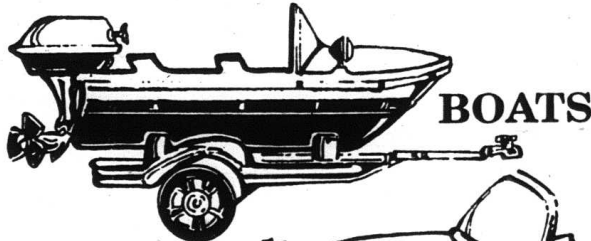

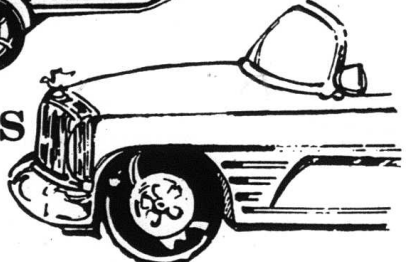



led by Cash, Taylor, Saylor, Roberts and Thomas. Jarred Burdette made a great over-the-shoulder catch in left field to help seal the victory.

In the sub-district final Rockcastle defeated Pulaski County 13-3. Colby Brown and Aaron Cash combined to pitch a great game with Cash and Saylor collecting three hits each.

The district final four was in Middleboro. Rockcastle drew Hazard in the first game and lost a close one 6-5. Aaron Cash turned in an another outstanding effort on the mound in what turned out to be Rockcastle's worst fielding game. Ronnie McClure, Cash, Saylor and Taylor each collected two hits in the loss to Hazard.

Rockcastle County then bounced back against Middleboro. The game was called in the fifth inning due to rain with the Rockcastle All-Stars leading 16-7. Devin Taylor pitched four strong innings with the offense being led by Cash and Taylor who had three hits each. Blake Roberts capped the scoring with a solo homer to left field.

In the next game versus Clay County, Rockcastle scored in the bottom of the sixth to gain the victory by the score of 9-7. Colby Brown pitched his last game of the tournament against the hard-hitting Clay County team. - 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 cup cooking oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 cups grated zucchini
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 3 eggs
- 1 TBSP vanilla
- 1 tsp. flour

Sift together flour, cinnamon, salt, baking soda, and baking powder. Beat in eggs. Add sugar and oil, mixing well. Add vanilla and dry ingredients. Stir in zucchini. Combine walnuts with 1 tsp. flour and stir into batter. Pour into two greased loaf pans and bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 hour.

**By Warden Alexander, Director PRODUCTION FLEXIBILITY CONTRACTS - (Wheat and Feed Grain Program) Eligible producers (Producers associated with farms having a crop acreage base) can enter into 7-year market transition contract. Late-filed provisions have been approved for farms to be signed up until August 1. We stress that this is the ONLY opportunity producers will have to enroll and those who fail to do so now WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE at a later date. There will be no**

additional signups except for land coming off the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Annual contract payments will be made no later than September 30 of each fiscal year 1996-2002. For FY 1997-2002, a 50% advance payment will be made at the option of the owner or producer on December 15 or January 15 of the fiscal year. Advance payments for the 1996 program year will be made no later than

14 days after COC approval of the contract.

Producers' must also remain in compliance with the highly erodible/wetland conservation practices and the payment limitation/eligibility requirements.

For more information concerning this program, or if you have any questions you would like answered, contact this FSA Office. To date 89% of the eligible farms in Rockcastle County have signed up to participate in this new program.

### Zucchini Squash...It's Everywhere!

Zucchini Squash...it is everywhere this time of the year. It has been abundant in many kitchens in the county and occasionally even mysteriously shows up on a neighbor's doorstep. Zucchini is a variety of summer

squash. It is practically tasteless, therefore it is useful in many different dishes. Many individuals are thankful that it freezes well also. The method for freezing zucchini depends upon its future use. If your recipes call for shredded zucchini, the zucchini can be shredded and frozen raw along with the juices. To use in recipes,

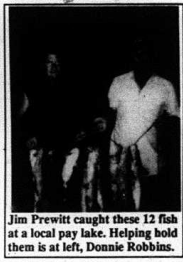

**Legislative Update**  
 Rep. Danny Ford Reports from Frankfort July 18, 1996  
 Economic and scientific research is underway to expand the uses of tobacco and to develop commercial opportunities so Kentucky's leading cash crop can compete in today's market.

This week in Frankfort, Dr. Maclor Davies, director of the Tobacco and Health Research Institute (THRI) at the University of Kentucky, spoke to members of the General Assembly Tobacco Task Force about alternative uses for tobacco. The Institute receives \$3.1 million in funds from a portion of the state cigarette tax.  
 We know tobacco is big business in our state. Tobacco sales for 1994 generated more than \$840 million. We led the nation in burley production (420 million pounds in 1994) and ranked second to North Carolina in total tobacco production. (In other crop production, such as corn, winter wheat and hay, our state was in the top 20 nationwide in 1994, last year for which we have statistics.)  
 However, with continued efforts by tobacco opponents to restrict the sale and use of tobacco, I believe it is very important that we look at the different uses for tobacco, not necessarily different crops.  
 According to Dr. Davies, THRI has \$11 million in grant money for a year study of the use of tobacco in association with antioxidants, lung physiology, nicotine, carcinogens, disease resistance, and cancer, in relation to chewing tobacco.

Davies, should generate additional interest in the Institute's program.  
 The Tobacco Task Force will continue to meet periodically on tobacco concerns in Kentucky. Members may also take several field trips, such as a tour of the THRI facility, attendance of opening day of burley sales, and possibly a visit to a tobacco processing facility.

### LIVESTOCK

#### General Provisions for Kentucky and Out-Of-State Livestock

All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a health certificate. A health certificate means a legible record covering the requirements of the state of destination accomplished on an equivalent from the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, United States Department of Agriculture, that is prepared and issued by a licensed accredited veterinarian.

- A) Health Certificates for Kentucky livestock shall be valid 150 days after issuance.
- B) Health Certificates for Out-Of-State Livestock shall be valid 30 days after issuance.

If animals are from tuberculosis accredited or brucellosis certified herds, the accompanying health certified shall show the accreditation and certification number with the date of the last herd test for tuberculosis and brucellosis.

#### SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR KENTUCKY CATTLE

All cattle for exhibition shall be identified individually on a health certificate in the owner's name.

**Brucellosis** - Animals 12 months of age or over shall have been negative to an official card test for brucellosis conducted in a state federal laboratory within 150 days of the date of exhibition, unless exempt by one of the following:

- A) Originate directly from a certified herd
- B) Have been officially vaccinated under 20 months of age for the dairy breeds.

**Tuberculosis** - Native Kentucky cattle are not required to have been negative to a tuberculin test to enter shows in Kentucky.

**Other Disease Requirements** - Cattle infected with warts or ringworm are not eligible for entry.

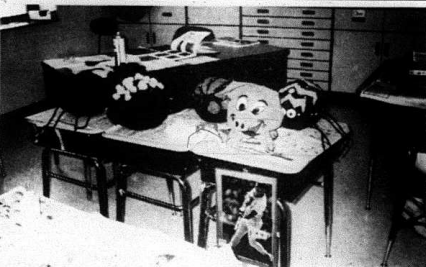

## Hunter education mandatory

If you were born on or after January 1, 1975 and wish to hunt in Kentucky, you must carry a valid hunter education course completion card. This means that you must attend and complete one of hundreds of courses offered across the state each year. Hunter education courses are free and available in most counties. The Signal will list dates and time of classes in the near future.

Mandatory hunter education began in Kentucky in March 1991. The course, geared toward safety and ethics in hunting, takes 10 hours to complete and is spread over three days. The first two sessions consist of classroom instruction, discussion and film watching with some short breaks between. The third and final segment is conducted at a firing range where participants learn the proper procedure for loading and firing a number of hunting arms.

Following the live-fire segment, participants must pass a written examination to confirm what they have learned during the course. The test is completed at the range. In the following weeks, participants who successfully complete the course will receive an orange hunter education patch and card in the mail. Your hunter education card is valid for life and is accepted anywhere in North America.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' (KDFWR) modern Hunter Education Program began in May, 1977. This is when the first Hunter Training Officers (HTOs) held Kentucky's first volunteer certification class. Today there are over 700 trained men and women who volunteer to teach hunter education courses. These teachers donate many hours and sometimes their own equipment to improve hunting by making participants aware of proper hunting procedures. Their time translates into federal government matching funds. Like the excise taxes that hunters and shooter pay on their equipment, these

funds pay for conservation and wildlife management.

Since its beginning, hunter education has not only reached young hunters. Most students in the hunter education courses are adults. Some are chaperoning future hunters while others are simply interested in improving their range of hunting skills. ### ORDINANCES

Three ordinances have been recently passed by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle county, and have had second readings, as required by law, in open court. A summary of each follows:

#### ORDINANCE NO. 010

(County is now empowered with certain specified federal restrictions, to regulate cable television, thereby giving the county government a voice, with limitations imposed by the federal government, in how local cable television companies are to serve the residents of Rockcastle County).

#### Summary

This ordinance authorizes the granting of a non-exclusive franchise to erect, construct, maintain and operate community antenna television system facilities - and additions thereto - in, under, over, along, across and upon the highways, public ways, bridges and other public places in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for the purpose of transmission and distribution of cable television impulses and television energy to the residents of Rockcastle county, regulating the same, and for other purposes described more particularly therein.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 011:

(Elimination of a tax: replacement with franchise).

#### Summary

The Fiscal Court repealed a tax that had been placed on Local Bank Shares for many years under KRS 136.270. Acting under authority granted by House Bill 416, the County's Fiscal Court eliminated a tax and replaced it with a franchise fee upon institutions, as provided within Chapter 136. All counties affected by H.B. 416.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 012:

(The Fiscal Court felt it in the best interests of the county's taxpayers to stop the escalating/spiralizing costs charged to the county for maintaining and housing juvenile criminal offenders by enacting this "Parental Responsibility Ordinance," which is the first in the state. It is designed to protect homeowners/landowners from possible harm by juvenile criminal offenders, to protect innocent juveniles from potential harm at night, and to require the parents of juvenile criminal offenders to reimburse and otherwise pay for all costs incurred by the County of Rockcastle for housing and maintaining said juveniles at a cost of up to \$100 per day plus all transportation and other charges that have otherwise been charged to the county. The Fiscal Court in recent memory paid as little as \$500 per year to house juveniles; those same related charges are now running as high as \$5,000 per month. The Fiscal Court took this action in an effort to protect local taxpayers from paying those charges).

#### Summary

The Fiscal Court declared it necessary, in order to preserve the peace, health, safety and welfare of all citizens - both juveniles and adults - and to attempt to protect the public's treasury against large claims created by the incarceration of unprecedented numbers of juvenile criminal offenders appearing in Rockcastle Juvenile Court, to enact said ordinance. Included, but not limited to, are the following: No child under age twelve (12) permitted or allowed to be upon public streets between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. without parent, legal guardian, or adult selected by parent or legal guardian to supervise child's behavior. No child under age of sixteen (16) years permitted to be upon public streets or in any public place between the hours of 12 a.m. (midnight) and 6 a.m. without adult supervision or upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian and has proof of such permission. Parents are to arrange for proper supervision for minors when the parent is absent; to require minors to attend regular school sessions; to keep illegal drugs out of the home; to take necessary precautions to prevent the minor from maliciously or willfully destroying real, personal or mixed property belonging to the County of Rockcastle, or is located in the County of Rockcastle; to forbid the minor from keeping stolen property, etc., and to seek help from appropriate governmental authorities or private agencies in handling or controlling the minor, when necessary as according to law; to be responsible for all incarceration costs should minor be incarcerated by Juvenile Court related to any of said ordinance.

Parents to be held civilly responsible for damages caused by delinquent acts; calls for fines of \$75.00 to \$500.00 and imprisonment for up to thirty (30) days for failure to exercise reasonable parental responsibilities/control.

Each of the above-mentioned ordinance summaries may be read in their entirety at the office of the County Judge-Executive, a true and correct copy of which has been affixed to the Minutes of Record of the Fiscal Court of rockcastle County, during regular business hours.

## Mundane Fiscal Court meeting held Tuesday

 It was a discussion day for the Rockcastle Fiscal Court as its called session Tuesday.  
 Only three votes were taken by the court that did not begin on time, as usual.  
 Two votes were on a Purr-Rigsby Road easement that came before the court several months ago.

Friday's rain did considerable water damage in the county and Carolifus has asked the governor for emergency assistance for roads damaged by flooding mainly in the Copper Creek area.  
 Nine flat tires were found on mowing machines when workers came Tuesday. The court wondered who?

The easements for the property in question was lost and no deed could be found. Also improvements to a fence had not been officially made so the court approved both motions.  
 The court voted to dispense with reading of the full text of an ordinance in favor of summarizing it.  
 The court voted to summarize three ordinances including county regulation of cable television; the elimination of a tax on bank shares and an ordinance making parents responsible for their children with a curfew ordinance included.  
 Discussed were several problems that the court did not rule on.  
 Overheard were: No money had been borrowed from the road fund. "Not a penny," Judge Executive Buzz

The court went into closed session to discuss "personnel" problems but mostly jail problems including overtime.  
 A report from the county treasurer Joseph Clontz showed the jail fund was in the red by \$38,660.87 at the end of June. Judge Carolifus said this deficit was in large part due to the expense involved in the incarceration of juveniles in out of county jails. Carolifus also pointed out to the court that the \$21,981.64 positive balance in the road fund does not reflect the \$473,000 received from the state for the next 12 months. This amount will be reflected in the July report.  
 The court agreed to ask taller Joe Howard to make a survey of overtime spent by jail employees in an effort to cut expenses.

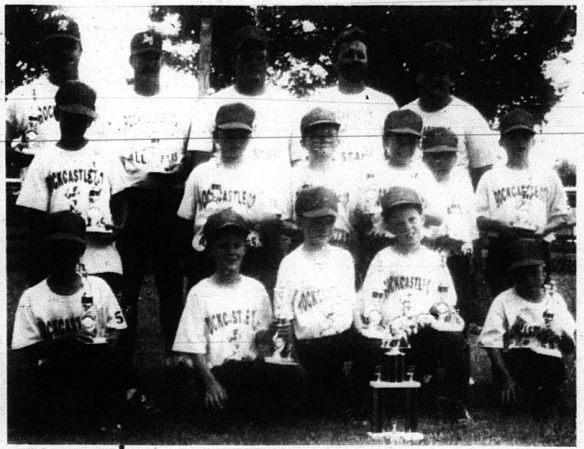

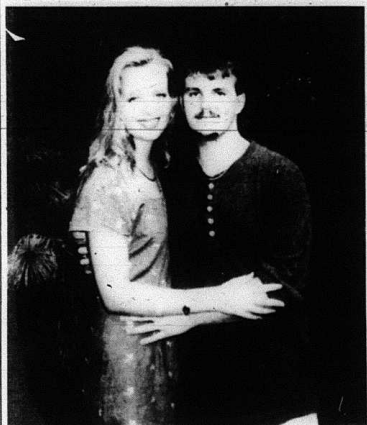

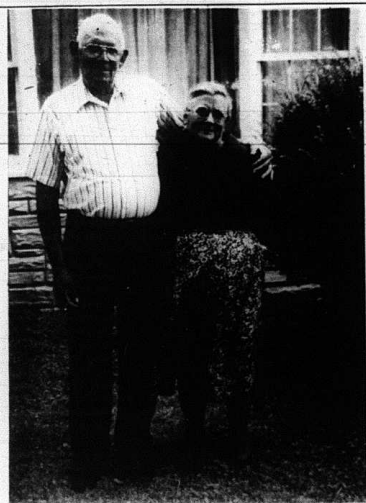
