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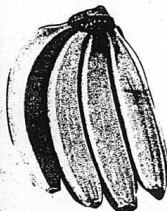

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Combined Final Notification and Finding of No Significant Environmental Impact

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Development (RD) has received an application for federal assistance from the Western Rockcastle Water Association, SAI #KY960430-0317. The specific elements of this proposed action consists of adding additional waterlines, replacing 4,000 feet of transmission line and paint one storage tank and upgrade a booster station.

USDA/RD has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that the location of the proposed action and determined that the location of the proposed water system construction would impact the 100-year floodplain. It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoid this impact. The basis of this determination is as follows:


- The floodplain could be impacted by the construction of the proposed water system due to stream crossings.
- The proposed water system must be located within the floodplain in order to serve the proposed customers.
- The applicant will be required in the RD Letter of Conditions to amend its bylaws whereby it will deny service to any new customer planning to build in a floodplain.
- The proposed action conforms to applicable state and local floodplain protection standards.
- The waterlines will be laid on public right-of-ways, where necessary, to avoid impacts on any prime farmland and/or wetlands or endangered species habitat that may be in the vicinity.
- There are no cooperating agencies on this project.

It was also determined that the proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment nor will an environmental impact statement be required.

Any written comments regarding these determinations should be provided within 15 days of this publication to Mr. Thomas G. Fern, State Director, Rural Development, 771 Corporate Drive, Suite 200, Lexington, Kentucky 40503. USDA/RD will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen day period. Requests to review the USDA/RD environmental assessment upon which this determination is based or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the USDA/RD District Office, 95 South Laurel Road, London, KY 40741.

Man beaten in Florida dies here

A Florida man was dead on arrival at the Rockcastle Hospital Monday morning.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said Tuesday that a preliminary autopsy report indicated that Billy Gene Bolander, 65, of Grove City, Florida probably died of natural causes. Dowell said that he and police initially thought that Bolander may have been beaten to death, but that apparently wasn't the case.

The coroner said that a traveling companion of Bolander's told authorities that Bolander had been beaten up in a "Gay Bashing" in Florida a few days ago.

Dowell said that Bolander's companion, who told authorities that he was gay, had agreed to drive Bolander to his hometown of Bryant, Ohio.

Dowell said the two men stopped Sunday night in Mt. Vernon, enroute to Ohio, and when the traveling companion of Bolander's awakened Monday morning he realized Bolander was having problems. He notified Econo Lodge personnel who in turn called for an ambulance.

A Rockcastle County High School senior died Tuesday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington after she was injured in an auto accident in Madison County.

Shala Engle, 17, of Scaffold Cane was one of five people involved in the single-car wreck on Scaffold Cane Road, (HWY. 1617) Monday night. According to Kentucky State Police Officer Christopher Crockett, who worked the wreck, Deborah Jackson, 18, of Scaffold Cane, apparently lost control of her 1987 Chevrolet Celebrity, which dropped off the shoulder of the road and hit a tree on the passenger side.

Crockett said that Jackson and Engle, both of whom were riding in the front seat of the car, were taken to the Berea Hospital and then flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Tuesday night a U.K. hospital spokesman said that Ms. Jackson was still listed in critical condition in the intensive care unit.

Also injured in the accident were Charles Walter Alexander, Dwight Jackson and Amanda Jackson.

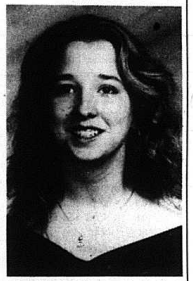
Amanda Jackson, a sixth grade student at Rockcastle County Middle

Judge appoints 3 new members to Northern board

Northern Rockcastle County Water District will soon be a part of the Western Rockcastle Water Association, County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolis told the Rockcastle County Fiscal at a called meeting last Thursday.

Only the approval of the Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) in Frankfort stands in the way of the merger. The PSC has had the plans for the district for over a year, unapproved.

The Judge-Executive told the court that if Western was set-up as a district instead of an association the approval would have already come from Frankfort.

But, Western has already taken over the daily operation of Northern and on Thursday the Judge-Executive appointed three new members to the Northern board: Denver Burton, who heads Western Water was placed on the board for three years, Eddie Hamm was appointed for two years and Western's attorney Jerry J. Cox was appointed to the board for one year.

The three men replace Byron Baker, Roger Parsons and Wayne Sparks who resigned after Western took over operation of Northern. "In approving the new members, Judge Carlolis said, "the fiscal court took this action to insure that the Northern section of the county will continue to have water service."

In other action, the court gave their approval to the County Judge to borrow \$50,000 for the general fund until property tax money becomes available to the county.

The Judge told fiscal court members that a shortfall occurred in general fund receipts for the county when the state reclassified the county's coal producing status.

Rockcastle County Treasurer Joe Clontz said that about \$78,000 was received by the county last year from the state as part of coal severance money, but that only \$30,000 was received this year.

"Normally we would borrow money from other county funds, such as jail or road, but both of those funds are strapped right now," Clontz said. "The jail fund is low because of

jail renovation and juvenile bills and the road fund is low because of work at the Copper Creek slide," Clontz said.

"We paid \$180,000 for work done on that project, but that money will be reimbursed to us by the federal government," Clontz said.

The Judge told the court that the money would be paid back by mid-December.

Durham seeking probation for Marjorie Montgomery

Friends of Marjorie Gail Montgomery, 35, say she was battered and abused by her boyfriend for several months before their relationship ended in tragedy.

Donna Durham, a close friend of Montgomery's said that Montgomery's guilty plea in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week, in the death of William Carpenter, 69, should never have happened.

Montgomery pled guilty to a lesser charge of manslaughter in connection with Carpenter's death last November. She had been charged with murder.

But, Durham said the plea was entered because Montgomery wasn't mentally stable enough to handle any more court proceedings that involved the shooting. Durham said Montgomery's mental condition is a direct result of the abuse she received from Carpenter throughout their relationship.

But Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael paints a much different picture about the situation that

ended in Carpenter's death. Carmichael said last Friday that Montgomery had beaten up on Carpenter at various times before his death and that both Carpenter and Montgomery had gotten emergency protection orders from the court against each other.

Carmichael said that witnesses to the shooting testified that Montgomery shot Carpenter after he passed out on a couch and that she was provoked the night of the shooting.

"He passed out on the couch and she laid a gun between his eyes and shot him," Carmichael said.

The Commonwealth Attorney said that because of statements by witnesses and the fact that Montgomery was apparently not provoked the night of the shooting, he was recommending a ten year sentence.

But Durham doesn't think Carmichael's assessment is correct and has circulated several petitions throughout the county requesting that Montgomery receive probation for her actions. Durham said that Montgomery feared for her life on a

daily basis during the time she and Carpenter knew each other and that she shot Carpenter in self-defense.

Montgomery is scheduled to be sentenced on December 9th and Durham is requesting that people

concerned about what she called an injustice should also write letters of support on Montgomery's behalf.

PUBLIC NOTICE FOR LAA ELECTION FOR COMMUNITY C. The Rockcastle FSA Committee election will be held this year on December 2, 1996. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters on Monday, November 18. In order for ballots to be valid, they must be received and/or post-marked no later than Monday, December 2, in the county office. Community C (LAA#3) is made up of the northeast and southeast section of Rockcastle County bound by Garrard, Madison, Jackson and Laurel counties. Highway boundaries for Community C are Little Hurricane Road, I-75, and Highway 25. Nominations for Community C include Joe C. Bullen, Thomas W. Coffey, Benda Hamilton and Troy Williams. Ballots must be tabulated in the county office no later than December 9. Exact date and time of ballot tabulation will be publicized at a later date.

Letters were mailed to AMTA participants on November 4, regarding any changes that may need to be made to the contracts. If you wish to change advance payment requests, the form enclosed with the letter should be filled out and returned to the office no later than December 1. Advance payments are made on December 15 and January 15, according to the date selected. If you do not wish to receive advance payments, the final payments are issued September 30 of each fiscal year. If you need to change producers who receive payments, or information other than advance payment requests, you need to come into the office to sign a revised contract.

Producers who have not received their tobacco marketing card by mail should contact the office to see what paperwork has not been completed. Cards cannot be issued until required paperwork is complete.

Effective August 21, 1996, the FSA Administrator declared a major disaster in eight KY counties due to damages and losses caused by excessive rainfall and flooding, which occurred on July 19, 1996. In addition to these eight counties, 19 other KY counties are named as contiguous counties where eligible family farm-

ers may qualify for FSA EM (Emergency) Physical loss assistance, pursuant to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act. Rockcastle County is one of the 19 contiguous counties named. EM applications will be received through August 21, 1997 for SEVERE PHYSICAL LOSSES ONLY and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

The continuous sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) began September 4 and is intended to be available indefinitely. Eligible land for enrollment in CRP includes cropland that has been planted or considered planted to an AG commodity in any 2 of the 5 crop years, 1992 through 1996, that is

physically and legally capable of being cropped. The acreage must be determined eligible and suitable by NRCS for any of the following practices: filter strips, riparian buffers, shelter belts, living snow fences, field

windbreaks, grassed waterways, salt tolerant vegetation, and shallow water areas for wildlife. Contracts shall not be less than 10 nor more than 15 years in duration. Interested parties should contact FSA for more information.

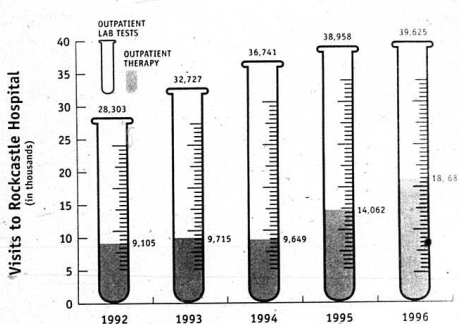

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Season ends as Rebels beat Rockets in OT

It was another excellent season, another good record and another defeat in the state play-offs for the Rockcastle County Rockets.

The Rockets were knocked out of the play-offs Friday night by the Boyle County Rebels 17-14 in overtime.

Boyle County is the same team that defeated Rockcastle a year ago, 14-13.

The Rockets have been eliminated from play-off action six straight years by a team from Boyle County.

Four straight years, the Danville Admirals defeated the Rockets and the past two of the Rebels have done the damage.

But, the Rockets suffered more than the loss to the Rebels, senior quarterback Malcolm Shepherd was put out of the game in the second quarter with a knee injury.

Head Coach Tom Larkey said that Shepherd would have to undergo surgery to repair his knee.

"He is a tough young man, who played hard for us all season and we will do what we can to help him get well," Larkey said.

The Rockets took the lead in the first quarter when sophomore Andy Hale scampered around left end on a ten yard run that culminated when Hale dived across the goal line.

The touchdown was set up by the Rockets only pass completion of the game a nine yarder from Shepherd to receiver Dusty McClure. McClure's catch and run kept the Rocket drive alive. Placekicker Raymond Blackburn kicked the extra point and it looked as if the Rockets would avenge their 1995 loss to the Rebels.

But, the Rebels sophomore quarterback, Bart Johnson, rallied his troops on the very next possession when he found a receiver in the Rocket's end zone on a 10-yard touchdown completion.

Johnson, who threw for 173 yards on the night, also completed a middle screen pass on that drive that went for

50 yards to set up the tying touchdown.

After Shepherd went down, backup Chris Bishop took over the controls.

Bishop, who had only taken a few snaps from center this season, had some trouble in the early going getting his timing on the muddy field, but settled down to do a good job running the offense.

"Chris did a heck of a job, he was put in a bad situation and he performed well for us," Larkey said.

"We weren't able to run some of our plays, because we had only put some of them in a few weeks ago, but we still managed to hold our own on offense," Larkey said.

The Rockets took the lead again in the third quarter when big Jon Cromer scampered 92 yards around left end. He was helped along by a great block from McClure on the left end.

"Jon probably impressed some college scouts with that run," Larkey said.

"A big back running as well as he did on that wet field didn't hurt his chances any at getting a scholarship," Larkey said.

Cromer's run and Blackburn's extra point kick gave the Rockets the lead once again at 14-7.

But Johnson brought his team back to tie the game at 14-14 and send it into overtime.

Rockcastle got the ball first in overtime and got it to the one yard line, facing fourth down.

"Everybody in the place probably knew we were going to give it to Jon (Cromer), but what else do you do when you're in that situation, that close to the goal line," Larkey said.

Most of the fans and even some of the players thought Cromer scored on the play, even one official gave a touchdown signal, but the coach said that the football didn't break the plane of the goal line. "He got part of his

upper body across, but the ball was slippery and he couldn't get it high enough to break the plane," Larkey said.

Boyle County then got the ball and the Rocket defense, which played well all night long, held them on three straight plays, bringing up a fourth down situation for them.

The Boyle County placekicker, who had missed a game winning field goal only minutes before would not be denied this time, as he nailed the game winner in overtime.

"I can't say enough about our team, especially our linemen, who played hard all year and made holes for our backs, when many times we were outmanned," Larkey said.

"No one likes to lose, but in all honesty we were beat up bad. By the end of the season our starting tailback, fullback and quarterback were gone and many of our other players played with nagging injuries every week," the coach said.

Cromer led the offense with 195 yards on 22 carries, while Hale had 19 yards on five carries and Andrew Gisher, Anthony King and Shepherd all had seven yards.

On defense, the Rockets allowed Boyle County 173 yards in the air, but held their ground game to just 75.

Anthony King led the Rockets with 11 tackles and assist, while linebacker Dennis Miller stepped in to make 10 tackles and assists.

David Coffey recovered a Boyle County fumble and was in on five tackles. Mike Muncy recorded the Rockets only quarterback sack and was in on six tackles.

Ronnie Vazant had four solo tackles and an assist. Rocket captain Slade Calhoun had one solo tackle and two assists, while linebacker Brooks Ingram was in on four tackles.

Besides gaining nearly 200 yards, Cromer was in on seven tackles and Shepherd got one before he was put out of the game.

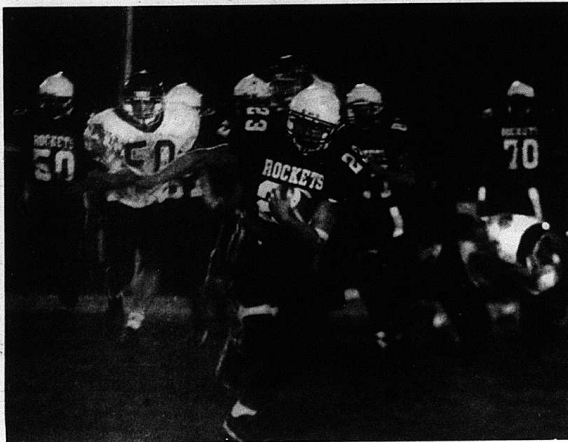
Hale had two solo tackles and two assists, as did McClure.

Andy Hale scored the first touchdown of the night for the Rockets on a 10 yard run.

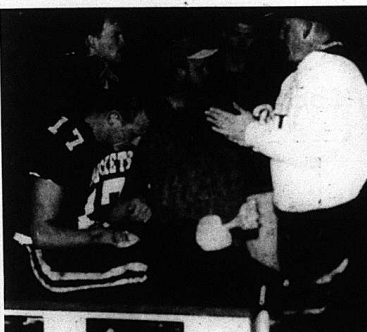


Jon Cromer scored the Rocket's second touchdown on a 92 yard run in the third quarter.

Malcolm Shepherd was put out with a knee injury midway through the second quarter and will have to have surgery to repair his knee.

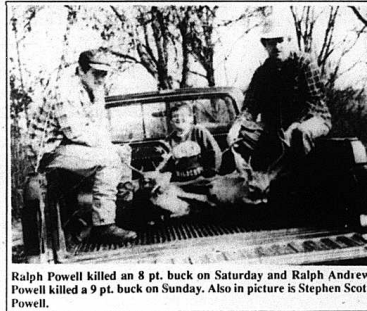

The writer of the letter forgot to tell you that he was in the city park tearing up a bench that was concreted into the ground. After being told many times that the law had been called, he still would not leave. Everything else took place after he tried to fight several other people.

Why do you complain about Fire and Rescue members responding to emergencies without being paged and say nothing about your best buddy, a convicted felon with a Revoked E.M.T. license, using a scanner to race to scenes in her Blue Mini-Van? She raced down to where Russell was killed (drove past, turned around and drove back past to town.) Fire Chief Sam Stallsworth was going to Barbourville with a school bus and drove up on that scene. What was your buddy's excuse? She also raced to YOUR scene after S.O. was dispatched to the radio.

As long as the local Ambulance Service people go home at 4 p.m. and are paged to come to the hospital and get an ambulance to respond to emergencies we will try to help people waiting for an ambulance (Sometimes up to 45 minutes, and only 10 miles away).

Where did you go from the time you left the park till you got to the hospital? How was the party? Who did you fight with at the party that was rumored to have cut you there? How many different versions of what happened have you told so far? Isn't it about 5?

Everyone says the County Attorney is a high school friend of your best buddy, and is scared to cross her
