Indirectly harmful products are those that do not themselves cause injury, but may lead people to delay or reject proven remedies, possibly worsening their condition. State law requires each county board of elections, which shall at the direction and under the supervision of the State Board of Elections, administer the election laws and the registration and purgation of voters within the county. Brown explained that local board of elections meet monthly and are in constant session on election day dealing with such matters as the qualifications of voters and the final tabulation of votes cast.


