Listening to our elected officials in Frankfort trying to come up with a solution to workers' comp; I'm glad we have a few good elected officials who will stand up for the injured worker.

I'm one of those injured workers "on an entitlement program with lifetime benefits," mentioned in an article by Roger Fries.

I was injured on the job in January 1986, which resulted in 100% disability. My injury was the result of the company's negligence. My case was not approved until May of 1989.

We have OSHA and called them to check out the unsafe workplace. They made an appointment to check out that complaint. You guessed it, the company was given ample time to clean up their act. After they left, the company was back to the same old practice. I lifted a bundle of jeans and now I'm disabled. It was too late for me.

Pat Harlow of RR Donnelly & Sons complained in one article she worried about the definition of "injury" in this state. I can tell her it's the same in all states "harm or damage" to an employee. Now Governor Patton wants to change this meaning. He says he has "Black Lung" but it's more from smoking than the coal mines. When did "cancer of the lungs"

become "Black Lung"?

In another article, Pat Harlow was still complaining and worried that "limiting access to workers' comp could lead to lawsuits by workers. I say if the injured worker did this she would get a taste of what a worker goes through to prove they are injured.

Now Patton wants to limit the time to prove an injury to 90 days. That is ok as they stop your workers comp in six months.

Being injured on the job a worker's life changes. We are not where we want to be or we would be home. When our job stops our lives still go on but without a paycheck. Then we have to hire a lawyer. I know lawyers are getting put down. There are some good lawyers and there are some bad lawyers. Just as there are some good employers and some bad employers.

The injured worker has to pay all litigation to prove our case. This is not fair to the injured worker as the company and workers comp in Frankfort benefit as they have lawyers also.

It there is OSHA and KEMI, employers should made to "play by the rules," provide a safe workplace, cooperate in programs that facilitate return to work following workplace injury to those who are able to return to work and avoid practices that contribute to injury and abuse of the system.

The most important role of KEMI is to provide advice, assistance, education and training that makes the workplace a safe place to be. Why isn't this being carried out?

I applaud the House members who have stood up for the injured worker. Our own Danny Ford says, "He was going along with the Governor as he is a small business owner and I would help him." He said, "Let's pass the bill and let the Senate take care of it." I say that's just like an employer to think only of himself. If it cost the employer \$369, a year to protect a worker that's small compared to what the injured worker has to pay when he gets injured.

We would rather be making today's wages than 2/3rds of '86 wages. Now Patton wants to take away an injured worker's compensation when they are able to apply for Social Security. How low can he go? If we are injured we have a right to workers comp pay and Social Security as we are entitled to both. In Kentucky our Social Security benefits are reduced.

What right do they have to take this away? After all we are not eligible for our retirement funds with most companies.

I'm sure the Governor in the years ahead of him, will see workers comp in a different light. Or will money make a difference to him or the officials in Frankfort who are going against the injured worker?



**ORDINANCE NO. 96-11-1**

**An Ordinance Imposing a license fee upon insurance companies for the privilege of engaging in the business of insurance within the corporate limits of the City of Brodhead for the calendar year 1997 and thereafter on a calendar year basis; establishing rates as 6% of the first year premiums for all life insurance and 6% of the premiums for all other types of insurance. Except Health Insurance, actually collected during the calendar year 1997 and thereafter until amended; establishing an effective date of July 1 and a delinquency date thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar quarter; establishing a penalty interest charge at the tax interest rate as defined by statute; and requiring insurance companies subject to the license fee to furnish annual collection information.**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY**

**SECTION 1:** There is hereby imposed on each insurance company a license fee for the privilege of engaging in the business of insurance within the corporate limits of the City of Brodhead for the calendar year 1997 and thereafter on a calendar year basis.

**SECTION 2:** The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues life insurance policies on the lives of persons residing within the corporate

limits of the City of Brodhead shall be 6% of the first year's premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason the issuance of such policies.

**SECTION 3:** The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues any insurance policy which is not a life or health insurance policy shall be 6% of the premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies, on-risk, located within the corporate limits of the City of Brodhead on those classes of business which such company is authorized to transact, less all premium returned to policy holders; however, any license fee or tax imposed upon premium receipts shall not include premiums received for insuring employers against liability for personal injuries to their employees, or the death of their employees, caused thereby, under the provisions of the Worker's Compensation Act and shall not include premiums received on policies of group health insurance provided for state employees under KRS 18A.225(2) and 18A.226.

**Section 4:** All license fees imposed by this ordinance shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar quarter. License fees which are not paid on or before the due date shall bear interest at the tax interest rate as defined in KRS 131.010(6).

**Section 5:** Every insurance company subject to the license fees imposed by this ordinance shall annually, by March 31, furnish the City of Brodhead with a written breakdown of all collections in the preceding calendar year for the following categories of insurance: (a) casualty; (b) automobile; (c) inland marine; (d) fire and allied perils; (e) life.

**Section 6:** The City Clerk (or appropriate city official) of the city is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this ordinance, and any amendment thereto, to the Commissioner of Insurance, Commonwealth of Kentucky.

**Section 7:** This ordinance shall become effective on the first day of July, 1997.

Under KRS 91A.080 a city "may enact or change its license fee or rate of tax to be effective July 1 of each year on a prospective basis only." When a city enacts or changes its insurance premium tax, the commissioner of insurance must receive copies of the ordinance and all amendments at least 100 days before the effective date. Be certain to also provide the appropriate mailing address for the City. Mail the ordi-

nance to: Department of Insurance, PO Box 517, Frankfort, KY 40602.

Under KRS 91A.080, delinquent insurance premium taxes must bear interest at the tax interest rate as defined in KRS 131.010(6), and no other penalty may be imposed by cities or counties. The Secretary of Revenue is required to adjust the tax interest rate to the adjusted prime rate rounded to the nearest full percent. The new rate becomes effective January 1 of the succeeding year. The rate effective for 1988 was 9%, 1989 was 10%, 1990 was 11%, 1991 was 10% and 1992 was 8%.

**ORDINANCE NO. 96-10-2**

**An ordinance imposing a bank franchise and local deposit tax; setting forth timetables for the collection of such tax for the year 1996 and all subsequent years; and setting forth enforcement procedures, including penalties, for the collection of delinquent taxes.**

**Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky as follows:**

**Section 1:** There is hereby imposed on all "financial institutions," as defined in KRS Chapter 136, located within the corporate

limits of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, a tax on the net assets of such institutions as follows:

**C.** To require the minor to attend regular school sessions and to forbid the minor to be absent from class without parental or school permission.

**D.** To arrange proper supervision for the minor when the parent must be absent.

**E.** To take the necessary precautions to prevent the minor from maliciously or willfully destroying real, personal, or mixed property which belongs to the City of Brodhead, or is located in the City of Brodhead.

**F.** To forbid the minor from keeping stolen property, illegally possessing firearms or illegal drugs, and to seek help from appropriate governmental authorities or private agencies in handling or controlling the minor, when necessary as according to law.

**G.** To be responsible for incarceration costs should the minor be incarcerated related to any of the above.

**H.** The above listed sections do not in any way exclude or take away from Kentucky statutes applying to same or similar situations, and where in conflict, the applicable statute should take priority.

**3. Duties of Police Officer.**

**A.** A law enforcement officer upon finding or being notified of any minor at, in or upon any public assembly, building, place, street, or highway whose parent is believed to be in violation of this Ordinance may stop and question such minor and request such information as his or her name and age and the name and address of his or her parent, guardian, or person having legal custody.

**B.** If a law enforcement officer determines or has reasonable cause to believe that a curfew violation has occurred, the officer may obtain from the minor the information necessary to issue a citation to the minor's parent, and then either take the minor home or direct the minor to proceed immediately to his or her home.

**C.** Whenever a minor is arrested or detained for the commission of any delinquent act within the County of Rockcastle, the parent of the minor shall be immediately notified by the law enforcement agency located inside the confines of Rockcastle County, advising the parent of such arrest or detention, the reason therefore, and the parent's responsibility under this ordinance.

**D.** A record of such notifications shall be kept by the County of Rockcastle Sheriff's Department.

**4. Parental Violation and Penalty.**

**A.** No parent or guardian or any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years shall fail to exercise reasonable parental control over such minor. An adjudication that said minor has violated a provision of this code which is a misdemeanor or a finding that said minor is responsible for a violation of this code which is deemed a civil infraction shall be prima facie evidence that said parent or guardian failed to exercise reasonable parental control. Where in conflict with an applicable Kentucky Statute, the Statute shall take precedence.

**B.** Pursuant to the violation of this code, the parent or guardian of the minor shall be held civilly responsible for the damages caused by the commission of any delinquent act within the County of Rockcastle.

**C.** Upon the first conviction of a violation of this Ordinance, the parent shall be subject to a fine of not less than seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

**D.** Upon the second conviction of a violation of this ordinance, the parent shall be subject to a fine of not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, nor more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars. And in addition, shall be sentenced to probation with the condition that the parent participate in, through completion, a court approved, community based treatment program (such as parenting skills, family services, employment and training, etc.) and/or, at the discretion of the court, be imposed for a period of up to thirty (30) days.

**E.** Upon the third conviction or subsequent violation and conviction, the parent shall be subject to a fine or not less than two (\$200.00) Dollars, nor more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars and/or, at the discretion of the court, imprisoned for a period of up to ninety (90) days.

**5. Severability**

**A.** Should any section, subdivision, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid or unacceptable, such holding shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the ordinance as a whole or of any part thereof, other than such parts so invalidated or declared unenforceable.

**B.** Any ordinance or parts of any ordinance in conflict with any provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**C.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its adoption, recodification, and publication by the City of Brodhead, as required by law. Given first reading on the 14 day of October, 1996.

**An Ordinance Levying the Annual Ad Valorem Tax in the Corporate Limits of Brodhead, Kentucky ORDINANCE #96-10-1**

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS) require that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes; and

Whereas, KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government.

**Now Therefore Be It Ordained** by the City Council of Brodhead, Kentucky, as follows:

**Section One: Tax Levy**

**A. Real estate**  
An ad valorem tax rate of .25 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) of assessed value of real estate subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied.

**B. Personal Property**

An ad valorem tax rate of .25 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) of assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied.

**C. Motor Vehicles and Watercraft**

An ad valorem tax rate of .25 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) of assessed value on motor vehicles and watercraft subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for the year 1997.

**Section Two: Due Date**

**A.** Previous balance 2% discount not available.  
**B.** 2% discount if paid by November 15th.  
**C.** Pay face amount November 15 - January 15.

**D. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and watercraft shall become due as set forth in KRS 134.810.**

**Section Three: Delinquent Taxes**

A. 6% penalty after January 15th

**An Ordinance Relating to Parental Responsibility City of Brodhead, Kentucky Ordinance #96-10-3**

**A Parental Responsibility Ordinance establishing responsibility upon parents, guardians and persons having legal custody or minors who commit delinquent acts and/or violate the "Curfew for Minors," portion of this ordinance.**

**Be it ordained by the fiscal court of Rockcastle County, Commonwealth of Kentucky, as follows:**

**Section 1. Purpose:** This ordinance is declared necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the people of the City of Brodhead, and is intended to address situations where parents have failed to act responsibly and reasonable in the supervision of the minor children to the detriment of the general public. In enacting the curfew, the City of Brodhead acknowledges juveniles lack of experience and immature judgments. As well as a substantial increase in juvenile detention costs directly related to increasing juvenile criminal activity. That the City of Brodhead hereby adopts an Ordinance establishing responsibility upon parents and guardians of minors, including the responsibility of parents and guardians of minors who violate the "Curfew for Minors" portion of this ordinance in the City of Brodhead and imposing a penalty for the violation thereof as follows:

**1. Definitions:**

- A.** For the purpose of this section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.
- 1.** "Minor" means any person under the age of 18.
- b.** "Parent" means any person having legal custody of a minor
  - i) as a natural or adoptive parent
  - ii) as a legal guardian or
  - iii) as a person who stands in place of parents;
  - iv) as a person whom legal custody has been given by Order of Court, or by another person(s) entity with the authority to grant or transfer legal custody.
- B.** As used herein "City of Brodhead" Kentucky, shall include all of the City of Brodhead.
- C.** "Remain", means to stay behind, to tarry, or to stay unnecessarily at, upon or in any public assembly, building, place, street, or highway.
- D.** "Allegation", means to either permit or neglect to supervise with actual or constructive knowledge. Knowledge will be presumed if the circumstances be such that a reasonably prudent parent should have known the child was violating this section.
- E.** "Delinquent Acts", means those acts which violate the laws of the United States, or the statutes of the State, or the ordinances of the County or those acts which would cause or tend to cause the minor to come under the jurisdiction of the Rockcastle Juvenile Court as defined by KRS Chapter 620, but does not include traffic violations.
- F.** "Illegal Drugs", means controlled substances obtained without a legal prescription.
- G.** "Juvenile Delinquent", means those minors whose behaviour interferes with the rights of others or menaces the welfare of the community, or as otherwise described in KRS Chapter 620.

**2. Parental Duties - Curfew for Minors**

**A.** It is the continuous duty of the parent of any minor to exercise reasonable control to prevent the minor from committing any delinquent act.

**B.** Included (without limitation) in this continuous duty of reasonable parental control are the following parental duties:

- (a) To keep illegal drugs or illegal firearms out of the home and legal firearms locked in places that are inaccessible to the minor.
- (b) To know the curfew provisions of this ordinance and to require the minor to observe the curfew, which shall be:
  - (i) No child under the age of twelve (12) years shall be permitted or allowed to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
  - (ii) No child under the age of eighteen (18) years shall be permitted or caused to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.
  - (iii) Subsections (i) and (ii) of this sections shall not apply when the child is with the parent, legal guardian, or adult selected by the parent or legal guardian to be with the child or if the child is over twelve (12) years of age and is upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian and has proof of such permission, or when exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly, provided that written notice signed by the minor and countersigned by a parent is in the possession of such minor specifying when, where and in what manner said minor will be exercising such First Amendment rights.



## Mayor defends water plant expansion cost

Mt. Vernon's water plant is at peak capacity. Mayor Gary R. Cromer, said this week, responding to action last week by the city to "put" a bond issue.

Mayor Cromer appointed a committee from the council at last Monday's meeting to study proposals from three firms to handle the bond issue for the city.

"Our water plant was designed to pump 1.8 million gallons of water a day and that's what it's doing now," the Mayor said. "So, if we are to furnish more water to the county we will have to upgrade the plant," he

said.  
The Mayor said the city water plant is processing water 23 1/2 hours a day.

In addition to supplying Mt. Vernon's 1,800 customers the city has three commercial customers, Western and Northern Rockcastle Water Associations and the City of Brodhead. It will also furnish some water to the new Rockcastle Association, eventually.

Not all Rockcastle is furnished by Mt. Vernon. Part of the county water comes from Jackson county, including the Three Links and Cl-

## Venters sentences Montgomery to ten years in prison

Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters has sentenced Marjorie Gail Montgomery, 35, of Livingston, to ten years in the state penitentiary for the shooting death of a Livingston man last November.

Last month Montgomery pled guilty to first degree manslaughter and on Monday, Venters denied Montgomery probation and sent her to prison.

Montgomery shot William Car-

pen, 69, to death last year while he was asleep on his couch.

Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael asked Venters to deny probation because of the severity of the crime.

Friends and family members of Montgomery had circulated a petition asking for Montgomery's sentence to be probated.

However Venters ordered Montgomery to report to jail on December 30.

## Crab Orchard man injured in shooting

A Crab Orchard man was shot twice early Friday morning in an altercation at Copper Creek.

According to Kentucky State Trooper John Yates, Eugene Chasteen, 42, was shot once in the hand and once in the side by Derel Griffin, 30, of Copper Creek.

Yates said the shooting took place at Griffin's home on Copper Creek Road around 4:30 a.m. after the two men apparently got into an argument. Chasteen was treated at the

Rockcastle Hospital and transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington.

Trooper Yates said that no charges have been filed in connection with the case, but that information from his investigation would be presented to the January term of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Chasteen has been released from the hospital.

Rockcastle Sheriff Deputy Nubaniel Price assisted in the investigation.

## Homestead exemption increased by state

Revenue Cabinet officials of the Patton Administration have recalculated the Homestead Exemption on real estate for the 1997 and 1998 tax years.

The exemption, established under a formula prescribed in KRS 132.810, will be \$24,400 which represents a \$1,300 increase over the 1995-1996 exemption of \$23,100.

During the 1997 tax year, over 320,000 elderly or disabled Kentuckians will realize millions of dollars in property tax savings through the Homestead Exemption.

To qualify for the Homestead

Exemption, a person must be at least 65-years-old during the tax period or have been classified as totally disabled by an agency of the U.S. Government or the Railroad Retirement System for the entire year in which



Last week I had to make a business trip to Bowling Green for a meeting that I thought would last all day.

Fortunately the eight or ten other people in attendance were also from out of town and they all wanted to see the Corvete Museum. So we set a goal to be finished up with business by noon and go sight-seeing the rest of the day.

I'd been to the Corvete Museum under similar circumstances on two previous occasions and even ridden in Corvettes a few times when I was in college. Dickie Adams used to have one and so did Jerome Couch and I know I was in both of their cars a few times even though no specific memories pop right out. What I'm trying to say is that two visits to the museum is, at the very least, one too many. And unless a Corvete had something to do with losing your virginity there probably isn't reason to visit even once.

So the meeting broke up and my cohorts headed out to look at old cars. I graciously declined the tour and decided to explore some back roads on the way home.

The Cumberland Parkway from Bowling Green to Somerset is a

hundred and some odd miles of asphalt and toll gates and not much of anything else. It's the only road I've ever been on where I've longed to see the next toll booth so I could verify that I was not the last remaining human on the face of earth. I've driven fifty miles without meeting a vehicle coming in the other direction or glimpsing one in the rear view mirror.

I've driven up to the toll windows and stuck out a dollar bill even though I had the exact change already counted out just so I could speak to somebody and make sure that I was not the sole survivor of whatever it was that had made humankind disappear for the last hour. Suffice it to say that the Cumberland Parkway is in no danger of wearing out. Unless kudzu starts growing up in the center lines.

Anyway, I got the map out and started looking for alternate roads that linked up with each other and pointed generally in the direction of Paint Lick. Don't ask me the road numbers because I lost count. But every time I'd come to an intersection I'd try to guess which direction it was heading and I just kept going along like that. Louisville Courier Journal columnist/KET personality, Byron

Crawford, is the only person I know of that's better at following his nose than I am. Of course Byron has a bigger point of reference to follow so that's understandable.

It's a wonderful way to see Kentucky. I wound up passing through Calypool, Three Forks, Glasgow (big town), Wisdom, Knob Lick, Sulphur Well, Vester, Ella, Phil, Labascus, Yosmiece, King's Mountain, Mount Salem, McKinney and at least a dozen other Kentucky communities that don't have signs at the edge of town. I turned the usual three hour drive into over seven or so. It was dark when I got to McKinney in Lincoln County but I knew the way home from there without gassing.

South Central Kentucky is stunningly beautiful and clean. Hardworking tenders of the soil inhabit most of my route home. Lots of barns and old fences, grazing cattle and fields of winter wheat, people who throw their hand ups in greeting when you drive by and lots of UK Wildcats stickers on everything from road signs to pick-ups to John Deere tractors. Every few miles there's a real country store with a gas pump outside and a grinning proprietor inside who can tell you how to get to the next town or to Detroit or wherever you're going and how you should have voted in the last election.

I walked into such a store in Casey County about four hours into my trip home. I know it was Casey County because I'd seen a sign a few miles back telling me that what I was entering. I had a suit on but I'd shrugged the tie. Anyway, I walked in and noticed that half a dozen farmers were sitting around and old iron heating stove and they seemed to be in a pretty heated argument. A woman about my age was behind the counter reading the newspaper and occasionally glancing over her glasses at a television set up near the ceiling to see if Oprah was ever going to get to the point. Perfectly oblivious to the men.

I asked if there was a restroom and she told me "round back." I asked if she had Dixie Loaf and ordered a sandwich with mayonnaise and a good thick slice of onion and a bottle of Ski. Meanwhile the farmers were being polite and taking the whole thing in.

So I went out back to the "round back" and came back and the argument had resumed. I leaned up against the counter, took a bite out my sandwich, and one of the men glance over

at me and said, "You look pretty smart. Maybe you can help solve this problem. Come on over here and see it down." He motioned at an empty ladder back chair.

"Boy that sammich smells good," one of the other guys offered. "If it weren't so close to supper time I'd get me one too. Course I like mustard on mine instead of that slimy old salad dressing."

I did as invited anyway and got introduced all around. Stated my business for passing through, where I was from and all that, accepted congratulations for not being the yankee that I looked like and then the conversation turned back to normal.

"What we're talking about," my new friend said, "is this invasion of mice that happens every year when the weather starts turning cold. You never see one in the summer and then all of a sudden they're thicker than chiggers in a black berry patch. Nobody knows where they come from and nobody here knows how to get rid of them without putting out poison and sinking the house up till after the first of the year. And I'd dumber sleep in the barn with a bowling ball than sleep in the house where I can't smell anything besides a dead mouse."

Everybody nodded their heads and I started talking about cats. Not a man among them would allow a cat in the house. I mentioned traps and was informed that after you catch half a dozen mice in traps, they learn how to throw them without getting caught and then eat the bait. **Fifth graders need MMR and physical**

State Law states that every child entering the sixth grade for the first time must have a second MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) and a second physical. These must be presented before your child will be enrolled into the sixth grade.

These services can be obtained either at the Health Department or at your doctor's office. Please make an appointment as soon as possible. Also be aware that the sixth grade physical form must be the form approved by the State Department. The correct form is a Sixth Grade Physical form and has the date January, 1993, in the upper, right-hand corner. These are the required records needed for enrollment. If any certificates are incomplete or on the wrong forms, the parents will be notified to get the correct records.

By getting these records turned in before this school year is over you not only will be helping the school but you will also be helping your child's sixth grade year to get off to a good start. Please call the Health

Department or your Doctor's office for an appointment today.

The Rockcastle County Health Department and local doctors have the correct forms. If you elect to go outside the county to get these services, please be sure that the correct physical form is used. This may prevent your having to make another trip if the wrong form is used or incomplete. Call your child's school if you think that you may need a copy of your child's immunization certificate (shot record) to take with you to get

your child's second MMR. Do this before summer, when there may or may not be someone at school who can make a copy for you.

Your help and cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated. Again, you are urged to get the up-dated immunization certificate and physical as soon as possible. It will be a lot easier getting an appointment now than it will be during the summer.

Paul in II Corinthians 4 is talking about his suffering, abuse and misuse as a result of his ministry of preaching the gospel. vs 1-12. He goes on to make a very interesting point in verse 13: "We having the same spirit of faith according as it is written, I believed, and therefore have I spoken, we also believe, and therefore speak." May we develop this important principle that Paul speaks of

Paul said he had the same kind of faith as the Psalmist did, who spoke in Ps 116:10. "I believed, and therefore have I spoken." Paul said he spoke as a result of his faith in God and his word. Paul spoke out of conviction, the persuasion, the confidence, he had in God and the gospel that had been committed to his trust. Paul had said earlier in this book, II Corinthians 3:12 "Seeing then that we have such hope, we use great plainness of speech." The NAS translates the verse: "Having therefore such a hope, we use great boldness in our speech." Now boldness does not suggest arrogance or haughtiness, but confidence. Paul preached the truth out of conviction in his heart. His faith in the gospel he held in his heart moved and compelled him to speak. Paul was a fellow that was ready to defend the truth that he held to. "But the other of love, knowing that I can set for the defence of the gospel" Philippians 1:17. The early church was a militant, aggressive group that spoke the word of God without fear or favor. Their faith moved them to speak up and to speak out.

It seems the spirit of our day is to say nothing, and not speak out on anything that may seem controversial. It seems a lot of us are "spiritual whimps," and have the backbone of a wet noodle. Moral covards are not look favorably look upon by our Lord. cf. Rev. 21:8, Mt. 25:25-26.



**Trimming Fat in Holiday Foods**

- Use egg substitutes in recipes instead of eggs. 1 egg = 1/4 cup of egg substitute or follow the directions on the package. Egg substitutes can be found in the freezer section or refrigerated section along with fresh eggs.
- Used reduced-fat sour cream, lowfat or nonfat yogurt, or cottage cheese in sauces and dips. Skim milk can be used in place of whole milk.
- Evaporated milk can be substituted for whipping cream in some

- recipes.
- Sauté vegetables using a cooking spray until they are caramelized or prepare in the microwave with a small amount of water or broth.
- To add fiber to the diet, choose whole grain and bran flours. Whole wheat flour can replace one-fourth to one-half of the all-purpose flour in a recipe.

The holidays can be fraught with danger for those who are watching their fat intake. Rich foods, laden with fat and calories seem to be omnipresent. The temptation can be too great. In addition, traditional holiday food tends to be high in sugar, salt and sodium.

You can make some recipe substitutions to trim these items in your holiday cooking and still enjoy foods that taste good. Here are some general guidelines to help modify recipes.

- You can eliminate up to one-third of the fat in a recipe without sacrificing flavor. Prune puree or

applesauce can replace up to one-half of the oil, shortening or butter in compatible baked products.

- You also can often reduce sugar by one-third. To enhance the flavor when sugar is reduced, add vanilla, cinnamon or nutmeg. Sugar can not be reduced in

products made with yeast.

- As a general rule, omit the salt or reduce by one-half. This may be more acceptable if you gradually reduce the amount each time you make the recipe. Do not eliminate salt from yeast bread or rolls as it is an essential ingredient for flavor and texture.



## Legislative Update

### Rep. Danny Ford Reports from Frankfort

The legislative process to reform the Workers' Compensation Program in Kentucky got a fast start during our Special Session Call when the Governor personally addressed a joint session of the Senate and House of Representatives.

During the course of the first week, three House Bills, HB1, 5 and 6 were combined, debated, revised and combined into HB1, Committee Substitute 2. Discussion continued simultaneously between the Governor, legislative leaders, labor and business representatives, and actuarial. After long days and late nights, debate began on Friday morning in the House Chamber on HB1, CS2 and forty-one amendments that had been filed for consideration. The debate on the House floor covering issues that have been controversial between labor, business, attorneys, insurance representatives continued until after 4:00 p.m. The bill passed 80 to 17 in the House and is now under consideration by the Senate.

Regular legislative committees and task force meetings continued as scheduled. A two day meeting of The Task Force on Public Education heard testimony related to problems and solutions in our public education

system. In a surprise announcement to the Interim Committee on Education, Dr. Penny Sanders, of the Office of Education Accountability, offered her resignation to become effective in May, 1997, provided pending lawsuits on educational matters are concluded. One particularly important question in Education is the interpretation of statutes concerning professional requirements and hiring procedures for School Superintendents. While I expect that we will be able to finalize the Workers' Compensation legislation during the second week of this Special Session, the people of Kentucky have other pressing needs. Health Care must be addressed. With health insurance rates, reported last week to be increasing by as much as 28% on top of the already excessively high premiums, Health Care is a problem that cannot wait. We have already requested that the Governor consider adding Health Care to any Special Session that might be called in early 1997 and will continue to press the opportunity to correct this very real problem.

## Spirit-rousing gospel with New Coon Creek Girls and Cox Family


At Somerset Saturday night however, it was a different story when despite a valiant effort by the Rockets, the Briarjumpers won 78-71.


Junior John Brown goes over two Briarjumper defenders for a goal Saturday night in a game at Somerset which the Rockets lost 78-71.

max areas. But the most water is used by Mt. Vernon customers, as expected. The second biggest user is Western and Northern and third is Broadhead.

When the Rockcastle Association has all its customers on line they too will be a substantial user, the mayor noted.

He added it could be two years before the new plant is operational once the city gets approval from the bond issue. He said the city hopes to get the upgrade underway this spring.

"They may approve it quickly or they may drag it out," the mayor observed. "Only time will tell."

The City still owes about \$800,000 on their sewer system and Lake Linville that was installed in the early 1960s.

"If they hadn't had the lake, where would we be now?" the mayor asked.

In a statement on the present water system and plant the mayor said, "All expansion has been put on hold until the water plant is upgraded."

Remember, Mt. Vernon had its detractors when the sewer system was installed in the early 1960s. Opposition to the sewer system was left in the hands of a few people, who even went to court to stop it. They obviously failed and the city had a bond issue and a sewer system which was sorely needed.

It should be noted, the city council has the sole say so over a revenue bond issue. The public and Billy users do not vote on a bond issue, only the council. Any opposition from the public would be to see council members to express their opposition.

The first meeting of the council committee to over the bond proposals was Wednesday, December 11.




