 One of the least publicized budget activities of the Federal government is providing more than \$39 billion of taxpayer money in support of advocacy organizations.

## State takes prisoners from Rockcastle jail

The Kentucky Department of Corrections has moved all of their prisoners from the Rockcastle County jail, a move that could cost the county thousands of dollars.

Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotfis confirmed Monday that all prisoners in the jail, which are classified as state prisoners, have been transferred to other facilities.

The move of the approximately fourteen prisoners is the result of apparent problems with the daily operations of the facility.

Judge Carlotfis said he and Jailor Joe Howard were informed of the move by the Department of Corrections last Thursday.

Carlotfis said the state was concerned that the Rockcastle County jail was not a secure enough facility to house their prisoners.

Jailor Howard had no comment on the situation and referred all questions to the County Judge.

The loss of the state prisoners will mean a loss in revenue for the

jail budget which is already strapped by the increasing cost of housing juvenile offenders in other state facilities and the cost of the renovation project at the jail.

The Judge-Executive said that he had requested a hearing with the Department of Corrections to try and resolve the matter and get the state prisoners back in the Rockcastle County jail as soon as possible.

"Most state prisoners are Rockcastle countians who have been convicted of a state crime and are awaiting transfer to the state penitentiary or were just sentenced to a year or six months in the county jail," Carlotfis said.

However once prisoners are classified as "state" the department of corrections pays the county to house them. Last year the department of corrections paid the county \$107,000 for the service.

The Judge-Executive said that unless something is done, it will strain an already lean county budget to subsidize the jail operation.

"We could have trouble paying our daily bills," the judge said.

Some of the problems at the jail were spelled out in an August 13th inspection report.

Interior doors inside the jail were left unlocked to the isolation cell and a detox cell, vestibule doors to the maximum security area were not operational and the outer vestibule door was propped open on at least two inspections.

Other problems cited in the last inspection included inmates in the jail being allowed to have contact with outsiders through doorways and into the security perimeter of the jail.

According to Department of Corrections reports, the county jail has received a poor report from inspections in April, June and August.

The Judge-Executive also said that it is the role of the fiscal court to provide a proper facility, approve the jail's budget and pay their bills.

"All other aspects of the jail, including the daily operation are up to the jailer," Carlotfis said.

"The court has no power over the jailer, who is a constitutional officer," Carlotfis said.

"And in all fairness to the jailer, he has no control over the number of

juveniles arrested and incarcerated at other facilities and he has no control over the cost of the renovation project," the judge said.

"Mounting bills to house juvenile offenders have hit the jail budget hard and the jail is also responsible for paying for the renovation. Phase I of the renovation has been completed. The county has borrowed about \$200,000 to complete the project and the jail has been responsible for paying about \$50,000 of the Phase I cost. The jail will also be responsible for paying back the money borrowed."

But most of those expenses have been paid with money from the state to house their prisoners.

Removal of the state's prisoners doesn't mean there are no prisoners in the jail, which averages 50 to 60 prisoners a day, but it does mean a loss of that income.

"We have been very fortunate to have always have had a surplus in the jail budget unlike most Kentucky counties," Carlotfis said.

"Only about five counties in the state do not subsidize their jail and we are one of them, but if we don't get this problem straightened out soon, there will obviously be no surplus and the county simply doesn't have funds to pump into the jail," he said.

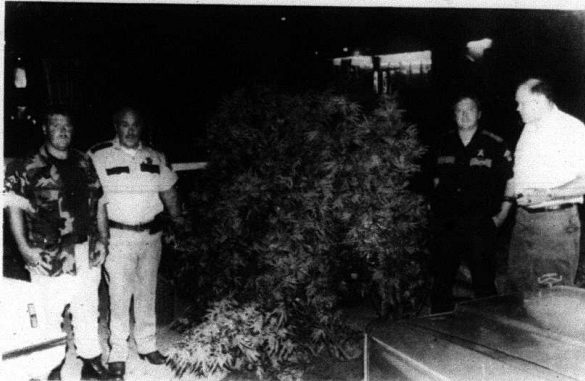
Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said Tuesday that he was aware of some of the problems at the jail since April and that he had advised the Fiscal Court and the Jailer to comply with all Department of Corrections requests and to adhere strictly to their recommendations.

"I will also advise the Judge and Jailer before the hearing on how they should address the situation with Corrections officials so the situation can be resolved quickly and the problems with the jail corrected," the County Attorney said.

In the past several months some prisoners have escaped from the county jail, but many of them were on work release.

And, in July, Johnny Denny of Brodhead did not escape from the jail as was reported.

Denny who was being placed in the jail because of parole violations ran off from the custody of his parole officers before he ever entered the jail.

## Brown charged with bigamy Indictments returned

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury has returned six indictments, including one against a Mt. Vernon man for bigamy.

According to the indictment, Scotty Lee Brown, 29, "committed the offense of Bigamy by marrying Karen Brown while still married to Pamela Goin."

According to a sworn affidavit by Pamela Denise (Goin) Brown, she and the defendant were married in Knox Co. Tennessee on October 20, 1993 and never divorced.

Brown married Karen Brown on May 26, 1996 in Rockcastle County. Brown is in the Rockcastle Co. Jail under a \$10,000 cash or property bond and arraignment is scheduled for Aug. 30 at 10 a.m.

A 16-year-old boy, certified by the court as an adult, was also indicted for Burglary, first degree, for "unlawfully entering the residence of Dexter Chandler while armed with a

firearm with intent to commit a crime therein."

William Baker, Jr. of Mt. Vernon will be arraigned on Sept. 13 at 10 a.m.

Other indictments returned included: Otis Kirby, 35, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon for "criminal attempt to commit murder by pointing a loaded gun at Joe Bussell (Brodhead city policeman) and pulling the trigger, with intent to kill."

Kirby is in the Rockcastle Co. Jail under \$25,000 cash or property bond with his arraignment scheduled for August 30 at 10 a.m.

Alvin Ray Pigg, 35, Rt. 1, Brodhead, was indicted for cultivating marijuana "by growing 185 marijuana plants with intent to transfer."

Mr. Pigg filed a \$10,000 bond and is scheduled to be arraigned Aug. 30 at 10 a.m.

Connie Sue Bussell, 20, of Brodhead, will be arraigned Sept. 13 at 10 a.m. on a charge of possession of a controlled substance, first degree. "By having in her possession, 1 ylox, a schedule II controlled substance."

Ms. Bussell is free on a \$2,500 bond. Michael W. Chasteen, 307 Peachtree Dr., Berea, was indicted on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol after having been convicted of the same on at least three (3) occasions.

Chasteen, 34, is also scheduled for arraignment Sept. 13 at 10 a.m.

## Holden arrested

Police arrested Matthew Holden of Castle Village Apartments in Brodhead Tuesday after police found a small amount of marijuana.

## Judge Carlotfis reports The State of the County

How is Rockcastle County doing these days financially? County Judge/ executive Buzz Carlotfis was asked this week.

His reply: "The County is running as it has for the last several years."

"Every fund is figured independently," he continued, "so exactly how the county is doing is difficult to determine," he said.

"The General Fund is basically the same as the last 25 years. Which means it hasn't grown and its ability to benefit has diminished," he declared. "In short, there is an increase in demand for services with no increase in revenue."

Apparently, since the county treasurer Joseph Clontz's July report to the Court showed the General Fund with a deficit of \$2,267.89.

The judge pointed out that "less than a dime of every dollar that comes from taxes goes to the county." The most goes to others such as the schools and state which "gets the lions share of taxes," he said.

Roads in the county are very important, especially to persons who live along them.

"I'd like to point out that since I've been here we've not borrowed a single penny for the Road Department," Carlotfis noted. "Money for blacktopping that I've put down in 1994 and 1995 is paid for. And we

still have more roads to do in each district.

The July report to the court by the County treasurer showed the Road Fund has a balance of \$193,492 at the end of July. In the Road Fund -IMMA account there is \$727. The Road Bonds debt reserve has a balance through October of \$70,000.

As an afterthought the judge ob- served that hopefully the Copper Creek road slide has been remedied.

The judge said during the past year a 130,000 gallon water tank has been installed to increase output in Northern Rockcastle and funding has been appropriated for the Rockcastle Water Association to extend water service. The amount of the funding is \$1.7 million.

Western Water Association has received a half-million dollars for water line extension from the Lake Linville boat dock nearly to I-75. Part of that fund will go to Slaty Branch and several other areas near Brodhead.

He pointed out that a new ball field had been developed at Brodhead and there has been grant money for Livingston school.

The judge also pointed out his continued efforts to develop Industrial Park II, known locally as the Henderson bottoms.

# Action-packed angling in Autumn

Although it may be difficult to imagine, fall is just around the corner. And when the temperatures begin sliding down the thermometer and nature begins blazing with color, Kentucky's fishing gets even better. As water temperatures begin dropping, almost all species of fish become more active. They seem to sense the impending cold weather and feed heavily in preparation of the lean weeks ahead. Lower temperatures allow fish to find their preferred comfort zone in shallow water, making fall fishing more productive than daytime summertime angling.

Beginning in September and continuing well into November, black bass may be taken in the jumps with surface lures and crank baits. A surer and more productive technique may be casting shoreline cover areas, such as submerged stump-beds, stickups and fallen tree-laps.

Black bass aren't the only fish to be caught in the fall - crappie and white bass can be caught in abundance, too. During hot days, schools of hungry crappie can be found in timbered coves and other submerged cover areas. At the same time, white bass can be found in jumps, on flats, submerged islands and the upper sections of embankments.

Those dedicated to seeking and catching muskie enter a highly productive period in the fall. These monster fish can be taken in certain rivers, and also Cave Run, Buckhorn and Green River lakes. These bodies of water have become some of the most outstanding muskie lakes in the entire country.

Sauger can be found below the locks and dams on the Ohio and Kentucky rivers. In western Kentucky, sauger will be abundant below the dam at Kentucky Lake. The tailwaters of Lake Cumberland is also a hot spot for sauger in the fall.

So hang in there, because as this hot and humid weather begins letting up, the good fishing will start kicking in!

## "It Is Written"

May we study for a few moments Paul's exhortation in Romans 13:11-14. The text reads: "And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light. Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying. But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof."

First notice that Paul says that we need to awake out of sleep. Far too many are spiritually sound asleep! You know when a person is sleeping, they are unaware, unconcerned, and feel not what is happening to them. (As for example when surgery is done on a person.) So it is when people are spiritually asleep, they are unconcerned about their condition, about sin, about what is right. The need is to wake up and realize that we are ever closer to the day of salvation. Every day that passes by just means that we are just that much closer to eternity.

Yes, we need to cast aside the works of darkness. Put away all wickedness, it only leads to heartache, sorrow, misery, and in the end doom and destruction anyway! Things like rioting and drunkenness, which refers to the use of booze to intoxicate and the foolishness this leads to. He also speaks of chambering and wantonness, the immorality and the licentious lusts that leads to fornication. And he also tells us to get rid of strife and envying, the spirit of contention (which carries a feeling of enmity and jealousy).

Finally, he tells us to put on the Lord Jesus Christ. To be transformed into his image, by seeking to think like him, have his attitude, mind-set, and to act like Jesus. We initially put on Christ when we obey the gospel. "For we are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as have been baptized unto Christ have put on Christ." Gal. 3:26-27.

**Drinking Water Keeps You Healthy**

A human embryo is more than 80% water.

A newborn baby is 74% water. A normal adult is about 60 to 70% water.

Every process in our body occurs in a water medium.

We can exist without food for 2 months or more, but we can only survive for a few days without water.

Most people live in a constantly dehydrated state.

As our bodies try to adjust to being deprived of water, our thirst mechanism becomes disabled. The only time we receive the "dry mouth" signal is as the last outward sign of extreme dehydration. In addition, the thirst sensation gradually decreases with age. The result is increasing dehydration. As we start to give our bodies more water, the thirst mechanism begins to work again, but doesn't become fully apparent until our bodies are

fully hydrated. When we are getting sufficient water, we're thirsty all the time!

**Water vs. Other Beverages.** There is a difference between drinking pure water and beverages that contain water. Fruit juice, soft drinks, coffee, etc. may contain substances that are not healthy, and actually contradict some of the positive effects of the added water. Caffeinated beverages stimulate the adrenal glands. Fruit juices contain a lot of sugar and stimulate the pancreas. Soda contains sodium. These drinks may tax the body more than they cleanse it.

Other beverages also contain dehydrating agents. They may actually reduce the water reserves in the body!

Drinking other beverages to the exclusion of water also causes you to lose your taste for water. This is particularly true with children as they become dependent on sodas and juices.

proved in this referendum by sheep producers and feeders, and importers of sheep and sheep products. If the order is approved, it will become final and a nationwide program will go into effect to collect assessments from the sheep and wool industry to carry out research and promotion activities to benefit the industry. A referendum on this same issue was conducted February 6, 1996 but the Secretary determined that the results were invalid because the procedures were applied incorrectly and inconsistently.

In-person voting will take place in the County CFS Office on October 1, 1996. Voters who wish to vote absentee may request an absentee ballot from the County CFS Office that serves the voter's residence or, if the voter is a business entity, the office that serves the entity's main office or headquarters. Requests for absentee ballots may be made from August 26 through September 17, 1996. CFS Offices will only fill requests from August 26 through September 17, 1996. Completed absentee ballots must be received in the county CFS Office by close of business on September 27, 1996. Ballots will be counted on October 6, 1996.

To be eligible to vote in this referendum, you must have been a "person" engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products during calendar year 1994. In this referendum, the term "person" means an individual or a legal entity (for example, a corporation, partnership, estate, etc.) or a group of individuals with a joint ownership inter-

est in sheep (for example, a family, a cooperative, an association, etc.).

In this referendum each "person" has one vote. Spouses who jointly own sheep are considered to be a "family" (i.e., a "group of individuals") and are not entitled to two votes even in community property states. No one is authorized to register or to vote on behalf of an individual voter. Raw wool is exempt from assessment, and importers who imported only raw wool are not eligible to vote.

Questions about voter eligibility (who can and cannot vote), verifying volume of production, challenges (the process by which a voter's eligibility is officially questioned), the challenge resolution process, appeals of eligibility determinations, ballot counting, reporting and related topics should be made to County FSA Offices. Questions about voting procedures (e.g., absentee voting, how to obtain ballot materials, where and when to vote) should be made to the County CFS Office. Any other questions about the referendum should be referred to Kenneth R. Payne, at the Agricultural Marketing Service, Washington, D.C., at 1-888-265-8110, beginning on August 12, 1996.

If approved, the program would be funded by mandatory assessment on domestic producers, feeders and exporters of live sheep and greasy wool of 1-cent-per-pound on live sheep sold and 2-cent-per-pound on greasy wool sold. Importers would be assessed 1-cent-per-pound of degreased wool or the equivalent of degreased wool for wool and wool products.

Producers who elected not to take out the FCIC insurance should contact the office to make sure that they have signed the FSA-570, Waiver of Insurance. This must be on file no later than September 30, 1996. This form must also be on file no later than September 30 if you are participating in the AMTA program (new 7 year program).

Producers who have FCIC insurance through the FSA office and experience conditions which affect their insured crop need to contact the office as soon as possible to complete disaster credit forms which pertain to their insurance coverage.

Producers who need to make farm improvements may sign-up for the Interim EQUIP program. This program is being used to replace the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) of current. Practices in this program include: diversions, critical areas, sediment retention, water or erosion control, stream protection,

animal waste system, permanent wildlife habitat, shallow water areas for wildlife. Special practices have been developed to address unique problems such as waste utilization, filter strips and heavy use areas.

Certification for Eligibility to Receive Price Support (MQ-38) forms will be mailed August 16, 1996, to producers who do not already have one on file. This form must be filled out prior to receiving a marketing card. Producers who receive this form should list the amount of acres of burley tobacco that was planted on the farm, whether or not nonquota tobacco was raised on the farm, and list each person who any questions pertaining to this form can be answered by phoning 256-2525.

On October 1, 1996, the Department of Agriculture will conduct a second referendum on the sheep and wool promotion, research, education and information act of 1994. The order will go into effect if it is ap-
