The Kentucky Department of Corrections has moved all of their prisoners from the Rockcastle County jail, a move that could cost the county thousands of dollars.

Judge Carloftis said he and Jailer Joe Howard were informed of the move by the Department of Corrections I ast Thursday.

Carloftis said the state was concrued that the Rockcastle County jail was not a socure enough facility to house their prisoners.

Jailer Howard had no comment on the situation and referred all questions that the state of the sta

ation and referred all ques tions to the County Judge.

"Most state prisoners are Rock-castle countians who have been consisted of a state crime and are awaiting transfer to the state penitentiary or were just sentenced to a year or six months in the county jail," Carlofts said.

However once prisoners are classified as "state" the department of corrections pays the county to house them. Last year the department corrections paid the county \$107,000 for the service.

The Judge-Executive said that unless something is done, it will strain an already lean county budget to subsidize the jail operation.

"We could have trouble paying our daily bills," the judge said.

Some of the problems at the jail were spelled out in an August 13th inspection genort.

inspection report.

Interior doors inside the jail were left unlocked to the isolation cell and

a detox cell, vestibule doors to the maximum security area were not operational and the outer vestibule door was propped open on at least two inspections.

Other problems cited in the last inspection included inmates in the

inspection included inmates in the jail being allowed to have contact with outsiders through doorways and into the security perimeter of the jail. According to Department of Corrections reports, the county jail has received a poor report from in-spections in April, June and August. The Judge-Executive also said that it is the role of the fiscal court to provide a more facility, amongo the provide a more facility, amongo the provide a more facility.

"All other aspects of the jail, including the daily operation are up to the jailer, 'Carloftis said.

"The court has no power over the jailer, who is a constitutional offi-cer,' Carloftis said.

juveniles arrested and incarcerated at other facilities and he has no control over the cost of the renovation proj-ect," the Judge said.

The county has borrowed about \$200,000 to complete the project and the jail has been responsible for pay-ing about \$50,000 of the Phase I cost

The jail will also be responsible for paying back the money borrowed.

But most of those expenses have been paid with money from the state to house their prisoners.

Removal of the state's prison

Removal of the state's prisoners does mean the jail, which averages 50 to 60 prisoners a day, but it does mean a loss of that income.

"We have been very fortunate to have always have had a surplus in the jail budget unlike most Kentucky counties." Carlotis said.

"Only about five countes in the state do not subsidize their jail and we are one of them, but if we don't got this problem straightened uson, there will obviously be no surplus and the county simply doesn't have

this problem straightened out soon, there will obviously be no surplus and the county simply doesn't have funds to pump into the jail, "he said. Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdeten said Tuesday that he was aware of some of the problems at the Julian straight and that he had advised the Fiscal Court and the Jailer to comply with all Department of Corrections requests and to adhere strictly to their recommendations. "I will also advise the louge and Jailer before the hearing on how they should address the situation can be resolved quickly and the problems with the jail corrected," the County Attorney said.



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Action-packed angling in Autumn

Although it may be difficult to imagine, fall is just around the concer. And when the temperatures begin sliding down the thermometer and nature begins blazing with color, Kentucky's fishing gets even better. As water temperatures begin dropping, almost all species of fish become more active. They seem to sense the impending cold weather and feed heavily in preparation of the lean weeks ahead Lower temperatures allow fish to find their preferred comfort zone in shallow water, making fall fishing more productive than daytime summgerime angiling. Beginning in September and continuing well into November, black tass may be taken in the jumps with surface lures and crank batts. A surra and more productive technique may be casting shoreline cover areas, such as submerged stump-beds, stickups and fallen tree-laps.



And he also tells us to get rid of strife and enviging, the spirit of contention (which carries, feeling of committee and the sorrow.)

Drinking Water Keeps You Healthy

A human embryo is more than 80% water.

A newborn baby is 74% water.
A normal adult is about 60 to 70% water.

Every process in our body occurs in a water medium.
We can exist without food for 2 months or more, but we can only survive for a few days without

Most people live in a constantly dehydrated state.

As our bodies try to adjust to being deprived of water, our thirst mechanism becomes disabled. The only time we receive the 'dry mouth' signal is as the last outward sign of extreme dehydration. In addition, the thirst sensation gradually decreases with age. The result is increasing dehydration. As we start to give our bodies more to work again, but doesn't become fully apparent until our bodies are

fully hydrated. When we are getting sufficient water, we're thirsty all the time!

Water vs. Other Beverages. There is a difference better drinking pure water and beverages that contain water. Fruit juice, soft drinks, coffee, etc. may contain substances that are not healthy a substances that are not healthy contradict some of the water water. actually contradict some of the positive effects of the added water. Caffeinated beverages positive effects of the added water. Caffeinated bevirages stimulate the adrenal glands. Fruit juices contain a lot of sugar and stimulate the pancreas. Soda contains sodium. To be eligible to vote in this refer-endum, you must have been a "person" engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products during calendar year 1994. In this referendum, the term "person" means an individual or a legal entity (for example, a corporation, partnership, estate, etc.) or a group of individuals with a joint ownership inter-

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eep (for example, a family, a

est in sheep (for example, a family, a cooperative, an association, etc.)

In this referendum each "person" has one vote. Spouses who pointly own sheep are considered to be a "family" (i.e., a "group of individua-als") and are not entitled to two votes even in community property states. No one is authorized to register or to vote on behalf of an individual voter. Raw wood is exempt from asserts. Raw wool is exempt from assessment, and importers who imported only raw wool are not eligible to vote.

By Warden Alexander, Director Producers who elected not to take out the FCIC insurance should con-nact the office to make sure that they have signed the FSA-570, Waiver of Insurance. This must be on file no-later than September 30, 1996. This form must also be on file no later than September 30 if you are participating. September 30 if you are participating in the AMTA program (new 7 year

program).

Producers who have FCIC insur-ance through the FSA office and experience conditions which affect their insured crop need to contact the office as soon as possible to complete

office as soon as possible to complete disaster credit forms which portain to their insurance coverage.

Producers who need to make farm improvements may sign-up for the Interim EQUIP program. This program is being phased in to replace the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) of current. Practices in this program include: diversions, critical areas, sediment retention, water or crossion control, stream protection,

animal waste system, permanent wildlife habitat, shallow water areas for wildlife. Special practices have been developed to address unique problems such as waste utilization, filter strips and heavy use areas. Certification for Eligibility to Receive Price Support (MQ-38) forms will be mailed August 16, 1996, to producers who do not already have one on file. This form must be filled out prior to receiving a marketing card. Producers who cereive this form should list the amount of acres of burley tobacco that was planted on the farm, whether or not nonquota tobacco was raised on the farm, and list each person who will receive a check at the warehouse. Any questions pertaining to this form car be check at the warehouse. Any questions pertaining to this form car be answered by phoning 256-2525.

On October 1, 1996, the Department of Agriculture will conduct a second referendum on the sheep and wool promotion, research, education and information act of 1994. The order will go into effect if it is ap-
