Rockcastle County Schools Plan for Inclement Weather • School Closings • Early Dismissals

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on 5 radio stations and 3 television stations. They are as follows: Radio- WRVK (AM-1460), WKKO (AM-1500, FM-105.7), WV-LK (FM-93), WRSL (FM-96.3), WHAS (AM 84); Television- WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6:00 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

If the delay plan is used, breakfast will be served upon the arrival of students at school.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive early.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television stations to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up phone lines.

Rockcastle County School System Delay Plan

Occasionally, there are mornings when an additional hour is needed to check bus routes and temperatures/weather conditions sometimes can change between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. As a result, the Rockcastle County School System will consider a one hour delay in school opening due to weather conditions.

If a one-hour delay status is warranted, the delay will be announced by the following radio stations: WRVK (AM 1460), WKKO (AM 1500 and FM 105.7), WV-LK (FM 93), WRSL (FM 96.3), WHAS (AM 84), and the following television stations: WLEX (Channel 18), WKYT (Channel 27), WTVQ (Channel 36), at 6 a.m. or as soon as possible.

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed for an hour while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.

In instances of a delay schedule, breakfast will be served as soon as students arrive at school.

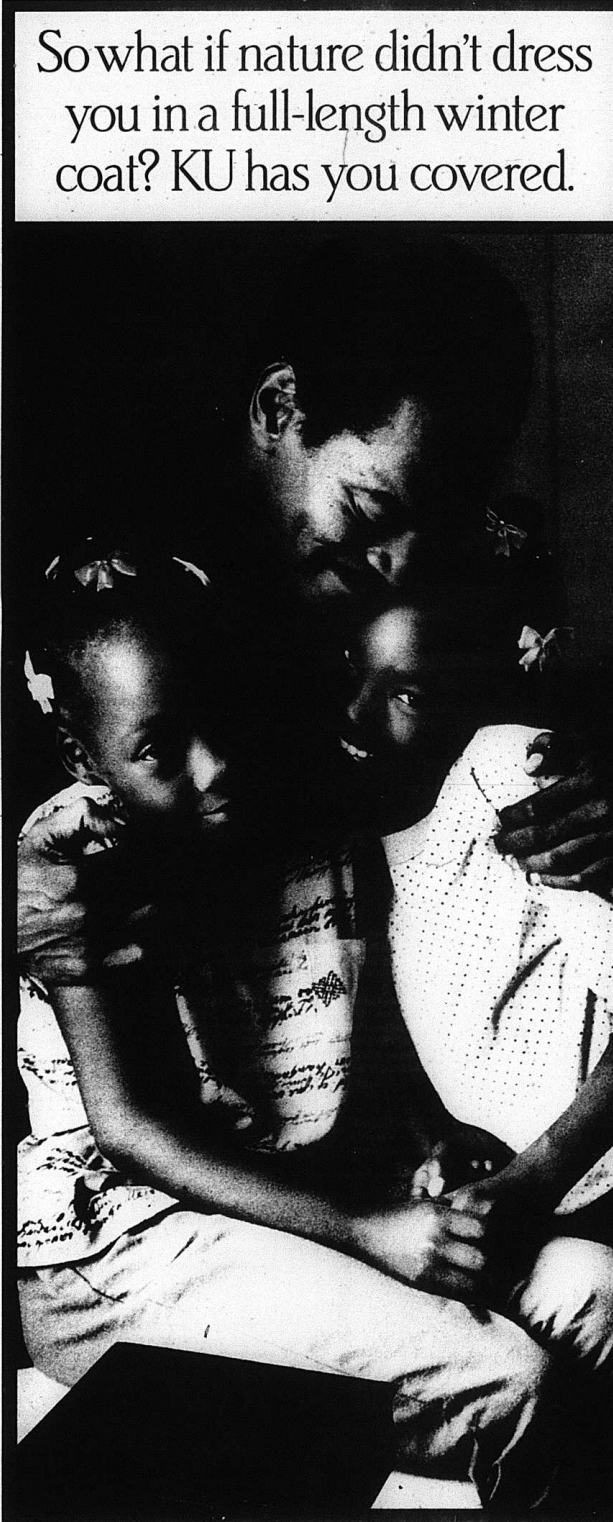

At fiscal court meeting

Judge questions transportation bills for juveniles

Who is responsible for transporting juveniles and how much should it cost the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court?

These questions, along with many others about expenses, were discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the court on Friday.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz presented the court with a bill for \$1,750 from Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith for transporting juveniles to other counties and back to Rockcastle for court. The bills were for trips made during October and November and involved about five juveniles.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis and Third District Magistrate Bill McKinney voiced their concern about the bill saying they thought that transporting prisoners was part of the Sheriff's duties.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said that according to state statute the Sheriff is required to transport prisoners, but the fiscal court is responsible for reimbursing him for his expenses.

The bills presented to the court were for lump sums such as \$50 for a trip to Richmond, \$75 for trips to Winchester or Nicholasville and \$175 for trips to Painsville.

None of the bills were itemized.

"That is the way all of the Sheriffs have billed the county and I believe the Sheriff's office should be paid for their services," Burdette said.

However, Judge Carlotis said the Sheriff could use the county vehicle assigned to the jail and cut down on his expenses and Magistrate McKinney said he thought the Sheriff's office should transport the juvenile prisoners as part of the duties of the office.

The court voted to delay payment to the Sheriff until they could discuss it with Sheriff Smith.

The court also voted to not pay two claims presented to them by Rockcastle County Court Clerk Norma Houk.

The two bills were for preparation of property tax bills and preparation of tax bills for motor vehicles and boats. The bills totaled \$3,321.60.

After the meeting Executive Secretary Anna Rose Mullins produced a KRS statute that said counties are required to pay for the preparation of the tax bills. Carlotis said that Mrs. Houk would be paid next month.

7,433 tax bills were sent out in the county. "We get it from all sides the Judge said, "the Sheriff collects the

Burley averages \$1.92 opening day

There was good news and bad news Monday for Rockcastle tobacco farmers.

The good news was the fact that tobacco sold for an average of \$1.92 a pound at most warehouses in the state. The bad news is that Rockcastle farmers are going to have 20 to 25 percent less poundage this year than normal.

Rockcastle County Extension Agent Tom Mills said Monday that Rockcastle tobacco farmers can sell about 3 million pounds of burley this year, but that isn't going to happen because of the shortage.

Mills blamed an early wet growing season and patches of blue mold throughout the county for the shortage.

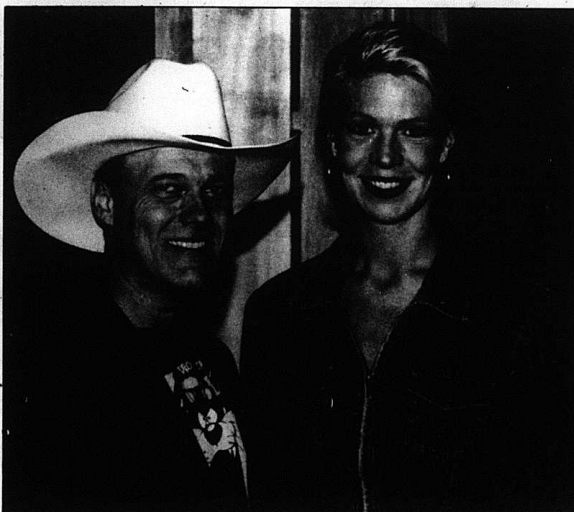
The \$1.92 price is about seven cents a pound higher than tobacco sold for a year ago and Mills believes it may even go up some after Thanksgiving.

"More cigarettes are being produced throughout the world than ever before and Kentucky farmers grow 70 percent of the burley tobacco in the world, that means a high demand for the limited crop this season and may in turn mean higher prices for the tobacco farmers," Mills said.

Mills said that Rockcastle farmers had about 60 percent of their crop stripped.

Tobacco markets will close for Thanksgiving on Thursday and Friday this week and re-open for sales on Monday.

When Loretta and I bought the old place we're in the process of fixing up. I budgeted \$500 for plumbing supplies and informed my better half that I'd do the actual installation myself.

No problem. No sweat. After all, daughter Jennif (when she was twelve years old) and yours truly had done all the plumbing to install a washer at another place we'd lived and we had torn out a wall and installed a shower at yet another.

Loretta reminded me that the latter project had involved copper pipe and that I had burn scars on my hands and arms that I will carry to my grave, that she followed me around with a fire extinguisher and that if she hadn't

been there, we wouldn't have any household possessions and Bob Noe would be minus one pretty nice house. "If you ever need brain surgery, I suppose you'll do that yourself too," she mused and penciled in \$2,000 for plumbing.

But I went into the basement of the current project and began drawing diagrams anyway. Thirty minutes later, I knew I was in trouble. The current project has a water supply coming out of two inter-connected cisterns some fifty feet apart and all the pipe is galvanized. There is at least a mile of it zigzagging under the floor and, if we ever get it all out, the waste will measure several tons. Of course, I want it all gone and I want

city/county water installed. And now that I know what all that entails, I feel immensely more qualified to perform brain surgery.

After making maybe 25 calls to seek professional plumbing help, I was ready to give up. Plumbers were telling me that they could get to me somewhere around the turn-of-the-century. I spent several evenings at Uncle Tom's Grocery, Emporium, Information Bureau, Liars Club and Un-Official Town Hall here in Paint Lick lamenting the fact that I couldn't find a plumber and crying into my Diet Dr. Pepper. (By the way, if you're ever coming through Paint Lick and you don't stop at both Uncle Tom's and Lucian Starnes' Service Station straight across the street, you will have bypassed two of the greatest treasures our part of the state has to offer. Stop and stay awhile, you'll be glad you did and the proprietors will be equally pleased to have you.)

A couple of nights later, the phone rang and Mike Horn was on the other end explaining that Tom Clark had told him all about my problems. Mike came over to the project on a Friday night and I showed him the mess. He made a page or two of notes on a long,

legal pad, advised me that he had to get to a supply store before it closed and promised he'd be back at the crack of dawn the next morning with a partner.

"About 5:30," he said and if I had believed him, I would have met him there, but I've missed hours and hours of work on numerous occasions waiting for plumbers to show up and before Mike came on the scene, I didn't have a clue to put with any of their names. Too many people in the home repair business, including plumbers, carpenters, siders, gutters and electricians, are far too long on the promise end of things and too far short of doing anything except making empty promises. Give me a call, and I can recite a long list of builders who have lied to me like dogs.

Cecil Tooley is staying in the house at night to keep an eye on things and ward off vandals. And, according to Cecil, Mike Horn and Bousie Tipton were beating on the door at 5:30 the next morning. I showed up around 9 a.m. and immediately panicked. Smoke was coming out the windows and the door to the basement. I thought the place was on fire.

Have you ever seen or smelled the smoke that welding flux can put off dear reader? In a word, it's awful. But, if men are at work and plumbing is the job you've hired them to do, smoke and odor are the way you measure that work is being done.

Mike and Bousie worked twelve hours on Saturday and thirteen on Sunday that week end and if I can get the water company to show up and install a meter, the project is ready to be turned on. They have the pipe laid from the water line into the house and all the connections mad and all the drains installed. If anybody has any pull with the Garrard County Water District, please give me a call. They're telling me it may be three weeks before they can get out here but I'm ready to go right now.

In the meantime, if you have home plumbing or electrical work, you will have a home improvement project going and you need competent, professional, all-business help and some assurance that it will be done to code at an affordable price, I'm here to tell you that the two best-kept secrets in central Kentucky are Mike Horn and Bousie Tipton. These guys love their work and they love to do it.

You can reach Mike Horn in Paint Lick at 606-925-2504. But call him after dark because he works like a horse until the sun goes down. And the only reason I'm sharing this number with you is because Mike and Bousie have kept every promise they made to me and I know for a fact that they really like to work and that includes long week ends.

When Billy Conner gets through my carpentry work and Jake Jacobs finishes up the electricity, I'll give you their numbers too. In the meantime, they don't need any more business for the next week or two. I need them to finish up here without any distractions.

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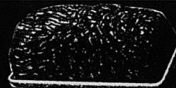

tax money the clerk gets the bills ready and we pay for everything although we only get a small portion of the property taxes," the Judge said. "It don't seem right, Magistrate McKinney said, "we get only 8 percent of the taxes and we pay all of the expenses, these other guys should have to pay their share," McKinney said.

"The school system gets approximately \$900,000, the state gets \$400,000 and we get \$157,000 and pay all the expenses," Carlotius said. "The library, the extension of office, health department and others get a share of the money and we get to pay, just like putting a new roof on the library and paying their electric bill," Carlotius said.

"The judge also told the court that he would like suggestions from the magistrates about how the county could make ends meet this year with the loss of coal severance money and the mounting juvenile bills.

Because of the lack of coal production in the county in the past two years the county was reclassified by

the state and it costs the county general fund about \$48,000.

"Juvenile incarceration bills continue to escalate and we are going to have a rough time making ends meet," the Judge said.

"It is going to be tight, but if we watch what we are doing and how much we spend, we can get by," treasurer Clontz said.

Judge Carlotius told the court the \$50,000 borrowed by the county two weeks ago for General Fund expenses will be paid back by the middle of December.

After the meeting the Signal asked County Attorney Burdette, who is responsible for prosecuting juveniles, whether there were other options in regard to rising costs. Burdette said, "I cannot back away from my obligation to prosecute juvenile offenders. I believe that by our being tough now we can alleviate the problem later. Juveniles must be responsible for their acts, because their bad acts are burdening the entire county," Burdette said.

One other note of interest, the county also received a bill from the Lincoln County Detention Center for the incarceration of five women prisoners at different times. To house the five women, one of whom is still in jail, the county was charged \$1,650.

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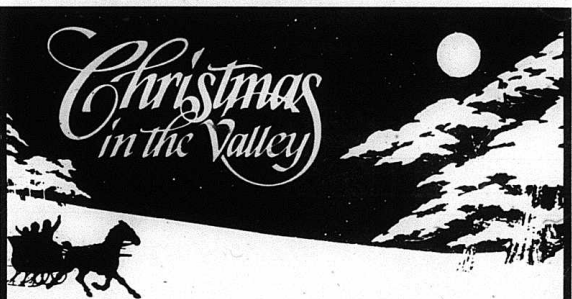
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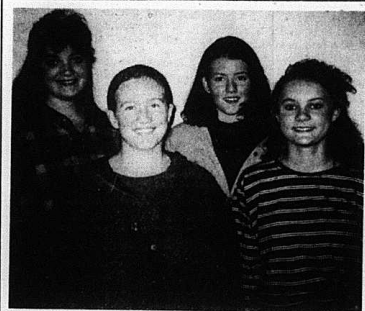
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Four chosen for All-State Chorus

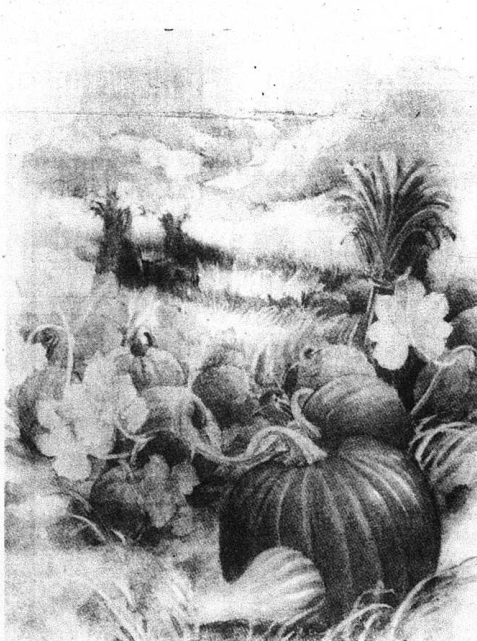

Thanksgiving Leftovers

Roasting a turkey is only done once or twice a year for most families. So, for most families extra turkey is planned for later use. Turkey that will be frozen should be sliced from the carcass and frozen immediately. The turkey can be frozen in slices or chunks. Cooked turkey should not be frozen on the carcass. If the bones will be cooked later for broth, they should be frozen in a separate container with the meat removed. Any cooked turkey should be used within 2 months. Here is a recipe to help use up some of that leftover turkey:

Kentucky Hot Brown Casserole

- 1/4 cup margarine
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups milk
- 2 chicken bouillon cubes
- 6 slices bread, toasted
- Turkey
- Ham

Shredded lowfat cheddar cheese
8 slices tomato
6 slices bacon, fried crisp and crumbled

Melt margarine in pan over low heat. Add flour, stirring until smooth. Cook one minute, stirring constantly. Gradually add milk and bouillon cubes. Cook over medium heat, stirring until thickened and bubbly. Set aside.

Place toast in buttered 13x9x2-inch baking dish. Top each slice of bread with turkey and ham. Spoon white sauce over meat. Layer cheese, tomato and crumbled bacon over sauce. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 4 servings.

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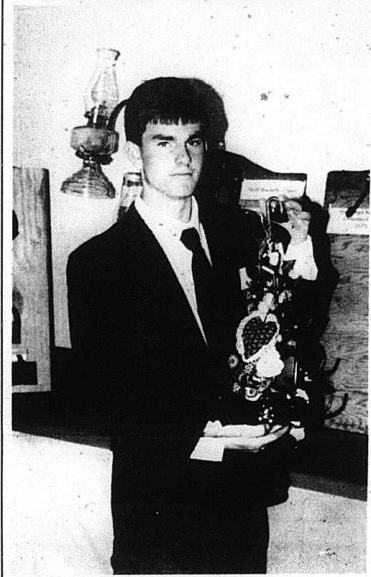

No matter how it seems, not every catalog in circulation has been stuffed in your mailbox this shopping season.

Really. Chances are you haven't flipped through the offerings from a little-known outfit called Century Free Enterprises' Distinctive Ornamental Iron Products.

But the business, born and based at Rockcastle County's vocational school, is booming.

"Our hopes were really small in the beginning," said Wendy Himes, 16, a junior in the office technology course at Rockcastle County Area Tech Center. "We thought we'd just make a dinner bell and that would be it. Now, we've got more than 20 items."

In fact, the welding and office students who created this enterprise say they are so busy with orders for mug trees, CD racks and plant hangers, they will have to wind down production early next year to focus on other academic projects.

Another sign of success came Friday. At a reception where state educators and business leaders got a close-up look at the operation, the students donated \$50 in proceeds from sales to a new scholarship fund at Berea College.

Beyond those achievements, the project has allowed students to get a taste of the work world at a time when businesses increasingly demand students who are job-ready, say teachers Ralph Baker and Patty Himes.

"We do things we wouldn't do in the real world," said Christina Judd, a 16-year-old junior. "We actually get hands-on experience in everything."

For the most part, Baker's welding classes design and manufacture the products, from napkin holders to book scrapers to basket trees.

The students in Himes' office technology program then prepare the catalog, track inventory through computer data bases and keep the books.

"It's just like a factory," said welding student, B.J. VanWinkle, 17, a senior.

Eventually, the students plan to focus on one item, such as the classic, triangle-shaped dinner bell, and market it intensively over the Internet, said Patty Himes.

For now, the students have relied on catalog and word-of-mouth sales. They set up shop at the Bittersweet Festival in Mt. Vernon earlier this year, where both classes pushed the products - with mixed success, according to the boys who took part.

"We tried to sell," B.J. said. "But the girls beat us," added classmate Derrick Payne, 17.

"We figured we're better at making it than selling," B.J. said.

The selling, nonetheless, has been steady. In roughly the past year, the group has sold \$1,500 worth of goods, Patty Himes said. When they sell all of the current inventory, the sales total will be about \$2300.

Profits go back into the business; buying welding gloves, raw materials and other equipment.

"The thing I see is the increase in self-esteem," Himes said. "I value that more than anything."

Students see other perks.

"This right here is a whole lot better than just sitting in class," said B.J., the welding student. "You get to use your hands. This is more like what we'll do when we get out."

The project at the vocational school is in its second year of operation.

"His ties to small town media in Kentucky enabled us to get out the word about Forward in the Fifth, its programs and the state of education in Kentucky in the early days," Eager said.

Winners of the Principals With Principles awards are principals who lead their faculty effectively, always put students first and welcome community and parental support and involvement. David Pensol of Roundstone Elementary was the winner from Rockcastle County.

Pensol was chosen for his support of the Library Power program, which seeks to make library media centers the heart of learning in schools.

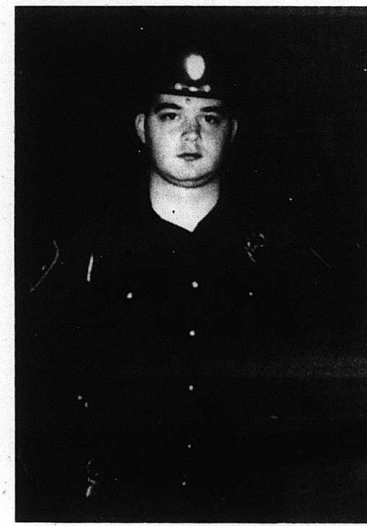
Bryant graduates from training program
