Magistrate recommends dismissal of Shepherd suit

A federal magistrate has recommended that a \$23 million lawsuit against Kentucky State Police which shot Gary Shepherd to death over three years ago, be dismissed on technical grounds.

Shepherd was gunned down in the yard of his home on the Old Brodhead-Mt. Vernon Road near Brindle Ridge on August 8, 1993 after he failed to surrender to state police, who found 55 marijuana plants growing on his property.

Magistrate Judge J.B. Johnson Jr. ruled last week that the suit filed by Shepherd's common-law wife, Mary Jane Jones and their 7-year-old son, Jacob Jones Shepherd, failed to name the officers in their individual capacities. And Johnson said an amended complaint that named the actual shooters and other defendants was filed after the statute of limita-

tions had expired.

The recommendation Johnson issued Friday will go to U.S. District Judge Jennifer Coffman for a decision. The plaintiffs' lead attorney, Jeff Blum said yesterday that Johnson's recommendation is "way off" and that he will ask for a hearing.

"I was taken aback by most of what came out," said Blum, who maintains the state caused the delays by illegally withholding crucial information. He has 10 days from the date the recommendation was filed to file objections.

Members of his family, including his wife and son, who were present when he was shot, have maintained from the time of the shooting that police intentionally killed Shepherd that Sunday afternoon.

Kentucky State Police said they noticed the plants during a flyover earlier that day. Officers said Shepherd refused to negotiate with them and was shot only after he advanced and pointed an assault rifle at them.

Witnesses quoted Shepherd as saying, "You will have to kill me before you come on my property and destroy anything."

In the wrongful death suit, the family said Shepherd was not armed for long periods of time and could have been taken peacefully. The suit said police conspired against Shepherd because he advocated legalization of marijuana and sometimes conducted religious services in his home.

Rockcastle grand jury inquiry both cleared the officers.

Johnson noted numerous precedents that have held state officers cannot be sued for money in their official capacities. He said the family's attorneys failed repeatedly to amend the suit to sue the officers personally.

When the shooters - troopers Mike Reichenbach and Joey Reffett - were finally named as defendants, Johnson said it was too late.

Johnson's recommendation would dismiss claims against most of the defendants, including Reichenbach and Reffett. Blum said he might still have a claim remaining against a trooper who allegedly portrayed Shepherd among colleagues as someone who couldn't be negotiated with.

Report suggests restrictions in forest

Logging and off-road vehicles would be prohibited if the National Forest Service accepts a report by the Kentucky State Nature Preserve Commission.

The multi-page report recommends a network of natural areas that cover a fourth of the 687,000-acre forest.

It recommends for protection 14,848 acres along the Rockcastle River Corridor which includes Rockcastle, Pulaski, Laurel and Jackson counties. The Rockcastle preserve also contains 7,759 acres in Waterfall Cave/Crooked Creek caves and 3,055 acres known as Smokeholch/Goochland Cave area.

It's also less than McClure which will see nearly 60,000 acres preserved.

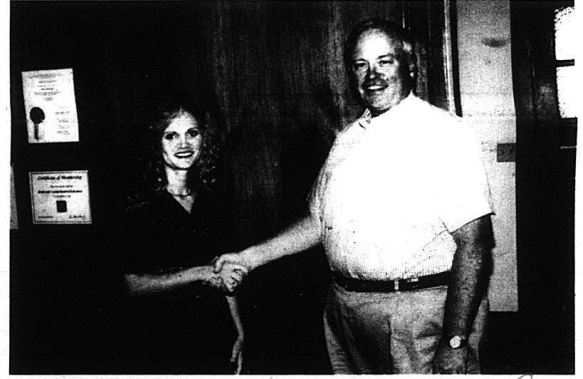
Major recommendations include:

- Create 49 new natural areas and add to four that are already protected. The natural areas include 234,700 acres, of which 143,700 are owned by the Forest Service.
- Expand the protection given to cliffs, which often attract endangered species.
- Protect the extensive cave areas in the forests still unknown.
- Restrict off-road vehicles to areas designated for their use. The report said off-road vehicles have a greater negative effect than any other form of recreation.
- Stop mining in areas where the forest service owns mineral rights and giving a higher priority to acquiring private mineral rights under natural areas.
- Increase wildlife biodiversity by allowing large blocks of forests to mature.
- Protect rivers and creeks in the forest because they are among the least disturbed left in the state.
- Giving added protection to that much land would allow the forest service "to restore some of the majority of the forests that once occurred here," the report said.

The report comes days before the deadline on a public comment period that is the first step to draw up a plan that will guide the Daniel Boone Forest through the early part of the next century.

The period ends today (Thursday). Nearly 2,000 comments have been received.

The recommendations on protecting natural areas are based on extensive inventories of plants and animals conducted between 1987 and 1994 that turned up many rare and endangered species.

Working Budget 16 Million

Boling new board member

The Rockcastle County Board of Education welcomed a new school board member at their regular monthly meeting last Tuesday.

Teresa Renner Boling, 29, of Orlando, will replace former board chairman Deborah Whitehead, who resigned in June after moving out of her district.

Boling will serve the remainder of Whitehead's term in division four and then will begin serving her own four year term in January.

Besides being the only applicant for Whitehead's seat she was also the only person to file for election in that division, which includes the voting precincts of Orlando and Climax.

Mrs. Boling's husband Jeff, was present to see his wife take the oath of office from Kentucky Supreme Court Justice Joe Lambert of Mt. Vernon. The couple have one child, a one-year-old son.

Dr. G.W. Griffin was chosen new board chairman by other members of the board in July.

In January, Boling will be joined on the board by another new member, Sherry Isaacs, a current member of the Roundstone school Site Based Council, will replace Doug Mullins in division five. Mullins did not seek re-election because he is also moving out of his district. Mrs. Isaacs was the only person to file for election to that seat.

In January the board will be made up of, Chairman Griffin, Terry Burton, who will begin a new four year term in division two, Dwight

Griffin, Boling and Isaacs.

The board also approved the working general budget for the next school year which actually included a drop in school tax of 4 of a cent from 44.8 for this year to 44.4 in 1997.

Although the decreased tax rate means only about \$9,000 in lost revenue to the school system, board member Doug Mullins said that he disagreed with lowering the tax rate, calling it a "pet peeve" of his. Mullins also said that Superintendent Larry Hammond note his objection to the tax rate in the minutes of the meeting.

Board member Terry Burton, who seconded the motion to approve the budget and tax rate said that he felt the board should lower the tax rate when possible if they could maintain the same level of service to students in the county. Although objecting to the new rate Mullins voted with the rest of the members in passing the \$16 million dollar budget.

The lion's share, about \$9 million of the budget will go to instruction of students, which includes the salaries of teachers, instructional assistants, principals and administrators.

After a lengthy discussion the board approved the creation of a new teaching position at RCHS for a Behavior Disorder Unit.

Superintendent Hammond told the board there was a need for such a unit that will serve four to five students will behavior problems.

Some of the members voiced concern about paying a full-time

teacher for such a small number of students, especially board member Dwight Griffin, who said that parents with "normal" children may question the action because of the expense involved. Hammond told the board that if there was no need for the unit in the future it would not be funded.

The board also approved an agreement with the National Cave Rescue Commission Central Region.

The group will use the Rockcastle County High School and some of their buses next June for training.

The rescuers will also train in areas during the weeklong training, which will bring about 275 rescue personnel to the county. This year's training was held in Arkansas.

The board also agreed to meet at Roundstone Elementary for their October meeting on the 8th and they will meet in December at Brodhead Elementary on the 10th.

Superintendent Hammond also presented his lengthy personnel report to the board for the period from August 14 to September 10.

Chris Frith, Jennifer Doan, Della Scoggin and Nancy Lake were hired as substitute teachers and Allene Cornelius was hired as an English teacher at RCHS.

Jerry Reynolds was hired as a full-time custodian and assistant basketball coach at RCHS. Ronnie Bullock and Tracy Barron were hired in food service at RCHS and Sheryl Bullock, Joan Northern and Melissa Paret were hired as full-time in-

Points East

One evening last week I was digging a post hole and noticed something glistening in a scoop of dirt. At first I thought it was a piece of glass, but when I picked it up and rubbed the soil away, it turned out to be a perfect porcelain marble. Sky blue with little red specks in it. It's the third or fourth one I've found in the vicinity over the last five years.

It was about a foot deep, the same level that I've found pieces of old medicine bottles, horses and mule shoes, pieces of harness and even a button or two when it's time to plow the garden every Spring. I'm betting that young boys gathered in the barn yard on summer evenings just before dark to play rolley holey, taps, Christmas tree or even keeps when their parents weren't looking.

I haven't played marbles since the eighth grade and that was thirty-five years ago. But when I was a school

boy, one's sack of marbles was often his most prized possession. I can remember walking three or four miles on Saturdays to trade marbles or traveling to Whitesburg to blow the profits from my *Grit* newspaper route a bag or two of cat eyes or porcelain beauties.

The boys on Blair Branch, all of whom walked to school, would show up an hour or more before classes to play marbles. We would spend our recesses and lunch hours knuckled down and then, after evening chores were done, we'd gather at predetermined homes on the holler to play again until dark, often times in the middle of the road.

Many of the games were complex. A book could surely be written on the different marble games and the rules that went with them. However it was against school and most family rules to play any game that involved keeping or winning another fellow's

marbles. Many families and teachers considered such games gambling. A typical keeps game involved making a round circle and having every player ante up two or three marbles which were placed wherever he chose to put them in the circle.

Players "lagged" or tossed their marbles from behind the circle toward a straight line some fifteen feet away to determine shooting order.

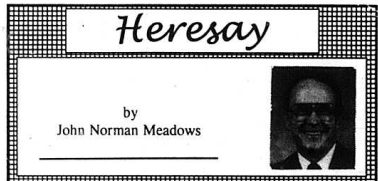
The object of the game was to knock as many marbles out of the circle as possible and you keptal you knocked out. That's an over simplification because there were all kinds of rules associated with killing another player by hitting his "tail" or shooting marble with your own and so forth.

Another game that didn't involve keeps was called Christmas tree and involved shooting all the marbles off of a Christmas tree. Rolly Holey

involved shooting your tail into a series of small depressions in the ground. You gained extra shots by knocking other players away and the object was to finish all the holes before anyone else.

Marbles went the same way as most other children's games when the grade schools were consolidated. School recreation commenced being centered around organized team sports or activities planned and orchestrated by the teachers. I'd wager that most elementary school kids today wouldn't know what a marble was if you showed them one and then they'd have no idea what it was used for.

So I'm sending the one I found the other day to my friend Byron Crawford at the Courier Journal. Byron collects marbles and has several buckets full. And a fellow with one marble in his pocket can't get into a game of keeps.



PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and explications from the somewhat soggy Plains of Wab, native soil of the erstwhile Filibus'B. Umptier, long-time local representative to the Kentucky legislature and part-time auctioneer for Bjong's Land-A-Plenty Realty Company, who, being a faithful member of Wab'd's Blue Moon Generally Baptist Church, gave preachers a word of advice, whenever he could. Addressing the '33 graduating class of The Greater Wab'dian School of Prophets and Pastors, he said, "Gentlemen, if you don't *boil it down*, the congregation will have to sweat it out. Then he added, "And

they will sweat it out - for a while - after which you're apt to find yourself just out."

Our new bridge is an architectural wonder, clearly displaying modernity in design while retaining the spirit of bridges past. You cannot see it from Wab'd's main thoroughfare, Highway 2549, best as known as Old 461. You must turn onto Keith Sowder Road, which runs south past my kitchen door. And there, just across from my backyard fence in the bottom, you can see this magnificent transport that spans the creek, which during the heavy rains we've had lately became a swelling tide, like the one we used to sing about in *On Jerden's Stormy Banks I Stand*.

Sunday's festivities at the bridge were quite special. We had horse shoe pitching, tobacco-spitting, mumbletypeg, figure whittling, and dinner on the grounds, topped off with watermelon and apple-pie. Let me, on behalf of all Wab'donians, thank everyone who helped make it a glorious day, especially the Greater Wab'd-Spino-Quail Housekeepers' Society, who provided that exceedingly scrumptious repast.

The ceremony itself will long be remembered because our bridge is a thing of beauty, stately standing there against the backdrop of Norton's Mount, which here and there flashed autumn hues.

And who can forget the speech given by The Honorable Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court, Joseph E. Lambert? One of Wab'd's very own, he was well aware of ole Filibus' advice. His well thought-out and well-worded, twenty-minute oration entitled *More Than A Bridge* was well received.

The most thrilling moment, however, was the actual christening of the bridge itself. In true Wab'donian fashion, County Judge Buzz Carlifus stood in the middle of the bridge, uncorked a bottle of moonshine, poured an ounce or two into the swirling Skeggian waters, emptied the remainder on the pavement of the bridge, and exuberantly exclaimed, "O bridge, mighty and resplendent! I joyfully christen thee 'THE DUNGEMORE MEMORIAL INTERNATIONAL BRIDGE.'"

The crowd applauded vigorously, well aware that the bridge's name harkened to the past but also pointed to the future. For those of you who are non-Wab'donians, let me explain.

(Attentive *Heresay* readers will note that I dispensed some of the following information in my column about a year ago. But it is worth repeating in that this sketch gives more detail and reminds all Wab'donians of this land's most memorable past. And, it also affords those who, unfortunately, did not get to read that particular *Heresay* a plethora of historical data.)

"Dungemore," dear hearts, refers to the cave in the side of Norton's Mount, up above our bridged creek, just above the tree line, the one I called "the cave with no name" for a year or two before a kind, elderly Wab'donian told me that, as a child, she had heard it called "Dungemore's Cave." She, however, did not know how it got that name.

Curious and historically-minded as I am, I had to know. I logged on to the Internet, and after hours and hours of searches, I came upon a web site data bank maintained by a college in western North Carolina. There I learned that an Indian, named Dungemore, had settled in what is now the Asheville area of North Carolina, having migrated there from "a place in *kinnakit* named *hatta doodhan hekani qunni sarsarabum*."

While the data source did not give a translation of that phrase, it appeared to me, linguist that I am, to be an ancient form of the present Cherokee language, one that predates the dialect used by the

Cherokee when they sided with the British during the American Revolution.

So sometime before my back got so bad I couldn't travel, I made a trip to The Smokies and eventually found an old Indian named Sam Hihat who ran a curio shop at the foot of Mt. Mitchell, and who was proud to tell me the tradition of the Cherokee in that area. From him I got the whole story.

Dungemore, Sam said, was a Cherokee chief who was overthrown by his "Tennessean" tribal council when he enacted some measures that snucked off liberation in that they gave squaws too much say-so about what went on inside the tepees.

Banned from *hatta balda heham*, "land of bog and hominy," Dungemore made his way up into *kinnakit*. Because of a mighty blizzard, he and his squaws, Tihlapoph (Tiptoes-with-Whistlepigs), took refuge in a cave on the side of mountain above the confluence of two streams of water.

National School-To-Work Week is September 14-21

National School-to-Work Week began on September 14, 1996 with the telecast of the Miss America Pageant. Miss America Shawnet Smith has spent much of the past year traveling the United States on behalf of the School-to-Work initiative.

Miss Smith has visited Kentucky on several occasions to attend School-to-Work events and to tape Public Service Announcements for the state.

J.D. Hoye, Director of the National School-to-Work Office has been chosen by Miss Smith to be the recipient of the Miss America Organization's "Woman of Achievement Award."

School-to-Work Opportunities, a

community-wide initiative in Rockcastle, is part of the nationwide effort to raise young people's academic and workplace skills.

School-to-Work better prepares all kids for career and academic success in a changing economy. Students have the opportunity to develop career awareness at the elementary level and engage in career exploration at the middle school level. On-the-job training, at the high school level, is closely integrated with classroom lessons. Students achieve academically and gain the real-world skills and experience they need to succeed.

Business and industry, in turn, gain access to the highly trained and edu-

cated workers it wants. High academic standards are required for the college bound and noncollege bound alike.

Locally, School-to-Work is making a steady and strong impact, in Local Labor Market Area 16, which consists of Estill, Garrard, Jackson, Lincoln, Madison, Powell and Rockcastle Counties. LLMA16 was awarded a \$282,000 continuation grant for the 1996-97 fiscal year which began July 1 and runs through June 30, 1997. This will mark the second year of implementation for the labor market. The award came from the Workforce Development Cabinet in early June. LLMA16 was among 22 grant recipients or more than \$6 million in federal funds. This is the third year of a five-year funding cycle for the LLMA. The LLMA received a \$50,000 grant in 1994 and a second grant of \$250,000 ran from October 1, 1996 to June 30, 1996.

LLMA16 is supported by a Local Partnership Council which consists of business, industry, labor, education, post-secondary, government, community organizations, and many other partners. The Local Partnership Council meets quarterly and provides information relative to the implementation of the 1994 School-to-Work Opportunities Act signed

by President Clinton. 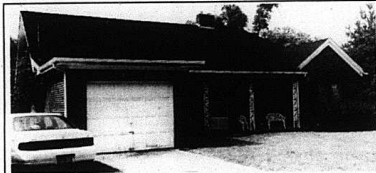

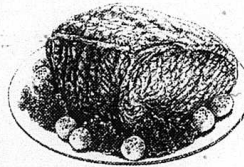

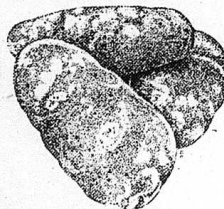

Extension Home Economics News

Appetizers

(Hot or Cold)

Appetizers are now prepared year 'round. They are served not only at formal dinners, but also for simple dinners, buffet suppers and as party refreshments.

Serving small portions of food with beverages before a meal helps to serve a couple of purposes: it helps put your guests at ease, and gives you extra time to put the main course on the table.

When serving appetizers, food safety is always a concern. Hot appetizers should be kept hot with warming dishes. Cold foods should be served in small amounts and replenished from the refrigerator. Be especially careful when serving egg products, mayonnaise, seafood and poultry.

Instead of serving an overwhelming variety of appetizers, it is wiser to prepare a few that complement each other.

Food often looks more enticing if some of it is arranged on different levels on the serving dish. It is a good idea to arrange several small plates that are easily replaced or replenished than one big one that may be difficult to keep looking

attractive.

Here's an appetizer that is easy to prepare and serve:

CHEESE BALL

- 10 ounces grated Cheddar cheese
- 4 3-ounce pkgs. cream cheese or low-fat cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 cup snipped parsley
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Let cheeses soften at room temperature. Combine cheeses, onion and Worcestershire sauce. Blend well.

using electric mixer. Stir in half of the parsley and half of the pecans. Shape into one large ball or about 72 small balls. Place in a bowl lined with waxed paper and refrigerate overnight.

About one hour before serving, remove ball from refrigerator and roll in mixture of 1/2 cup ground pecans and 1/4 cup snipped parsley. Serve with crisp crackers or fresh fruit. Yield: 1 large

cheese ball or 72 small ones. Calories: about 54 for each small ball.

RECALLED MASCARPONE CREAM CHEESE

The FDA is warning the public not to consume imported mascarpone cream cheese sold under the Gliglio, Parmalat and Sol di Valle brand names because it may be contaminated with Clostridium botulinum. Consumers are warned not to use the product for any purpose even if it does not look or smell spoiled. The product comes in 17.5 oz. containers.

Infection with botulinum can result in the following symptoms: general weakness, dizziness, double-vision and trouble with speaking or swallowing. Difficulty in breathing; weakness of other muscles, abdominal distention and constipation may also be common symptoms. People experiencing these problems should seek immediate medical attention.

Rockcastle whips Allen Central 62-0

What had been billed a good high school football game turned into a bloodletting Friday night as the Rockets destroyed Allen Central 62-0.

Seven different Rockets scored touchdowns and placekicker Raymond Blackburn set a school record with eight extra point kick conversions as the Rockets kept their perfect record intact at 3 and 0.

The Rockets set several school records including most points, breaking the record of 60 set last year against Pike County Central in the same Renfro Valley Jamboree Bowl. The Rockets have won four of five bowl games sponsored by the famous entertainment complex.

Senior Jason Brown was named most valuable offensive player for his 118 yards on just nine carries and two touchdowns, and junior Dusty McClure received defensive player of the game honors for his two interceptions and one fumble recovery. McClure ran one of his interceptions back 50 yards for a score and added two solo tackles to his defensive stats.

In three games McClure has picked off five passes which also ties an interception record by a Rocket. Last year in 12 games Ronnie Vanzant picked off five passes.

"We jumped on them early and our defense held them to just nine yards of total offense," head coach Tom Larkey said. "Our kids played well," Larkey said.

The Rocket win pushed them to a 20th place ranking overall in the Louisville Courier-Journal's statewide poll and a fifth place ranking in class 2A.

The Rocket scoring started on their first drive when senior Jon Cromer scored on a 5 yard run. Cromer would pick up his second touchdown a few minutes later when he scored from 11 yards out. The Rockets led 14-0 at the end of the first period and, after touchdowns by Jason Brown, who scored twice in the second period, Dennis Miller, Dusty McClure and Anthony King, the Rockets led 48-0 at half-time.

Miller scored after he picked up a Allen Central fumble on the two yard line and McClure scored on the 50 yard interception return. King scored on his only carry of the game, a 30 yard fun from scrimmage.

The Rocket starters got a breather in the second half as the younger Rocket players saw most of the action in the final two periods, but that didn't stop the scoring barrage.

In the third period, sophomore Henry Bryant scored on a 24 yard run and in the fourth quarter sophomore fullback Andrew Carrera scored his first touchdown of the year on a 2 yard carry.

The Rockets were led on defense by senior Ronnie Vanzant with eight tackles and assists.

Recovering fumbles for the Rockets were Slade Calhoun, Dennis Miller and McClure.

McClure also had the two interceptions and Josh Hendrickson and Andrew Giesler each picked off a pass.

Miller, Jason Brown and Brian Scalf all sacked the Allen Central quarterback.

Besides Vanzant's eight tackles and assists, Calhoun had 1, Anthony King, 2, Brooks Ingram, 2, David Coffey, 6, Mike Muncy, 3, Jon Cromer, 4, Miller, 4, Brown, 6, Chris Bishop, 2, Malcolm Shepherd, 1, McClure, 2, Henry Bryant, 2, Josh Hendrickson, 3, Andrew Giesler, 3, Jason Dillingham, 1, Andrew Carrera, 1, Andy Hale, 1, Daniel Forbes, 1, and Brian Scalf, 1.

Besides Brown's 118 yards, Jon Cromer picked up 41 yards on five carries, Chris Bishop had 23 yards on three carries, Andrew Carrera, 36 yards on six carries, Anthony King, 30 yards on one carry, Henry Bryant, 18 yards on two carries, Gary Coffey, 22 yards on three carries, Derrick Bradley, one yard on two carries and Jeff Linville and Malcolm Shepherd each carried the ball once for no yardage.

Shepherd was also 0-2 passing.

The Rockets toughest test of the season will come Friday night when Garrard County will come to town. The Golden Lions are ranked third in

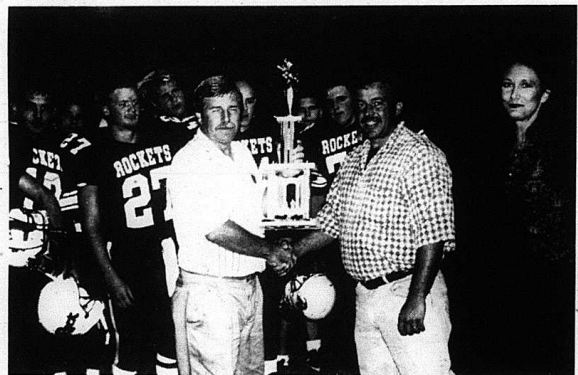
IA in the state and possess great speed, quickness and experience.

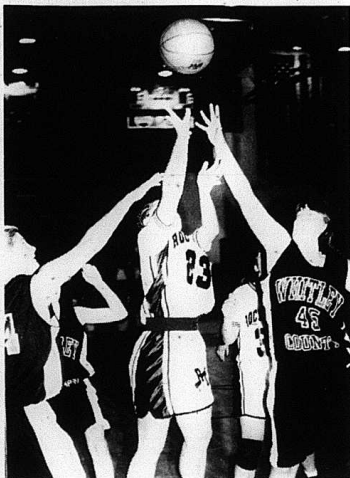

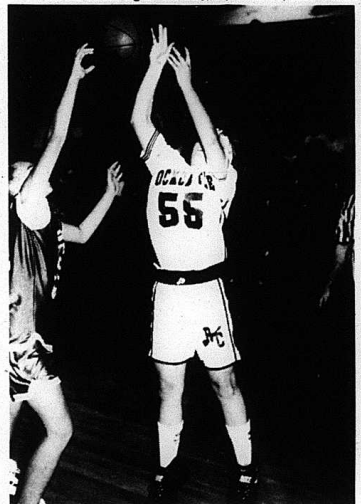

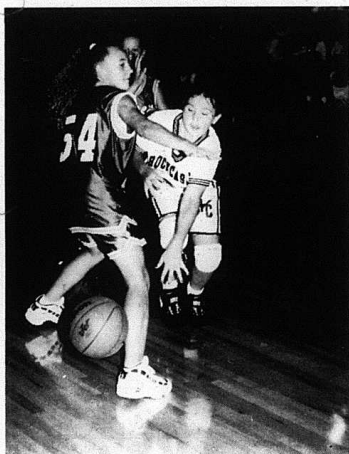

"It is Written"

In Acts 17:30 we read, *And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent.* Again the scripture saith, *And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem.* Luke 24:47. May we study for a few moments on the subject of repentance.

Producers who need to make farm improvements may sign-up for the Interim EQUIP program. This program is being purchased in to replace the current Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). Practices in this program include: diversions, critical areas, sediment retention, water or erosion control, stream protection, animal waste system, permanent wildlife habitat, shallow water areas for wildlife. Special practices have been developed to address unique problems such as: waste utilization, filter strips, and heavy use areas.

CES then delivers the ballots, challenges and other voting materials to FSA. FSA will count ballots and add volume of production on October 16. Agriculture News

Warden Alexander, Director
The Rockcastle County Farm Service and Natural Resource Conservation Service Agencies are scheduled to move to a new location October 1, 1996. The new Service Center will be located on Hwy. 150, approximately 3 miles south of Mt. Vernon. Office hours will be Monday-Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., except for legal holidays, when the offices will be closed.

Effective August 21, 1996, the Farm Service Agency Administrator declared a major disaster in eight KY counties due to damages and losses caused by excessive rainfall and flooding, which occurred on July 19, 1996. In addition to these eight counties, 19 other KY counties are named as contiguous counties where eligible family farmers to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, Rockcastle County is one of the 19 counties

named. EM applications will be received through August 21, 1997 for SEVERE PHYSICAL LOSSES ONLY and applications pending on completed. EM loans will be made under Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) Instruction 1945-D.

Producers who elected not to take out the FCIC insurance should contact the office to make sure that they have signed the FSA-570, Waiver of Insurance. This must be on file prior to picking up your marketing card for 1996. This form must also be on file no later than September 30 if you are participating in the AMTA program (new 7 year program).

Producers who have FCIC insurance through the FSA office and experience conditions which affect their insured crop need to contact the office as soon as possible to complete disaster credit forms which pertain to their insurance coverage.
