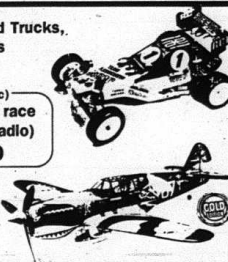

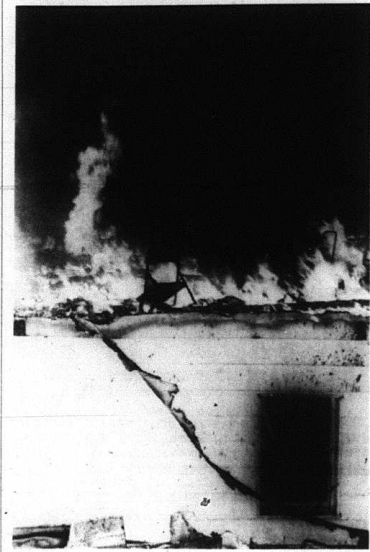

Fire destroys Lighthouse Assembly of God



Denny runs away from parole officer at jail

Johnny Denny must have decided that if he was going to be charged with breaking parole, he might as well break it good. On Friday, while he was being processed into the Rockcastle County jail because of a parole violation, Denny, 34, of Brodhead, ran off. Rockcastle County jailer Joe Howard said that parole officer Rebecca Light had brought Denny in for a parole violation and while she was processing paper work Denny decided to leave. Howard said that when deputy

jailer Otha Marcum opened the door of the jail to let someone else in, Denny ran, still handcuffed, into the street where he climbed into an old red Nova and was carted off to freedom. "It must have been a set up deal, because witnesses said the car was sitting there waiting and it took off as soon as Denny climbed in," Howard said. Howard said Denny had been talking to some visitors at the jail before he ran off. He is still at large.

At Livingston

Youths toss smoke bomb into church

"I think they dared each other, one lit the smoke bomb and the other one threw it," said Livingston Pentecostal Holiness Church Pastor James Miller. Miller was referring to what he called a "boyish prank" during revival services at his church on Monday night. According to Kentucky State Police spokesman Gilbert Accardo, Jr., two 13-year-old boys from Livingston threw a smoke bomb into the church around 9:30 Monday night and ran off. Church member Thomas Wagner stomped out the fuse on the bomb and threw it outside. Other church members chased one of the boys down and the mother of the other boy turned him over to authorities after she found out what had happened.

"I was standing at the pulpit and we were getting ready to dismiss when the front door opened and the smoke bomb came flying in," Miller said. "They were just being mischievous boys," Miller said. The two youths were arrested by state police and transported to the juvenile facility in Clark County to await proceedings in juvenile court, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette. Burdette said that the recently passed parental responsibility ordinance may have had something to do with the mother turning the one boy over to authorities. "You never know, maybe she realized the possible consequences if she didn't do what she was supposed to, maybe the ordinance helped in this situation," he said.

Guide to help prevent church fires available

In the wake of recent church burnings in Kentucky and one in Rockcastle County, a Church Threat Assessment Guide from the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. "While nothing will guarantee the safety of a church, there are some precautions a congregation can take to better protect itself," Burdette said. The guide spotlights areas of vulnerability for churches, such as unsecured doors, heavy shrubs and inadequate lighting. The guide shows membership ways to address the

By: Richard Anderkin State and federal investigators are still trying to determine the cause of a fire that completely destroyed the Lighthouse Assembly of God Church at Burr on Saturday morning. For the past several days, agents from the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, the FBI, Kentucky State Police and the State Fire Marshall's office have been in Rockcastle County sifting through the ashes, conducting tests and interviewing residents trying to gather as much information on the fire as possible. The flames and smoke from the fire, which was reported to the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department at 12:45 a.m. Saturday, could be seen in the dark sky almost a mile away. "When we topped the hill on U.S. 25 at Superior (Food Market), we could see the blaze and when we got to the scene a couple of minutes later the entire church building was completely involved," said Mt. Vernon firefighter Garry Hansel. "There was nothing we could do, except to keep things around the building from burning," he said. The fire at the Lighthouse Assembly of God Church, which was built by the late Rev. Marvin Hensley, Sr., in 1972, was one of three church fires in Kentucky during the past week. An all African American church in Webster County was gutted by fire last Tuesday and the Monticello Missionary Church in Wayne County burned Friday night.

In both instances, police believe the fires were arson and, in the Wayne County fire, a 26-year-old Monticello man was arrested Monday and charged with arson. In the Webster County fire, although the congregation has no white members, police do not think the burning was an act of racism. On the other hand, the Lighthouse Assembly of God Church at Burr does not have any black members, so police and the pastor, Dwight Hensley, also do not believe the fire, if it was indeed arson, was racially motivated. Dwight Hensley is Marvin's Hensley, Sr.'s son and has been pastor of the church for the past year and a half. However at least one Rockcastle county resident doesn't feel the same way. Brian Mink, 20, of Mt. Vernon, who watched the fire with several other spectators Saturday morning, said he thought the church was probably burned because at least one black man is currently receiving treatment at Teen Challenge of Kentucky, which is located next to the burned church. "Teen Challenge, which is located in the former home of the Hensleys, helps 18-year-olds and older men who

are suffering from some type of chemical dependency or emotional problem. Teen Challenge is a Christian, non-secular organization and is in no way associated with the Lighthouse Assembly of God Church. In January, fire destroyed a building at Teen Challenge that directors were converting into classrooms, offices and a recreational facility. The fire was later ruled arson. Three months before that fire, someone poured kerosene on the floor of the same building and threw a fire bomb into it, but the fire went out on its own. Nevertheless, Mrs. Sherry Leonardo, whose husband, the Rev. Joseph Leonardo, is executive director of Teen Challenge, said Monday that she doesn't believe that the fire at the Lighthouse Assembly of God had anything to do with Teen Challenge. "We haven't had any problems since January, I don't think there is any connection to us," she said. Pastor Hensley said Tuesday that although there are black men living at Teen Challenge from time to time, he doesn't believe the two are related in anyway. "We have never had any type of threat against our congregation or even been broken into," Hensley said. Police are not releasing the names of potential witnesses to the fire, but at least one man, a truck driver who was getting on the interstate heading north, at the time of the fire, told police that he saw a pick-up truck near the church driving around the road with its lights off, immediately after he saw the fire. Officials would not comment on the truck driver's remarks and said only that several people have been interviewed.

Materials gathered at the scene are currently being tested at the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearm laboratory in Georgia, according to FBI agent Ron Kincaid. Kincaid wouldn't comment further on the fire, except to say that a determination would probably be made within the next week to ten days. Church board member Rob Roberts said Monday that the only thing left in the church during the summertime was a humidifier. "I could understand it a little more if it was in the winter time when we have to leave the heat on, but the way the building was built, sure seems strange to me," Roberts said. Members of the congregation met at Roberts' home on Sunday following the Saturday morning fire and Pastor Hensley said the congregation met at another member's home on Wednesday night. The congregation will meet at the

PREVIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and vexations, as in "Multitudes, multitudes in the valley of vexation!"

Butter and sistrum! Am I piqued? Let me tell you how really piqued I am.

During the past two weeks, I've worked hard to rein in my rampant cynicism, but some "experts" at a certain pain management clinic in Lexington are not helping one iota. I'm almost the point of conjuring a pox on a slew of them.

How they differ from the good doctor I see from time to time here in greater Wabdonia — a doctor who does not have one eye on me, one on the fees in the waiting room, and the other on the clock.

Beloved, I'd be remiss if I did not give credit also to the doctors who rightly prognosed Nancy's most serious affliction in '92, likely sparing her a year or more on a breathing machine and possible permanent paralysis. And her main doctor in Lexington said a critical factor in her miraculous recovery was the early diagnosis made by Wabdonia's Dr. Bill Griffith.

So, I know some doctors are worth their weight in gold. Perhaps even the ones who are working on my back problem. But some things they've done and *not* done make me side with the cynics.

Concerning cynicism, let me quote Sculley Apsarkfike, one of our local Wabdonia wis, who said "No one wants to be a cynic, but they are right ten times out of nine." (Sculley, literary buff that he is, may have "borrowed" that notion from H. L. Menckin.)

Before I do my customary castigation for today, let me explain why I'm so beside myself. (I'm normally beside myself, but tonight I'm sitting about ten feet away. Call me Legion.)

Today I made my third visit to the pain management clinic. For the first time I got some temporary relief minutes after an epidural injection of a steroid into the fluid tract of my lower spine.

Actually, the injection was a mixture of W2-40, extract of papaya, and a generous helping of eighty-weight axle grease. But, when you hurt all the time, you'll give such a try, believe me.

My malady, of course, may just be divine retribution for my having been born a Republican and registered Baptist. My pain started when I took up with the Democrats and entertained notions of going over to the Campbellites.

But today's visit wasn't all up and up. The doctor who treated me today was not the doctor who had seen me two times before. Today's doc is a Indian, as in south Asian Indian. With my poor hearing, I have a devil of a time understanding those people! And I may never get his name right. Anyhow, in comes Dr. Ramadamalesh, the first thing he says to me is, "Mr. Meadows, you have severe depression, and you need to know that this spinal block will not cure your problem."

kenema, I looked at him and said not gently, "I know that! My psychiatrist referred me to you because he is of the opinion that I'll never get a handle of my depression until this back pain lets up."

And that remark caused me shake with anger, literally. I said, "Do think I've spent the greater part of the last ten years battling just to stay out of that hell? Just to stay alive? And you think I don't know that?"

We bantered a bit more, and finally I said, "Can you imagine what it is like to have a headache every waking hour? That's something like

the way it is with me... If you don't think this procedure will give me some relief, I can do the exercises (and work on the mind) then maybe we ought to stop this show right here."

At that he looked off in the distance for a moment and then said, "The epidural should help." (I believe he heard his cavity register groans when I mentioned aborting the affair.)

Discipline myself! Since April I've taken off twenty three pounds to get the frontal tug off my spine! And I walk a mile or more at least five days a week. Discipline is not my problem. Mixed messages are, as you will see if you care to read on.

Now to the other phase of my run-in with Dr. Ramadamalesh: Prior to going to the third floor of the pain relief clinic, I kept my third appointment with physical therapy on the ground floor. You're not going to believe this.

On my first visit a gentle middle-aged therapist, call her Renita, had asked a bucket of questions — most of which I had answered — from Dr. Kenema's nurse on my first visit upstairs. She examined me by pulling the way I had that and asking, "Does this hurt?" I thought we were getting somewhere. She gave me a book of exercises, showing me how to do four of them regularly until my next physical therapy session.

I did the exercises. And they hurt. They actually exacerbated by lower back and upper shoulder discomfort. So I quit them.

When I went back to physical therapy the next week, I was greeted by Gerry, who informed me that Renita had "gone back to the hospital to work" and that he was now my therapist. Then he set into asking the same questions Renita had asked.

I stopped him. "You should have the answers to those questions in that file you have there." He looked. He did.

Then he "examined" me, as Renita had done, touching here and there. He's not to be just out of school and dead set on letting me know he has learned the medical names for my muscles and such. "Your *duabuliet* doesn't seem to be as explicated as your *duabuliet*!"

Beloved, you know what I almost said. It begins with "What the" and ends with "talking about?"

Recognizing Health Fraud

Health fraud costs Americans an estimated \$30 billion a year. However, the costs are not just economic. The hidden costs - death, disability - are unbelievable.

Regulatory actions by the FDA are necessary in many cases because products that have not been shown to be safe and effective pose potential hazards for consumers both directly and indirectly. The agency's priorities for regulatory action depend on the situation; direct risks to health come first.

Unproven products cause direct health hazards when their use results in injuries or adverse reaction. Indirectly harmful products are those that do not themselves cause injury, but may lead people to delay or reject proven remedies, possibly worsening their condition.

Older Americans may be especially vulnerable to health fraud because approximately 80 percent of them have at least one chronic health problem. Many of these problems, such as arthritis, have no cure and, for some people, no effective treatment. Their pain and disability lead to despair, making them excellent targets for deception.

New health frauds pop up all the time, but the promoters usually fall back on the same old cliches and tricks to gain your trust and get your money. According to

FDA, some red flags to watch out for include:

- * claims the product works by a secret formula. (Legitimate scientists share their knowledge so their peers can review their data.)
- * publicity only in the back pages of magazines, over the phone, by direct mail, in newspaper ads in the format of news stories, or 30-minute commercials in talk show format. (Results of studies on bona fide treatments are generally reported first in medical journals.)
- * claims the product is an amazing or miraculous breakthrough. (Real medical breakthroughs are few and far between, and when they happen, they're not touted as "amazing" or "miraculous" by any responsible scientist or journalist.)
- * promises of easy weight loss. (For most people, the only way to lose weight is to eat less and exercise more.)
- * promises of a quick, painless, guaranteed cure.

* testimonials from satisfied customers. (These people may never have had the disease the product is supposed to cure, may be paid representatives, or may simply not exist. Often they're identified only by initials or first names.)

Blue Mold Threatens Tobacco Crop

Blue mold moved into local tobacco fields just about 4 weeks ago and has continued to build in strength. Recent heavy rains and cooler than normal temperatures have been ideal for blue mold to develop new spores which move by wind to new fields. At first reports were scattered but in recent days farmers are finding that most fields have some level of infection. As tobacco grows in height and width leaves are meeting in the row which holds in more moisture plus ideal growing

conditions has the disease destroying large amounts of tobacco in some fields.

What can tobacco producers do to protect their crop? U.K. Extension Specialists suggest we protect the crop by applying Acrobat MZ. The key to this chemical being successful is getting good coverage of the total plant. Spraying just the top of plants will not give the protection needed. In an effort of getting good coverage increase the spray pressure and volume of water. Drop nozzles

would also help in getting spray coverage for the bottom leaves.

Another key point is to monitor what is happening in the field. Acrobat MZ treatments need to be repeated at 7-10 day intervals and not applied 30 days prior to harvest. (Consult label or call for dates and number applications which can be made.) If tobacco is near topping then early harvest spray is an option. Past experience show that when tobacco is topped and sprayed for suckers the plant changes and lowers the damage from blue mold. Again each field will have different levels of infection and may require different management strategies. Keep a close eye on this years tobacco crop and the blue mold situation.

He has starred in television programs, movies, cable specials and commercials in this country and abroad.

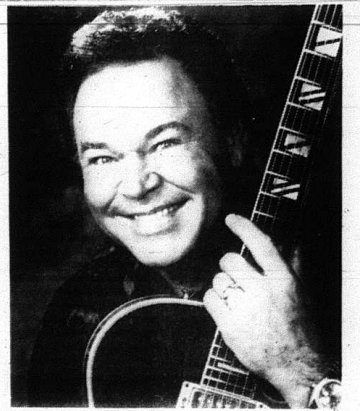
He has been a member of the Grand Ole Opry since the sixties and his list of hits would fill pages.

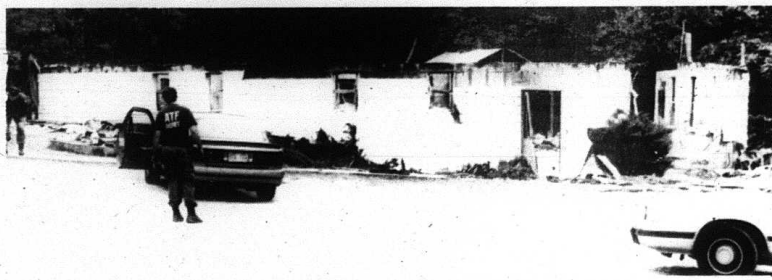

Taxpayers may have to pay for KACO's financial problem

If the state Insurance Department has its way, nearly every Kenton county will face special fees to wipe out a \$9.4 million deficit in an insurance program run by KACO (Kentucky Association of Counties).

KACO officials had funded a state Insurance Department disbanding that the shortfall in its All Lines Fund was that large, or that it even had a deficit, since the program has paid all current claims.

But Christian County Attorney J. Michael Foster, chairman of the program, said recently the All Lines Fund board thinks any county or special district, such as a library district, that had a policy with the program since it started in 1987 must pay an assessment fee to cover the \$9.4 million.

"I have accepted the fact... we're going to have to deal with the \$9.4 million figure," Foster told dozens of county officials at a convention held recently in Lexington.

The money will come from taxpayers.

Rockcastle County has participated in the program for years and Judge Buzz Carlotts said this week, "When you total the savings over the years we have participated in KACO, it is only prudent and wise to continue saving Rockcastle's taxpayers from higher premiums."

The judge said he did not know how much Rockcastle would have to pay. It depends on the length of time the county has been in the program and that will probably be determined by the association of counties.

The judge also said, "In Rockcastle County, it has saved tens of thousands of taxpayer dollars over the years, which is why the present Fiscal Court decided to continue with the program."

The court received a bid of \$32,396 from KACO. Private insurance carriers' bids were \$59,588 and \$48,000.

"I think it is smart to pay a special assessment of a few thousand dollars in order to save the approximately half million dollars we have saved over the years," Judge Carlotts concluded.

Foster said the \$9.4 million is not really a deficit but rather the amount the Insurance Department said the All Lines Fund should have reserved to cover "incurred but not reported" claims. In some cases, some losses

are not reported until a year later.

Foster went on to explain, the problem arose in part because in setting premiums each year, All Lines Fund managers used the low end of estimated claims in order to keep rates low. The fact that the All Lines Fund board is made up of county officials sensitive to local budget limits might have played a role in that, Foster said.

"That was a proper way to set premiums, but the Insurance Department's philosophy is to use high-end estimates," Foster explained.

Also, the All Lines Fund used a billing procedure that the Insurance Department doesn't recognize because it did not include a charge for continuing coverage and a charge for incurred but unreported claims, Foster said.

The All Lines Fund is considering what many years they were in the All Lines Fund and their loss history.

There are 73 counties and 419 special districts that have liability policies with the All Lines Fund. That was down from 112 counties and 538 districts last fiscal year as uncertainties about the All Lines Fund's finances caused local officials to buy other insurance.

"The program needs to be preserved to provide competition with private companies," Judge Carlotts said.

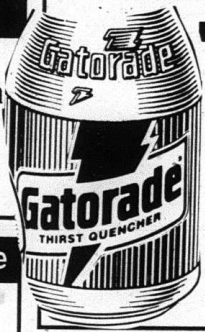

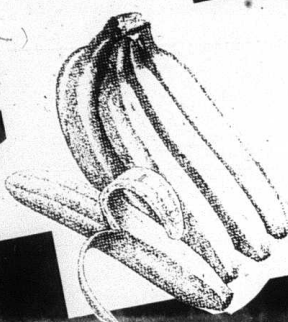

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations as adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block aisles in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language
 - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
 - c. Fighting on the bus
 - d. Destruction of bus property
 - e. Defiance of driver's authority
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above-stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished the parent and the superintendent.

Dangerous clothing that can get caught in handrails, doors or other areas includes:

- Jackets or sweatshirts with drawstrings
- Backpack straps
- Scarves or other loose clothing

If you drop something near the bus, don't pick it up. The driver may not see you. Tell the driver & follow his/her instructions.

Remember that motorists don't always stop for the school bus. Use extreme caution when getting on or off the bus.
