In 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of education retained Barry W. Cooper, P.E. who completed an inal inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and eveloped and submitted to the State of Kentucky an Asbestos Management Plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to imple

the Nockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management plan.
