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



lew schemes of fraud operating of foreign countries and over the Internet give consumers new reasons for caution in 1997.

reasons for caution in 1997. Many telemarketing schemes in the United States have been cracked by the Federal Trade Commission, along with state attorney generals. As a result, some operations have moved their businesses out of this country to avoid prosecution. Some of the countries useful frequently for scams include Canada, Nigeria, Australia and Germany Losson three streepecially bitter for victims.



Extradition laws make it difficult to prosecute, and victims have little hope of recovering losses. The Consumer Protection Division of the Kentucky Attorney General's Office says mail that offers consumers something that sounds too good to be true should be treated with caution, regardless of what country it comes from. Another significant increase in fraudulent schemes will occur on the Intermet. Con-arrists offer some of the traditional frauds through this medium that at one time only appeared in newspaper advertisements. These scams range from

work-at-home offers that cost con-sumers only a few dollars to elaborate investment schemes that cheat investors out of thousands.
