

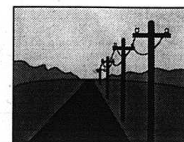

On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The law required EPA to develop regulations which provide a comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule (40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E). This Rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1987, EPA published the Model Accreditation Plan (40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E) required by AHERA, which specifies training, examination and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans and design or conduct response actions in schools. The Model Plan became effective on June 1, 1987.

In 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of education retained Barry W. Cooper, P.E. who completed an inal inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an Asbestos Management Plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management plan.

Copies of the management plan are always available for review for those interested persons at the Administration Office at Rt. 5, Box 69, Mt. Vernon, KY and at the Principal's office at each School any time during normal office hours.

Copies are available for duplication at a cost of 25 cents for each 8 1/2 x 11 page of the Management Plan.

Two plead guilty in connection with break-in at local post office

A Mt. Vernon man and a Keavy man pleaded guilty last week in federal court in London to stealing a money order machine and blank forms from the Brodhead Post Office in May of 1994. Tammy Jo Johnson, 22, of Mt. Vernon and Steven Johnson, 34, of Keavy face up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine after their guilty pleas before U.S. District Judge Jennifer Coffman. The two were charged in June after an extensive investigation by U.S. Postal Inspectors. The Brodhead post office was robbed during lunch hour on May 20, 1994, of an undisclosed amount of money, money orders and the machine. New large post office boxes had been placed in the post office a short time before the robbery which occurred sometime between 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. At the time of the robbery Postmaster Elizabeth Tipton said someone had apparently broken the lock on one of the new boxes and crawled through it to the operational side of the post office. Mrs. Tipton said the boxes were taken out immediately after the robbery and replaced with smaller ones making it impossible for anyone to gain entrance in the same manner again. The postmaster said Wednesday that postal inspectors had completely handled the case and she had no comment as to what led to the arrests and guilty pleas. The couple is scheduled to be sentenced on December 6.

Pre-hearing conference to discuss jail problems set

A pre-hearing conference has been scheduled for Sept. 18 at 1:30 p.m. with the Kentucky Department of Corrections by telephone, Rockcastle Judge/Executive Buzz Carlottis reported Tuesday. A hearing officer has been assigned to take over the conference call. He is Scott D. Majors. Judge Carlottis said the pre-conference hearing officer will determine why the state felt it was necessary to remove the state prisoners from the Rockcastle Co. Jail last month. On hand for the call will be some one Judge Carlottis names to represent the county. Carlottis said it is likely Jailer Joe Howard will represent the county during the call. Last month, the Department of Corrections removed all state prisoners from the county jail because of problems in the day-to-day operation of the facility. The move could cost the county as much as \$100,000 in revenue if the state continues their boycott of the Rockcastle Jail.

Tell me, dear hearts, is that not a most bizarre dream?

I've read that dreams are the brain's way of "processing" recent events and information. Just last week I did indeed hear someone speak well of John's work. Extension Home Economics News

Back to School Clothing for Children

Clothing is very important to children, especially from age 6 to 12. It can be an important factor in whether a child is accepted or rejected by school friends.

Studies have indicated that a well-dressed child is better mannered, more self-confident and better behaved than a poorly dressed one. As children enter a world of playmates and classrooms, their clothing should suit the role they will be expected to perform. The clothes they wear play a part in their adjustment in social growth and influence their mental health. Inability to dress like others may produce emotional stress for the child, and this problem may be more acute for families with limited resources.

WHAT CHILDREN WANT
Children want certain things in their clothing which help them with their social development. **Conformity.** The child wants his clothes to conform to the style worn by his playmates. The school-age child is intensely motivated to gain acceptance from his peer group. If a child is dressed very differently from his peers, he becomes self-conscious and has a feeling of anxiety and inferiority. Often these feelings carry over into adulthood. Children need to develop socially, and clothing can help the child in his social development with his peers, his teachers, and others. **Easy To Manipulate.** Children want to be able to dress themselves and may become impatient if dressing takes too long or if they need help. Their clothing should encourage independence in dressing and give them confidence in doing for themselves. **Comfort.** Children want their clothing to be comfortable. Instead of buying clothing that is too large, shop for features which allow some growth such as undefined waistlines, deep-cut armholes for set-in-sleeves, two-piece garments, deep hems or cuffs, long tails on

shirts and blouses, and stretch or knit fabrics. Clothing that is large may become faded or worn before it fits the child. Light-weight clothing is desirable as heavy, bulky clothes are awkward to handle and can tire the child. Older elementary school children still want comfort, but are beginning to show an interest in

style. **Attractive.** Children want attractive clothing and favorable attention. Attractive clothes affect not only the child's own behavior but also how the group behaves toward the child.

Agriculture News

The Rockcastle County Farm Service and Natural Resource Conservation Service Agencies are scheduled to move to a new location October 1, 1996. The new Service Center will be located on Hwy. 150 approximately 3 miles south of Mt. Vernon. Office hours will be Monday-Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., except for legal holidays, when the offices will be closed.

Effective August 21, 1996, the Farm Service Agency Administrator declared a major disaster in eight KY counties due to damages and losses

caused by excessive rainfall and flooding, which occurred on July 19, 1996. In addition to these eight counties, 19 other KY counties are named as contiguous counties where eligible family farmers to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, Rockcastle County is one of the 19 counties named. EM applications will be received through August 21, 1997 for SEVERE PHYSICAL LOSSES ONLY; and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed. EM loans will be made under Farmers Home Administration

(FmHA) Instruction 1945-D.

Producers who elected not to take out the FCIC insurance should contact the office to make sure that they have signed the FSA-570, Waiver of Insurance. This must be on file prior to picking up your marketing card for 1996. This form must also be on file no later than September 30 if you are participating in the AMTA program (new 7 year program).

Producers who have FCIC insurance and experience conditions which affect their insured crop need to contact the office as soon as possible to complete disaster credit forms which pertain to their insurance coverage.

Producers who need to make farm improvements may sign-up for the Interim EQUIP program. This program is being purchased in to replace the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) of current. Practices in

this program include: diversions, critical areas, sediment retention, water or erosion control, stream protection, animal waste system, permanent wildlife habitat, shallow water areas for wildlife. Special practices have been developed to address unique problems such as: waste utilization, filter strips, and heavy use areas.

Last date to request an absentee ballot for the sheep referendum will be September 17. In-person voting will take place on October 1. Voting will take place in the County Extension Service office. CES then delivers the ballots, challenges and other voting materials to FSA. FSA will count ballots and add volume of production on October 16. Persons with questions concerning the sheep referendum may contact the FSA office at 256-2525, or the County Extension Service at 256-2403.

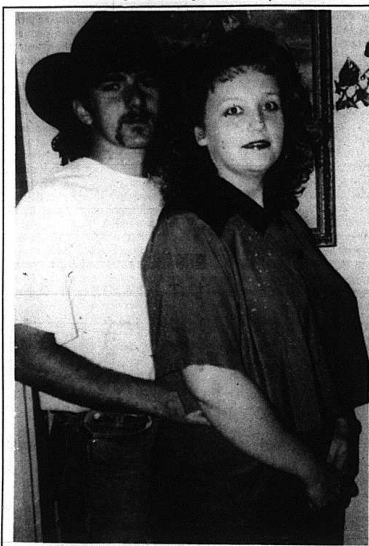

"IT IS WRITTEN"

One of the important topics in the word of God is the subject of the nature of man. In IThessalonians 5:23 we read, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." Notice that Paul describes 3 parts of man: spirit, soul, and body. Let's note a few things about each.

Man's body is made from the dust of the ground. In Genesis 2:7 we read, "And the LORD God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." We are made from the common elements that come from the earth. God took the dust of the ground, adding about 3 parts water (we are about 75% water) and formed man. The word "formed" suggests the idea of a potter squeezing and shaping clay to make a pot or sculpture. Even so God formed Adam's body from the earth. To the earth our bodies will return. Eccl.12:7.

Man also has "soul" that is animal life, vitality. Notice in Genesis 2:7, man became a living soul. The same word is used again in Genesis 2:19, "and out of the ground the LORD God formed every beast of the field, and every fowl of the air; and brought them unto Adam to see what he would call them; and whatsoever Adam called every living creature, that was the name thereof." That phrase living creature is the same word as in 2:7, living soul. Man has "life, breath, vitality" just like the animals. Sometimes in the scriptures, though, soul is used to refer to the inward man, made in the image of God.

Man also has a spirit, which was formed within his body. In Zechariah 12:1 we read, "The burden of the word of the LORD for Israel, saith the LORD, which stretcheth forth the heavens, and layeth the foundation of the earth, and formeth the spirit of man within him." Notice man's spirit was formed within him. The word "formed" is the same word as used in Genesis 2:7. God formed man's spirit, molded, shaped it as a potter would clay. Man's spirit bears the image of God. Genesis:27, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." We look like God in that we have intelligence, emotions, and power of choice or will. Animals do not possess these qualities but man does, and this makes us unique. Because we have freewill, we are morally accountable creatures. And since we all have sinned, Romans 3:23, we need redemption. Some day we will face God in the day of judgment, are we ready for that day?

Shepherd shines as Rock rolls over South Laurel

The last two seasons the Rockcastle County Rockets have opened their season in Mt. Sterling at the Recreation Bowl. Friday night the Cardinals of South Laurel must have thought they were playing in the Malcom Shepherd bowl.

The Rockets senior quarterback led his team to a 29-8 victory over South Laurel in the Rocket's season opener.

Shepherd carried the ball only four times, but he gained 113 yards and scored two touchdowns. The first came with time running out in the first quarter when Shepherd dropped back to pass and couldn't find a receiver. The quarterback took off, broke a tackle at the line of scrimmage and scampered 56 yards to paydirt. "It was a gutsy run," said Coach Tom Larkey who had a lot of praise for his somewhat inexperienced quarterback.

"He is a tough kid and he has always been a winner," Larkey said. "If Malcom continues to carry the ball the way he did Friday night, other teams will be trying to figure out how to stop four backs instead of three," the coach said.

Besides scoring the first touchdown, Shepherd added another score in the fourth quarter on a 38 yard run and he also led the defense in tackles and assists, getting eight for the night.

The quarterback, who plays cornerback on defense, also picked off a South Laurel pass and ran it back thirty-five yards to set-up a two yard touchdown run by senior Jon Cromer.

"A heck of a performance," said defensive coach Tony Saylor about Shepherd's overall game.

The coaches also had a lot of praise for the entire team's consistent play.

"Our varsity had only forty yards in penalties and no turnovers, those are the type of numbers to expect from a team with a lot of experience," Larkey said.

Besides Shepherd's 113 yards, senior Jason Brown turned in his best running performance ever as Rocket gaining 101 yards on 12 carries and scoring a touchdown on a fifty yard run in the second quarter.

Cromer had 68 yards on 16 carries, junior Dusty McClure had

yards on seven carries, sophomore Andrew Carrera had 14 yards on four carries and junior Chris Bishop carried the ball once for two yards.

The Rockets heralded placekicker Raymond Blackburn got only one chance to kick and made good on it, an extra point. Brown added two extra point conversions on the ground.

All total the Rockets had 330 yards of offense all on the ground. Shepherd attempted only two passes.

On the defensive side, besides Shepherd's eight tackles, McClure added six and he also had an interception.

Chris Bishop added seven tackles and assists from his strong safety position and Anthony King had six tackles and a quarterback sack.

Dennis Miller played well at middle linebacker, getting five tackles and assists and Jon Cromer added four tackles.

Sophomore Brooks Ingram played well, getting three tackles and one sack as did Brown, who had the same numbers, three tackles and a sack.

Andy Hale had two tackles, as did outside linebacker Stade Calhoun, and defensive linemen Mike Muney and David Coffey.

Andrew Gisler, Bobby Cundiff, Henry Bryant and Ronnie Vanzant all added a tackle for the defense.

"Overall our defensive played well for the first time out," coach Saylor said.

However, in order for the Rockets to win Friday night against Southwestern Pulaski County, Saylor's defense must stop one of the nation's top running backs in Mike Brumm. Street and Smith Magazine rated the tailback as a top college prospect.

"Brumm ran all over Lincoln County Friday night as the Warriors defeated the excellent 3A school 21-12."

"This is the best team from Southwestern that we have faced," Saylor said.

The Rockets came out of the opening game healthy for the most part. Jon Cromer is nursing a pulled groin but will be ready to play and linebacker Dennis Miller has a banged up knee, but he too is expected to start.

The Rockets biggest problem with personnel is a flu bug that hit the team this week causing some players to miss practice. Andrew Carrera has not practiced all week and Coach Larkey said he expects to move Chris Bishop into that spot Friday night, if Carrera is unable to go.

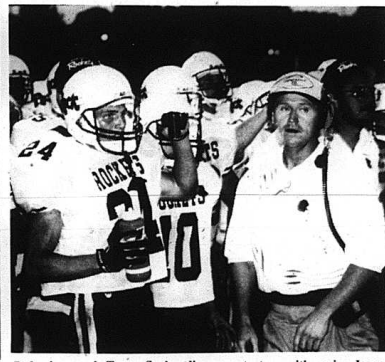

Lee Keene receives Everett Brown Award

Lee D. Keene, administrator of the Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, has been named recipient of the Everett C. Brown Award for 1996. The honor is given yearly to a citizen who has made an exceptional contribution towards the betterment and improvement of Rockcastle County. The award has been given each year since 1978. Established by the family of Everett C. Brown as a memorial to his life's achievements, the Brown family wishes to recognize citizens who provide leadership, service and commitment to our community. The award is presented by the Kiwanis Club of Rockcastle County.

Mr. Keene has had an enormous effect on our community. As administrator of the hospital since 1989 he has initiated growth and planning that will put the Rockcastle Hospital a step ahead into the 21st century. Chief among the latest innovations for the hospital will be a new medical arts building slated to open next year. Added to that is the continuing improvement and expansion of services not only for the hospital but of the respiratory care center. The hospital employs 310 people, has a payroll of 7.5 million a year, and has an annual budget of 15 million. The steady improvement and capacity of this splendid facility is a reflection of the leadership and expertise brought to it by a talented staff, its board of directors and administrator.

Mr. Keene is a native of Pike County, and graduate of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. He attended George Washington University in Washington, D.C. earning his M.B.A. Before taking over at the Rockcastle Hospital, he was administrator at the Pikeville Hospital in

Amber Thacker wins both Talent contests

Amber Camille Thacker of Mt. Vernon, has won both the Gospel Talent and the Talent Round-Up 1996 in Renfro Valley. Twelve-year old Amber is one talented young lady.

On June 8, 1996 Amber sang "He Grew the Tree," one of her favorite gospel numbers, to land her first place in the gospel competition. A little over three months later, and just two days after her twelfth birthday, she impressed the judges with her performance of Faith Hill's "It Matters to Me." Amber has been influenced in many ways by her family. Renfro Valley is no stranger to Amber's family roots. Her singing ability may have been inherited from her great grandfather, Homer McNew, who along with his brothers and sisters sang on the Renfro Valley radio broadcast during the '40s.

Singing in public is nothing new to Amber. She sang in church when she was only four years old. She is a natural. Unlike many child prodigies, Amber has never had formal voice training, but is blessed with a beautiful, strong voice that can be heard above all others in a choir.

According to her mother, Sheila, "Amber sang full sentences before she could speak full sentences."

At the age of 3 1/2 Amber started singing with her aunt, Devia while listening to tapes in the car. When she was asked what motivated her the most to start singing, she gave the credit to her aunt.

Sheila said there's always a radio playing in the house and Amber sings along with the songs. She admits that Amber is a typical pre-teen, having a tendency to fall asleep with her radio on. She's a big fan of Lexington's, K-93 FM radio station.

Winning talent contests is becoming quite familiar to Amber. In addition to this year's Renfro Valley Gospel and Talent Round-Up contests, her other winnings include: 1st place in Rockcastle County 4-H Variety Shows, 1st in the Knox Co. district talent contest, the Kentucky 4-H show, in addition to performing at the 1995 Kentucky State Fair with

winners from all districts within the state.

At nine years old, and competing against 38 other girls, she won 2nd runner-up in the Pre-Teen America contest at Galt House in Louisville. In 1995 she took 1st place at the K-93 Radio/Channel 27 TV Kids First talent contest. For the opening of the 1996 Little League season, Amber was invited to sing one of the most difficult songs there is to sing...our national anthem. Wearing her cheer-leading outfit, Amber got out there and sang it beautifully...without music!

In speaking with Amber you wouldn't guess that she's won so many talent contests. She tends to be quite modest about her accomplishments. But singing...isn't the only thing that this young lady excels in. Amber is a Rockcastle County Middle school 7th grade cheerleader, a member of the school choir, 4-H Club, and her school's gifted-student Challenge Program.

Although her parents both work, Sheila at the Mt. Vernon Health Department and Kenneth as a Mt. Vernon rural mail carrier, they find the time for, and are devoted to, Amber's outside interests.

Amber enjoys entering contests. Not only to sing herself, but to see and hear the other contestants perform. Friends and fellow performers admire her talent and occasionally ask her for advice when they perform. Modestly, she tells them to "stay focused and just get out there and sing your best."

Preparation for competition begins at home. "They're (her parents) always telling me to move around on stage," said Amber. She admits it's hard for her to do if she isn't moved by a song. She carefully chooses most of the songs she sings. "I've got to feel good about the song I'm singing. If it isn't right, I won't sing it."

Eye contact with her audience is important. She said she's more comfortable singing in church because she can see who she's singing to.

Being a big country fan, Amber would like to one day pursue a career

as a country music performer, quickly admitting she will always sing gospel songs because they move her the most.

Some of Amber's favorite country songs are: "Independence Day" by Martina McBride, which she sang for both the 4-H and K-93/Channel 27 talent shows. She also enjoys, and has performed songs by Dolly Parton, the Judys and Faith Hill.

Amber doesn't know how to play the piano but can pick out the notes to her songs by ear. She plans to take both piano and guitar lessons in the near future.

"We (my husband and I) don't push Amber to compete. It's her choice and we're very proud of her."

The Thackers have another daughter, 6-year old Morgan. Sheila said Morgan tends to be more the athletic type but she also performed at the age of four.
